PRICES SOAR AT KEENELAND'S SECOND SESSION Average price of yesterday's session at the Keeneland November Breeding Stock sale was up a whopping 54% over last year's comparable session, while median price jumped from \$35,000 to \$60,000. The Tuesday segment sold 304 horses for \$32,695,200 to average \$107,550. A year ago, 270 lots averaged \$69,671. Top-price of the day, \$750,000 was paid for SILVER LANE, a full sister to millionaire Grade 1 winner HAWKSTER (Silver Hawk-Strait Lane, by Chieftain), by C. Gordon-Watson, agent. The 8year-old group stakes winner, believed to be in foal to NUREYEV, was consigned by Hagyard Farm, agent. Two others brought \$700,000 apiece: the 10th horse in the ring, ANNOCONNOR (G1, \$1,002,420 by Nureyev-My Nord, by *Vent du Nord), carrying a foal by PLEASANT COLONY, sold to Anthony Penfold, agent, from of the Carelaine Farm, et al consignment (to dissolve a partnership); and stakes-winning CITY DANCE, full sister to Freshman sire SLEW CITY SLEW (Seattle Slew-Weber City Miss, by Berkely Prince) sold to Gilman Investment Co. from the consignment of Eaton-Williams (agent for Wooden Horse Investments). Other highorices include: LIFE AT THE TOP (GB) (in foal to DANZIG) for \$675,000 to Calumet Farm from Walnut Green Agent; HAIL ATLANTIS (in foal to STORM CAT) for \$650,000 to Arthur Appleton from Eaton-Williams; and a weanling 1/2-sister to GLORIOUS SONG and DEVIL'S BAG (Seattle Slew-Ballade, by *Herbager) for \$600,000 to Silky Green, Inc. from Windfields Farm. Cumulative totals from the first two sessions show 594 horses have sold for \$55,239,800 to average \$92,996. Median price is \$50,000.

THE BREEDERS' CUP IN EUROPE The 10th Breeders' Cup was watched and wagered on by 2,700 patrons at eight racetracks in the United Kingdom. The largest attendance of 800 racing fans was posted at Newbury. Simulcasts could also be seen at Ascot. Doncaster, Goodwood, Newmarket, Windsor, Ulloxeter and Newcastle racetracks. Patrons wishing to watch and wager on the Breeders' Cup paid anywhere from 50 pounds (or \$75) to gain entrance to Ascot, where the races were treated as a private black-tie dinner, to 5 pounds or (\$7,50) at the door at Newcastle, According to Nick Kester, Marketing Director of Satellite Information Services in London, there was not a disappointed person at any of the eight British racetracks. Kester feels the presence of local horses in the Breeders' Cup was very important to the British audience, and the fact that so many of their runners were sent to California for the event helped make it such a success. As far as other European outlets were concerned, 39 OTBs carried the Breeders' Cup in Holland, which constituted 100 percent of the Dutch market. Fifty-nine OTBs took the simulcast in Belgium, six in Austria and 42 in Germany. Two racetracks in Italy, San Siro in Milan and Pisa Racecourse in Pisa, featured wagering on Breeders' Cup races with 75 bookmakers. Other tracks taking the simulcast were Leopardstown in Ireland. Ovrevol in Norway and Klampenborg in Denmark. In Sweden, 450 patrons watched the Breeders' Cup from Taby Racetrack in Stockholm and 250 from Jagersro Racetrack in Malmo. This year's Breeders' Cup simulcast was also watched and wagered on by 400 people at South Africa's Kenilworth Racetrack. The total South African attendance, including 10 OTBs, numbered 1,453. The handle was 100,000 Rand or approximately \$14,000. Satellite Information Services (SIS), which handles live simulcasts at 11,000 OTBs worldwide, has already received orders for the 1994 Breeders' Cup. Racetracks and OTBs in Great Britain, Belgium, Holland, Germany and South Africa have already expressed interest in receiving simulcasts of next year's event.

STAMPEDE PARK ENDS 39-DAY MEET

Canada's Stampede Park ended its 39-day fall stand Sunday with average daily attendance of 2,434 and handle of \$522,736. Chris McGregor won with 58 of his mounts to take the Jockey's race, while Don Schnell saddled 19 winners to earn the trainer's title.



'MARKET 'AUTHENTICATES' GAINES

Few people know the breeding business better than John Gaines. That was illustrated again at the Monday session of the Keeneland November sale.

110n November 8, Gaines sold five weanlings for more than \$1 million, 35% more than he had paid for the mares carrying those same foals. One of the weanlings was a half-sister, by Summer Squall, to 1993 Kentucky Derby winner Sea Hero, which was sold for \$550,000.

That is invigorating for any consignor, and for Gaines, who likes to test his judgment in the market, it is acknowledgment that he bought well. As he once said, "The only way you can really authenticate what you do is in the marketplace."

Gaines, 64, former owner of Gainesway Farm, is in the midst of a comeback in the commercial breeding business. He had been on the sidelines since selling his farm in January of 1989. Just as that proved to be a good time to sell, he resurfaced in November of 1992, which now appears to be one of the lowest points the market has seen in the last decade.

When it seemed like everyone was leaving the business, Gaines began to buy mares. And not just any mares. He bought older, proven mares, ones with name recognition. Though Gaines does not like to discuss his specific game plan, he will say that he saw a hole in the market for older mares.

And for stepping into the market when many dared tread, Gaines has been rewarded. At the Monday session of the Keeneland sale, Gaines sold five weanlings for a total of \$1,070,000. He had purchased the dams of all five of those weanlings for a total of \$791,000 while carrying the resultant foals. That amounts to a positive total of \$279,000, less expenses and commissions, and Gaines still owns the mares.

The best mare in the Gaines broodmare band is Glowing Tribute, dam of Sea Hero. He purchased her, in foal to Summer *Squall, for \$460,000 at the dispersal of Paul Mellon's Rokeby Stables in November of 1992. She is back in foal to Riverman. He had bought her after Sea Hero won the Champagne Stakes. The Summer Squall filly was purchased by Ben Walden Jr. and Tom Van Meter.

Walden, owner of The Vinery near Midway, Kentucky, said he wants to make the Summer Squall filly a foundation mare for his operation. "We're going to race her, retire her, and breed her, and then keep all her daughters, and race them, and retire them," said Walden, who has built The Vinery into a major stallion operation in just a half-dozen years. "I thought this filly was cheap. She's a great looking filly, and she comes from one of the best families in this country."

Partner with Walden on the Glowing Tribute filly is veterinarian Tom Van Meter, who owns a number of other horses with Walden.

Gaines on Monday also sold a \$250,000 colt by Hansel out of Taba (Arg.), dam of champion Turkoman (he purchased the mare in foal to Hansel for \$70,000); a \$105,000 filly by Dixieland Band out of Papal Decree (purchased for \$43,000), dam of Papal Power; a \$120,000 filly by Blushing John out of See You At the Top (purchased for \$180,000), dam of Life At the Top; and a \$45,000 colt by Ogygian out of Royal Suite (purchased for \$38,000). Only the See You At the Top weanling brought less than Gaines paid for the mare.

The youngest mares Gaines owns are 14-year-old Gilded

Lilly, dam of champion and Breeders' Cup Sprint third-place finisher Gilded Time. He also owns the dams of millionaire/champions Groovy and Wilderness Song, classic winners Bet Twice and Golden Fleece, and millionaires Top Corsage, My Big Boy, and Chief Honcho.

The single-most important philosophy Gaines uses in selecting breeding is his so-called "progeny test." That is, a sire or dam must prove they can produce quality runners, and until they do, no one can predict whether or not they will be successful in the stud.

For Gaines, his mares passed the progeny test. And on Monday, they passed the commercial test.
