1994 GULFSTREAM MEETING RICHEST IN FLORIDA HISTORY Gulfstream Park will open its 1994 62-day season on January 4, with a daily average purse projection of \$275,000, among the highest in the United States. A total of 38 stakes, 22 of them graded, will represent the highest ratio of stakes to days of competition ever presented in Florida. Total stakes money offered is \$4,575,000, including \$140,000 in Breeders' Cup funding.

SMITH TO RIDE THREE WEEKS AT HOLLYWOOD National leading money-earning jockey Mike Smith will ride the majority of this fall's Hollywood Park meeting, according to jockey agent Tony Matos. Smith, one of the favorites for this year's Eclipse Award, will ride at Hollywood on a regular basis from November 28 through the end of the meet, which runs until December 20.

BAY MEADOWS, HOLLYWOOD TO COMMINGLE SIMULCAST BETS Bay Meadows and Hollywood Park received permission from the California Horse Racing Board Wednesday morning to commingle win, place, show and exacta wagers on simulcast races. The tracks plan to exchange races that have purses of at least \$20,000 throughout Hollywood's autumn meeting, which opened yesterday and continues through December 20.

JOHN CHURCHMAN RECOVERS FROM SURGERY Churchill Downs-based trainer John Churchman was reported to be doing well Wednesday morning following quadruple bypass surgery Tuesday at Norton Hospital in Louisville. The 58-year-old Louisville native has been training horses for more than 25 years. He campaigned Kentucky Derby starters Fighting Fantasy and Wilder Than Ever. Fighting Fantasy, a son of Fighting Fit, has won 15 races including three stakes for earnings of \$499,263. Wilder Than Ever, a son of Wild Again, was third in the 1991 Grade II Jim Beam Stakes.

HOLLYWOOD DERBY—SATURDAY All but one of the three-year-olds scheduled to start in Saturday's Hollywood Derby began their racing careers in Europe. Earl of Barking (IRE), a son of Common Grounds (GB), won five races in Great Britain before being transplanted to California. Trainer Richard Cross said of the colt, "We bought him one year and six weeks ago. He has prospered in American racing. He is better here than he was in Europe. He is coming up to this race very very well. He's had time off and he runs well fresh. He's a very willing colt, a little fussy but easy to train." When asked about the highlight of Earl of Barking's career under his training, Cross responded, "Winning the Cinema Handicap was nice, but personally I liked winning the Hoist the Flag as a 2yo better because it was twice as much money." Fatherland (IRE), a son of Sadler's Wells, won two Group races as a two-year-old in Ireland before shipping to Gary Jones' barn in California. "He came to us four days before the Del Mar Derby," Jones said. "I thought he should have won, but it was a roughly run race with a field of 14 on a small track. He was flying late. If he got a clear trip, I think he would have won easy. He's coming up really good to the Hollywood Derby but I'm still worried he might not get in. They give preference to graded stakes winners and then money-earned. He was a champion two-year-old last year in Europe, but he's earned only \$100,000 this year. I want to run him in the worst way. He's a neat horse. He does whatever you want him to do." Other probable starters include Wharf, a son of Storm Bird, who will be making his first start outside of England, and Blues Traveller (IRE), a son of the Storm Bird stallion Bluebird, who finished third in the Epsom Derby and sixth in the Del Mar Derby in his only North American start. Guide (FR), a Local Suitor colt, is undefeated in two starts since shipping from France, winning both the Oceanside Stakes and the Del Mar Derby at Del Mar. Fastness (IRE), by Rousillon, will make his first American start after winning two of ten races in France, including the listed Prix Herod. Eastern Memories (IRE), a Don't Forget Me (IRE) colt, won four of nine

starts in England before shipping to the United States, where he won the Volante Handicap on November 4 at Santa Anita. Scheduled to go to the post for Andre Fabre are the Blushing Groom colt Sharman, who won the Group 3 Prix De La Jonchere earlier this year in France and is unraced in North America, and Dernier Empereur, a Trempolino colt who will be making his second start in California after finishing 12th in the Breeders' Cup Turf. Nonproductive asset, a son of Stalwart who has won four of eight lifetime starts, is the only probable starter who has raced solely on American soil.

HAWTHORNE GOLD CUP—SATURDAY Northern Trend, a five-year-old son of Sunny North out of the Fleet Nasrullah mare Trendville, is one of nine scheduled to go to the post. Calder-based trainer Bill White claimed Northern Trend near the end of the Gulfstream meet for \$25,000 and he's gone on to earn \$200,000 since. According to White, "He is coming into race really, really good. We worked him seven furlongs in 1:28 2/5 Friday and he came out of the work good. He's a medium-sized chestnut, a blocky quarter-horse type. He's frisky acting, a little nippy but easy to deal with." In Northern Trend's last outing, he finished ninth in a 7 1/2 furlong turf race at Calder. White says, "He had run three times on turf in his life and won one, so we used it as a prep. He didn't take to it well, that's why we worked him that seven-eighths five days later." Mark Guidry has the mount on Northern Trend. Replacing Kent Desormeaux as Marquetry's rider will be Mike Smith. The remainder of the jockey assignments are as follows: Valley Crossing, Andrea Seefeldt; Stalwarts, Juvenal Diaz; Powerful Punch, Curt Bourque; Evanescent, Aaron Gryder; Dancing Jon, Shane Sellers; Rin Tin Bid, Randall Meier; Likely Target, Gabriel Retana. Racetracks that will take the Gold Cup simulcast are Aqueduct Racetrack, Calder Race Course, Laurel Race Course, Woodbine, Delaware Park, Remington Park, Suffolk Downs, Bay Meadows and Fonger Park. Simulcasting the full Hawthorne card on Saturday, including the Gold Cup, are Birmingham Race Course, Mountaineer Park, Portland Meadows, Prairie Meadows and the Woodlands.

FAIR GROUNDS TO OPEN THANKSGIVING

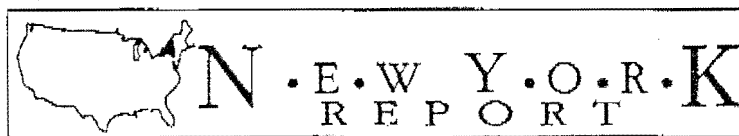
DAY The Fair Grounds open its 122nd season Thanksgiving Day, November 25 with an 11-race card that will include the \$50,000-added Thanksgiving Handicap, contested at six furlongs for ages three and up. The holiday card kicks off an 87-day season that runs through March 28. A total of 61 stakes will be offered during the meet for more than \$3 million in added and guaranteed monies. Anchoring the stakes program will be the Grade III \$300,000-guaranteed Louisiana Derby, which will be run Saturday, March 19.

DICKSTEIN EXHIBIT COMING TO NATIONAL MUSEUM OF RACING Equine photographer Skip Dickstein has selected approximately 40 images from the thousands of racing photographs he has taken for "Memorable Moments: A Retrospective of The Racing Images", an exhibition that will run from December 6 to May 9 at the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame in Saratoga. Dickstein says, "People will see Alysheba in triumph, Sea Hero's Kentucky Derby, a steeplechase image or two. The exhibit will combine images of racing action with behind-the-scenes views. I photograph many subjects, but one of my major interests is Thoroughbred racing. I grew up in the horse business. They are part of my heritage." Dickstein will discuss his experiences as an equine photographer at the Museum December 14th at 7:30 p.m.

N.Y. HORSES OF RACING AGE SALE UP 24.1%

Fasig-Tipton New York, Inc.'s Belmont Horses of Racing Age sale sold 77 runners for an average of \$11,766, up 24.1% from the comparable '92 sale when 160 horses averaged \$9,482. Hip 100, FAREWELL WAVE, topped the one-day vendue with a \$62,000 bid from West Point Thoroughbreds. Rokeby Stables consigned the MSP seven-year-old Virginia-bred gelding, who has amassed \$430,073 with 12 wins from 48 starts.

PETERHOF TO BILLINGSLEY CREEK Peterhof, a multiple graded stakes winner in Ireland, has been moved from DanDar Farm in Washington to stand the 1994 breeding season at Billingsley Creek Ranch near Hagerman, Idaho. A sire of seven SWs from seven crops and progeny earnings of more than \$3.7-million, PETERHOF will stand for \$1,000.
