HOLLYWOOD HORSEMEN LEND HELPING HANDS

The tragic brush and forest fires which have devastated Southern California have forced the evacuation not only of humansfleeing the flames, but equine victims as well. But trainers at Hollywood Park have not Ignored the needs of the horses displaced by the fires. The horsemen are working together to provide equipment and supplies; the track's stable superintendent, Gary Williams, is coordinating the effort. "Initially, we're working with Actors and Others for Animals, the organization that is working with displaced animals from the Altadena fire," Williams said. "But we think we can generateenough aid to help horse owners in other areas. asking trainers to donate bridles, halters...if they need feed and bedding, we'll work with our suppliers, and I'm sure they will help with donations of hay and straw." The 1993 Tropical at Calder meet opens this Saturday with a special 11:00 a.m. post time for six live races, followed by the entire simulcast of the 10th Breeders' Cup from Santa Anita. The two-month meeting kicks off with the \$50,000 Melreese Handicap at seven-and-a-half furlongs on the grass; beginning on Sunday, November 7, post time will move to 12:30 for the remainder of the season.

NEW STEWARD AT GULFSTREAM

Gulfstream Park President and CEO Douglas Donn has announced the appointment of Thomas E. Trotter as steward for the upcoming Gulfstream meet. One of racing's most respected officials, Trotter currently serves in that capacity at Keeneland and has held similar posts at Arlington, Delaware and Atlantic City. The 67-year-old Kentucky native succeeds Don LeVine, who resigned because of a conflict with his new position as chief steward in Pennsylvania.

ROMERO RETURNS

Jockey Randy Romero, who has spent the last two months riding in Hong Kong, has returned to the U.S. and will join the Churchill Downs jockey colony by Friday or Saturday. The 35-year-old Louisiana native, who notched one of his biggest victories at Churchill aboard Personal Ensign in the '88 Breeders' Cup Distaff, had moved his tack to the Orient from Saratoga last August.

CLASSIC

Jockey Jerry Bailey, who rode Black Tie Affair to victory in the 191 Classic, will have the mount on the French hopeful Arcangues. The five year old will be making his first start on the dirt and at a mile and a quarter Saturday. His trainer, Andre Fabre, is expected in California today. Trainer Bobby Frankel sent each of his Classic contenders out for a mile-and-a-half gallop Tuesday, and commented, "If I was a betting man, which I'm not, I'd gamble on the entry at 2-1 or better," adding, "Bertrando looks as good as he ever has." As for the condition of Marquetry's swollen face, the trainer said, "he is 80% better. I'm relieved after seeing th eimprovement. I'm sure he'll be okay for Saturday." Best Pal, the all-time California-bred money winner, came out of Monday's workout in good order. Jockey Club Gold Cup winner Miner's Mark had his first look at the Santa Anita strip Tuesday morning, galloping for trainer Shug McGaughey after arriving in California Monday. Wallenda and Devil His Due, who shaled the trip with McGaughey's colt, were also out on the track to stretch their legs yesterday; Super-Derby winner Wallenda will breeze a half mile this morning. The Belmont winner, Colonial Affair, will also tune up with a half- mile breeze for the Breeders' Cup today. Trainer Chris Speckert indicated yesterday that he is "leaning towards" Alex Solis as the jockey for his Classic colt, Pleasant Tango. Both he and fellow three year old Kissin Kris will work at Santa Anita this morning, while Canada's top sophomore, Peteski, will go five furlongs at Woodbine today, then hop a plane to the West Coast.

TURF

Last year's Turf winner Fraise, who upset champion Sky Classic at 14-1 last year, worked six furlongs in 1:19 Tuesday; jockey Pat Valenzuela was in the irons for the move. Solar Splendor also breezed yesterday, going five furlongs on the turf in 1:00 4/5. The six year old has been very unlucky in the Breeders' Cup; last year he wrenched an ankle and was pulled up, but he didn't even make it to the gate in 1991; he flipped over on the turf course one morning prior to the race and had to be scratched. Hollywood Wildcat came out of Monday's work on her toes and was back on the track yesterday for a jog; Beldame winner Dispute also jogged Tuesday.

MILE

Mount Jockey Chris McCarron was up on Eclipse Award winner Flawlessly yesterday mroning for her final Breeders' Cup breeze, five-eighths in :59 4/5 on the turf. Trainer Charlie Whittingham was pleased with the move. "I wanted her to work around a

minute, wo I'm happy...she's in good shape." Defending Mile champ Lure will try the Santa Anita turf course tomorrow; trainer Shug McGaughey announced yesterday that the colt will race at five. "Seth (Hancock) made that decision when he won the Kelso at Belmont Park. The family was moved by the way the crowd reacted to him." Irish 2,000 Guineas winner Barathea enjoyed a smooth trip from England Monday and should clear quarantine today. Jockey Pat Eddery will ride the French three year old, Bigstone, in the Mile. Eddery rode the colt once before, piloting him to win the Group I Queen Elizabeth Stakes last time out. D.C International winner Buckhar was scheduled to leave Belmont at 4:30 this morning for his trip to the coast. The lightly-raced five year old has won half his 16 career starts, and is four-for-five at a mile. The Mott Mile team of Lech and Paradise Creek both breezed yesterday, with the former going five-eighths in :59 3/5 under jockey Craig Perret, who will ride him Saturday, and the latter testing the turf in 1:18 1/5 for six furlongs. Jockey Jose Santos will ride Fourstars Allstar in the Mile; the New York runner is expected at Santa Anita today. Trainer Ron McAnally indicated yesterday he would prefer to runJohann Quatz in the Mile, rather than the Turf. "He has proven to me that he is a good mile to a mile-and-a-quarter horse, and I would hate like heck to experiment at a mile and a half." Trainer John Gosden, who took the inaugural running of the Mile with Royal Heroine, has yet to decide whether his Catrail would go in the Mile or the Sprint; stablemate Wolfhound will likely have Jockey Frankie Dettori in the saddle for the Mile. The speedy filly Visible Gold worked five-eighths in :59 1/5 yesterday, but trainer Paco Gonzalez said he is considering skipping the Mile in favor of the Louis Rowan Handicap, a race she won last year, at Santa Anita Sunday.

JUVENILE FILLIES

Jockey Pat Day has picked up the riding assignment aboard Team Lukas' Stellar Cat; Day won the '87 Juvenile Filles aboard Epitome. The rider has been on the two year old once before, winning an allowance race at Keeneland in October. The daughter of Storm Cat worked a solid half-mile in :46 1/5 at Santa Anita yesterday. New York invader Heavenly Prize was out for a gallop yesterday morning after shipping in Monday; the undefeated filly handled the Santa Anita surface with no problem. Group I winner Coup de Genie is awaiting the results of her blood test; she was expected to clear quarantine yesterday and will have her first U.S. gallop this morning. Oak Leaf winner Phone Charter is scheduled to have her final Breeders' Cup breeze today or tornorrow.

SCOOPS

Anyone can have an off day. Four-year-old Bertrando has only been off the board once in 17 lifetime starts. The son of '86 Classic winner Skywalker was ninth in this year's Santa Anita Handicap, but trainer Bobby Frankel excuses the offpar performance. "He had a skin disease and we rushed him into the race. I have never seen horses run well with skin disease. His bridle broke before the race and they were wrestling with him at the gate. He came out of the race lame, and we're not sure why. Maybe he turned an ankle," It just wasn't his day.

In the Money, Best Pal would become the third all-time leading money winner with a victory in the Classic. The gelding



is currently fifth on the list, behind Alysheba, John Henry, Sunday Silence and Easy Goer.

- * Looking for a long shot? Try the Sprint, where favorites are one-for-nine, odds-on choices are 0-for-three and the average payoff is better than \$27.00. Favorites have fared better in the Turf, winning three of nine, but again, the odds-on choices are 0-for-two and the average payoff is a whopping \$34.30.
- * As a matter of fact, overall, odds-on favorites have gone 0-forsix in the four races open to all older horses. The two year olds have chalked up a much better record; odds-on choices are three- for-three in the Juvenile Fillies and one-for-two in the Juvenile.

The Distaff is the race most likely to produce an odds-on favorite. There have been eight in the nine runnings, and six have won. The 1992 edition was the first without a favorite at less than even money.

* Jockey Laffit Pincay Jr. is the only rider to have notched three Breeders' Cup wins in the same division. The Panamanian has taken the Juvenile three times, including the '86 running at Santa Anita aboard Capote. Pincay rides Flying Sensation in the '93 Juvenile.

TAKING THE BREEDERS' CUP BY STORM By Jay Privman

At the start of the year, it looked as though Bobby Frankel had more firepower than the Desert Storm troops. With an influx of Europeans, primarily from Juddmonte Farms, Frankel was the consensus best bet prediction as trainer of the year. A wet winter in California delayed Frankel's start, but since the weather cleared, Frankel has marched a steady and sure path to an Eclipse Award. Frankel is the nation's top money-winning trainer this year, with purse earnings of \$6.9 million. To get an idea of his dominance, consider the terrific year of Shug McGaughey. He is second with \$4.6 million, yet that is onlt two-thirds of Frankel's total. the money title," Frankel said. "That's something I've got control over. The Eclipse Awards, personalities get involved." For Frankel's year to be complete, it would be appropriate for him to win a Breeders' Cup race Saturday at Santa Anita, But the Breeders' Cup has been a windmill to Frankel's Don Quixote. He has run 16 horses, and had 16 losers. The Sour Sixteen Frankel will have excellent chances in several Breeders' Cup races this year, most notably the Classic. He will send out the three-pronged entry of Marquetry. Missionary Ridge and Horse of the Year candidate Bertrando. He also has the flaky filly Toussaud in the Mile, front-running Luazur in the Turf, and he was hoping to get Now Listen off the alternate list and into the Sprint. "I would like to win one. That would make my year," Frankel said while watching his horses train this week at Santa Anita. "Just one. I don't want to be a pig. Frankel believes his best chance is with Bertrando, the speedy colt who has scored wire-to-wire wins in the Pacific Classic and Woodward Stakes in his last two starts. "He has had seven weeks off, but the schedule has worked very well," he said. "If Bertrando runs his race, he'll be tough to handle. "I've always thought he was a good horse." When he was 2, I thought he was better than A.P. Indy. I've always had a lot of respect for him, even when he wasn't in my barn." Frankel believes all three of his Classic runners are coming up to the race in good order. He is particularly enthused over the way Missionary Ridge has trained of late. Marquetry, whose style is similar to that of Bertrando, has been compromised in races where they have gone head-to-head. But Marquetry is a good horse in his own right, with graded stakes wins each of the last three years. "If it wasn't for Bertrando, he'd probably have won another \$1 million this year," Frankel said. mase of

Toussaud, Frankel added, "drives me nuts." She balks in the morning while training, takes forever to get to the starting gate in the afternoon, and stops to a common gallop if she makes the lead too soon. But Toussaud has won four stakes this year, making her worth the fuss. "I wish I knew what makes her tick," Frankel said. "I don't think we've seen her best race. I've never gotten to the bottom of her." Just days before the Breeders' Cup, Frankel seemed remarkably relaxed. The anxiety that is understandable on the eve of this event was absent. "I might second-guess myself the night before, thinking t should have done this, could have done that," Frankel said.

"But right now, I'm happy,"
