The remainder of the Champions were: Comet Shine (Fappiano), 2-year-old Colt; Term Limits (Time for a Change), 2-year-old Filly; Deputy Jane West (Silver Deputy), 3-year-old Filly; Cozzene's Prince (Cozzene), Older Horse; Dance for Donna (Apalachee), Older Mare; Hero's Love (Hero's Honor), Grass Horse; Apelia (Cool Victor), Sprinter; Bold Debra (Dom Alaric-FR), Broodmare. Breeder of the Year was Kinghaven Farms; the rest of the honors were: Robert Landry, Jockey; Constant Montpellier, Apprentice Jockey; Frank Stronach, Owner; Roger Attfield, Trainer.

### STAR OF COZZENE TO RACE IN '94

Star of Cozzene (Cozzene), 5th in the Japan Cup last out and a contender for year-end honors, is expected to race next season. But, as a precaution, x-rays were scheduled yesterday, according to trainer Mark Hennig. "It's just precautionary," he said. "If by some chance we find something wrong, we wouldn't want him to miss the breeding season. But we fully expect him to race next year."

LOOSE HORSE HITS THE HIGHWAY Belmont Park-based trainer Howie Tesher's Cox's Sword went out for a breeze Friday morning--on Elmont's Hempstead Tpke. "He was supposed to jog on the training track," said Tesher, "but when he got to the 1/8 pole he threw the rider and ran off." The 2-yearold jumped 2 fences before making it out to the turnpike. Security alerted the police to put out a traffic alert. "He ran west on Hempstead and got on the cloverleaf to the Cross Island Pkwy., " said Tesher. "He was headed to Aqueduct. He exited the parkway back to Hempstead Tpke. At that point, a number of people lined the exit ramp so that he was penned in and they were able to grab him." Cox's Sword suffered only a small cut. ### Thoro-Graph Analysis By Jerry Brown

The issue of "bouncing" arises in the analysis of Saturday's feature at Hollywood. The term originated with those of us who graph the form cycles of each horse, and refers to what happens after a horse puts in a maximum effort. The stress causes a poorer effort in his next start, which has the appearance on our graphs of a ball bouncing off a wall.

Sprinting fillies in general (and Gary Jones trainees in particular) tend to run well fresh, and **Meafara** (Meadowlake) did just that in the Breeders' Cup, firing her best shot. She probably will not run quite as well this time. **Memo's** (Mocito Guapo) effort on the same day was by far his career best, and not only will he not run as well, but he will have to spot substantial weight to the entire field.

All of this throws the race wide open, and entices us to take a shot at a price. There are several live longshots, (in fact, not one member of the field can be eliminated); the one we are partial to is **Bahatur** (Mt. Livermore), who is lightly raced and developing into a serious stake horse. After a freshening, and with a history of running well fresh, he could be coming up to his best effort yet.

### **NEW STALLION FOR 1994**

SULTRY SONG CLAIBORNE FARM

Dk b/br 1988 Cox's Ridge-Sultry Sun (Buckfinder) 1994 Stud Fee \$7500 live foal

Trainer Pat Kelly recalls the highlight of Sultry Song's racing career as being the 1992 Hollywood Gold Cup. "Winning a million dollar race plus having gone all the way across the country, no horse had done that in a long time," said Kelly. When asked what he misses the most about Sultry Song, Kelly replied, "Other than his successes? Just having him around the barn. He was a real character. We kept a rubber cone out in front of his stall, like a traffic cone, and he used to pick it up and throw it at people. One day he flipped it up and over the top of his stall and hit himself in the butt. He was a character. He had a good personality."

Sultry Song had been given a few months off after the 1992 Breeders' Cup, and the plan had been to race him again in 1993 as a 5-year-old. "We decided just before Saratoga that he wasn't going to make it back to the races the way we needed to have him back, to perform at the Grade I level," said Kelly. "So arrangements were made to ship him to Claiborne last summer."

Kelly feels Sultry Song will make an excellent sire. "He's got a tremendous pedigree. It's a great family. It's been very good to us for a long time, with the grandmother, their mother Sultry Sun, and the two brothers [including Gr.I SW Solar Splendor]."

Sultry Song arrived at Claiborne July 29 and will remain the property of Live Oak Stud, under whose colors he raced. Claiborne is also the home of Sultry Song's broodmare sire Buckfinder as well as his own sire Cox's Ridge. According to a Claiborne spokesperson, "Cox's Ridge has been as steady a horse for us as any stallion you'd want to have. He's sired many very nice horses so we're optimistic that his son will continue that. The reception to Sultry Song has been good, but he's a privately owned horse so that means more seasons are available to us than there would be to a syndicated stallion. As is frequently the case with syndicated stallions, the syndicate members have use of one season for each share and then there's frequently bonus seasons, and our hands are sometimes tied as far as availability. But Live Oak is working with us on placement of his seasons and we're still taking requests."
