THE DEPUTY TO MARGAUX FARM

The Deputy (Ire) (Petardia {GB}--Manfath {Ire}, by Last Tycoon {Ire}), winner of this year's GI Santa Anita Derby, will stand the 2001 breeding season at Margaux Farm. The Midway, Kentucky farm has purchased a half interest in the colt. The three-year-old, off since finishing 14th in the Kentucky Derby, had been training for a return in the Dec. 26 GI Malibu S., but came up with filling in a tendon and had to be retired. On the board in every start except the Derby, The Deputy began his career in Britain, breaking his maiden at Epsom in September of his juvenile season. The bay made his U.S. debut in January, taking the Hill Rise S. on the grass at Santa Anita, then tried dirt for the first time and bested High Yield by a length in the GII Santa Catalina S. In his next outing, he finished just three-quarters of a length behind Fusaichi Pegasus in the GII San Felipe S. before capturing the Santa Anita Derby by a length over subsequent GI Breeders' Cup Mile hero War Chant in his penultimate start. He goes to the breeding shed with four wins, two seconds and three thirds from 10 tries for earnings of \$817,787. "He is unique in that no horse imported as a two-year-old from Britain or Europe has ever accomplished what The Deputy was able to as a Triple Crown hopeful," Margaux Farm manager Steve Johnson said. "He was as Americanized a foreign horse as we have ever seen. He demonstrated that rare mix of speed, class and grit on dirt that is the hallmark of the American racehorse." The Deputy will stand for a fee of \$7,500, live foal.

SOAP OPERA ENDING TO DEAUVILLE

L'Agence Francaise concluded its December Mixed Sale in Deauville yesterday. The final day's top price was brought by Falcon Crest (Fr) (Cadoudal {Fr}), a stakes winner over hurdles in France. The 11-year-old mare, in foal to Epervier Bleu (GB), was consigned by Haras des Sablonnets and purchased for FF400,000 by Jeremy Maxwell. The top-selling weanling yesterday was a colt from the second crop of Villez (Lyphard's Wish {Fr}), an eight-time stakes winner over hurdles. The January foal, named Karpous (Fr), was consigned by Haras des Chartreux and purchased for FF240,000 by FBA. For the three-day sale, the average was up 21.9 percent over the 1999 figure, while the gross increased 35 percent from last year. (Stats, p2)

The runner-up took the lead in midstretch, then came up lame as they neared the wire, but still hung on for second. A Group winner in his last start, he suffered a fracture in his left hind leg and had to be euthanized.

A winner in four of his first five outings, Daitaku Riva captured the G2-Jpn Spring S. in March and was second in the G1-Jpn Japanese 2000 Guineas in April, but failed to threaten when 12th in the G1-Jpn Japanese Derby May 28 and was given a five-month break. The chestnut returned to be second in the Oct. 21 G3-Jpn Fuji S. and was made the favorite here after a second-place showing in his latest try, the G1-Jpn Mile Championship Nov. 19. Rated off the opening fractions, he finished full of run to gain a narrow decision.

Although I spend a lot of time analysing information, I must admit that I have never attempted to keep a check on certain types of records. For example, I didn't know the answer last week when I was asked whether Zafonic's four juvenile Group winners in 2000 constituted a record for a European stallion.

I found myself pondering a question of my own after Wheaton's son Radical Riley narrowly won Saturday's GIII What A Pleasure S. Wheaton completes a magnificent hat-trick for his extraordinary dam, Terlingua, who has already enjoyed graded-stakes success this year through her sons Storm Cat and Pioneering. Storm Cat, of course, is heading for another sires' championship, while Pioneering has made a very pleasing start with Give Praise (GII Sorrento S.) among the four black-type horses in his first crop, conceived at a fee of only \$3,500. Has any mare, I wondered, bettered the achievements of Terlingua's sons in a single year?

I immediately would have nominated the great English mare Doubly Sure, who has five sons--Kris, Diesis, Keen, Presidium and Rudimentary--with a Group winner to their names. However, no more than three have sired Group winners in any one year. Two winners of the Broodmare of the Year title, Fall Aspen and Weekend Surprise, have also matched Terlingua's feat.

To answer my own question, the brilliant Fairy Bridge had four sons with Group winners during 1999, thanks to Sadler's Wells, Fairy King, Hermitage and Perugino, but Perugino needed an Australian crop, in addition to his Irish foals, to join the club.

Sex Appeal, the dam of El Gran Senor, Try My Best and Compliance, also reached this target thanks to her South African son Northern Guest. Can anyone name any better examples?

Some of the sons of these celebrated mares were given their chance at stud largely on the strength of their relatives' achievements, rather than their own. Wheaton definitely comes into this category. This son of the excellent Alydar arrived at High Mark Farms near Ocala as a six-year-old early in 1996, having raced 11 times for Overbrook Farm over the previous two seasons. The only time he got his head in front was in a maiden race over an extended mile at Beulah Park as a five-year-old. Wheaton's brother Provo won only twice from 24 starts and was sold as a stallion to Cyprus, so they were a long way removed from Storm Cat's class.

However, with a son of Raise A Native as his sire, Wheaton is a three-parts brother to the promising Pioneering, who was retained at Overbrook after winning two of his six starts as a juvenile. Wheaton covered 83 mares at a fee of \$2,500 this year, having sired six winners from eight juvenile runners from his small first crop last year. His second crop, of which Radical Riley is a member, is markedly bigger, but his popularity has fluctuated over the years.

Radical Riley may have been inexpensive to produce, but his bloodlines are very good. His dam, Vogueing, is a half-sister to Strike A Balance, the dam of Canadian Horse of the Year Peaks and Valleys. This winner of the Molson Export Million S. has the Grade II winner Dollar Bill among his first runners this year. Radical Riley's third dam is the very successful Take A Stand, who is the second dam of that outstanding filly Open Mind. Take A Stand in turn was a half-sister to Close Control, the influential broodmare who numbers Excellent Meeting, Advancing Star, Doneraile Court, Early Pioneer and Souvenir Copy among her many smart descendants.

CARNIVALAY FILLY TOPS AT FASIG-TIPTON

Expecting (Carnivalay--Prospective Joy, by Allen's Prospect), a three-year-old broodmare prospect, attracted a final bid of \$87,000 to top yesterday's Fasig-Tipton Kentucky December Mixed Sale in Lexington. The chestnut, who was two-for-two as a juvenile and did not start this year, is a half sister to Grade I winner Hookedonthefeelin (Citidancer), who won seven races and \$462,554. The filly was consigned by Montessori (Christine A. Hansen), agent for Country Life Farm, and purchased by Gainesway Farm, agent. **Spritz** (Relaunch--Supplier, by Irish River {Fr}), a six-year-old broodmare who was not mated this year, brought the day's second-highest price, going for \$51,000 to Michael Barnett. Consigned by Bluestem Farm, Inc., the five-time winner of \$65,370 is a half-sister to multiple stakes winner High Margin (Repriced) and is also from the family of graded-stakes winners Capital Request, Concept Win and Comparability. The best-selling weanling at the auction was a filly by Bon Point (GB) out of Raspberry Blonde (Devil's Bag), who sold for \$43,000 to trainer Ralph Ziadie, conditioner of MGSW Sir Bear. Out of a half-sister to MGSW Polite Rebuff, the Florida-bred has Politely as her fourth dam. She was consigned by FitzGerald/Keogh, agent.

Dogwood Stable Buys Remsen Winner:

Windsor Castle (Lord Carson), who finished second in both the Gill Cowdin S. and Gill Nashua S. before taking the Gill Remsen S. by 2 1/2 lengths Nov. 25, has been sold by owner/trainer Frank Alexander for an undisclosed price to Dogwood Stable. The two-year-old will race as property of a partnership, with Dogwood as majority owner and Alexander retaining a percentage and also continuing to train the colt. Dogwood President Cot Campbell, who will serve as racing manager, added, "In several days, we expect to announce the name of a prominent breeding farm as one of the partners in this venture." The Kentucky-bred bay has three wins and two seconds from seven starts for earnings of \$209,100. He will prepare for a Triple Crown campaign in Florida.

The Wicked North Moves East:

The Wicked North (Far North--Wicked Witchcraft, by Good Behaving) has become the latest member of the quickly growing New York stallion population, relocating from Mira Loma Thoroughbred Farm in California to stand the 2001 season at James and Lorna Mack's Silvernails Farm in Pine Plains. The son of multiple stakes-winner Wicked Witchcraft was a millionaire and multiple Grade I stakes winner and captured the 1994 Eclipse Award for champion older male. In three seasons at stud, the 11-year-old, who began his stallion career in Kentucky, has produced multiple stakes-winner Red's Lady and allowance winners Pretty Wicked and Wicked Star despite estate probate rulings that limited his production to 16 named offspring in 1999 and 18 named two-year-olds of 2000. With litigation concerning his ownership resolved, the Michigan-based partnership of Coffeepot Stable will stand him at Silvernails for \$5,000, live foal.

Deadline for Maryland Million Nominations Nearing:

Dec. 31 is the deadline for nominating Maryland stallions and Maryland-sired weanlings and yearlings for participation in Maryland Million events. The fee for weanlings (foals of 2000) is \$250, while the fee for yearlings (foals of 1999), if they were not previously nominated as weanlings, is \$600. The nominations make weanlings and yearlings eligible for lifetime participation in the Maryland Million. The stallion nomination fee, which is due annually, is equal to the advertised 2001 stud fee, with a \$500 minimum.

IN MY OPINION...

John R. Gaines, who established Gainesway Farm, originated the Kentucky Horse Park, founded the Breeders' Cup and was instrumental in the formation of the National Thoroughbred Racing Association, made the following remarks while accepting the Clay Puett Award for outstanding service to the racing industry last Thursday at the University of Arizona Symposium on Racing. Commenting on the ongoing conflict between the NTRA and owner/breeder Frank Stronach, who owns seven racetracks and has threatened to pull them out of the NTRA, Gaines said:

Since the industry is now convening in the booming state of Arizona, I think it is appropriate for all of us to buckle up, let the fresh air in, and rumble over the landscape in Senator John McCain's Straight Talk Express. It's getting late, it's getting critical, and it's getting boring. This is the place and now is the hour to tell it like it is.

The on-going public exchanges between the NTRA and Frank Stronach are totally unproductive. They only serve to further polarize an industry that is yearning to stand tall on common ground. In my view, the current debate has more to do with the Theatre of the Absurd than with the unforgiving realities--economic, political and competitive--facing our sport in the modern world.

To tone down the cacophony, each side needs to concede at least one thing. Frank Stronach should respect the empirical fact that the collective investment of all the constituencies represented by the NTRA is countless times larger than that of the chairman of Magna Entertainment and the master of Adena Springs Farm. On the other hand, the investments of Mr. Stronach and the enterprises he controls make him the largest individual stakeholder in the entire industry, and the NTRA should honor such an undeviating commitment.

At this point, what we do not need are any more calls for unity or any more pleas for a common agenda. Neither do we need any more lectures on entrepreneurship or any more sermons on democracy.

What we do need is an act of statesmanship on the part of both parties. The NTRA must accept the validity of Mr. Stronach's concern that the industry's history of too many self-perpetuating bureaucracies, accountable to no one but themselves, is a recipe for disaster.

And Mr. Stronach must accept that the splintering of our industry threatens a way of life that is precious not only to him but to many thousands of other stakeholders in our industry.

Economics are critical, but a way of life is precious. Nothing less is at stake here than the treasured way of life afforded to us all by racing and breeding. How can both the NTRA and Frank Stronach not recognize that they are natural allies, not natural enemies, in preserving this priceless heritage?

In my view, Mr. Stronach, without hesitation, should join the NTRA's board and participate fully in decisions it makes about racing's future. I believe this is the best, and the only, way for him to accomplish his goals and achieve his unique vision for our sport.

At this critical moment, Frank Stronach has the opportunity to benefit an entire industry with an act of statesmanship. As a model for what needs to be done, I suggest he heed a call issued by one of America's greatest patriots--Benjamin Franklin--at the Constitutional Convention held in Independence Hall in the City of Brotherly Love 220 years ago.

Faced with a convention exhausted from months of wrangling, subterfuges, selfishness, pontifications, partisanship and compromises, Franklin said, "As I gaze out the great window at the end of this hallowed hall, I am unable to discern whether the sun is setting or the sun is rising over our great republic. But of one thing I am sure. Without the good will of every single one of us and our desire to serve the common good, the republic will not survive."

JOCKEY CLUB RESTRUCTURES

In a move designed to modernise its internal workings, the Jockey Club yesterday announced structural changes which will begin to take effect Jan. 1. The changes, already approved by the Privy Council, will ensure that all activities will be represented on the main board, while the regulatory responsibility will be carried out separately by designated stewards. Christopher Spence, senior steward of the Jockey Club, said, "Put simply, these changes modernise the Jockey Club's structure. The creation of the British Horseracing Board as the governing authority has resulted in fundamental changes to the administration of racing and the importance of the Racecourse Holdings Trust and Jockey Club Estates has grown considerably. Currently, the Jockey Club has four key roles, namely regulating racing, supporting the work of BHB, owning and running racecourses and operating training facilities. The revised structure recognises these roles and reflects our position in British racing today." The new changes will also hand over regulation of racing to the regulatory stewards, who, operating independently, will oversee the regulatory matters and appoint the members of the disciplinary and licensing committees.

MURTAGH & COCHRANE FORM ALLIANCE

Johnny Murtagh, the success story of the year 2000, will use ex-jockey Ray Cochrane to book his British rides next year. After his 11 international Group 1 victories this season, he is looking to secure further British success in 2001. He said yesterday, "I asked Ray last night that if Frankie [Dettori] has the choice of more than one horse in a race, he could put my name forward for the ones he doesn't want to ride. I thought I might pick up some spare rides." The arrangement does not compromise Murtagh's contract with agent Eddie Byrne, but it is a significant boost to Cochrane, who already has Dettori under his wing. The recently retired jockey said, "Seven other jockeys have approached me to book rides for them. I'm quite surprised how it has snowballed. I'll be doing some more later on but I'm not going to rush things. I don't want to find I've taken too much on and I can't do the job right. At present I'm booking rides for Frankie and I'm delighted to be doing that."

The Irish Race Writers Association voted jockey Johnny Murtagh the Goffs Racing Personality of the year. In accepting the award, Murtagh said, "It's been an unbelievable year for me and without the support of [trainer] Mr. [John] Oxx, my wife Orla, His Highness The Aga Khan, my agent Eddie Byrne and a host of other owners and trainers, I would not be accepting this award. Every jockey dreams of riding really good horses and I don't think we realized how good Sindaar (Ire) was in the Spring, but he really put me on the map and I'll be eternally grateful to him." Murtagh won an amazing 11 Group 1 winners in 2000.
