### HORSE OF THE YEAR HONORS FOR FALBRAV

He didn't top any category on the International Classifications, but Scuderia Rencati and Teruya Yoshida's Falbrav (Ire) (Fairy King) was Monday named the 2003

British Horseracing Board's
Horse of the Year. The new
honors were unveiled alongside
the 27th International Classifications at Portman Square in London. BHB Chairman Peter Savill
was on hand to launch the inaugural awards. Falbrav, who enjoyed Group 1 successes in the

Prix d'Ispahan, Eclipse S., International S., Queen Elizabeth II S. and Hong Kong Cup in 2003, also collected the newly devised BHB Middle Distance Championship by collecting the most points in Sandown's Eclipse, the King George at Ascot and the International at York. He received a glowing tribute from Savill, who commented, "It is with much pleasure that the award for Horse of the Year is made to Falbray, who competed in 10 consecutive Group 1s...over an eight-month season. This doubles the BHB awards tally, as he collected the inaugural BHB Middle Distance Championship in the summer after his performances at Ascot, Sandown and York. He was talented, consistent and versatile at the very highest level and epitomised the benefits that can be reaped from keeping a top-class older horse in training." Falbrav's trainer Luca Cumani added, "Falbrav was a special horse, because not only is he beautiful, but he has the physical strength and mental strength which enabled him to run in and win so many top-class races across the world." ### ON THE WAR PATH AT KEENELAND JANUARY

La Galerie (Arg) (Southern Halo), in foal to GI Breeders' Cup Mile hero War Chant (Danzig), brought a final bid of \$800,000 to share top honors at the opener of the Keeneland January Horses of All Ages Sale in Lexington yesterday. The eight-year-old mare, named champion juvenile filly in her native country after victories in the G1 Saturnino J. Unzue S. and G2 Gran Premio Carlos Casares, was consigned by Three Chimneys Sales, agent. She was purchased for \$140,000 as a yearling by Robert Clay and Cobra Farm, a price Clay believes to have been a record at the time for a yearling in Argentina. After her championship season, she was sent to the U.S. to continue her career with trainer John Kimmel. The bay was a four-time allowance winner and finished third in the GII Distaff Breeders' Cup H. and GII Genuine Risk H. in 2002. Rick Trontz signed the ticket on behalf of Mrs. Betty Mabee yesterday. "She's got Halo and a lot of good stuff in the pedigree," Trontz said. "It's a great outcross...look at all the Mr. Prospector and Northern Dancer stallions you can breed to. It's all blue sky." Also bringing \$800,000 Monday was the five-year-old broodmare Spring Meadow (Meadowlake). Consigned by Darby Dan Farm, agent, she was bought by Live Oak Stud. KeeJan cont. p2

### HAWK WING TOPS THE CLASSIFICATIONS

It has been a long wait for Aidan O'Brien to join the magic 130 club in the International Classifications, but Susan Magnier's superb G1 Lockinge S. winner Hawk Wing (Woodman) finally made the breakthrough for his trainer this year. His 11-length romp at Newbury in May saw him achieve a rating of 133 pounds, one pound clear of His Highness the Aga Khan's G1 Prix du Jockey-Club and G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe hero Dalakhani (Ire) (Darshaan {GB}), the highest-rated sophomore. "Racing is all about opinion and interpretation and Hawk Wing has probably created a larger divergence of opinion among us than any other horse for a number of years," BHB Senior handicapper Nigel Gray commented yesterday. "In my personal opinion, Falbrav would have been my horse of the year too for the durability, versatility and top-class consistency that he showed. But we weren't able to reach a rating of any higher than 127 for him on the strength of his form." Int'l Classifications cont. p4

## Keeneland January cont. Stealing the Show....Mabee...

Betty Mabee has come a long way since she and her late husband John purchased their first two yearlings for a total of \$6,000 at the Del Mar yearling sale in 1957. The passing of John Mabee in April 2002 could have led his widow to divest her holdings, but she has nonetheless persevered and continues to maintain a sizable racing stable on the West Coast. The Mabees, who bought Golden Eagle Farm in Ramona, California in 1972, bred more than 130 stakes winners and earned three Eclipse Awards for outstanding breeder. Mrs. Mabee, now 83, signaled her continued commitment to the industry yesterday at Keeneland, adding to an already formidable broodmare band with the purchase of eight horses. "[Mrs. Mabee] is just trying to get some nice mares with new blood and some quality to add to the band," said Hopewell Farm's Rick Trontz, who is bidding on behalf of Mabee. "[Golden Eagle] had gotten rid of some mares and now they're trying to beef back up again." Trontz, who boards upwards of 20 mares for Mrs. Mabee, indicated that she had planned on attending the Keeneland November sale, but was forced to remain in Southern California due to the wildfires that raged not far from Golden Eagle. In addition to the session topper, Trontz acquired five other six-figure mares for Golden Eagle Monday, including the 10-yearold Heaven to Earth (Regal Classic), who was purchased for \$350,000. After producing Jade Hunter foals in 2000 and 2001, the attractive chestnut was sold for \$575,000 carrying a Thunder Gulch colt at the 2001 November Sale. A half sister to Colour Chart (Mr. Prospector), the dam of ill-fated Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies winner Tempera, Heaven to Earth is the dam of a yearling colt by Gone West and was sold carrying a foal by Mr. Greeley. She was consigned to the sale by Tay-Ior Made Sales Agency. Trontz was also responsible for the purchase of Cee's Elegance (Cee's Tizzy). The winner of the GII A Gleam Invitational H., the gray mare earned over \$744,000 at the races and was hammered down for \$320,000 from the consignment of Taylor Made Sales Agency. Trontz said that there has been no decision as to what stallions the mares would visit this year, and that Mrs. Mabee will consider either racing or selling the offspring. "She's breeding for the commercial market," he explained. "You have to wait and see how [the foal] turns out before you decide what to do with it." Golden Eagle Farm has raced such stars as Best Pal, General Challenge, Excellent Meeting and Event of the Year, who stands for a 2004 stud fee of \$10,000 at the Ramona nursery.

## Spring Is in the Air...

Graded-stakes winner **Spring Meadow** (Meadowlake--Go for It Lady, by Mr. Prospector), sold as a broodmare prospect, was the co-topper at yesterday's session, going to Live Oak Stud for \$800,000. The five-year-old was bought for \$200,000 by David Shimmon as a twoyear-old and was campaigned by the Fog City Stable of Shimmon and Bob Bianco. Although based on the West Coast, the chestnut made a name for herself while racing in New York at three, finishing second to Carson Hollow in the GI Prioress S. at Belmont and third to You and the Prioress winner in the GI Test S. at Saratoga after being shut off at the quarter pole. She concluded the year with a runner-up finish to Got Koko in the GI La Brea S., began 2003 with a victory in the GIII Las Flores H. and went on to win stakes races at Delaware and Fairplex before retiring with earnings of \$496,123. Eric Hamelback, general manager of Live Oak Stud, thought she was the pick of the catalogue. "Typically we come into a sale, go through the catalogue and try to find the best mare in the sale," he said. "Michael Youngs and I thought that she definitely was the best. She had the pedigree, she had the race record." He added, "We do not intend to race her, but matings have not been determined. Obviously we can go several different ways. She's a wonderful mare, a wonderful physical, the phenotype was exactly what we wanted. We had her appraised a little bit less going in, but for \$800,000, we were very happy and we feel like we got our money's worth, whereas in November it was tough to get a horse for fair value." Davant Latham, an advisor to David Shimmon and Bob Bianco and the bloodstock director at Darby Dan Farm, was also pleased with the final bid. "We knew she had the potential to sell, but you never want to get your hopes too high," Latham said. "She was such a beautiful filly, such a classy filly, and was an inch away from winning the Test. It was fun to see her go through the sale. It was in some ways a bittersweet moment, for me and the people at Fog City, because she's been such a special filly. They were torn [about selling] because they're not in the breeding game, but if you're going to start, what a mare to start with. We're very happy that Live Oak got her. We know she'll have every opportunity she could possibly have."

## Adena Acquires Fleet Forever Partners...

Frank Stronach won a protracted bidding duel to claim 2002 Colleen S. winner Forever Partners (Not For Love) for \$410,000 yesterday. Bred by Timber Creek Farm, the four-year-old bay filly was originally purchased by Skeedattle Associates as a yearling for \$50,000 at the 2001 EASMAY sale. Campaigned by that ownership and trained by Tony Dutrow, the New Jersey-bred made an immediate impression at the races, breaking her maiden by a nose at first asking before posting an 11-length score in the Colleen, an effort for which she received a Beyer Speed Figure of 94. Shelved following a runner-up effort to Awesome Humor in the GI Spinaway S., she returned to take a Pimlico allowance last April before finishing an unlucky third in the GIII Miss Preakness S. in what would become her final start in May. "She was just a very, very fast filly...very talented," commented Dan Hall, manager of Stronach's Adena Springs Farm. "She stood out to me. She's got all the physical qualities that we like-she's a beautiful mare and she's very well-balanced. There could be a little more depth to her pedigree, but she had a lot of quality. She's really difficult to fault." Forever Partners was consigned to the sale by Taylor Made Sales Agency.

He may be a May 22 foal, but a son of Unbridled's Song topped the yearlings at Keeneland January yesterday, bringing a final bid of \$230,000. Consigned by Taylor Made Sales Agency, Agent LXIV, the gray colt was purchased by Buzz Chace, agent for Bill Poston of Atlanta, Georgia. Poston plans to resell the horse later in the summer. "He's a little bit of a late baby, but he's got all the right parts," Chace said. "I think he's going to mature into a beautiful horse. He reminds me a lot of his father. I thought he was just outstanding." The yearling is out of a half sister to SW Fly North (Pleasant Colony), the dam of 2002 champion three-year-old filly Farda Amiga (Broad Brush).

### All In The Family...

Denis Sheehy, acting as agent for an unnamed client who "has a stud farm in Country Cork, Ireland" went to \$160,000 to land a yearling filly by Maria's Mon, from the draft of Taylor Made Sales Agency. The secondbest seller at the Keeneland January opener, the chestnut is the second foal from Primaly, who was named champion two-year-old in Canada after running second to Countess Diana in the 1997 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies. Primaly is a daughter of Canadian Broodmare of the Year Primarily, who is also the dam of Sovereign Award winner Poetically. The family has been extremely live in this sales ring of late. At last year's November sale, Primaly was purchased by Haruya Yoshida for \$575,000 in foal to Fusaichi Pegasus, while Poetically was knocked down to B. Wayne Hughes for \$2.05 million carrying a foal by A.P. Indy. "The family was the attraction," Sheehy explained. "You're buying from a champion that bred two champions. We paid enough for it, but we wanted it. It's the only one we wanted. She's going back to race in Ireland and she'll be trained by either D.K. [Dermot] Weld or Kevin Prendergast."

## International Classifications cont. How the Classifications Work...

"We have to do what we think right on the information that is available to us," Nigel Gray explained. "We have to seek to reflect what happens on the racecourse. Isn't it possible that Newbury was the one occasion where Hawk Wing had everything in his favour and where he was able to show his real form for the first and only time? The problem with trying to find a rating for a top-class horse is trying to ascertain exactly how good he is. You have to take a view on Falbrav's victory in the International. We took the view that Darryll Holland went about 3 1/2 lengths clear before deciding that he'd done enough and easing up. We rated him as a winner by 3 1/2 or four lengths, but we couldn't justify going any further. We are giving a rating to a horse's performances, not just to the horse. We will never know if, given different circumstances, Falbray would have beaten Hawk Wing over a mile or a mile and a quarter--wouldn't it be great to have found out? Falbrav is as good as 127. He might have been better. But what we can say is that through all our examination of Hawk Wing's win at Newbury, he must be rated higher." The Niarchos Family's Bago (Fr) (Nashwan), who closed out his unbeaten juvenile campaign in the G1 Criterium International at Saint-Cloud in November, is the top-rated two-year-old colt on 121 pounds. That rating makes him the lowest top-rated juvenile since Grand Lodge led the division in 1992.

He has since returned to take the GIII Mr. Prospector H. under top weight at Gulfstream Park Jan. 3. The bay carries a foal by Woodman, another Mr. Prospector-line stallion.

Defer West set a track record in winning a stakes at Retama Park in 1987 and clearly passed the speed gene on to her latest foal to make the races. Foaled last Jan. 4, this yearling filly is a half sister to Silver Minister (Silver Deputy), who kicked off the New Year with a five-length victory in the Turfway Prevue S. Jan. 3. The filly is out of Mint Leaf (Capote), who sold for \$180,000 in foal to Distorted Humor at last year's Keeneland November Sale, and is a half sister to MGSW Ide (Forty Niner).

That record stood until last summer when Phantom Light, a son of Alphabet Soup, charged home to win the GIII Dominion Day H. and equalled his sire's record in the process. That effort earned him a Sovereign Award as Canada's leading older horse. Kirby's Meadow sells in foal to Swain (Ire).

Consigned by Lane's End, agent

A four-time pattern winner overseas, including a victory in the G1 Prix St Alary at three, Luna Wells was exported to the U.S. in late 1996, then returned to Europe, where she sold for 1.7 million guineas at the 1996 Tattersalls December sale. Returned to the U.S., she managed a third-place effort in the GII Las Palmas H. in 1997 the following season. A half sister to prominent stallion Linamix (Fr), Luna Wells is the lone mare in the catalogue in foal to Storm Cat.

Hip <u>684</u>, Small Promises (m, 6, <u>Carson City</u>--Promiseville, by Alwasmi)

Consigned by Fred Seitz/Brookdale Farm, agent

Catalogued as a racing or broodmare prospect, Small Promises won a pair of restricted Canadian stakes and was second in the GIII Maple Leaf S. en route to being named the champion older mare of 2002. Kept in training last year, the gray mare placed in six of her eight trips to the post, including a runner-up finish to Allamerican Bertie in the GIII Sabin H. at Gulfstream Park.

If you want to see a demonstration of Sod's Law, all you have to do is sell a struggling young stallion to Japan. In no time at all--as the owners of Wild Rush have recently witnessed--the stakes winners will then start to flow and the hitherto-neglected stallion will suddenly be back in the news. Unfortunately, most of these stallions are gone beyond recall by that time.

However, the Coolmore/Ashford team has, not for the first time, pioneered a system which effectively helps them have their cake and eat it. Instead of selling a young stallion when his popularity or results take a temporary dip, they have sometimes chosen to lease them to Japan. If those results continue to dip, the ticket to Japan eventually proves one way, but Coolmore has usually found that its faith in its stallions pays dividends in the long term.

One of the earliest examples of this was with the much-missed Danehill. Having started his career at a fee of 25,000 Irish guineas in 1990, Danehill's fee had fallen to only 9,000 Irish guineas in 1993 and 1994. Although his popularity began to rise again in 1995, Coolmore leased Danehill to Japan for the Northern Hemisphere season in 1996.

That was the year that Danehill moved up to fifth place on the Anglo-Irish stallion table and he never looked back on his return from Japan.

Royal Academy was another Coolmore stallion who spent the 1996 season in Japan, perhaps because he hadn't provided his patrons with much of a profit at the 1995 yearling sales. Since then, Coolmore has leased the likes of Thunder Gulch (1999), Hennessy (2001), Peintre Celebre (2001) and Spinning World (2002).

Thunder Gulch's departure was no doubt precipitated by the fact that he was approaching the traditionally difficult fourth season and his first yearlings had met with very mixed results at the sales. Peintre Celebre, for his part, had covered fewer mares in his second season than his first, so it made sense to try pastures new in his third season.

For Hennessy, a trip to the Orient became an option after his first runners had mainly failed to live up to expectations in 2000. Even allowing for the fact that these expectations had been boosted too high by a 1999 yearling average of nearly \$250,000 (off a \$40,000 fee), 11th place on the freshman sires' list was not good enough. A Group 3 win in Ireland by Perigee Moon and a \$27,000 stakes win by Airy Hill were not going to be enough to fill Hennessy's book in 2001, so off he went.

Hennessy's early results were particularly disappointing because precocity is one thing we have come to demand and expect from this male line. Hennessy's grandsire Storm Bird was unbeaten at two, winning four Group races on his way to the title of Europe's champion juvenile in 1980, and his sire Storm Cat has been champion sire of juveniles on no fewer than six occasions. Storm Cat owed his 1995 title largely to Hennessy's efforts. Maturing early, Hennessy quickly achieved a sequence of four impressive victories, notably gaining graded stakes successes by 5 1/2, 9 3/4 and 3 1/4 lengths. Hennessy also matched Storm Cat's feat of finishing a close second in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile.

Fortunately, Hennessy soon set about restoring his reputation. The Grade II successes of Distilled in the Illinois Derby and Keats in the GII Lexington S. provided a good start to 2001 and even better followed when Hennessy's second-crop juveniles began to show their paces. Johannesburg, a very good early-season juvenile, proved to be so much more, reeling off Group 1 wins in Ireland, France, England and the United States.

Hennessy also enjoyed success with GIII Cowdin S. Sunray Spirit, so he didn't have any difficulty in attracting mares on his return to Kentucky from Japan. With his 2002 fee set at \$45,000, he covered 146 mares.

But there is a downside to the concept of leasing stallions to Japan, and Hennessy is about to experience it--he has no juvenile crop to represent him in the West this year. The same applies to Peintre Celebre in Europe, but his problems may be delayed until 2005, when he will have to rely on a limited number of older horses and a batch of juveniles bred to go a distance.

Inevitably, these stallions will find it harder to take high rank on the stallion tables over the next two years. It remains to be seen whether breeders and buyers are going to make allowances for this, and I rather doubt that they will. My fear is that these stallions may again face dwindling demand in a year or two, causing further peaks and troughs later in their careers. The only way out is for these stallions to offset their lack of a whole crop by coming up with a star performer or two.

Hennessy might have had just such a star had Cactus Ridge not been retired after he'd won all four starts, but he does have Harmony Lodge working for him. This mare is still going strong at the age of six, as she showed with her repeat victory in the GIII First Lady H. She had helped increase the hype surrounding Hennessy's first-crop juveniles, causing something of a sensation at Fasig-Tipton's two-year-old sale at Calder. The \$1,650,000 bid she drew from Eugene Melnyk constituted a record for a juvenile filly and the money looked well spent when she equalled the track record for 5 1/2 furlongs on her debut at Saratoga.

At that stage, it seemed fair to expect Harmony Lodge to develop into a leading juvenile, but her Saratoga race proved to be her only start at two. Indeed she hadn't won a graded stakes by the time she turned five, but she has made ample amends since and her recent Gulfstream win was her fifth at graded level.

In some respects, her record mirrors that of her dam Win Crafty Lady. A dual winner at two, Win Crafty Lady didn't become a graded winner until five, when she took the GIII Interborough H. over six furlongs.

Win Crafty Lady is by Crafty Prospector, a son of Mr. Prospector, whereas Diligence, produced by Harmony Lodge's second dam Honeytab, was by another son, Miswaki. Diligence, twice a graded winner at seven furlongs, is at stud in Florida, as is Win Crafty Lady's Dehere colt Graeme Hall, who earned over \$1.1 million.

Harmony Lodge ranks alongside Cactus Ridge and Distilled as one of three graded winners sired by Hennessy from granddaughters of Mr. Prospector. They represent four percent of his foals bred to this pattern and I will be surprised if there aren't plenty more good winners to come from this cross. Chances are, though, that we won't see them until next year.

## MAGIC MILLIONS WRAP-UP

Magic Millions concluded a strong renewal of its Conrad Jupiters Yearling Sale Sunday on the Gold Coast. The Hong Kong bench was especially strong at the auction, but a dwindling supply of Danehill yearlings may have a negative impact on that market in the future. Asked about the importance of Danehill to Hong Kong's presence at Australian sales, Hong Kong trainer David Hayes said: "Danehill is why the Hong Kong buyers come, that is what gets their attention, and it will take a few years to find a replacement for Danehill in Hong Kong. They will still buy here, but they like proven stallions familiar to them, so their buying pattern won't be as obvious." Of this year's auction, Hayes added, "I think most vendors would be happy and as a buyer, it was hard to buy. I was impressed with Catbird (Aus), Fasliyev and King's Best among the freshman sires."

Grant Pritchard Gordon, making his first foray from England to Magic Millions, bought three yearlings for A\$600,000. Of his experience at the auction, he said, "The sale was stronger than I expected; I had hoped to buy a couple of well-bred fillies but I was blown out completely on a couple of occasions and underbidder once. As long as the sale continues to have an international flavour, it will have international interest. Hopefully another stallion will come along in Danehill's place. There were international pedigrees and nice racy types, but, physically, it is a very tough sale to work, with the heat, particularly in the sale ring."

Australian trainer Lee Freedman, who purchased 12 yearlings for A\$1.01, commented, "I'm very happy with the horses we'll train by Agnes World, Lujain, Singspiel (Ire) and High Yield. Yes, the number of new sires each year represents a challenge, but I am very happy because it's new blood. This sale will become one of the great sales of the world, but it has outgrown the auditorium."

Vinery Stud, which consigned Friday's session-top-ping A\$800,000 Danehill colt, enjoyed a solid sale. The stud's Dr. Tom Simon said, "We have had a very satisfying sale, we'll take just one filly home and I am happy with the way More Than Ready sold [16 for A\$54,000]. The middle market has been very strong, but at the top end we are missing the top international buyers. There's such a lot of nice Danehills who sold for less than their value."

One is an undefeated Grade I winner whose facile victories have the West Coast dreaming they have a Kentucky Derby contender. The other banked over a million dollars in 2003 and won two Grade I races, one at a mile and a quarter, the other at seven furlongs. The connections of Lion Heart and Island Fashion, however, will not be holding their breath at the Westin Diplomat Resort and Spa in Hollywood, Florida, awaiting the announcement of champion two-year-old colt and

three-year-old filly, respectively. Neither horse was a finalist. Should they have been? Yeah, probably. But the timing of their primary accomplishments--in late December, well after the Eclipse Award ballots had been mailed--meant that many voters had already picked their winners. Ah well, there's always next year.

As beleaguered fans of college football will attest, any system to crown a champion short of a legitimate playoff format with a championship event will cause derision among the cognoscenti. In Thoroughbred racing, the Breeders' Cup World Thoroughbred Championships, ostensibly, was to be such an event. And while many horses have been named Eclipse champion off a single North American start that just happened to be a Breeders' Cup win--Johannesburg, Bank's Hill (GB) and High Chaparral (Ire) are recent examples--many runners with legitimate claims to end-of-year honors who simply don't or can't make the Breeders' Cup aren't left out in the cold. *Writers Up cont. p5*

This year, neither four-time Grade I winner Mineshaft (older horse division) nor three-time Grade I winner Empire Maker (three-year-old male division) made the Breeders' Cup (both were retired off minor injuries in early October), yet both obviously deserved to be finalists. The Breeders' Cup is not, in fact, the end-all, be-all indicator of championship honors. So why, then, did many of the folks who vote on the Eclipse awards seemingly stop paying attention to racing after the Breeders' Cup and tune out while a pair of horses made a play for divisional superiority with some late-season heroics?

First, Michael Tabor and Derrick Smith's Lion Heart. The chiseled chestnut, who fetched a sale-topping bid of \$1.4 million at last year's Fasig-Tipton February two-year-olds in training sale, made his belated debut Oct. 24, winning a Santa Anita maiden by a length. Romping by six in his stakes debut, the Nov. 15 GIII Hollywood Prevue S., he wrapped up his season with a 3 1/2-length tally in the Dec. 20 GI Hollywood Futurity. Patrick Biancone, who trains the colt, thought the victory was enough to convince Eclipse voters. "He's an unbelievable horse," said the Frenchman. "I think the colts need a leader, and he is the leader."

The two-year-old colt division is, admittedly, a tight one. A case can be made for each of the three finalists: Action This Day won the big one--the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile; Birdstone took the GI Champagne S. with ease; and Cuvee, who won a trio of graded races, dominated by 8 1/4 lengths in the GI Futurity S. But in a system where voters have short memories and often make their picks on a what-have-you-done-for-me-lately mindset (does anyone remember Composure?), one certainly gets the impression Lion Heart's absence on the final ballot is due less to deductive reasoning and more to the fact that most voters had gone home for the holidays.

A similar case can be made for Everest Stables' homebred Island Fashion. The big gray broke her maiden in the \$256,000 WinStar Oaks at Sunland in late March, then, two starts later, captured the one-mile GIII Delaware Oaks by 6 1/2 lengths in what would be her final start for trainer Nick Canani. Switched to

Barclay Tagg's barn, she promptly annexed the 1 1/4-mile GI Alabama S. by six. Two off-the-board efforts led to another trainer change, this time to Marcelo Polanco, under whose care Island Fashion put forth one of her best performances. Making her turf debut against older mares as an 87-1 bomb in

the one-mile GI Matriarch S. Nov. 30, she came roaring from the back of the pack and finished fourth, beaten just three-parts of a length.

By the time Island Fashion entered the gate as a 9-1 chance in the seven-furlong GI La Brea S. at Santa Anita Dec. 27, Eclipse voters had just two days before the Dec. 29 deadline to hand in their ballots. In another very tight division, some voters overlooked the importance of the La Brea. It can be assumed that Island Fashion's six-length runaway victory, which left her atop the division in North American earnings with over \$1.2 million, might have swayed a few opinions.

"If she wasn't nominated, who would you nominate?" asks Polanco. "Just look at her record. She won at four different tracks and she ran against the best three-year-old [Ellolov, one of the three Eclipse finalists in the division] in the La Brea and beat her by 12 lengths from the far outside post position. She galloped. She completely dominated.

"It's a slap in the face for her not to have been nominated," he added. "She's by far the best horse I've ever had."

Polanco's frustration is understandable. The job of those voting on the Eclipse Awards is to assess the accomplishments of horses that compete throughout the calendar year. Why send in the ballots early? Patience is a virtue, though we'll have to show some ourselves and wait a year to see if voters have heeded that wisdom.

"Maybe we can win [an Eclipse] this year," says an optimistic Polanco. "As long as you have a horse in the stall, there's a chance."
