SIR HENRY CECIL DIES

Sir Henry Cecil, one of Britain's most successful trainers of all time, has died. He was 70 and had battled stomach cancer since 2006. Cecil, who married Jane McKeown in 2008, is survived by two children from his first marriage, Katie and Noel, and son Jake from his second marriage. The Warren Place conditioner registered 25 British Classic victories, and was responsible for guiding superstar Frankel (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) through his unbeaten career.

"It is with great sadness that Warren Place Stables confirms the passing of Sir Henry Cecil earlier this

morning," reported sirhenrycecil.com. "Following communication with the British Horseracing Authority, a temporary licence will be allocated to Lady Cecil. No further update is anticipated this afternoon."

Born near Aberdeen in 1943, 10 minutes ahead of his brother David, who died in 2000, Cecil took out his trainer's licence in 1969 and registered his first British Classic win with Bolkonski (Ire) (Balidar {Ire}) in the 1975 G1 2000 Guineas, following up a year later with Wollow (Ire) (Wolver Hollow {GB}). Frankel became his third

2000 Guineas winner in 2011. He also won four renewals of both the G1 St Leger and the G1 Epsom Derby, winning the latter with Slip Anchor (GB) (Shirley Heights {GB}), Reference Point (GB) (Mill Reef), Commander in Chief (GB) (Dancing Brave) and Oath (Ire) (Fairy King). Cecil, who was Knighted by The Queen for services to horseracing in 2011, was renowned for his record with distaffers and tallied six victories in the G1 1000 Guineas and eight in the G1 Epsom Oaks. He was crowned Britain's champion trainer on 10 occasions, with the lastest of those titles in 1993, and amassed a record 75 Royal Ascot winners.

Despite the lack of a Group 1 success in the early part of the millennium, Cecil was resurgent when Light Shift (Kingmambo) bagged the 2007 G1 Epsom Oaks, but the best was saved until last. His career reached a pinnacle through his association with the champion Frankel, who claimed 10 Group 1 events in an unbeaten 14-race career. *Cont. p3*

WARD TRIO BOUND FOR ROYAL ASCOT

Wesley Ward exploded onto the Royal Ascot scene with the 2009 victories of Jealous Again (Trippi) in the G2 Queen Mary S. and Strike the Tiger (Tiger Ridge) in the Listed Windsor Castle S., and the Keeneland-based conditioner will be back in Berkshire for more next

week. Ward, who also saddled Cannonball (Catienus) to run second in the 2009 G1 Golden Jubilee S., was fourth with Gentlemans Code (Proud Accolade) in the 2011 Listed Windsor Castle S., but sidestepped last year's meet due to unsuitable track conditions.

His team of three is headed by Susan Magnier and Ice Wine Stable's **No Nay Never** (Scat Daddy), an Apr. 26 Keeneland maiden winner who is pointing at Thursday's G2 Norfolk S. over five furlance, but will target Tuesday.

over five furlongs, but will target Tuesday's G2 Coventry S., over an extra panel, if track conditions dictate. Hat Creek Racing's **Sweet Emma Rose** (City Zip) is slated for Wednesday's five-furlong G2 Queen Mary S., having bagged an Apr. 5 Keeneland maiden before running fourth, after showing early dash, in the May 18 Rollicking S. at Pimlico last time. Ward's own **Ogermeister** (Silver Train), who scored by six lengths going five panels at Belmont in his only start May 16, completes the trio and is bound for the five-furlong Listed Windsor Castle S. on Tuesday's opening card. All three worked on Keeneland's turf strip Sunday and will ship to Britain tomorrow. Joel Rosario will ride. *Cont. p7*

Broadcaster and journalist Brough Scott, author of Henry Cecil: Trainer of Genius, paid tribute saying, "It's a death in the family and, obviously, our first thoughts are with his own family. Henry was very much part of the racing family and the thing with him is you have to use absolutes. He was the most charismatic and the best-loved trainer we've ever had. He was very competitive and was an absolute superstar. Not just a superstar in what he did, but what he gave to the game. He gave a personality to the game and he gave an attraction to the game. His battle with cancer coinciding with the ultimate triumph of Frankel put him so much at center stage. None of us will ever forget the sight of him at York and Ascot last year while he brought through the best Thoroughbred anyone has ever seen. To handle Frankel, a horse who had a hugely explosive temperament, through all that when things could so easily have gone wrong was an epic final chapter. He was as hard as nails underneath, particularly with what he went through in the last seven years, and, in the end, he didn't live for his horses, he was alive because of his horses. The crowd, the public and the race fans, they loved Sir Henry Cecil. He gave us some wonderful, wonderful memories and we thank the Lord that we had Henry Cecil, and that he had Frankel in those closing years. 

"It's a great loss to the sport and to everybody who knew him. He was such a great guy--different, special, a genius. We had six great years together. The first year we had an amazing run when Slip Anchor won the Derby and Oh So Sharp won the Triple Crown for fillies. There were many others--Old Vic who won the French and Irish Derby, Reference Point, Indian Skimmer--there were so many of them. He had a great sense of humour. He was a super-intelligent guy and really knew how to place his horses. He tried to have fun. The atmosphere during most of the time I was up at Warren Place was just fantastic. It was all due to him. It was a team effort, but everyone looked to him. He was the one making decisions about where to run the horses. The way he trained was great and the way he placed them was fantastic. He was a special trainer. To have a horse like Frankel and finish off his career when he wasn't in great health was incredible. He did a perfect job in making Frankel the horse he was."

Jockey Club Estates managing director William Gittus "Henry has been a hugely important part of the Newmarket training grounds for so many years. It is difficult to imagine what Warren Hill will be like without his familiar figure. His contribution to racing and to the town is hard to quantify, but is perhaps best demonstrated by how the public took such a famous trainer and such a famous horse in Frankel to their hearts in the last few years."

Professionally, it was actually quite hard to learn from him. He was genius like. He had a sixth sense with horses and would do things by feel rather than by the book. Personally, Sir Henry was kind, generous and humble. I will never forget the day he let me saddle [Polar Boy in the Brittania H.] for him at Royal Ascot [one of his 75 career winners at the Royal track] as a young, 19-year-old. It was the thrill of a lifetime.

Without Fear, a regular fixture on the Scandinavian stakes circuit since 2011, tried Meydan handicaps at the turn of this year, including a fourth to Await the Dawn (Giant's Causeway) there Feb. 21, and made a triumphant return to his old stomping ground with a decisive score in this meeting highlight. Sent postward off an eighth on the Meydan turf Mar. 2, he raced second going by the judge first time, but was shuffled back one spot along the backstraight. Regaining second on the home turn, the strapping bay was ridden to close on long-time leader Berling at the top of the two-furlong stretch, and swept by that rival inside the final 150 yards to secure a belated first pattern race with aplomb.

RACETRACK ROUND-UP

ON FIRE BABY OUT OF FLEUR DE LIS

GI Apple Blossom H. winner **On Fire Baby** (Smoke Glacken) has been withdrawn from consideration from Saturday's GII Fleur de Lis H. after spiking a fever, according to *Daily Racing Form*. "We're thinking and hoping it's only a virus," trainer Gary Hartlage told *DRF*. "We'll just have to see what the doctors say. Obviously, it's bad timing, but these things happen a lot, unfortunately. Hopefully, she'll be over it real soon."

LITTLE MIKE WORKS; U.N. NEXT

Little Mike (Spanish Steps), who closed out last season with a win over Point of Entry (Dynaformer) in the Nov. 3 GI Breeders' Cup Turf, recorded his first official work Tuesday morning following his return from Dubai where he finished 11th in the Mar. 30 G1 Dubai Duty Free. The 6-year-old, who also took last year's GI Arlington Million and GI Turf Classic, covered four furlongs in :50 4/5 over Churchill Downs' Matt Winn turf course. The move was the fourth fastest of six at the distance.

"I spoke to [trainer] Dale [Romans] and he said it was an easy work, but he did it so easily," said owner Carlo Vaccarezza. "He was just a monster. He was so full of himself. Dale says the horse is better than ever."

Also during his Middle Eastern sojourn, Little Mike finished eighth in the Mar. 9

G1 Al Maktoum Challenge. And, while both starts overseas proved disappointing, Vaccarezza offered an explanation for the gelding's latest uncharacteristically sub-par effort.

"He came out of his race in Dubai with a sprained ankle, and when he came back [after the race], his ankle was the size of a watermellon," recalled Vaccarezza. "We sent him to Abu Dhabi for X-rays and it turned out to be only a sprain. So, we brought him back to the States and he went to WinStar. He had lost weight after the race, but he has since put it back on. I've been to WinStar to see him three times, and he looks great. People at the farm have also been very pleased with him."

The bay rejoined Romans' string at Churchill last Friday and is expected to make his next start in the GI United Nations S. at Monmouth Park July 6. Following his trip to the Jersey shore, Little Mike is also expected to attempt defense of his titles in the Arlingon Million and the Breeders' Cup Turf.

"[Jockey] Joel Rosario has also committed to Little Mike for the U.N.," confirmed Vaccarezza. "And after that, we'll all get together and play it by ear. We'll just take it race by race."

"No Nay Never is speedy and he's talented, and I would love to go in the Norfolk," Ward told Racing Post. "He is so exciting, he moves like a cat and he's a sweetheart to ride. I'm very excited about him. Sweet Emma Rose is a small filly, [but] very, very fast. I sent her up to Pimlico for a stakes race, but with Ascot in mind I hadn't trained her hard. I didn't want to squeeze the lemon and thought I could get away with it. She was gasping afterwards, but she's come back nicely and did an outstanding breeze the other day. Ogermeister is another talented horse and, although he's bred for dirt, he's shown a particular affinity for grass. He won the only maiden race of the season so far for 2-year-olds in New York. There was a little moisture [at Keeneland Sunday], a little give in the ground. I'm relieved they all seemed to handle it because it might have been dry for 30 days at Ascot. I'm very hopeful. I'm bringing three guns with No Nay Never the number one."

DETTORI BOOKED FOR HAVELOCK

Frankie Dettori, who recently returned from a six-month drugs ban, has been booked to ride Silverton Hill's G1 Diamond Jubilee S. contender **Havelock** (Great

Notion), it was confirmed yesterday. Trainer Darrin Miller ships the homebred 6-year-old into Britain just two days before the Saturday feature, and he will line up off a win in the Apr. 13 GIII Shakertown S. at Keeneland and a fifth in the May 4 GIII Twin Spires Turf Sprint at Churchill Downs. "He looks a solid horse





pleasing connections in a workout at Sandown last week, will miss that intended engagement after suffering a training setback. "Unfortunately, Snow Fairy has suffered a minor setback, which means she will be on the easy list for a couple of weeks and will sadly miss Royal Ascot," read a statement on *edunlop.com*. The six-time Group 1 winner has been on the shelf since annexing the Sept. 8 G1 Irish Champion S. at Leopardstown.

SECOND-CROP REPORT


Two-time Horse of the Year and Lane's End sire Curlin (Smart Strike) had his first graded stakes winner last Saturday, and the good news for him is it was a Classic winner, as Palace Malice hung on to win the GI Belmont S., with the GI Preakness winner Oxbow (Awesome Again) second and GI Kentucky Derby winner Orb (Malibu Moon) third. So it was a formful race, although, like all runnings of the Belmont since Rags to Riches (Beyer 107) in 2007, it was slow. Palace Malice covered the last half-mile in about :54 flat--the last quarter in :27 3/5--and finished up in 2:30 3/5, for a Beyer rating of 98.

Three weeks ago, in my column of May 22 (click here), I quoted Andy Beyer as pinpointing the lack of stamina in American pedigrees now as the explanation why, in the previous five runnings of the Belmont, none of the winners had run a Beyer number higher than 100, whereas the average winning Beyer for the race since 1987 had been 107. We talk about them as numbers, but all speed figures begin with relative measurements of time, and a drop of seven points at a mile and a half is near enough a second and a half. That's how much slower Belmont winners have been in the last six years than they were previously.

But they still pay \$600,000 to the winner, even if the winning time was slow and the Beyer was low, and that amount was credited to Curlin's account, which propelled him into fourth spot on the TDN 2013 Year-to-Date Second-Crop Sire List (click here). But, with the three American Triple Crown races in the book, as well as nine of the 12 Guineas and Derby races to be run in England, Ireland, and France, today I'd like to concentrate more on the cumulative picture for the major second-crop sires (click here).

The Coolmore team bought into **Majestic Warrior** (A.P. Indy) after he won the GI Hopeful S. at Saratoga as a 2-year-old in 2007. He never won again, but right

about now they're not regretting their investment. Retired to the operation's Ashford Stud in Kentucky, Maiestic Warrior finished fourth by progeny earnings on the 2012 Freshman Sire List, and led the group of F2010 (first foals 2010) sires with 71 runners and 30 winners in 2012. None of those were black-type winners, but he did have four black-type placed, of which two were graded stakes-placed. But he's really fired in 2013, leading the F2010 sire group with five black-type

winners and 10 black-type placed horses, including GI Kentucky Oaks winner Princess of Sylmar and GIII Bay Shore winner and last weekend's GII Woody Stephens second Declan's Warrior. He's back in front of Hill 'n' Dale's **Midnight Lute** (Real Quiet) in 2013 earnings, and now leads all second-crop sires with over \$3.2 million in progeny earnings; those five black-type winners and 13 black-type horses. He is also tied with Darley's **Street Boss** (Street Cry), with 44 cumulative winners each.

Two-time GI Breeders' Cup Sprint winner Midnight Lute has undoubtedly been the 2013 revelation of this sire group. He was seventh on the 2012 Freshman Sire List, including a minor black-type winner, but this year he's been virtually unstoppable. Midnight Lute himself was trained by Bob Baffert for a partnership headed by Mike Pegram, and his three graded stakes winners this year are all trained by Baffert for the same owners-watch out, Coolmore. The latest of the three was Midnight Lucky, who won the GI Acorn S. at Belmont on Memorial Day.

Though he's not a graded stakes winner, the best colt by Midnight Lute is probably Mylute, trained by Tom Amoss. He was second to Revolutionary in the GII Louisana Derby, fifth in the Kentucky Derby, and Classic-placed when third in the GI Preakness. Midnight Lute is currently second among second-crop sires in 2013 earnings--about \$65,000 behind Majestic Warrior at the minute--and is now second overall on the cumulative second-crop sire list as well.


The revelation of this sire group in 2012 had to be Spendthrift's **Into Mischief**, a son of Harlan's Holiday whose biggest win came in the GI Cashcall Futurity at Hollywood Park as a 2-year-old. He was definitely on the unheralded side, but finished third on the 2012 Freshman Sire List. The freaky Goldencents ran second to champion Shanghai Bobby (remember him?) in the GI Champagne, then went and got the money in the GIII Delta Jackpot.

TDN WEEKLY SALES TICKER





"We're not quite done with the 2013 Two-Year-Old sales, but we almost are. From 6% fewer catalogued, 4% fewer have sold than last year, but for a 15% gain in gross and almost 20% gain in average over 2012. The corresponding gross is up 37.5% from the market bottom in 2010. Compared with pre-Crash 2008, 23% fewer were catalogued, 12% fewer sold (clearance rate +8% from catalogues), for only a 5% lower gross than in 2008, and an actual 7% rise in average. Now, those first-half mixed sales – well, that's another story."

Meanwhile, Vyjack, another colt by Into Mischief, won both his starts at two, including a minor stakes, and kicked off 2013 with two graded-race wins over the Aqueduct inner track, in the GII Jerome and the GIII Gotham, before running third to Verrazano (More Than Ready) in the GI Wood Memorial.

Back on the Left Coast, Goldencents scored impressively in the GI Santa Anita Derby. Both colts ran in two legs of the Triple Crown, but were unplaced all the way around, which suggests up to nine furlongs may suit the Into Mischiefs best. He is now sixth on the 2013 Second-Crop list, and third on the Cumulative Second-Crop list.

Number four on the cumulative list is now Darley's **New Approach** (Galileo). He was the leading European Freshman Sire last year (and fifth on the combined NA + EU TDN list). He's now in the same positions (first in Europe, fifth overall) on the 2013 list, which makes him fourth cumulatively. He's the first sire I've ever seen have three 2-year-old black-type winners at Royal Ascot, which he did in his first crop last year, and this year he has two Classic winners, G1 English 2000 Guineas winner Dawn Approach and G1 Epsom Oaks winner Talent, as well as the GI Epsom Derby second, Libertarian. He's heading straight for the World Top 12.

The 2007 GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner **War Pass** (Cherokee Run), who stood at Lane's End, but died after siring just two crops, can now be added to the likes of Saint Liam (one crop, including Horse of the Year Havre de Grace), Lawyer Ron, and Red Clubs (two crops each) as big losses to the breeding ranks considering how well they have done. War Pass had two Derby contenders this year: Revolutionary, who won the GII Louisiana Derby and was third in the Kentucky Derby and fifth in the Belmont; and Java's War, who won the GI Blue Grass S. War Pass is third on the 2013 second-crop list and fifth overall.

Curlin, sire of the GI Belmont winner, as mentioned above has now moved into fourth spot on the 2013 list, and is now sixth on the cumulative list. Seventh and eighth on that list are two more American sires: Street Boss, who leads the group with 31 winners in 2013 and is tied with Majestic Warrior with 44 winners overall, is also the leading North American Sire of 2-Year-Olds at this early juncture. WinStar's Spring At Last (Silver Deputy) was second only to Henrythenavigator (Kingmambo) on the 2012 Freshman Sire List. Spring At Last had four black-type winners last year, including three graded stakes winners. Two of the four have won black-type races again this year, but he had no Classic contenders, so, for the moment at least, he has slipped down to 12th in 2013 second-crop progeny earnings, and to eighth on the cumulative list.

Trainer Mark Casse did very well with these, though, and he is back in Canada with them, so we could see a Spring At Last resurgence at any moment.

Ninth and tenth on the Cumulative list are the two horses who fought out the finish of the 2008 GI Breeders' Cup Classic on the all-weather at Santa Anita (sigh. Those were the days), Darley's **Raven's Pass** (Elusive Quality) and Coolmore's Henrythenavigator. 'Henry' was the Leading Freshman Sire of 2012, when he had Group 1/Grade I winners Pedro the Great in Ireland and George Vancouver at Santa Anita. He's now been transferred to Coolmore in Ireland, so we now class Henrythenavigtor as number three on the 2013 list among European sires, and he is number nine overall, cumulatively. Raven's Pass had a big winter with his runners in Dubai, ranks second among European sires in 2013, and 10th among all second-crop sires cumulatively.

Of course, we have been monitoring this crop closely all through the spring, and there are quite a few other second-crop sires who have made an impression at one time or another. In particular we should mention Coolmore's **Duke of Marmalade** (Danehill), now a half-brother to G1 Epsom Derby winner Ruler of the World. He leads European sires with 20 winners this year, and his three 2013 black-type winners include the impressive Irish listed race winner Alive Alive Oh, who skipped the G1 Epsom Oaks, but is eligible to throw a scare into Talent and Secret Gesture, should she go for the G1 Irish Oaks next month. Duke of Marmalade is the number four European sire on the 2013 second-crop sire list (20th overall in 2013).

England's Newsells Park Stud's **Mount Nelson**, by Danehill's son Rock of Gibraltar, is the number six European sire in 2013 by progeny earnings (33rd overall), and second to Duke of Marmalade in 2013 winners, with 18. He's going in the right direction.

France's Haras de Lonray stands the 2008 GI Arlington Million winner Spirit One (Anabaa Blue). He is eighth in Europe in 2013 (39th overall) and has just had his first group winner, the G3 Prix de Royaumont (3-year-old fillies, 2400m) winner Eleuthera. Those three mentioned are actually all Danzig-line sires, and so is one super-sleeper in Kentucky, Darby Dan's Magna Graduate, by A.P. Indy's half-brother by Danzig, Honor Grades. Magna Graduate (27th on the 2013 second-crop list) won one Grade II and six Grade III races, placed in the G1 Dubai World Cup and GI Stephen Foster, and earned over \$2.5-million. He's only got 12 lifetime winners, but one of them is a very fast dual stakes-winning filly named Blueeyesintherein, and another is a colt trained by Kenny McPeek named Bellarmine, who looks like he might be stakes caliber, too.

Oh, and the world's most expensive horse ever sold at auction, the \$16-million 2-year-old **The Green Monkey** (Forestry), had his first black-type winner last week, Kinz Funky Monkey, at Hollywood Park. *Cont.* p11



Sir Henry Cecil...

I had the great privilege of knowing Henry Cecil for more than 30 years. In 1982 I owned a hair in the tail of a horse who was for a time favorite for the 1983 G1 Epsom Derby named Lord Protector, by Vaguely Noble and trained by Henry for a syndicate organized by California bloodstock agent Rollin Baugh. I've been lucky enough to be in and out of Warren Place a few

times in the ensuing years, including a couple of times in the last couple of years when the tour invariably included a stop to see Frankel in his box. A lot of the professionals in this business have met and worked with many trainers, and been, really, lucky enough to have been around many of the top operations. With respect to

all the great living trainers, Henry Cecil was the greatest trainer I've ever been around. You could tell, when he was around the horses, he just understood them. It was like he was plugged into them. Yes, he could be self-deprecating, mocking; yes, at times--and sometimes for long stretches--he had a troubled personal life. It's great that he went out as the trainer of probably the greatest horse any of us have ever seen, Frankel, and that his last years were so rewarding professionally and personally, for which his widow, Jane, deserves immense credit and thanks. They say nobody is irreplaceable, but they're wrong: Henry Cecil is irreplaceable. Godspeed, Henry. Our lives were so much richer because of you.

Young at the Belmont: Twenty-Somethings Hit the Track in 2013 by Carly Silver

As usual, a good chunk of the Saturday race population at Belmont Park on June 8, 2013, consisted of longtime racing enthusiasts, each toting a *Daily Racing Form*. On this day, though, many more were new to the racing game, folks who trekked out on a warm afternoon to see the Belmont S. be run.

My longtime friend and fellow racing enthusiast Liz Young and I were in the former category. She'd picked Orb for the Kentucky Derby and was eager to see the Belmont unfold. She ended up choosing the handsome gray colt Incognito. Me? I'd yet to pick a horse for the big race by the time we arrived, but my eventual choices, Freedom Child and Overanalyze, finished up the track.

To my surprise, there was a seemingly unending supply of

twenty-somethings crowded on our train from Penn Station to Belmont. Why were all of these people, likely newbies to racing, heading out to Long Island?



I found myself a bit put off by many attendees'

elegant attire. I hadn't known that fancy dress was recommended, so I came in a three-quarter sleeve T-shirt (which I later exchanged for a simple tee), jeans, and sneakers, figuring that, if I was going to be on my feet all day, I might as well be comfortable. To my surprise, though, the Derby dress rules applied to nearly every other twenty-something I saw at the track. Fascinators and tall hats bedecked many a perfectly coiffed head, while sky-high heels--impractical for crowding around the paddock or climbing staircases to the grandstand, I thought--were scattered throughout the crowd.

Did the races always call for young people to dress to the nines? Not necessarily. I blended in, without even trying, as an average racegoer. Were they hoping to find a race that captured the glamor of the Triple Crown? If so, it's sad to say that they missed out on that event after the first Saturday in May. Were they there with family to celebrate, or was their trip simply for the beautiful weather and time with friends? I attempted to track down my peers in an effort to hear their opinions on the race, on Belmont fashion, and the Sport of Kings.



I found John McHale, 18, at a picnic table in the backyard of Belmont Park, sitting with his friends and family. He hails from Rockaway in New York. A longtime racegoer, he was at his first Belmont S.,

though he visited Belmont Park often since age two. He had chosen Midnight Taboo to win the race.

Alexandra Dumite, 22, was kind enough to chat with me while we were waiting in line together. We exchanged stories about being relatively recent college graduates and trying to find apartment housing in New

York. Just last month, Dumite graduated from the University of Richmond. A Milwaukee, Wisconsin, native, she is currently interviewing for jobs in entertainment production. Dumite was at the Belmont with her boyfriend and his family--his uncle is particularly into racing. When I spoke to her at 3 p.m., she didn't yet have a Belmont pick. Though she has

attended the Preakness before, she was at her third Belmont S. Dumite found the event to have a good mix of people--rich and regular, paupers and the pampered.

As I made my way through the backyard in the afternoon, young people stretched out on blankets, snacked from picnic baskets, and rooted their picks on while watching the races on TV screens. They swarmed around food trucks.

gathered in front of the ESPN truck for a sports trivia contest, and queued for overpriced lemonade. They were everywhere--which bodes well for racing. In an era in which lesser-known sports have trouble gathering new fans, I was happy to see people my age at the track. They might have been blocking my view of the stretch or blowing what sounded like vuvuzelas far too loudly on the train, but it's good that they were there. Racing needs new blood.

I found myself drawn to one group of friends clustered on the backstretch. Its members, mostly men, wore creative, horse-shaped balloon hats. A dapper

Blake Jones, 22, impressed with his festive attire, looking like a '20s businessman from F. Scott Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby*. Marcus Klemmer, 24, wasn't in it all for the race: he confessed that the two biggest draws for him were horses and food trucks, in that order. When asked what he found most appealing about the event, Adam

Weinrib, 22, observed, "It's the event. It's the camaraderie."

Everyone had their own pick for the big race later in the afternoon. Klemmer favored Orb for the Belmont for sentimental reasons. When he was a member of the Syracuse University lacrosse team, Klemmer's nickname was "Orb" because of the way he ran. Weinrib didn't have a specific horse he wanted to win--he just favored any runner but Goldencents, as he wasn't a fan of the horse's part owner, Rick Pitino, the men's basketball coach for the University of Louisville. It's good, then, that Goldencents wasn't entered in the race.

As always, it appears that no single person came to the race for the same reason. Admittedly, I only spoke to a portion of the population at Belmont that day, but everyone experienced the Belmont differently. Some came with a group, while others ventured alone. Some came dressed to the nines, ready for their glamor shots, while some--like yours truly--looked like they were headed to the gym. Some came for the horses, some came for the food, and some came for the company. As Joe Palmer would say, This Was Racing.

Jack Knowlton, operating manager of Sackatoga Stable who campaigned 2003 GI Kentucky Derby and GI Preakness S. winner Funny Cide (Distorted Humor), will receive the Safe Home Equine Protection Award. Knowlton receives this award for his anti-slaughter efforts and work against equine abuse, including his time spent on the New York State Task Force on Retired Race Horses. "I am honored to receive the Equine Advocates' 2013 Safe Home Protection Award," said Knowlton.
