BRINGING IT ON AT BARRETTS

With the juvenile sales season already in full swing, Barretts takes center stage today with the March Sale of Selected Two-Year-Olds in Training at the Hinds Pavilion at Fairplex in Pomona, California. Barretts' predecessors on this year's two-year-old scene, OBS and Fasig-Tipton, realized across-the-board increases in gross revenue, average and median, and Barretts hopes that the tide of abundance will continue to flow. "I would think that the market will continue to be strong and it appears likely that things would remain constant," commented Barretts President and General Manager Gerald McMahon.

Onward and Upward...

After enduring five years of decreasing aggregate, Barretts enjoyed a rise in gross figures in 2002 and 2003, and hopes to make it three straight with a bounteous catalog this year. Inflated by a 54-head dispersal from The Thoroughbred Corporation, Barretts has catalogued a full cast of 228 horses for the 2004 edition. "This year's catalog is fairly solid. I think our basic core of horses is better, overall, than last year's catalog," said McMahon, adding, "This year's catalog is a little bit smaller in numbers than last year, which was done intentionally. We wanted to emphasize quality. We tried to find individuals with a balance of pedigree and conformation." And, according to McMahon, that attempt appears to be showing signs that it will payoff for Barretts. "A number of people have said that they have seen some very nice horses on our backstretch," said McMahon. "We have a very good international interest in this book, and I think that goes for both The Thoroughbred Corp. and two-year-old buyers. We have also had contact with a number of people who are new on the scene and have expressed interest." With bidding beginning at 2 p.m. PST, the sale starts off with The Thoroughbred Corp. consignment, followed by 174 juveniles. *Barretts Coverage cont. p2*

Deja Vue for Atlantic Ocean..

Looking to improve on her first trip through the ring at Barretts is **Atlantic Ocean** (Stormy Atlantic), who realized a sale-topping \$1.9 million during the 2002 renewal of the sale. The four-year-old filly is one of three GSWs included in The Thoroughbred Corp. dispersal. Trainer Kristin Mulhall will be the acting agent for the consignment. As for the how the dispersal will impact Barretts, McMahon said, "The Thoroughbred Corp. horses have already helped us attract a large number of buyers who wouldn't ordinarily be here. That dispersal has already helped the overall sale. Many buyers who have requested videos and catalogs have expressed interest in both the two-year-olds and The Thoroughbred Corp. horses. The influence has definitely carried over."

Temperature Might KO Tiger Hunt from Rebel

Kentucky Derby contender **Tiger Hunt** (Kris S.) came down with a temperature over the weekend, which could knock him out of the Mar. 20 Gill Rebel S. at Oaklawn. Tiger Hunt, who is unraced since finishing fourth in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile, had a temperature of 103 3/5 Saturday and an elevated white blood cell count, said Barry Irwin, the president of the Team Valor syndicate that owns the colt. Irwin said it is 50-50 that Tiger Hunt makes the Rebel. He was unsure where the horse would start if missing the race. "Who the heck knows," he said. "It's sort of depressing. But what can we do? The horse has never been sick before."

Leprechaun's Maiden Voyage...

Although Mike Mulligan of Leprechaun Racing is no stranger to the game, he is new on the scene at Barretts. Fresh off a strong showing at last week's Fasig-Tipton sale at Calder, where he sold a Forest Wildcat half sister to Peace Rules for \$630,000 after purchasing the filly for \$120,000 at last year's Saratoga August sale, Mulligan brings a small but select group to this venue. "I think we have a good bunch here," said Mulligan, who runs Leprechaun with his wife Britt. In its ninth year of operation, Leprechaun has turned out multiple stakes winner Fort Ruby and Saga Novel, who broke the track record and later bettered his own mark in Japan. Headlining the operation's Barretts consignment is [Hip 84](#), a son of Pulpit out of the Relaunch mare Set To Fly. The colt looked strong in his initial breeze last week with a final time of :10.4 for the eighth, but thrust himself among the top horses yesterday when he blasted through the distance in :10.1. With juveniles like that in the barn, Mulligan is hopeful that the luck of the Irish will continue to hover over Leprechaun Racing. "The Barretts folks have told us that they have sent out more video tapes and catalogs than they ever had, which was the case at the other sales this year, so I expect there to be a strong buying market here," he said. "I think that the sale will follow suit, as long as the quality of horses follows suit with the earlier sales. Optimistic about the future, Mulligan recognizes the importance of the juvenile sales in the grander scheme of things. "I believe that a lot of the success of these sales has to do with the amount of success that your seeing from our horses," he explained. "Most of the two-year-old races last year were dominated by horses purchased at the two-year-old sales. And, in many of the major preps for horses that are on the Derby trail, the winners have come out of these two-year-old sales." Ready for bigger and better things in a market that is enjoying an all-time high, Mulligan stated, "People are starting to take notice. They are starting to realize that, if you want to be successful on the track, you cannot ignore the two-year-old sales." Following the current blush of success, it is also likely that people will take notice of Leprechaun.

The Need for Speed...

It is a well established fact that at the core of the two-year-old sales is speed and, in the weeks leading up to Barretts two-year-old sale, few topics received as much attention as did that subject. Unrelenting rains hit the Los Angeles area in the days leading up to the initial preview show and, as a result, it yielded relatively sluggish times. For some, the need to achieve the swiftest time is crucial, the deciding factor in whether a horse will sell well or not, but slowly the tide seems to be changing. Although speed inevitably helps the bottom line, savvy buyers are looking to mine the diamond in the rough that may have fallen through the cracks because of an average breeze during the previews. Here is what a few industry leaders had to say on the matter:

Becky Thomas, Sequel Bloodstock, Consignor

"Our business is an island. The biggest component of our two-year-olds are works. They are not going to sell well, no matter who they are by, if they don't have a good work. It is really not an indicator of what a horse is really worth, but it is an indicator of how well you are going to sell." *The Need for Speed cont. p3*

Donna Wormser, Consignor

"Unfortunately, the speed factor is one of the most important things at these two-year-old sales. Luckily, there are some people who are doing more homework and looking at how the horses present themselves on the track. Unfortunately, there are still many buyers who want the faster horses."

Ciaran Dunne, Wavertree Stables, Consignor

"I think they have to work well, but I am not sure that the fastest horses bring the most money any more. I think they all have to work well, but I think that the people buying are smart enough that the distinction between :10.3 and :10.6 is not that big a factor. Some of the horses that people had high hopes for worked in the high :10s and :11s, but if they can come back and do what people originally thought they would do, then it will not hurt them."

Jerry Bailey, Consignor

"The buyers are not too forgiving, but I think I do see a little more forgiveness on the better-bred horses than I used to. Even the horses that don't have much of a pedigree, there doesn't seem to be a top end on them if they work well. We have seen horses with little pedigree, but that have worked well, bring near seven-digit prices. That's unusual. There used to be a limit on those horses. It seems like the top end on those horses has come off. It doesn't make it any easier in the middle to sell, but you certainly have to say that it is a more optimistic market this year."

Terry Oliver, Consignor

"I don't think that having the fastest horses here is as important. Having the videos has become more important, and it is evident that people are doing their homework and becoming more educated. As much as being fast, it's how they do it. That's what changes the whole ball game. You can take a horse that goes :10.2 and if he does it the right way and everything is there, I'd rather have that than a :10 flat horse. Everyday. And that's what moves the horses into the big leagues. As a seller, the yearlings are expensive to buy, so we need those big horses to make it. They pay the way. The times are important, but they are not the final say."

Jenine Sahadi, Trainer

"I am not necessarily looking for a horse who goes in :10 flat. It's the way they do it."

Case in Point...

The theory of speed will be tested tomorrow when [Hip 97](#), a filly by Lord Carson, steps into the ring. While the chestnut, consigned by B.C. Thoroughbreds, agent for Timberline, was impressive during the first breeze session with a time of :10.1 over a confirmed heavy track, she left spectators' tongues on the floor with a brilliant :9.7 move yesterday, a Barretts record. "We were very pleased with her work today," said B.C. Thoroughbred's Shane Chipman. "She's a very fast filly." A daughter of the young unraced mare Storm Struck, the filly descends from the Canadian champion two-year-old filly Queen Louie. "I like her because she is long and lean, but she carries her weight," explained Chipman. The filly, currently owned by the five-man Timberline partnership, was purchased at last year's OBS August sale for \$37,000 and earlier brought \$13,000 at Keeneland's November sale.

Sun Setting on an Empire...

The partnership between Prince Ahmed bin Salman and Richard Mulhall traces back to the early '80s, during which time the Prince was attending the University of California-Irvine and Mulhall was training horses on the Southern California circuit. Initially operating under the banner Cimmaron Stable and later Universal Stable, the pair played in the lower end of the market, paying \$30-50,000 for most of their racing stock, but according to Mulhall, "We were having a lot of fun." Ready for the big leagues in 1994, the pair kicked off The Thoroughbred Corp. and made a splash with their very first purchase, Supremo. Purchased for \$400,000 at the Keeneland April sale, the bay went on to win the GII Norfolk S. as a juvenile. Buoyed by a string of further successes, including War Emblem's Kentucky Derby victory, the Prince appeared ready to continue his dominance, but was stricken by a heart attack and died in the summer 2002. His brother, Prince Faisal, soon took over managing duties, but it was decided the following year that the racing operation would be disbanded. Beginning with the initial cut-back at Keeneland September in 2003, the disassemblment took full force at Keeneland's November sale.

Years of Plenty...

The Thoroughbred Corp. played a major role in the recent history of Barretts March sale, where it led all buyers in gross expenditures three out of four years from 1999 to 2002. In fact, the Prince walked away with the sales topper in 1998 and 1999, as well as securing the co-topper in 2001, and the high hopes and ample financial outlay paid off for the Prince, beginning with Sharp Cat, who won seven Grade I races from 1996 to 1998. The daughter of the stakes-winning mare In Neon, purchased in what was only the stable's second year, was retired with 14 wins from 21 lifetime starts and over \$1.9 million in earnings. Drawing from the same well, the Prince secured another two-year-old out of In Neon. Named Royal Anthem, the colt went on to score in the GI Canadian International, GI Gulfstream Park Breeders' Cup H. and G1 Juddmonte International before retiring in 2000 with earnings of \$1,875,417. The 2001 March sale provided a double score for The Thoroughbred Corp.'s racing operation with the purchase of GI Champagne S. winner Officer and Habibt, who won the GI Hollywood Starlet and GI Del Mar Debutante.

Denouement...

With two notable exceptions, today's dispersal spells the end of The Thoroughbred Corp.'s racing days. How does Mulhall feel about it? "I don't have feelings any more...I'm in the horse business," explained Mulhall with a chuckle. "But seriously, it's something that has to be done, that's it." According to Mulhall, the family will retain many of the operation's stallion shares and still owns Grade I stakes winner Dessert and MGSW Stylish. Both fillies are slated to be bred during the current breeding season and will be sold in November at Keeneland. Grade I winners Johar and Elusive City have also been retained, but both will be sold privately later this year. Saddling one of the last of The Thoroughbred Corp.'s colorbearers, Triple Fantasy, for Sunday's La Habra S. at Santa Anita, trainer Bob Baffert said, "This is the end of an era. We're witnessing history." Mulhall, however, offered a more pragmatic assessment. "You can't get attached in the horse business," he said. "Things happen and when it's over, it's over."

B-Brushwood Stable (Ky)**

Cat Fighter (Race Record: 7-3-2-1, \$209,800)

Cat Fighter appears to have every right in the world to realize a hefty price. By America's leading stallion Storm Cat and out of GI Spinaway S. and GI Matron S. heroine Strategic Maneuver, she has finished out of the money just once in seven lifetime starts. The bay came home third in her 2004 debut, the GII El Encino S., where she was beaten only 1 3/4 lengths. She gave buyers an even greater incentive to reach for their wallets when she collected her first graded-stakes score in the GII La Canada S. on Valentine's day. The \$700,000 KEEJUL yearling is a three-quarters sister to Irish Group 3 winner Ishiguru, who sold for \$1.15 million at Keeneland's July sale in 1999.

**Hip 24, f, 4, by Stormy Atlantic--Super Chef, by Seattle Slew
B-Arthur Appleton (Fl)**

Atlantic Ocean (Race Record: 19-5-3-2, \$678,210)

A member of the initial crop of Stormy Atlantic, Atlantic Ocean attracted little interest when she sold for \$31,000 at the 2001 Keeneland September yearling sale, but made up for that humble start the following year when she reeled in a cool \$1.9 million at this venue. The four-year-old recouped some of that investment with a score in the GIII Miesque S. as a juvenile and collected another graded-stakes victory at three, taking Santa Anita's GIII Santa Ysabel S.

When it comes to equine Oscars, there is absolutely no doubt as to who is the Lord of the Rings among Europe's stallions. Sadler's Wells has proved even more dominant than Peter Jackson's Return of the King, with its 11 awards, and last year saw the now-23-year-old stallion sweep to his 12th consecutive sires' championship (and his 13th in all).

Naturally, as an enormous fan of the Coolmore superstar, I am delighted that his descendants have been busily making their mark in North America in recent weeks. The last day of January saw Red Rioja, a filly by Sadler's Wells' Irish-based son King's Theatre, win the GIII Brown Bess H. Then, during February, his son El Prado--North America's champion sire of 2002--landed the GIII Palm Beach S. with Kitten's Joy and the GI Donn H. with the redoubtable Medaglia d'Oro. Another of Sadler's Wells' sons, the French Group 2 winner Royal Solo, supplied Binya, winner of the GIII The Very One H. on Saturday, the same day that Sadler's Wells' grandson Horse Chestnut enjoyed his first stakes success, thanks to Lucifer's Stone in the GIII Herecomethebride S. (Binya, incidentally, was produced when her dam, Beacondaire, was 25 years old, which represents quite an achievement on the mare's behalf.)

Horse Chestnut, of course, is the latest in a long line of foreign-bred stallions which have helped make Claiborne Farm so famous. His predecessors include the champion sires Sir Gallahad III, Blenheim, Ambiorix, Princequillo and Nasrullah.

Back in 1972, the stallion roster at Claiborne included as many as seven foreign horses, imported from four different countries--Herbager and Le Fabuleux from France, Pago Pago and Sky High II from Australia, Forli and Pronto from Argentina and Hawaii from South Africa. Times have changed, though, and the fact that Horse Chestnut is the only import among the current Claiborne stallions no doubt reflects the wary approach many American breeders now adopt towards imported horses of unfamiliar bloodlines.

Not that breeders have been very wary of Horse Chestnut: they sent him 88 mares in his second season and 93 in his third. The son of Fort Wood managed to cover 69 mares last year, even though he had to undergo colic surgery at a busy part of the season. His comparatively small first crop--39 live foals from 60 mares--was a result of his being forced into premature retirement by injuries suffered in a workout on Jan. 22, 2000. The timing of that injury was most unfortunate, coming just a couple of weeks after Horse Chestnut's highly promising American debut in the GIII Broward H.

Making his first start on a dirt track, Horse Chestnut drew away to win by five and a half lengths, in a style which suggested he would be a major player in the GI Donn H. His Broward win was his ninth from 10 starts and increased his winning sequence to eight. His American win also laid the base for comparisons with Claiborne's previous South African star, Hawaii, who arrived in the USA as a winner of 15 of his 18 starts in his home country. Hawaii then established himself as North America's champion turf horse, thanks to his total of five stakes wins in 1969 which included the United Nations H. and Man o'War S. *Caulfield cont. p9*

Although Horse Chestnut didn't match Hawaii's feat of becoming a champion at two, both headed their generation at three, when they both won the G1 Cape Guineas over a mile. Horse Chestnut also gained Group 1 wins over nine, 10 and 12.2 furlongs, even though he had been fast enough to score over five furlongs at two and to win a stakes race over 6.5 furlongs at three.

Hawaii sired some good winners in the States, such as Island Charm, Kamehameha, Qualique, Kilauea and Sun and Snow, but the race which best highlighted his merit as a sire was the Derby at Epsom. After his sons Hunza Dancer and Hawaiian Sound had, respectively, finished third and a very close second in 1975 and 1978, Hawaii supplied the winner in 1980, when Henbit was triumphant.

It would come as no surprise if Horse Chestnut too were to enjoy plenty of success in Europe. His first-crop juvenile runners in Britain last year included the winners Chester Le Street, who failed by only a head to win the G3 Superlative S. last July, and Aesculus, plus a colt who was second on his last appearance.

Demi O'Byrne also seems to have faith in Horse Chestnut, having paid \$500,000 for one of his sons at the OBS Calder Sale in February after the colt had worked an eighth in :10 1/5. He described the colt as "very mature and very fast," adding that he has a lovely action and balance. All being well, the youngster should soon be showing exactly what Horse Chestnut is capable of.

There hasn't been too much evidence available to American breeders up to now, with five of his 19 first-crop two-year-old runners having raced in Britain. The small American sample includes the stakes-placed performers Tabacchi and Yingyingying and the very progressive Lucifer's Stone, whose record now stands at three wins from six starts.

Lucifer's Stone has already shown she stays at least a mile and an eighth and she could conceivably stay a bit further. Her broodmare sire, Demons Begone, started favorite for the 1987 Kentucky Derby, only to bleed badly, and comes from the family responsible for a Preakness winner in Pine Bluff and a Kentucky Derby hero in Fusaichi Pegasus.

Interestingly, the filly's second dam, Breathless Charm, is by Miswaki, who is the broodmare sire of three Group 1 winners by none other than Sadler's Wells, including the Derby-winning Galileo. Breathless Charm is in turn a half-sister to ill-fated champion Left Bank, the versatile French Deputy colt who put up such fine effort to defeat Street Cry and Lido Palace in the G1 Whitney H. over a mile and an eighth.

Wimbledon Preps for Louisiana Derby

Trainer Bob Baffert, who saddled Kafwain to a second-place finish in the GII Louisiana Derby last year, only to see the horse demoted after a positive drug test, will be back for the race this year with **Wimbledon** (Wild Rush). The colt has only a maiden win under his belt, but cruised to an eight-length score in that Feb. 8 test at Santa Anita tuned up for his stakes debut with a five-furlong work in 1:00 at Santa Anita yesterday. "I caught him galloping out in 1:12 for six furlongs. He looked good," Baffert said. He added, "He needs to get some seasoning, and there's nothing like Cajun seasoning." Baffert is also likely to bring three-year-old filly **Victory U.S.A.** (Victory Gallop) to New Orleans for Saturday's GII Fair Grounds Oaks. Off since running fourth in the Dec. 21 G1 Hollywood Starlet, the chestnut prepped for her 2004 debut yesterday. "She is fresh and just worked six furlongs [Monday] morning in 1:11 4/5," the trainer said. "The work was fast, but she did it very easily." The likely favorite for the Fair Grounds Oaks will be the Todd Pletcher-trained **Ashado** (Saint Ballado). She comes off a win in the GII Demoiselle S. at Aqueduct in November.
