STORM CAT WEANLING TOPS THURSDAY SESSION AT \$250,000 A wearling colt by STORM CAT out of the unraced CLEVER TRICK mare CLEVER TRIP was purchased by Brian Grassick Bloodstock for \$250,000 to top the fourth session of Keeneland's November Breeding Stock sale. Oak Tree, agent, consigned the session-topper. When compared to the 1992 Thursday's session, which was topped by a \$135,000 bid for the sire MORNING BOB, average was up 50.2% (\$25,681 vs. \$17,100), while the median jumped 53.8% (\$20,000 vs. \$13,000). The 300 horses brought a total \$7,704,400, while last year's session sold 289 for \$4,941,900. Three other horses brought six-digit figures: Walnut Green Bloodstock bought the mare SPOTLIGHT DANCE (in foal to STAR DE NASKRA) from North Ridge Farm, agent for R. S. Evans, for \$160,000; Brian Grassick Bloodstock bought a weanling colt by Theatrical (Ire)-Impatiente, by *Vaguely Noble, from Ashford Stud, agent, for \$120,000; and John Gaines, agent, bought the mare CARACCIOLA (Fr) (carrying a CAPOTE foal) from Kingston Park Stud for \$115,000. Cumulative totals through four days: 1,196 horses have sold for \$78,528,400 to average \$65,659, with median at \$35,000.

STAKES CHANGES ON NYRA SCHEDULE The Grade I, \$500,000 Wood Memorial will be pushed back one week in 1994 to April 16, three weeks before the May 7 Kentucky Derby, it was announced by the New York Racing Association today. The Wood has traditionally been run two weeks before the Derby. "In moving the Wood back a week, we're responding to the wishes of horsemen who are looking to get a little more time after their final Triple Crown prep," said Terry Meyocks, NYRA vice president, racing. "After a lot of debate over the past few years, we now feel the switch will be for the good of horsemen and for the good of the race." Forty added-money events with purses totalling \$3,685,000, will be run at Aqueduct from January 1 through May 1. Other changes on the Aqueduct winter and spring schedule, which was released today, include the addition of the Fred "Cappy" Capossela Stakes, a six-furlong race for three year olds on Feb. 20, named for the late track announcer who was the voice of New York racing from 1934 to 1971.

15 Brush With Reality Osborn Barton Beal Street Blues became one of the most talked-about twoyear-olds in the country last year when she won her first three starts, including the Miss Oceana Stakes and the Grade II Del Mar Debutante. That effort was followed by a disappointing third-place finish in the Frizette Stakes and a fifth-place finish in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies. After three starts in 1993, the daughter of Dixieland Band has yet to regain her brilliance. She did show improvement in her last start, a 1 1/16-mile allowance race at Keeneland, when she finished second by two lengths. Six- year-old Nannerl displayed the best form of her career in 1992, when she won four graded stakes. The daughter of Valid Appeal out of the Proud Birdie mare Allouette has started eight times this year and won only once, in the \$45,000 Honorable Miss Stakes at Saratoga on August 25. Still, she has been a model of consistency, finishing in the money in six of her eight trips to the post. One Dreamer, a five-year-old gray Relaunch mare, has really come into her own this year. She made her first start at age four and has won eight of 16 races since. She posted two-length victories in both of her last two starts, the Aqueduct Breeders' Cup Handicap and the Rachel Jackson Stakes at Dueling Grounds.



Yellow Ribbon Stakes, \$400,000, Grade I 1 1/4 f&m. 3 and up, Santa Anita, Sunday. Probable starters include Bright Generation (Delahoussaye), Hero's Love, Lady Blessington (Jerry Bailey), Let's Elope, Lyphard's Delta (Stevens), Market Booster (Kinane), Miatuschka (Black), Miami Sands (Pincay), Revasser (Desormeaux), Skimble (Day), Tribulation, Verveine and Campagnarde. Market Booster is trained by Irishman Dermot Weld, who successfully shipped to Australia two weeks ago to win the Melbourne Cup. Weld, who also became the only foreign trainer to win a Triple Crown race when he saddled 1990 Belmont Stakes winner Go and Go, is the first trainer to send out a Northern Hemisphere horse to victory in the 143-year history of the two-mile Melbourne Cup. Market Booster is due at Santa Anita Thursday evening or Friday morning, with Weld following later that night. Trainer Richard Cross will try to beat older mares in the Yellow Ribbon with Henry Pabst's three-year-old filly Miami Sands, "She's doing very well," said Cross. "She worked five furlongs Tuesday (1:00 3/5). I don't know that the older horses she'll be facing are that much better than she is." Pabst purchased the Irish-bred filly in June. She has been defeated twice by Hollywood Wildcat (2nd, Aug. 1 San Clemente; 3rd, Del Mar Oaks) before defeating males in an Oct. 11 allowance at Santa Anita. She was most recently second in the Queen Elizabeth II at Keeneland Oct. 30. "She had a lot of trouble," said Cross. She was trapped from the middle of the turn, but it was no fault of (Laffit Pincay Jr.) It was just bad racing luck." Trainer Henry Moreno has requested a provisional invitation for the 6year-old Re Toss. "I requested (it) just to keep our options open," said Moreno, who will meet with owner Arthur and Larry Risdon Thursday before making a decision.

(NYRA changes)

The Carter Handicap, traditionally run Derby Day, has been shifted to the Belmont Spring meeting. More changes may be in effect for the spring and summer. Meyocks said that it Was "most likely" that the Handicap Triple Crown, will be restored. The Triple is made up of the Metropolitan Mile, traditionally run Memorial Day, the Suburban Handicap, run July 4th weekend, and the Brooklyn, which would be shortened two furlongs to a mile and one-eighth, and moved from its current spot on the Aqueduct Fall calendar to fall in between those two. The Nassau County, which has been run Belmont Stakes Day the past three years, would then be relocated to the first weekend at Saratoga, and may be renamed the Saratoga Cup, according to Meyocks. The Saratoga Cup was a staple of the August meet until 1955, and was again run in 1963 before being taken off the stakes schedule, and was won by War Admiral and Stymie, among others.

NORTH AMERICAN RECORD \$79.8 MILLION WAGERED ON '93 BREEDERS' CUP Total wagering on the seven Breeders' Cup races last Saturday established a North American single-day record handle of more than \$79.8 million, posting a 4 percent increase over last year. The total breaks last year's record of \$76,876,726, set on the Breeders' Cup races from Gulfstream Park. More than \$67.7 million was wagered at 730 simulcast and off-track locations across the United States and Canada, a 1 percent increase over last year, not including final tabulations of Las Vegas Casino and other outlets.

NBC BREEDERS' CUP RATING UP 13 PERCENT OVER '92 The NBC Sports telecast of last Saturday's Breeders' Cup earned a 3.4 rating and a 9 share, 13 percent higher than last year's 3.0 rating and 8 share. The 193 rating was the highest for a Breeders' Cup telecast since 1989, when the broadcast recorded a 3.7 rating.

'WRONG' TICKET WINS SANTA ANITA BETTOR \$1.5 MILLION IN BC PICK 7: 'PARTNERS' AT REMINGTON CASH SECOND

TICKET A wrong number on a Breeders' Cup national Pick 7 ticket won a Ventura, California man \$1,598,310.80 last Saturday at Santa Anita. The 51-year-old engineer, who did not wish to be identified, said that when he went to hand his Pick 7 slip to the teller, he did not realize that in addition to his selection for the Classic, No. 1, the Bobby Frankel-trained entry of Bertrando, Marquetry, and Missionary Ridge, he had marked no. 11. That, of course, turned out to be Arcangues, the \$269.20 longest payoff in Breeders' Cup history. The mistake came about because he had also played no. 1 and 11 in the Turf (the Opera House/Intrepidity entry and Kotashaan.)

"I knew it would be big," he said, "but I had no idea it would be \$1.5 million. I couldn't believe it. My wife was shaking so hard, we left right away." The man, who attends the races every week, has revealed his secret to only his wife and his accountant, who asked for the check immediately. Said the man, "he wants me to start collecting interest." The second winning ticket, purchased at Remington Park, cost \$720 and returned \$1,499,916.20. According to Keith Chamblin, Remington's Director of Media Relations, the ticket was bought by a group of 3 or 4 people who went in as partners, none of which wished to be identified. The group singled Kotashaan and Lure, and did not use Frankel's Classic entry.

EUROPEANS PREPARE FOR JAPAN CUP Two of the four European-based horses pointing towards the Japan Cup were bred in Kentucky and, strangely enough, both are by the Mr. Prospector stallion Miswaki. The 1993 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winner Urban Sea, a four-year-old chestnut filly out of the Lombard (Ger) mare Allegretta (GB), was bred by Marystead Farm. Urban See is riding on a three-race winning streak that began July 11 in the listed Prix du Fonds Europeen de l'Elevage, continued in the August 21 Group 3 Prix Gontaut Biron and reached its height in the October 2 Arc De Triomphe. Misil, a five-year-old roan, is a son of Miswaki out of the The Axe II mare April Edge. Bred by William S. Farish, Misil was Italy's 1991 Champion Miler and 1992 highweighted older horse at seven to nine furlongs. He has won two Group races in Italy this year, the Group 3 Prix Federico Tesio and the Group | Del Jockey Club E Coppa d'Oro. He finished seventh by 4 3/4 lengths in the Arc De Triomphe. Finishing second in that race, just a neck behind Urban Sea, was Japan Cup invitee White Muzzle (GB). White Muzzle (GB), a three-year-old son of Dancing Brave, has one Group 1 win to his credit, the Derby Italiano. Platini (GER), a four-yearold colt by Surumu (GER), finished 13th in the Arc de Triomphe and 10th in the King George V Stakes in his last two starts, but won four of his five starts before that with one second-place finish. Platini (GER) was the highweighted three-year-old at 11 to 14 furlongs in Germany in '92. He has eight black-type wins to his credit, five of them group races.

BREEDERS' CUP FOLLOW Kissing Kris (3rd, Classic) was scheduled to be flown Thursday to Florida and given some time off before returning to Santa Anita for the Strub Series this winter...Blumin Affair (2nd, Juvenile at 42-1), will remain in Southern California and is scheduled to make his next start in the \$500,000 Hollywood Futurity...British import Surprise Offer (10th, Sprint) is stabled at Santa Anita and is nominated to the \$200,000 Hollywood Turf Express... Norfolk Stakes winner Shepherd's Field (6th, Juvenile) has been turned out for some rest and relaxation...Toussaud (4th, Mile) is being pointed to the Nov. 28 Matriarch at Hollywood.
