DANEHILL COLT TOPS PREMIER FINALE

A second Danehill colt reached seven figures at the New Zealand Bloodstock's Premier Yearling Sale in Karaka, when David Ellis of Te Akau Racing yesterday went to NZ\$1.1 million to purchase Lot 509. The bay yearling, consigned by Pencarrow Stud, is the first foal out of Australian Group 1 winner Grand Echezeaux (NZ) (Zabeel {NZ}). The mare is a half sister to Romanee Conti (NZ), the dam of G1 Melbourne Cup winner Ethereal (NZ). In foal to Stravinsky, she has a Montjeu (Ire) filly at foot. "He is the best yearling Pencarrow has ever had to sell since we began taking horses to the sales 20 or so years ago," Pencarrow Stud manager Leon Casey said of the seven-figure yearling on the farm's website. "He was a stunning foal and has never put a foot wrong." Of his new acquisition, Ellis said on Pencarrow's site, "I decided before Christmas that I wanted to purchase a Danehill colt with a stallion pediaree. I looked at all the Danehills at the Gold Coast sale and at this sale and this is the best of them. He's the type of colt that can perform at two and right up to derby level. If he lives up to those expectations, he will then retire to stud in the Waikato." The underbidder on yesterday's sale topper was Adrian Nicoll of BBA Ireland, who purchased Lot 159, a son of Danehill out of Push a Venture (GB) (Shirley Heights {GB}), for NZ\$1 million during Monday's opening session of the threeday auction. The sale average of NZ\$111,955 is up 17 percent from last year's figure of NZ\$95,291. The median rose eight percent to NZ\$72,500. The buy-back rate was 17 percent. "Going into this year's Premier Sale, we were hoping to achieve somewhere around 10-percent growth in average and aggregate," explained New Zealand Bloodstock's General Manager of Bloodstock and Marketing Julia Naismith. "To see the average climb by 17 percent and the aggregate by 31 percent is extremely satisfying to say the least. Not only was the top end of the market incredibly strong, but the all-important median or middle market also grew significantly. Buyers from across the globe love coming to Karaka and when we combine this advantage with pedigrees and yearlings of top international quality as we did this year, we had the right ingredients for what has been a highly successful sale." 

WORLD CUP PROGRAM ATTRACTS A CAST OF

A THOUSAND Nearly 1000 horses from 25 different countries have been made eligible for the Mar. 27 Dubai World Cup program at the close of the second nomination period Jan. 14. The centerpiece of the card, the \$6-million G1 Dubai World Cup, could attract several horses from the United States, including Breeders' Cup Classic winner Pleasantly Perfect (Pleasant Colony), Medaglia d'Oro (El Prado {Ire}), second in the Classic, and Congaree (Arazi), who squares off against Pleasantly Perfect in the GII San Antonio H. this weekend. Refuse To Bend (Ire) (Sadler's Wells), recently transferred to Godolphin, could make an appearance in the G1 Dubai Duty Free as could MG1SW Vespone (Ire) (Llandaff) and G1 Dubai Champion S. hero Rakti (GB) (Polish Precedent), Johar (Gone West), who shared the victory in the Breeders' Cup Turf, has been invited for the G1 Dubai Sheema Classic, while Cajun Beat (Grand Slam) has been selected to contest the G1 Dubai Golden Shaheen, which could also attract South African sprint sensation National Currency (SAf) (National Assembly).

IN DEFENSE OF AGENTS

Other than convicted felons, can there be an easier target than the middlemen? They don't own the thing, they aren't the star. They are the agent, the broker, the dealer, the fixer. It's not their capital involved; they're somehow vaguely suspected of being parasites. So it's easy to blame them for ills in the system. The thorny issue of transparency in bloodstock dealings has reared up again in Britain, as a result of a story by Richard Evans in *The Daily Telegraph* which was splashed across the front page of yesterday's trade daily, the *Racing Post*. Strangely, it was to do with a case that never even went to court, but involved trainer David Elsworth, English agents Charlie Gordon-Watson and Jamie McCalmont, and California agent Richard Duggan. It was really pretty run-of-the-mill stuff, but has made headlines over here--at least it's a break for one day from the John Magnier/Alex Ferguson saga. In a climate where this so-called competition commission, the Office of Fair Trading, is threatening to sabotage the entire structure of British racing, this sort of publicity just makes industry participants more jittery.

To make a long story very short, the allegation was that Gordon-Watson, representing the buyer through Duggan, committed to buy a filly trained by Elsworth, who was going to be paid £10,000 by the buyers even though he was also being paid by the sellers. It never happened anyway because the filly was injured before the money changed hands, Duggan refused to pay for her, and Gordon-Watson was suing to recover costs incurred by the sale not going through, which he maintained was hardly his fault. Anyway, the Judge read the statements and told the parties to go off and settle, basically because Elsworth not telling the seller he was also being paid by the buyer could be construed as fraud. So it was settled. But for some extraordinary reason, the *Telegraph*'s Richard Evans turned it into headline news, and yesterday's Racing Post picked it up and now has everybody shouting from the rooftops about how bloodstock agents should be properly regulated, et cetera. Evans' story extensively cited Justin Wadham, a lawyer and former Darley Stud official who was representing Duggan, the agent in America who refused to pay for the filly after she had been injured--though I don't remember reading that in the *Telegraph* story. But the basic issue is that trainer Elsworth was supposed to be getting £10,000 from the buyer's side, on top of what he was going to be getting from the seller. If Elsworth had told Foodbroker he was getting the £10,000, there would be no legal issue, Judge Dean said, according to what I read.

I suppose shock, horror, and wringing of hands is an inevitable consequence, at least publicly, of the discovery that everything is not always disclosed to everybody on all sides of a transaction. Aside from the fact that 'incentives' have been an effective way of doing business since business has been done (greed being an essential component of the human condition, it would seem), I actually think our agent friends are somewhat taking the hit for having the wits to survive in a very tough and competitive environment where you still have a chance to succeed on your merit. What I mean is this: let's look at the principals here, the sellers and the buyers of this commodity we call racehorses--a commodity which, may I remind you, would have no value were it not for we humans who are gambling on them, trading in them, and even reporting about them.


If you're looking for transparency, why not start with a standard contract between licensed dealers and principals--which states that the agents for seller and buyer will each receive a five-percent minimum commission from the seller. I would actually add a couple of wrinkles. There is no reason for it to be exclusive, and I would be in favor of a minimum commission of something like £250 in Britain, or \$500 in America. Half the reason agents would be tempted to commit larceny, if they were, is because they have no guarantee going in from the person they're meant to be representing. And, by the way, can I tell you one of the reasons principals won't commit to paying five percent? Greed. Principals can be greedy, too, just like agents.

In my role as an analyst of the breeding side of the industry, I would hate to see much invasive regulation anyway. I probably have a selfish reason for thinking that: the stuff I get to analyze is a kind of pure capitalism. It really is a true market economy, and as such it regulates itself in some pretty interesting ways. I think I have the luxury of analyzing pure economic factors, uncomplicated by too much bureaucracy, regulation, or other political factors.

So, sure, let's have more transparency, and less cheating. But don't let's blame it all on the agents: they're not driving this train. If you want to make them part of the process that makes the rules, fine; but as for making them the scapegoats for everything that's wrong with the business ... pass. Look to the lawgivers first, I say.

FABRE SIGNS UP GARY STEVENS Gary Stevens will be riding in France in 2004 after signing a retainer with André Fabre. In the surprising revelation, the world-famous jockey, who turned 40 last year, will begin riding for the legendary French conditioner in the middle of March. Stevens will fill the gap left by the departure of Olivier Peslier as first jockey to Fabre in September 2002 and by the retainer that Christophe Soumillon has signed with His Highness the Aga Khan. "I would have to have my head examined to turn this down," Stevens told European Bloodstock News yesterday. "It is to me, at the age of 40, the opportunity of a lifetime. I love change, I got my education through racing and I got my education through travel--not by going to school." Fabre and Stevens paired up previously to success in the 1990 GI Breeders' Cup Turf with Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid al Maktoum's In the Wings (GB). Stevens will be enjoying his second foray into Europe, having ridden for Sir Michael Stoute in England during the 1999 season.


Frisky's Next Start Still a Mystery:

JOCKEY CLUB REACT TO CASE

Officials at the Jockey Club have announced that they will call a summit meeting of the major figures within the bloodstock and racing industries. The move, which will bring together representatives of bloodstock agents, owners, trainers, breeders, and sales company employees, is in response to a recent court case involving conditioner David Elsworth and bloodstock agent Charlie Gordon-Watson. That case centered around the sale of the filly Foodbroker Fancy (Halling) to U.S. interests during which Judge Michael Dean QC made comments regarding the conduct of the business. Those remarks came after hearing witness statements that Gordon-Watson had made a payment to Elsworth, who was already due to receive a percentage of the sale from the current owners. Reacting to Judge Dean's comments that "the sooner the people involved change their ways, the better," the Jockey Club's Executive Director Christopher Foster added, "We are calling a meeting of the relevant organizations to discuss how to increase transparency in sales transactions."
