



# OPPENHEIM ON KEENELAND SEPTEMBER

In his report on the Keeneland September Sale in Monday's *TDN* (click <a href="here">here</a>), Lucas Marquardt referred to the market as being both relatively stable and polarized. Both things are true. I'm sure most people would agree that knowing what to expect from the Thoroughbred marketplace can't simply be a matter of referring to the previous year; this year, for example, the fact that there were 16% fewer horses in the \$300,000-average Book 1, and 400 more horses in the 'back books' suggested to us that a fall in the sale's overall gross was to be expected. We projected that decline could be as much as \$30-million, resulting in a \$250-million gross, and that \$23-million of that decline was likely to come in Book 1.

In the event, as we reported Sept. 15, the decline in Book 1 was limited to \$14-million, mainly because the average, for those sold, rose almost 15%, from \$303,072 last year to \$347,471 this year; also, however, the clearance rate from the Book 1 catalogue declined over 4%, from 61.2% in 2015 to 57.0% this year. Ninety-seven fewer horses--a decline of 22%-were sold in Book 1 this year, prompting predictable calls for a further contraction of Book 1 to a two-day sale. Format changes by sales companies cause consternation if not havoc to us hard-working journalists covering the sales--most, understandably, just give up and report what the sales companies say--but they are inevitable. *Cont. p3*

NBC will air a live 90-minute telecast from Gulfstream on race day and all coverage will be streamed live on NBCSports.com and the NBC Sports app.








### Keeneland September (cont. from p1)

It won't come as a total shock if we find there will be format changes for the September Sale 2017.

The undoubted good news from the sale was that the decline in gross for the whole sale was

limited to about \$8.6-million, or 3%. So, in terms of pre-sale projections, the sale was definitely stronger than we expected. It would probably take the rest of the morning, and you would be asleep in five minutes, if I attempted to unravel and explain the various technical movements of market tiers (or, in Keeneland September terms, 'Books'), but let me make just two points which seem significant.

and the market in general, had a huge 30% rally in 2013, in which year the Keeneland September gross went from \$220-million to \$280-million. Both the gross and the average (around \$100,000) for the whole sale hovered around those figures in 2014 and 2015. Because of the shift in number from Book 1 to the back books, we projected a 10% decline in both gross and average. In fact the gross declined by 3% and the average by 5%, but both remained well within the range to which the 2013 recovery carried the numbers (see the Weekly

Sales Ticker for details).

The second point, which is not so cheery, is the decline in the clearance rate from the catalogue, between withdrawals and not-solds--but the good news there is that several consignors we spoke with reported a brisk trade in horses not sold in the ring being moved after the sale, so perhaps this metric isn't as worrying as it looks. In 2013, there were 3,908 yearlings catalogued to Keeneland September. There has been a

15% increase in the number catalogued since 2013, but only a 2% increase in the number sold. The clearance rate from the catalogue has therefore fallen 8% since 2013, from 70.2% that year to 62.3% this year; last year 65.9% of yearlings sold, so





"When the Keeneland September Yearling Sale gross leapt by \$60-million in 2013, it marked the end of the four-year recession in the thoroughbred market in North America; unfortunately, the only real growth since has been in the number catalogued, resulting in an 8% decline in the clearance rate from the catalogues since then. Cutting the numbers in Book 1 by 16% meant the sale gross almost had to be down, so the market was strong, up to a point, to be down only about 8% in gross."

3.6% of that 8% drop has been from this time last year. However, this might not be such a pointer to falling demand as it seems on the face of it. Consignors at the 2-year-old sales are used to getting a high percentage of their RNA's moved within a day or two after the sale, and there is plenty of anecdotal evidence that trend is spreading to the yearling sales.

One other statistic Lucas cited Monday looks very significant:

the 34% rise in the number of \$500,000-plus yearlings, from 69 last year to 93 this year; and the 12% fall--over 100 yearlings--in the number sold between \$100,000-\$499,000. That's a little bit what I think Lucas meant by 'polarization.' On the one hand, it's great news that the power players, especially the new American big-hitters--even with only token top-level European buying by Coolmore, Darley, and Shadwell--are really prepared to pay \$500,000+ for the top prospects. On the

other hand, the fall in the number of \$100k-\$499k yearlings from 831 to 728 has to be a big worry, because it means overall the number of six-figure yearlings declined from 900 to 821, which is a 9% fall in the overall number of six-figure yearlings-even though, for those which did sell, the average price was probably 10% higher. It also means there was a 7% rise, from

1,845 to 1,971, in the number of yearlings sold for under six figures. So 79 fewer yearlings sold for \$100,000 or more; and 126 more yearlings sold for under \$100,000. It was all fine, like it always is, if you had one 'they wanted,' but that bar gets higher and higher, and means breeders are even more dependent on the 'home run horse' to show a significant profit. These results will not be encouraging breeders to step up their

investment in stud fees, and after four years in which the September Sale has grossed \$280-million, \$279-million, \$281-million, and now \$272-million, it's difficult to imagine many sires being able to justify a stud fee rise for 2017. Essentially, after a tremendous recovery in 2013, the market has remained flat for four years.

With Keeneland September now completed, rather than using sire averages just within that sale, we now switch back to their overall

averages for the sales season, which are available in the Sales Statistics (formerly Insta-Tistics) section of the *TDN* website. To see a list of the top North American sires of yearlings after Keeneland September, click <a href="here">here</a>. It won't be a huge surprise, after reading the Keeneland statistics, that Gainesway's **Tapit** (41/52 through the ring sold, average \$651,463) and Claiborne's

War Front (21/29, \$626,428) are the leading North American sires by average, and are a long way in front of everybody else. Tapit and War Front registered single-digit increases from their respective 2015 yearling averages. Darley's Medaglia d'Oro registered a single-digit decrease, but still ranked third, with a \$344,100 average from 40 sold. The next three spots went to sires which showed significant increases from their 2015 averages: WinStar's Speightstown (33/49, \$325,666) and Pioneerof The Nile (43/59, \$261,046); and Ashford's deceased Scat Daddy (69/94, \$245,026). A few older sires saw pretty significant drops in average.

Claiborne's **Orb** (51/65, average \$148,146; click <u>here</u> to see the averages for North American first-crop sires of yearlings) was the leader among first-year sires, with a total of seven

horses with more than one sold ending Keeneland September with averages over \$70,000, including: #2, Ashford's Shanghai Bobby (56/65, \$120,835); Calumet's Oxbow (23/27, \$112,260); Darley's Animal Kingdom (43/67, \$106,802); WinStar's Paynter (33/55, \$93,045); Hill 'n' Dale's Violence (62/80, \$87,556); and Adena Springs' Point of Entry (25/38, \$74,220).

Now attention turns back to the European sales, with Goffs, in Ireland, starting today, and

Tattersalls, in Newmarket, who will be selling for most of the following two weeks. Tattersalls, in particular, is likely to benefit in the short-term from political events outside its control, namely Brexit making the £ sterling 20% cheaper than last year. With Arqana's Deauville August and a few other European yearling sales already in the books, as well as having a few selling in North America, Coolmore's **Galileo** (8/13, \$557,826) and Juddmonte's **Frankel** (11/13, \$512,903) are the leading European yearling sires so far this year (click <a href="here">here</a>). Galileo, Frankel, Tapit, War Front, and Darley's **Dubawi**, who hasn't had a yearling sell yet this year, constitute quite a formidable top five North American and European sires of yearlings, and likely all five will be averaging well over \$500,000, weak sterling or not, by the end of the next three weeks.



### AN APOCALYPTIC STROLL DOWN MEMORY

The everything-must-go auction to liquidate the contents of Rockingham Park drew an estimated 800 bidders and observers to the defunct Salem, N.H., track Sept. 24, when decades of memorabilia, wall-sized photographs, and archived press and marketing items were the main attraction. A scaled-down crowd of about one-tenth that number attended Sept 25, when industrial kitchen equipment and thousands of chairs, televisions, poker tables, and bingo equipment were among the bulk items sold to the highest bidders.

James St. Jean Auctioneers, which conducted the two-day auction, would not reveal specifics about the sales, and the main

number at Rockingham yielded a recording that said the facility was no longer open for business. But various reports on Twitter, including those posted by Jessica Chapel on @Railbird, revealed that items such as the track's nameplate from under the finish wire (\$2,000) and the finish line pole marker (\$700) attracted robust bidding.

If the Sept. 23 preview day for the auction was any indication, many of the attendees seemed to place more value on the sentimentality of the items rather than what

the keepsakes might actually be worth on the open market.

The massive large-format images of champions Dr. Fager and Roman Brother that once graced the walls of the Rock press office commanded the auction setup in what used to be the track's sports bar, sharing space alongside jockeys' room scales and a tattered collection of long-since-faded silks and harness colors left behind after the track last hosted Thoroughbreds and

Standardbreds in 2002 and 2009, respectively.

Hundreds of boxes of chart books, news clip scrapbooks, and troves of racing magazines that looked as if they hadn't been thumbed through in years were given a thorough going-over at Friday's preview, as were the thousands of individual photographs loosely organized by date or subject and grouped into smaller individual lots.

The sheer amount of archived 1940s-60s press photos of "Uncle Lou" Smith and his kindly wife Lutza presiding over innumerable fundraisers and charity drives was testament to the days when giving back to others in the community seemed to be the primary function of track management. The awe-inspiring images of the "old Rock" clubhouse and grandstand being consumed by flames in the catastrophic 1980 fire drew many comments from onlookers who recalled the devastation firsthand.

At one point during the preview, a longtime member of the New England backstretch community grew emotional upon coming across a smiling portrait of recently deceased jockey Jill Jellison, and the woman pleaded with an auction company employee to allow the photo to be removed from its numbered lot. The auction rep respectfully sympathized with the woman, and out of earshot of the other previewers, quietly suggested



that she talk to Rockingham general manager Ed Callahan, who he said was making exceptions by letting some small sale items be handed over to people who had personal attachments to them before they went up for bidding.

A good number of items in the memorabilia section appeared to have significant archival value, but were badly outdated in terms of the media that they were recorded on.

Marveling over table laden with a 1965 film newsreel of Walter Cronkite reporting on the New Hampshire Sweepstakes race and boxes of long-playing records containing broadcasts of 1950s racing shows from a local radio station, Callahan gestured with his arm and said, "But what would you even play them on?"

For certain, though, the best reminiscences of Rock weren't up for sale. You could still attempt to access them by exploring long-abandoned areas of the property, although memory lane appeared as if it had been blind-sided by an apocalypse.

The main one-mile oval itself was in remarkably good shape, with the compacted stone dust base of the harness track admirably fighting off the out-of-control vegetation attempting to take over from underneath the outer fence and sagging Fontana safety rail. Most of the homestretch was used as a staging area for the track's aged fleet of vehicles, tractors, and maintenance equipment, including an equine ambulance that

occupied a prime spot where the finish wire used to be.

The once-lush turf course, installed in 1986 and formerly maintained like a finely manicured billiards table, was unrecognizable as a racing surface. It was so parched and dry in some locations that even weeds seemed reluctant to take root.

A number of onlookers ventured out to pose for selfies in front of the decrepit tote board. The structure that was once a beacon of officialdom for countless races now seemed like a spooky, surreal shell whose electronic innards had been ravaged by the elements.

A trek across the overgrown infield, its drainage pond layered with green scum, led to what was left of the backstretch stables. Parcels of the barn area had already been subdivided and sold to retail developers, and were actively being demolished behind a fenced-off section.

The few barns that remained closest to the track were remarkably void of any physical evidence that racehorses once lived there. No stray horseshoes were left behind for good luck, although a few whiteboards remained intact with training routines outlined in faded, bleeding ink. Calendars remained affixed to the walls of several tack rooms, where time stopped in 2009, the year of Rock's last harness season.

The veterinary shed at the top of the stretch appeared

ransacked, the desks and floors strewn with x-rays of long-forgotten racehorses, a scattering of used syringes, and a curious collection of ribald equine-themed cartoons that no one will ever laugh at again.

The former executive offices in the administration building-the lone frontside structure that survived the 1980 fire--were utterly trashed. Among the scattered detritus were signs of the past (copies of New Hampshire racing statutes) and the unreckoned future (blueprints and architectural drawings of the proposed casino that never got built). Undated letters to season pass holders promising fun times at an upcoming race meet were haphazardly flung about the floor, some of them chewed by vermin.

Signage throughout the plant that once seemed authoritative now lent a touch of absurdity to the abandonment: "Keep off the Grass" warned one posting. The closed door to the stewards' office shooed away visitors with a "Hearing in Progress" warning. A stern "Reserved Only" placard stood silent sentinel over rows of dusty, unoccupied finish-line seats.

Up in the judges/camera/press box tower, the back door to the roof had long since been left ajar, inviting myriad birds to take over the cubbyhole rooms high above trackside. The glass-fronted announcer's booth was littered with dead flies, its swiveled binocular stand pointed in perpetuity toward the six-furlong chute.

The paddock stalls have become a storage area for track-apron benches that nobody will cheer from again. The jockey's

quarters was the only frontside structure locked up tight behind an "Authorized Personnel Only" sign, although the outdoor scale house not far from it looked as if the next good gust of wind would bring it crashing to the cracked asphalt.

One significant--even hallowed--item from Rock's past will escape both the wrecking ball and the auction hammer. Obscured from view by overgrown bushes, the granite gravestone of

Springsteel has stood solemnly in the track's infield for more than eight decades. A multiple stakes winner and fan favorite of a bygone era, the "Galloping Gray Ghost" was laid to rest not far from where he fell in a June 30, 1934, race.

"Injured In Service" is etched into Springsteel's marker. On Monday, the removal of the headstone was scheduled to commence. It has been donated to Old Friends Thoroughbred Retirement Farm in Georgetown, Kentucky.

"Where It All Began," was the marketing slogan stamped on many of the memorabilia items that sold at auction. Now Rockingham Park has officially reached its end.

"We've been working really hard, my agent Mark North has been doing a great job, and I'm starting to ride for a lot of different trainers--everybody is giving us a chance," Elliott said.

In the summer of 2014, looking to revitalize his career, Elliott moved his tack to Southern California, to Del Mar's seaside oval, where he began to network with trainers like Bob Baffert. Things were going pretty well, until he was kicked by a horse in the stable area, injuring his ribs. Elliott left the West Coast and rode at Keeneland that following fall, but looking back, Elliott said it

was too early to return, citing that his ribs were still bothering him.

"So I decided to take a break from riding for a while," Elliott said. "I got into another business for trainer Tevis McCauley, who owns Whitetail Heaven Outfitters, it's a deer

hunting operation--he bought another lodge in Kentucky and I got into partners with him on that."

Elliott bonded with McCauley over their shared passion for the outdoors, while riding horses for the trainer during that fall meet at Keeneland in 2014. Although McCauley still has a small barn of horses he trains at Keeneland, the Kentucky native's main focus now is on his deer lodge, located in Nicholasville, about 23 miles away from Keeneland.

"This region of the U.S. has become the hottest destination in the world to hunt whitetail deer," McCauley said. "Stewart [Elliott] had some extra time in 2015, so he decided to invest some money in our company."

Elliott subsequently sold his 20-acre farm in New Jersey and moved out permanently to Kentucky. At Whitetail Heaven Outfitters, Elliott took on a number of odd jobs, including putting out deer feed and checking hunting trail cameras. McCauley's deer operation, among other services, provides guided hunting trips to clients.

"Stewart guided a lot of the hunters because he is really good with people; he's a really likeable guy, and of course, being that he won the Kentucky Derby, his nickname around the camp was 'Derby.'"

Added McCauley, "As a matter of fact, we had visited a farmer to buy [deer] feed from him and the farmer recognized Stewart from winning the Kentucky Derby on Smarty Jones. He went into his house and pulled out a picture of Smarty Jones for Stewart to sign."

It seemed that even on the hunting trails, Elliott could not escape his riding fame, but he quickly became known for another talent--tree climbing.

"One day, we were trying to hang a tree stand, where you hunt out of to take a deer," McCauley said. "Whenever you hang a deer stand in a tree, you always have to saw some tree limbs. Stewart got out a little hand saw and climbed up the tree about 25 to 30 feet to saw off that limb. He shimmied up that tree like a squirrel."

As much fun as hunting was for Elliott, something was tugging at him to return to riding. Elliott was in Kentucky when he saw American Pharoah win the Triple Crown in 2015. Thoughts from his run in the Triple Crown in 2004 came flooding back, when, as Tom Durkin called it, "Smarty Jones was valiant but vanquished, finishing second."

Asked about how he got over losing that momentous race in the GI Belmont S. aboard Smarty Jones, who was trying to become the first horse to win the Triple Crown in 26 years, Elliott simply talked about how grateful he was to be in that position in the first place.

"You just have to go on," Elliott said. "You just go about business as usual. I just appreciate everything I got out of that experience. I remember before the Arkansas Derby that year I

was saying, 'This could be my first million-dollar race,' hoping to win that one. And then we got to the Derby and Preakness and won those. I'm just thankful that we had a great run to go as far as we did."

Back in the irons at the start of 2016 at Santa Anita, Elliott began working horses for the Baffert barn, hoping to capture some of the residual afterglow of American Pharoah's glory.

"Eventually something came open; [Baffert] gave me something to ride," Elliott said. "Actually, the first mount was here at Los Alamitos and the horse won."

Elliott began riding horses for Baffert regularly, riding numerous winners for the Hall-of-Famer this past summer at Del Mar, including American Pharoah's sister, American Cleopatra (Pioneerof the Nile), in her maiden victory. "I worked her back the other day," Elliott said of American Cleopatra. "There are so many nice horses over there [at the Baffert barn]. I've been breezing some new ones that are pretty nice, too."

Baffert is, in fact, a big Stewart Elliott fan.

"He is the nicest guy, just really pleasant to work with," Baffert said of Elliott. "He really enjoys what he does and he's very easy going."

Added Baffert, "Stewart is great with young horses, and extremely sharp out of the starting gate. His horses run for him and he's really helped me out. He is very talented and I think he's a very underrated rider."

Elliott has backed up those sentiments at the Los Alamitos Thoroughbred meet this month, winning seven of the first 18 races carded at the meet. He won three races on both the Sept. 8 and Sept 11 cards. Elliott's 2016 total earnings currently stand at \$1,825,281 from 345 starts and 48 wins.

But this isn't the first time Elliott has enjoyed a hot streak. Besides his stellar year in 2004 with Smarty Jones, Elliott rode a freakish six consecutive winners, and just missed a seventh, on March 18, 1990, at the recently defunct Rockingham Park in Salem, New Hampshire.

Born in Toronto, Canada, Elliott was inducted into the Canadian Racing Hall of Fame last year. He comes from a racing family. His father, Dennis, was a jockey for 23 years and his mother, Myhill, was an assistant trainer at Woodbine. The family moved to New Jersey in the 1970s and Elliott started his jockey career in 1981 at the age of 16, riding at Mid-Atlantic tracks like Keystone, Delaware Park and Suffolk Downs.

In 2004, the then 39-year-old told the *Daily Racing Form* that he anticipated riding for another seven years, putting him at retirement in 2011. But Elliott is still here, riding seemingly at the top of his game. At 51, Elliott now says that he sees himself riding for another three or four years and has high hopes for the upcoming Santa Anita meet.

"You have to go by how you feel and how your business is," Elliott commented. "I feel good. I jog, I try to take care of myself, eat right, try to get to sleep early every night."

When asked about winning the Los Alamitos meet title, Elliott added, "It's great, you know, that's what we work for, we get up early every morning and work horses. It shows that things are paying off."

Keeping tabs on Elliott back in Kentucky is his hunting buddy Tevis McCauley.

"There's not a more deserving person in the world to win that title than Stewart," McCauley said. "He's a hardworking, honest, good person and I'm super excited for him."

### McCARRON: FEDERAL INTERVENTION A

### **MUST** by Lucas Marquardt

Hall of Famer Chris McCarron became just the second jockey recognized as an Honored Guest by the Thoroughbred Club of America, and used his platform at Sunday night's 85th annual Testimonial Dinner to urge the adoption of a federal bill to establish a Thoroughbred Horse Racing Anti-Doping Authority.

"The status quo is not working, folks," said McCarron.

"Uniform medication rules across the country are a must. I know most people in this room don't want the federal government to get involved. But we don't have another avenue. Every other effort has been exhausted and pushed aside."

With only 20 of the 38 racing jurisdictions having voluntarily

adopted the Racing Medication and Testing Consortium's National Uniform Medication Program, McCarron said the industry needs to do more to protect its equine and human participants. He alluded to the ongoing case of Marcus Vitali in Florida, noting the trainer "has 46

medication violations in his career--23 in Florida alone," and yet, "is still being able to ply his trade."

Said McCarron, "It's a hard, cold fact. There are a lot of horses out there running who shouldn't be running. And the authorities in this business need to grab hold of those horns and do something about it...and soon."

McCarron added that the cost of operating a racing stable puts pressure on owners, who then apply pressure to trainers to run unsound horses who should otherwise be out of training.

"They're making poor decisions," he said. "To borrow and amend a slogan: Drugs don't kill horses. People kill horses."

Examples of racing's disjointed regulatory structure are easy to find, he said, offering the example of software programs like The Jockey Club's InCompass that allow racing secretaries to share information quickly and easily, such as which horses are on vets' lists. But such programs aren't being utilized in many jurisdictions.

"You can take a horse from California who is on the vets' list, and run him in Arizona," said McCarron. "They'll take the entry. Same thing with New Mexico. This is ludicrous."

Other jurisdictions suffer from lax medication rules, he said. "In Oklahoma, you can run a horse on Bute and Banamine on

the day they're in [to race]," said McCarron. "This is crazy."

One result of America's patchwork of rules and regulatory bodies is an increased danger to jockeys, said McCarron, who noted a study by the American Medical Association, conducted 10 years ago, that revealed there are 35 accidents a week involving jockeys.

"It could be anything to being stepped on in the paddock, to getting flipped on in the gate, to hitting the deck at 40 miles an hour," McCarron said. "Worse yet, on average, two jockeys are

killed each year, and two more are paralyzed. We've had three paralyzed already this year. There's a multitude of reasons this is happening, but the Number One reason is discretion."

Said McCarron, "I've been to Washington D.C. six times, walking the halls of Congress, in support of HR-3084, which would give the government the right to assign USADA [United States Anti-Doping Association] to be the governing body of [racing medication and testing] in this country. This bill is supported by Keeneland, the Breeders' Cup, WHOA [Water, Hay & Oats Alliance], the

Coalition for Horse Racing Integrity, and The Jockey Club."

McCarron said two downward trends in racing should be a wake-up call for racing's leaders: the decline in starts per horse, and the decline in the number of tracks in the U.S.

"Back in the '70s, the average annual starts for a Thoroughbred was 14," he said. "Today, career starts is approximately 11. Due to the fact that horses don't run as often as they used to, field size is greatly impacted. And when that happens, fans don't want to bet on 5--and 6-horse races. They'll look elsewhere to enjoy their leisure money."

McCarron added, "When I was a kid growing up in Boston, there were 17 racetracks [in the region]. There's one left [Suffolk Downs]. I think they ran three days this year to keep their license. Forty years ago there were seven or eight Thoroughbred tracks in South Florida. We've got Gulfstream left. Calder's there, but it's just a track--no grandstand. I broke my maiden at Bowie on Feb. 9, 1974. It's going to be houses soon. I won my last race at Hollywood Park, the new site of the L.A. Rams football stadium."

McCarron concluded by urging those in attendance to advocate for change.

"I truly believe that there are enough people in this room with the power to cause change to happen," he said. "And for the good of the horse, the good of the participants, and the integrity of the game, something's got to give."

The night wasn't without humor, however. McCarron began by

thanking the late Bill Shoemaker for taking off John Henry in 1983, as well as, "Pat Day for taking off Alysheba, Jerry Bailey for taking off Go For Gin, and Victor Espinoza for taking off Tiznow," he said. "Thank you guys--you furthered my career. And I want to give a shout-out to Gary Stevens, for my bonehead decision to take off Silver Charm after riding him twice."

McCarron talked about filming a scene for the movie Seabiscuit, when his mount, depicting War Admiral, kept beating the would-be title hero, who was supposed to draw off by

> daylight in their famed match race. An irate Gary Ross, director of the film, stormed over and asked McCarron to explain why his mount kept winning the staged race.

"What can I say, boss? I've still got it," said McCarron.


McCarron was preceded at the podium by his daughter Erin, who used a blend of humor and poignant memories to introduce her father. She told of the time the McCarron family appeared on the gameshow The Family Feud, only to earn zero points ("They didn't get one question right"), and of the time the New England Patriots coach Bill

Belichick used a video of Tiznow's Breeders' Cup Classic win in 2001 to show his team the meaning of perseverance.

"You can't stop fighting the good fight--you have to go to the very last second, and have to fight with everything you've got: that's basically the motto that my dad taught all of us," she said. "He always taught us that we always needed to be our best. Not the best, but our best. And he taught us that everything had value: every person, every animal had value."

### Tampa Bay to Offer Richest Stakes Schedule in Track History:

Tampa Bay Downs will offer the most lucrative stakes program in the track's history--highlighted by the \$350,000 GII Lambholm South Tampa Bay Derby--during its 2016-2017 season, it was announced Monday. The meet, which begins Nov. 26, will feature a total of 24 stakes, six of them graded, for a total of nearly \$3-million in purse money.

The March 11 Tampa Bay Derby is a perennial stepping stone to the GI Kentucky Derby, and it will be joined by the Feb. 11 \$250,000 GIII Sam F. Davis S. as a "Road to the Kentucky Derby" points qualifying event in 2017. Both fixtures anchor the two biggest days of racing on the Tampa Bay Downs calendar. New to the Mar. 11 card is the \$75,000 Columbia S., a one-mile turf event for 3-year-olds, while purses for the Apr. 2 Florida Cup card have been increased by 33%.

"The increase in stakes purses for the upcoming season reflects the ongoing interest in our racing program throughout the Thoroughbred industry," said Vice President and General Manager Peter Berube. "While our graded stakes, especially the 3-year-old races, garner most of the attention, our stakes schedule offers tremendous value for horses in all categories."



### Baffert, O'Neill, Elliott Top Los Al Standings:

Hall of Famer Bob Baffert and Doug O'Neill shared training honors and jockey Stewart Elliott won his first Southern California riding title at the Los Angeles County Fair meet at Los Alamitos, which concluded Sunday. Baffert and O'Neill finished the season with five victories apiece. It was the fifth Thoroughbred meet at Los Alamitos in which O'Neill has either been the sole or co-leader while Baffert has led or shared the crown three times. Elliott, 51, finished with 12 wins, two more than runner-up Santiago Gonzalez.

The Los Angeles County Fair meet ended with a decline in average daily mutuel handle. Through Sunday, the average all sources handle was an estimated \$3,918,306 compared to \$4,110,983 in 2015. Last year's LACF season was 10 days, two fewer than 2016 as Santa Anita raced on the corresponding weekend 12 months ago.

"It's all about the product you put out on the race track, and for this meet, it was hard," said Brad McKinzie, vice president and general manager of the Los Alamitos Racing Association. "This was the toughest Fall meet we've had in terms of entries."



# GOFFS ORBY SALE STARTS TUESDAY

Four days of yearling trade begins today at Goffs with the two-day Orby Sale followed immediately by the Sportsman's Sale.

The profile of the Orby has increased dramatically in recent years, a fact which has not escaped the attention of buyers from far and wide. Newcomers to the sale this year include David Ingordo, the team from Zayat Stables and Mike Carpenter among a strong American contingent, as well as visitors from Australia, Singapore and South Africa.

After heavy rain over the weekend interrupted some of the early viewing days, agents and trainers alike took advantage of a sun-drenched Kildare day to turn their long-lists into short-lists.

"It's great to see the sun and also so many new faces here at Goffs," said Chief Executive Henry Beeby ahead of his company's major yearling sale, which this year also features the first part of the Wildenstein Stables Dispersal of yearlings and horses in training directly following the Orby catalogue. The family's mares and foals will be offered in November.

An early highlight could be provided by <u>lot 22</u>, Baroda & Colbinstown Studs' colt by Galileo (Ire) out of the GI Beverly D S. and GI Flower Bowl Invitational S. winner Dynaforce (Dynaformer), while <u>lot 74</u>, a filly by the same sire who should draw plenty of attention is Ballylinch Stud's sister to G1 Dubai Fillies' Mile winner Together Forever (Ire) and half-sister to G1 Prix Jean Prat winner Lord Shanakill (Speightstown).

### **PEDIGREE INSIGHTS: BRAVE ANNA**


Few fillies' races can boast as rich a history as the G1 Cheveley Park S., first contested in 1870. Its long list of winners features plenty of fillies which were to make a huge impact, either on the track or as foundation mares, but none more illustrious than Pretty Polly and Sceptre, the winners respectively in 1903 and 1908. Sceptre went on to win the further top flight 2000 Guineas, 1000 Guineas, Oaks and St Leger, while Pretty Polly took the 1000 Guineas, Oaks and St Leger before establishing a highly effective female line.

No-one expects a modern-day Cheveley Park winner to make an impact in the longer classics, or indeed against the colts, but it is still a hard race to win, as Aidan O'Brien wryly commented after landing the race for the first time in the 21 years he has been training the Ballydoyle horses. **Cont. p5**








That odd exception involves former world class jockey Mick Kinane, who keeps a few mares at Clare Castle and was one of the partners who bred Authorized out of the mare Funsie (Fr)

(Suamarez {GB}). Kinane's association with the mighty Sea the Stars (Ire) (Cape Cross {Ire}) saw him receive a breeding right to the Gilltown stallion and that explains the origins of the only non-Coolmore sired offering from Clare Castle's six-strong Orby Sale draft at Goffs. Following the success of Authorized, the breeders sold

the mare privately to Paul Makin and she reappeared at auction at the Paulyn Dispersal at Goffs in 2013 where she was bought by John Warren for €550,000.

"We normally keep the mares if they breed a good one, but we were made a very good offer for Funsie, so we took it," said O'Loughlin. "We don't keep a huge herd, normally about a dozen in Ireland and we like to keep two or three mares in America, as

well. Barry Mahon, son of Juddmonte Ireland manager Rory, manages Clare Castle for us on a day to day basis and he oversees all the yearling prep also."

The American arm of the operation is also performing well, as evidenced by the sale of a colt by Shanghai Bobby (Harlan's Holiday) at Keeneland Book 1. Hip 265, consigned by Padraig Campion's Blandford Stud, was purchased by Mayberry Farm for \$575,000. The

mare, Coolwind (Forest Wildcat), had been bought by the partners at Keeneland in 2012 in foal to Candy Ride (Arg) (Ride

The Rails) for \$110,000 and is proving a shrewd investment.

The breeders were naturally disappointed to see Order Of St George turned over at short odds in the G1 Palmerstown Estate Irish St Leger at The Curragh on Champions weekend, but can take heart in the fact that this year he also added a G1 Ascot Gold Cup to his achievements which also include being crowned joint champion 3-year-old colt in Ireland in 2015 in addition to being champion European stayer. He could soon be in for his biggest test to date if he lines up in the G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe at Chantilly Oct. 2. As a foal, O'Loughlin described Order of St George as 'a big quality horse' and having sold his brother Kellstorm (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) for 875,000gns at Tattersalls in 2014, they will be hoping for more success when they return to Newmarket with a half-brother by Declaration Of War (War Front). Their dam Another Storm (Gone West)

delivered a colt foal by Australia (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) earlier this year, but unfortunately is currently not in foal.

The immediate focus however is on Goffs, a sale that O'Loughlin is a big fan of.

"Goffs has been kind to us over the years, we've

sold some good horses there and we are keen to support the sale each year," continued O'Loughlin. "The Orby is a great sale for buyers and sellers, there's something there for everyone and you often get some great value there too. I have experience of the sale from both sides and nearly every year there's a Classic winner sold there. We've a nice draft to bring this year. Of the six I'd say the best is possibly the Sea The Stars colt [lot 83] that we co-bred with Mick [Kinane]. His half-brother is a stakes winner in Japan and obviously the sire is having a great season."

Co-breeder Kinane is also looking forward to Goffs and is enjoying his second fruitful association with Sea The Stars. Cont. p4

"I was privileged to ride Sea The Stars and was fortunate he came along when he did," remarked the former champion jockey. "To have a breeding right to him each year is now a great bonus when you consider what a marvellous stallion he is proving to be. Naturally, we're hoping for a good sale."

Another of the Clare Castle draft that O'Loughlin is keen on is lot 438.

"We have a Declaration Of War filly and she is very nice," he said. "She is out of Cochabamba (Ire) (Hurricane Run {Ire}) and she looks precocious. She's a great walker with a big backside and is a quality, well balanced filly. She is out of a young winning mare that was group placed and James Tate has the Fastnet Rock 2-year-old half-sister and is very positive about her."

Clare Castle will also offer: <u>lot 106</u>, a bay filly from the first crop of Irish highweight Camelot (GB) (Montjeu {Ire}) out of the German listed winner La Sylvia (Ire) (Oasis Dream {GB}); a filly (<u>lot 192</u>) by the late High Chaparral (Ire), who is a half to G1 Prix Saint-Alary heroine Fidelite (Ire) (In the Wings {GB}); a daughter of Trishuli (GB) (Indian Ridge {Ire}) (<u>lot 321</u>), herself a full-sister to MGSW Imperial Stride (GB), GSW High Pitched (GB) and a half to MSW Zero Tolerance (Ire) (Nashwan), by Fastnet Rock (Aus); and <u>lot 411</u>, a colt by Pour Moi (Ire) (Ire) out of Italian G1SP Bright and Clear (GB) (Danehill), who is a half-brother to GSW Exosphere (GB) (Beat Hollow {GB}).

Considering the relative short history of Clare Castle the partners have been extremely successful in breeding high-class racehorses.

"We've raised around 40 black-type horses and two champions, so we'd have to be very happy with how things have gone since we started up," said O'Loughlin. "We are fortunate in that we are in a position to be able to utilize such a world class roster of stallions. Mr. Magnier has always been very encouraging and it would be very hard to work with the calibre of stallions that are in Coolmore and not invest in some mares to breed to them."

With stallion lynchpin Galileo not getting any younger, the Coolmore team will be anxious to develop an heir to his throne, similar to when Galileo himself stepped up just as Sadler's Wells was entering his twilight.

Concluded O'Loughlin, "I have a feeling at the moment that we have potentially some really top-class stallion prospects. I don't know which one it might be, but between Camelot, Australia, Gleneagles (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}), The Gurkha (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) and Declaration Of War, they have every chance to make it. Particularly the four Sadler's Wells line horses that we developed ourselves. They have all the attributes, the physiques, the race track performance, the damlines. The foundations are there." 

The records suggest strongly that it helps if your contender is sired by a member of the Danzig male line. The great Claiborne stallion was directly responsible for two Cheveley Park heroines, in the unbeaten Blue Duster in 1995 and Pas de

Reponse a year later. His double was quickly matched by his son Danehill, thanks to Wannabe Grand and Regal Rose in 1998 and 2000, with another of Danzig's sons, Zieten, getting into the act via Seazun in 1999.

The male line made it six wins in seven years when Danzig's grandson Grand Lodge came up with another unbeaten winner in 2001, in the form of Queen's Logic. Since then the male line has supplied Donna Blini (by Danzig's son Bertolini), Hooray and Rossdhu Queen (both by grandson Invincible Spirit), Vorda (by

grandson Orpen) and Tiggy Wiggy (by yet another grandson in Kodiac).



It was War Front, of course, who was responsible for both of Aidan O'Brien's challengers for the latest Cheveley Park. And it was these fillies--Brave Anna and 'TDN Rising Star' Roly Poly-who took advantage of fellow 'Rising Star' Lady Aurelia's abrupt deceleration on the climb to the winning post, with Brave Anna snatching victory by a short head. The news that Lady Aurelia bled three out of five shouldn't be allowed to detract from the War Front fillies' performances. At level weights, they covered the six furlongs faster than the colts in the G1 Middle Park S. less than an hour later and both showed plenty of courage and toughness.

As Brave Anna and Roly Poly strolled around the pre-parade ring together, it was impossible not to notice the physical similarities between the two, which extend to their facial markings. Perhaps this is hardly surprising because they are bred along similar lines. Whereas the victorious Brave Anna is out of a daughter of Sadler's Wells, Roly Poly--already winner of the G2 Duchess of Cambridge S.--is out of a granddaughter, by Galileo.

Bearing in mind that Sadler's Wells, like Danzig, was a son of Northern Dancer, it is understandable that War Front has been mated to a relatively small number of daughters of the 14-time champion sire. The pairing produces 3 x 3 to Northern Dancer (plus 4 x 5 to Forli). The seven Sadler's Wells mares with racing-age progeny by War Front have 11 foals, of which eight have started. In addition to Brave Anna, Liscanna has produced the year-older Hit It A Bomb, winner of the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf. Then there's The Brothers War, who was fast enough to win a listed race over six furlongs as a 3-year-old, even though his stoutly-bred dam Moon Queen was a Group 2 winner at around a mile and a half. And Omar Bradley was

> narrowly beaten over seven furlongs at G3 level in France at two, making it four group performers from eight runners.

This adds to the belief that War Front is destined to enjoy tremendous success with his growing number of progeny out of very accomplished racemares by Galileo--Roly Poly being one of the first.

It is going to be fascinating to see how far Brave Anna stays. Her career already features two disappointing efforts over seven furlongs, but the picture is clouded by the possibility

that she may not have been at her fittest for those races. Also, the ground was much slower then than the fast ground she encountered in the Cheveley Park. Cont. p6

### **Pedigree Insights: Brave Anna Cont.**

Last year, after Hit It A Bomb's Group I victory at Keeneland, I did a bit of research on Liscanna for an article in the Thoroughbred Owner & Breeder. Here's what I wrote:

"Sadler's Wells had 2,259 foals, but how many six-furlong races did they manage to win in Britain and Ireland after the age of two? The answer is a mere four. Victories over seven furlongs were also fairly rare, with just 33 successes compared to 333

over a mile and a quarter, 325 over a mile and a half and 199 over a mile and three-quarters or more. Add in all the victories over intermediate distances and the average works out to a substantial 11.2 furlongs.

"Sadler's Wells owed all of those rare six-furlong

wins to fillies, the best of them being the listed-placed Akua'Ba (now the dam of Group 2 winner Akua'da) and Liscanna. Although Liscanna was tried at up to nine furlongs as a 2-year-old, she proved fast enough at three to win the G3 Ballyogan S. over six. It isn't hard to find the source of her speed. Her dam Lahinch was a member of the first crop sired by the dual 2-year-old Group 1 winner Danehill Dancer and she helped put this future champion sire on the map. Lahinch won two races over five furlongs, including a listed race, before ending her first season with a narrow defeat in the G2 Rockfel S. She collected another listed victory at three, this time over seven furlongs. On her final appearance she contested the Prix de l'Abbaye, so she was obviously thought to be very speedy."

I went on to point out that Liscanna was the only foal Sadler's Wells sired from a Danehill Dancer mare. This takes on greater significance now that Sadler's Wells's imperious son Galileo has sired The Gurkha, Minding and Alice Springs--collectively winners of nine Group 1 races this year--from other Danehill Dancer mares. The fact that Liscanna's dam Lahinch was sired by Danehill Dancer means that Danzig appears in the second and fifth generations of Brave Anna's pedigree. With Nijinsky and Be My Guest also in her fifth generation, Brave Anna has five lines of Northern Dancer--a situation which is by no means unusual these days.

You can get some idea of the quality of Brave Anna's female line from the \$425,000 paid by Shadwell for her third dam, the Private Account filly Dublah, as a yearling. Dublah's appeal included the fact that she was a granddaughter of Paint the Town, a Vaguely Noble mare who earned a Timeform rating of 121 while racing at around a mile and a half. Paint The Town in turn was out of Belle de Nuit, a GI Test S. winner who was a half-sister to Evening Out, America's champion juvenile filly of 1953. Clearly Brave Anna's juvenile ability is nothing new for this family.
