### POST POSITIONS SET FOR THE 10TH BREEDERS' CUP:

The post position draw for the 10th running of the \$10 million Breeders' Cup Championship was held yesterday at Santa Anita; 82 horses have been entered for the seven Cup races. The Classic, Turf and Sprint each lured full 14-horse fields, while the Mile drew 13. Europe will be represented by 19 runners, including five in the Mile and eight in the Turf. Andre Fabre will saddle eight Breeders' Cup runners Saturday, the largest contingent ever for a European trainer. The strongest favorite on the morning line is Juvenile contender Dehere, who was figured at 6-5; Lure, looking for his second straight Mile win, is at 7-5. Five of the seven 1992 Breeders' Cup champions will return for another try this year.

**ALL CLEAR FOR THE EUROPEANS** All 19 of the Breeders' Cup runners from Europe have cleared quarantine and are set to compete Saturday. Stable Superintendent Tom Fator breathed a sigh of relief upon learning that all of the foreign horses had passed their blood tests. "I've had my fingers crossed while waiting for the news," he said.

### DEHERE FOUNDATION TO HOLD PRESS CONFERENCE

Robert E. Brennan, owner of Juvenile favorite Dehere and Chairman of the Dehere Foundation and Dehere Gun Fighters of America, will hold a press conference today to announce "a major initiative" of the two groups. Brennan will discuss a multi-million dollar campaign to deal with guns and reduce violence, the results of the Roper Survey and the National "Deathclock" in Times Square, New York. The Dehere Foundation was formed in August to combat the proliferation of inner city violence. Brennan has pledged all of his colt's earnings, which now total \$595,912, to the cause. A victory in Saturday's Breeders' Cup Juvenile would add another \$520,000 to the fund.

Colonial Affair worked a half mile in :50, handily, Wednesday morning for his final Classic prep. "It was a little slower than what I wanted," said Hall of Fame trainer Scotty Schulhofer. "This is something you learn when you train horses—there are two speeds, too slow and too fast. I wanted him to go in :48 and a couple. With company he is a real good work horse, but by himself he is a little bit lazy. I'm sure it won't be any excuse for Saturday." Kissin Kris also worked yesterday, going a half mile in :46, handily. Trainer David Bell was pleased. "He worked very well. He looks happy with himself. It pumps him up. I've done all I can do, we'll just hope he is good in the paddock now." The son of Kris S, who has a history of washing out in the saddling area, wears earmuffs in the paddock on race day; they are removed when he steps onto the track. Pleasant Tango, who drew in from the also eligible list, prepped for his first Grade I appearance with a half in :47 2/5, breezing Wednesday morning with jockey Alex Solis in the saddle. Solis will ride the colt in competition for the first time Saturday. Trainer Bobby Frankel had a companion on the Santa Anita backstretch yesterday morning; his 4-year-old Australian shepherd Tasha followed him through his daily routine. Frankel's home in Pacific Palisades is just a mile and a half from the still-raging wildfires, making both the pup and her owner nervous. Frankel said he considers two

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things in his home irreplaceable—his baseball card collection and his dog.

## WAIT 'TIL NEXT YEAR

The trainer who dominated the Breeders' Cup during his best days barely has a presence this week at Santa Anita. With just two longshots competing, Stellar Cat in the Juvenile Fillies and Tabasco Cat in the Juvenile, D. Wayne Lukas is largely being ignored as the media descends upon Bobby Frankel, Shug McCaughey and others. Lukas says that is fine. He will return.

"With the fact that we had so many strong sales this summer, I think you'll see us back next year with the two year olds like we had in the mid-80's. We're down this year, but I feel positive about turning it around. The industry has supported us right through this. You can sit back and wring your hands and say, 'what happened?' or you can evaluate what went wrong and correct it. We think we've done that."

Lukas was the leading purchaser at this year's Saratoga yearling sale, the September Keeneland sale, and the top domestic buyer at the July Keeneland sale.

Two starters will be the smallest Breeders' Cup contingent Lukas has ever sent out. He started four last year. Should either of his Cats win, he will have won his first Grade I stakes race since the 1991 Meadowlands Cup; he has won just four graded stakes this year.

## IN TRAINING FOR THE BREEDERS' CUP

Like any good play-by-play announcer, Breeders' Cup racecaller Tom Durkin knows how important it is to be prepared. For Durkin, getting ready for racing's \$10 million day involves a lot more than just memorizing the silks when the pre-entries come out a couple of weeks beforehand.

"My goal is to be as familiar with the horses as I would be with a group of my best friends," said Durkin, whose dramatic calls have graced the Breeders' Cup since its inaugural running at Hollywood Park in 1984.

To that end, Durkin literally spends the whole year collecting charts from every major stakes race run here and abroad, poring over them intently to determine the various running styles of potential Breeders' Cup starters. More importantly, he finds and catalogues the tapes of as many pertinent races as he is able, reviewing them time and again so the images of the contenders are burned into his brain.

"What has helped this year is that I finally learned how to dub tapes. Now, instead of scrambling through boxes and boxes of videotapes, I have, for instance, spliced all the sprint races onto one tape, all the two-year-old races onto another, and so on," said Durkin. "Of course, the clock on my VCR is still flashing '12:00 a.m.' but I do know how to dub tapes."

Durkin takes the standard practice of memorizing silks and a horse's general appearance one step further. He also spends time studying each horse's markings, whether it has a blaze or a diamond, a snip or a bald face.

"The little things on their heads, including what color bridle or style blinkers they are wearing, can save you," he said. "It really helps when they turn into the stretch. It gives you an extra confidence, like looking at a person's face."

It was precisely that attention to detail that helped Durkin in the closest thing to a panic he's ever had during the Breeders' Cup. Midway through the running of the Juvenile at Churchill Downs in 1991, he lowered his field glasses for a moment to check the running time as the horses approached the far turn. In that moment, Arazi, who was at the back of the pack, launched his astonishing run which carried him up to the lead in exactly the amount of time it took Durkin to raise his glasses and begin ticking down the field. When he saw Arazi, he couldn't believe his eyes—until he spotted the crooked white snip that distinguished his face.

"All of this happens so fast—you don't have time to make mistakes, and you can't afford to," Durkin said.

The final weeks leading up to Breeders' Cup Day are as intense for the racecaller, mentally and physically, as they are for the colts and fillies who are competing. Beginning right after Labor Day, Durkin begins a regimen of diet and exercise designed to get him in top form for the intensity of the four-and-a-half hour show on NBC.

After trying out fresh new phrases during the day (when he calls races at Belmont and Aqueduct in New York), Durkin spends his evenings with his VCR and his computer, trying to distill everything there is to know about the dozens of horses he

will be watching into a series of small notebooks.

"There's one notebook for each race," he said. "And, on Breeders' Cup Day, there's a 15-minute time period to re-familiarize myself with each of the horses."

Of course, 98 percent of all his hard work is, as he puts it, "for naught."

"You just don't use it," Durkin said.

But if he hadn't done his homework, there would always be that nagging fear about his epitaph.

His epitaph?

"I call a wrong winner, I don't have to worry about what they'll put on my tombstone," he said with a laugh. "Here lies Tom Durkin—he called the wrong winner in a \$3 million race."
