TRACK PROBLEMS BEHIND ZAYAT MOVE

Owner Ahmed Zayat, in attendance at the Darley OBS Day of Champions yesterday, said that Santa Anita's recent problems with the Cushion Track

prompted him to take his horses out of trainer Bob Baffert's barn and send them east. Zayat sent Saratoga track-record holder **J Be K** (Silver Deputy) to Steve Asmussen; **Maimonides** (Vindication) and **EZ Warrior** (Exploit) to Bill Mott; and **Massive Drama** (Kafwain), third in Sunday's GII Vicente S. to Dale Romans. "When you have colts, and you have some plan [for the Kentucky Derby], it

becomes extremely challenging to map out where they're going to go next because their training is being disrupted," Zayat explained. "They have a great stakes program [at Santa Anita] to move the colts forward, but once you start missing key dates, it becomes a problem. Every day counts." Zayat added, "I know they're trying their best, and I have no criticism of them for that, but I've got horses like Maimonides, a \$4.6 million

yearling who broke his maiden by 11 1/2 lengths, and I can't get him to race. I have another colt, J Be K, who holds a track record at Saratoga, and it's the same thing. At some point you have to go somewhere else." Zayat emphasized that the move was not in any way prompted by a dissatisfaction

with Baffert. "It's not personal at all," he said. "I have a lot of respect for the man. But at the end of the day, you have to make a business decision. I couldn't ask him to come east again. I didn't even give him the choice, because I didn't want to put him in a dilemma. It's too uprooting for him and his family."

NYRA PREDICTING SHUTDOWN

In a statement issued Monday afternoon, New York Racing Association Chairman C. Steven Duncker revealed that weekend negotiations with state government officials have moved NYRA even closer to a shutdown when the current franchise extension expires Feb. 13. NYRA officials have several objections to the framework of the franchise agreement currently on the table. "The bill does not provide the proper business model and economic terms that permit NYRA to emerge from bankruptcy, nor does it correct the broken business model of Thoroughbred racing in New York, a broken model that can only worsen and further imperil this industry under the legislation currently proposed," Duncker stated. He added, "While we agree that the NYRA Board should be streamlined, as we earlier resolved with the Governor in a Memorandum of Understanding last September, the newly proposed structure would politicize the Board and endanger the very reforms that have been accomplished to date. Such a significant step backwards would serve neither the best interests of the racing industry nor the people of New York State. We find the current state of negotiation to be pointing irrevocably towards a cessation of racing this week." The proposal unveiled before the state legislature last week calls for a 21-member Board, made up of 11 NYRA directors and 10 government appointees, and would require a supermajority ruling on any decision made by the Board. NYRA would also be required to relinquish its claims to ownership of the tracks and some surrounding property.

THE GREEN MONKEY RETIRED

The Green Monkey (Forestry), who sold for a world-record price of \$16 million at Fasig-Tipton Calder in 2006, has been retired and will take up stud duty at Randy Hartley and Dean DeRenzo's Ocala, Florida farm in 2009, according to *Daily Racing Form*. Campaigned by Michael Tabor, John Magnier and Derrick Smith and trained by Todd Pletcher, the colt missed most of his juvenile season due to a gluteal injury, and made only three starts this term, including a fourth most recently in a maiden on the grass at Hollywood Nov. 21. A stud fee will be announced at a later date.

According to my dictionary, the prefix "pyro" denotes fire, heat or high temperature. Well, the Pulpit colt of that name certainly warmed up the Kentucky Derby

Future wagering three days ago. Storming through from last to first in the stretch in the GIII Risen Star S., Pyro reduced his odds to 5-1. It wasn't just the style of Pyro's victory which suggests he has a classic future. The Risen Star may only carry Grade III status, but it has been won by some very good colts over the last 10 years, including Ecton Park (GI Super

Derby), Exchange Rate, Repent (GII Louisiana Derby and now sire of the Derby hopeful Crown of Thorns), Badge of Silver and Lawyer Ron (champion older male).

As a two-year-old, Pyro found War Pass too strong in both the GI Champagne S. and GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile, but his late-closing style could well prove better suited to the mile and a quarter of the Kentucky Derby than War Pass's free-running approach.

But does his pedigree support the view that he is going to be suited by the Derby distance, which is 1 1/2 furlongs further than he has been asked to race so far? The good news is that the two stallions in the second generation of his pedigree are A.P. Indy, a GI Belmont S. winner by the Triple Crown winner Seattle Slew, and Wild Again, who gained both his Grade I successes over 1 1/4 miles, including one in the Breeders' Cup Classic.

The remarkable statistic regarding Seattle Slew is that, despite numbering so many top-class performers among his male-line descendants, only one of them--his ill-fated son Swale--has managed to win the Kentucky Derby. However, A.P. Indy was talented enough to have won the Derby, had a badly bruised foot not kept him on the sidelines, and he has recently demonstrated his ability to sire outstanding three-year-olds through the exploits of Bernardini and Rags to Riches. cont. p3

There was a time when Pulpit, another son of A.P. Indy, was strongly fancied to make amends for his sire's absence from the Churchill Downs Classic. He started at 5.70-1 for the 1997 Derby on the strength of a record of four wins from five starts, including very encouraging victories in the GII Fountain of Youth S. and the GII Blue Grass S. His one defeat came at the hands of Captain Bodgit in the GI Florida Derby. For a while it looked as though Pulpit might justify all the expectations surrounding the Claiborne hopeful, as he led through the half- and three-quarter-mile stages, only to be passed in the stretch by Silver Charm, Free House and Captain Bodgit.

The demands of the Derby--whether it's the Kentucky version or the original Epsom variety--can be all too much for an immature colt and, unfortunately, Pulpit came into this category. Never having made it to the races as a juvenile, Pulpit was always going to face a tough task to become sufficiently seasoned for a race as competitive as the Run for the Roses. Consequently, the Kentucky Derby was Pulpit's sixth race in 113 days and it proved too much. The way he faded in the last quarter raised suspicions that he hadn't shown his true form. These fears were confirmed a few days later, when a displaced knee chip was discovered, and the Derby proved to be his last race, even though he was back in work by the Saratoga meeting.

I suppose the possibility exists that the last furlong of the Derby was also a bit too much for Pulpit, as he is out of Preach, a very talented sprinter-miler by Mr. Prospector. Certainly his best progeny, such as Purge, Corinthian, Sky Mesa, Rutherienne, Stroll, Tapit, Mini Sermon, Oratory and Sightseeing, have gained their most important successes up to a nine furlongs. There has been the occasional sprinter, and Pulpit's weekend graded double was completed by Bsharpsonata in the GII Forward Gal S. over seven furlongs. Of course, there are some exceptions to this general rule, such as Essence of Dubai, who took the G2 UAE Derby over 1 1/4 miles, Devil's Preacher, a Grade II winner over 1 1/2 miles, and Wend, who took the GII New York H. over 1 1/4 miles, and this could bode well for Pyro.

Incidentally Pyro, Bsharpsonata and the stakeswinning Namaste's Wish all come from Pulpit's 2005 crop, which was sired at a reduced fee of \$35,000. His next few crops, sired at \$60,000 and then \$80,000, should be well worth keeping an eye on.

Pyro's dam Wild Vision doesn't provide many direct clues about stamina potential, as she ran only once, winning a sprint as a two-year-old. However, Wild Vision's brother Wild Wonder was a more durable individual, a veteran of 20 races between the ages of two and five. Wild Wonder was at his best at four, when his three graded wins included the GII Mervyn LeRoy H. over a mile and a sixteenth. That said, Wild Wonder was fast enough to set a track record over a mile at four, and his only stakes success at five came over six furlongs. His best efforts as a stallion were Wild Fit (GI Del Mar Debutante S. over seven furlongs) and Fusaichi Rock Star (GII San Vicente S. over the same trip).

Wild Wonder clearly didn't possess as much stamina as some of Wild Again's best winners, such as Sarava (Belmont S.), Milwaukee Brew (a dual winner of the GI Santa Anita H.), Offlee Wild (GI Suburban H.) and Wild Event.

This suggests that there is plenty of speed further back in Pyro's female line. His second dam, Carol's Wonder, was a talented sprinter by Pass The Tab, a winner of the GII Ohio Derby over a mile and an eighth, but later successful in the GII Carter H. over seven furlongs.

Pyro's third dam Carols Christmas visited Wild Again to produce Call Now, a winner of the GII Del Mar Debutante over seven furlongs at two. Carols Christmas also produced a prolific Derby winner, but not of the Kentucky variety. Her Naskra colt Olympio took the GII Minnesota, GII Arkansas and GI Hollywood Derbys over nine furlongs and the GII American Derby over 1 1/4 miles, as well as being fast enough to win the GI Malibu S. over seven furlongs. Carols Christmas is also the second dam of half a dozen winners at Grade I or Grade II levels, the best being the GI Futurity S. winner Cuvee, a fast-maturing son of Carson City.

Clearly a bit more evidence is required before anyone can be fully confident that Pyro will be suited by a mile and a quarter. Let's hope his next start provides it.

Face the Cat to Fountain of Youth

Face the Cat (Tale of the Cat) looks likely to make his next start in the GII Fountain of Youth S. at Gulfstream, according to trainer Helen Pitts. A winner of a one-mile Gulfstream allowance in his most recent start Jan. 30, the Kentucky-bred breezed a half mile in :50 flat, the 28th fastest of 49 at the distance Monday. "It was good, really good," said Pitts. "He worked in hand, a nice easy half, and he did it very well." Face the Cat is undefeated in two tries over the Hallandale oval, including a maiden score Jan. 4. "It would be a tough spot," she added. "Is a race like [the Fountain of Youth] the most desirable spot after winning an allowance race? Probably not, but you've got to take your shot and see if he belongs."

Wise Answer Returns in Sam F. Davis

J D Farm's Wise Answer (Wised Up) will kick off his upcoming campaign in Florida, beginning with Saturday's Sam F. Davis S. at Tampa Bay, according to trainer David Brownlee. "After that, we'll decide whether to go up there for the GIII Tampa Bay Derby [Mar. 15] or wait for the GI Florida Derby [Mar. 29]," he said, adding, "I think he'd love the track at Gulfstream." A winner of three stakes last year, including a 10length romp in Calder's In Reality Division of the Florida Stallion Series, the bay was a well-beaten seventh while trying the turf for the first time in his latest start in the GIII Tropical Park Derby Jan. 1. "[Jockey Eibar] Coa told me he didn't like the turf and we gave him a little break, although you can't give him too much or you can't hold him on the ground," explained Brownlee. "He worked really well here Saturday [five furlongs in a bullet 1:00 flat1."



GENTLEMEN, START YOUR ENGINES

The need is for speed under the Florida sun. Nope, we're not talking about NASCAR's Budweiser Shootout at Daytona, nor are we referring to the seminal auto racing film, *Days of Thunder*. We're talking about the juvenile sales season, which kicks off today with the single-session Ocala Breeders' Sales Company's February Selected Sale of Two-Year-Olds in Training.

OBS cataloged 172 horses for the first major juvenile sale of 2008, but a healthy number of outs--40 as of last night--has reduced February to a 142-horse affair. Action begins at 12:00 p.m.


As it was, the OBS February catalog was approximately 10 percent smaller than last year's. OBS Director of Sales Tom Ventura attributes that to a buying bench of pinhookers who, in general, were more cautious in their yearling purchases last fall after a 2007 season that struggled to maintain momentum from a recordbreaking 2006.

"It was kind of across the board; our company, and the other sales companies, were down slightly for their select sales this year," said Ventura. "Our March sale will be down about 50 horses, which is about 10 percent less than last year. But we probably inspected 10 percent less horses. I don't think the quality is short, but I think the pinhookers tightened up a little bit in numbers--maybe not it total dollars, but in the number of horses they bought."

While the number of horses on offer is down at February, there seemed to be plenty of buyers on the grounds after Sunday's breeze show, and Ventura is optimistic of a strong sale.

"Last week's breeze show was very well-attended; we had some trainers in from California, and all the right people were there," Ventura said. "So many horses work well at that show that many didn't breeze back, but there has been a steady stream of buyers at the barns, so I think things are lined up for a good sale. I don't think we'll necessarily get a great gauge of where the two-year-old market is from this sale, but for the number of horses we have, I think we have plenty of buyers."

Some of the buyers on the grounds in recent days include some of the biggest names in the business: Coolmore's Demi O'Byrne, representatives of Sheikh Mohammed's Darley operation, Doug Cauthen and Eliot Walden of WinStar Farm, and Ahmed Zayat, among others.

Ventura said that the success of the sale over the last decade is what keeps bringing the buyers back.

"If you look at the numbers over the years, we've had 10 or 11 percent stakes winners coming out of OBS February," said Ventura. "Those numbers aren't an anomaly--that's over a 10-year span."

Ventura added that much of the success of the February Sale can be attributed to the close communication between OBS and consignors about what horses are right for the sale. Ventura estimates that OBS looked at about 1,600 youngsters for its two select sales, February and March.

"Between the 180 we accepted here and the 450 we'll have at March, there are a lot of horses that don't make the cut," Ventura said. "But the consignors who work with the horses year in and year out, they know where their horses belong--physically and mentally. They don't want to bring a horse here for practice--they want to sell it, and they know how demanding the buyers are."

A Home near Home...

In 2007, a handsome gray colt from Peacock Ridge's consignment named Smoke'n Coal (Smoke Glacken) topped the February Sale on Darley's \$550,000 bid-the lowest-priced topper since 2002. Overall, business was down slightly. The average was \$133,657, off 4.1 percent from the 2006 record of \$139,430, while median dipped 9.1 percent to \$100,000.

Last year was the first year that the February Sale was held in Ocala, moved north from its traditional home in Miami. Tom Ventura said that initial reports were positive and, as OBS gets ready to hold its second February Sale in Ocala, he believes both buyers and sellers continue to approve of the location.

"For the majority of our sellers, this is their backyard," he said. "But we also got several positive comments immediately after last year's sale from buyers. They enjoyed it here. Even for the trainers who are based in Miami, it gives them a few days to catch up on some business up here. A lot of them have horses in training in Ocala. Plus it gives them a chance to focus on the sale and not have to run back to their barns to check on their horses."

Carl Bowling's love of horses began as youngster in a logging camp in North Carolina in the early 1950s. The camp, owned by his uncle and grandfather, stretched

across the side of a mountain and was home to a number of Clydesdales. Bowling, who was born in Asheville, watched in awe as the stout animals went about their work, hauling logs up and down steep hills.

"It was amazing how they were trained--they were so smart," the 68-year-old Bowling said recently. "I really loved those horses. My grandpa would send me up there, and I Horsephotos was content leading the

horses around and watering them. I thought to myself, 'when I grow up, I'm gonna get me a riding horse."

Needless to say, Bowling's involvement with horses developed well past that. One of the original pinhookers in Florida, Bowling, who operates Straightaway Farm, has enjoyed a lengthy career in the business. His pupils have included the likes of Horse of the Year Favorite Trick, Grade I winner City Zip, and graded stakes winners Oratory, Birdonthewire, Forever Silver and Western Pride.

It was a circuitous path that led Bowling to his current role as a prominent consignor of Thoroughbreds. Instead of heading to the track to learn the ropes like most horse-crazed kids, Bowling headed to the factory-to work at General Motors. Later, he started his own car painting and repair business in Toledo, Ohio, but he couldn't quite give up the idea that he'd like to work with horses.

Finally, when he was 28 or 29, he "broke down."

"I bought a house with 10 acres," he explained. "The first week, I bought a riding horse for myself. Then I bought one for my wife, and then I got some ponies for my kids. All of the sudden I was in the horses business --you know how that goes."

As a teenager, Bowling was what today might be called an adrenaline junkie. He raced cars on the streets of his hometown. When he got older, he began building motorcycles, the type on which you lay down, head precariously aimed forward.

"Other people would build 'em, but would be afraid to ride 'em. Not me; I loved it," he said.

Bowling's love of speed, combined with a competitive nature, got the better of him after his first equine purchases. He began barrel racing, then bought a couple of cheap Quarter Horses. While operating his body shop, he started working free for a trainer, galloping horses in the morning in exchange for lessons in horsemanship.

"If you really like something, you'll just learn more and more," he said.


Bowling moved to Michigan and was soon training on the state's small Quarter Horse circuit. Before long his hobby was turning a better profit than his day job, so he guit to focus on horses full time.

"I did all right," he said. "One year, I had the champion three-year-old colt, co-champion two-year-old filly, and was the leading trainer and leading owner in the state of Michigan, but that was all there was to do."

Bowling decided that he would have to move south if he wanted to get serious. He spent time in Florida, New Mexico and Texas, where he trained for a friend named John Scott.

Scott had Quarter Horses with Bowling, but was mainly involved with Thoroughbreds. One day, Scott called Bowling, asking if he'd fly in to Florida to observe three Thoroughbred horses Scott thought were underperforming.

Bowling did so, and reported back to Scott that the horses, in his opinion, were indeed underperforming. The problem?

"They weren't fit enough," Bowling said. "I said, 'You've got some real nice horses, but they're being hobby-horsed around there and not being taught to extend.'"

Scott told Bowling that he should be training them. Bowling declined, saying he wasn't a Thoroughbred trainer, but when Scott said that he was going to give one of the horses to the current trainer to settle a bill, Bowling objected.

"I said, 'Listen, if you do that you're making a big mistake,'" said Bowling. "I really liked the one horse, a colt by What a Pleasure. I told him to put the horses on a van to Texas. I sent him a check for \$25,000 to cover the training bill in exchange for half of the What a Pleasure colt."

Two months later, Bowling sent one of the horses, a filly, to Louisiana Downs and another filly to Delta Downs. Both won. He brought all four to Ruidoso in New Mexico. In his first start under Bowling's tutelage, the What a Pleasure colt Bowling had been so fond of ran a fifth off the track record, and he went on to capture a number of stakes.


"I decided then and there that I was getting out of the Quarter Horse business," laughed Bowling.

In the early 1980s, Bowling settled in Florida and purchased some breeding stock and some yearlings. And he began staging what amounted to his own private two-year-old in training sales.

"I started taking 10 or 12 horses down to Calder, calling all the trainers to let 'em know what day I was going to be there," he said. "This was before there was anything called pinhooking. I would just breeze them a quarter of a mile and let the trainers clock them. I wasn't looking for any big money. I'd sell the whole load for between \$20,000 to \$50,000. I loved it. I was doing what I loved, and I didn't have to move around. So me and my wife Joan invested in some land in Ocala."

The two-year-old scene has grown in leaps and bounds since then, of course, and Bowling has maintained a prominent position.

In 1996, he picked up a well-made son of Phone Trick for \$32,000 as a yearling. He and Ricky Leppala, a former Quarter Horse jockey with whom he often partners, resold the colt, Favorite Trick, for \$100,000 to Joseph LaCombe at this very sale. Eight months later, Favorite Trick sealed Horse of the Year honors by capping an undefeated season with a tally in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile S.

A few years later, Leppala and Bowling were represented by another solid score with the Saint Ballado

colt Flame Thrower. They parlayed the \$27,000 yearling buy into a \$270,000 two-year-old. Flame Thrower won a trio of graded stakes at two: the GII Del Mar Futurity, GII Norfolk S. and GIII Best Pal S.

One of Bowling's best scores was with a horse he failed to get sold: Carson City's son City Zip. Bowling

secured the chestnut as a short yearling for \$9,000, a price that reflected a check ligament surgery.

"At that time, I had probably done 10 or 11 of those

surgeries, and all of them had stayed super sound," Bowling explained. "It was almost funny--every time I'd done check ligament surgery on a horse, he turned out to be a stakes horse."

Bowling was confident City Zip wouldn't be affected by the issue, so broke and trained him, and put him through this sale in 2000.

"I told [prospective buyers] \$100,000 up front; I said '\$100,000 up, he runs for you, \$100,000 down, he runs for me,'" he said. "Someone bid \$80,000, I bought him back, and that turned out all right. He became the fourth horse in history to sweep the two-year-old stakes at Saratoga." City Zip won six graded stakes, including a dead-heat win with Yonaguska in the GI Hopeful S.

Bowling added, "I had sold half of him for \$500,000, he made \$820,000, and we sold him to stand at stud for \$1.5 million. Plus I still have a lifetime breeding right to him."

These days, Bowling is scaling back--sort of. He says this will be his last year bringing over a consignment to the juvenile sales himself. He does plan on buying yearlings to pinhook, but will break them and put them through their early paces, then transfer the horses to other consignors to "put the speed in them" and consign them at two-year-old auctions. About four or five years ago, he and Joan sold their 450-acre spread in Ocala to Gulf Coast Farms, and now have a smaller 110-acre farm. They have also trimmed their broodmare band, which numbered about 25 three years ago, to 15 to 20 mares. That includes about a dozen with Doug Branham, a claims adjuster who is relatively new to the business. Branham has built a farm near Lexington, Kentucky, where he keeps the mares that he owns in partnership with Bowling.

"We've got some good mares, by Gone West, by Fusaichi Pegasus," Bowling said. "We're basically breeding to run, but anything you're breeding to run will work in a two-year-old sale, because they'll have the right mom and the right dad. Right now, it's taking the best to bring good money. So we're breeding to run, but we'll be taking most, if not all, the horses through the sales. If we think they're worth more, will race 'em."

In addition to Leppala, Bowling has helped along the careers of a few other consignors, not the least of which is own son Tony Bowling, a succe`ssful pinhooker in his own right.

"He's done real well; he's a very good horseman," said Bowling.

Looking back, Bowling has come a long way since walking his family's horses on that logging camp in North Carolina.

"We've been truly blessed, doing what we wanted to do, living where we wanted to live," Bowling concluded. "I've truly enjoyed it."

Oh, so what about the Straightaway moniker?

"It's because it doesn't matter where you're at down the backside; it matters where you're at at the wire," he said



Barrier Reef to Godolphin:

Barrier Reef (Mizzen Mast), winner of the Feb. 2 Whirlaway S. at Aqueduct in his most recent start, has been transferred from Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid Al Maktoum's Darley Stable to his Godolphin operation, according to Daily Racing Form. The three-year-old was scheduled to ship from Tom Albertrani's barn in New York to Payson Park in Florida Tuesday. The colt will remain in the United States under the care of Saeed bin Suroor's assistant, Rick Mettee. "This is part of our program--this is a promotion," Darley USA President Jimmy Bell told DRF. "At Darley, we're trying to identify and develop horses for Godolphin. With the race he ran last time out, that was enough to do that. We hope he's able to add to that and continue to climb the ladder." It is expected that he will make one more start before a possible tilt at the Triple Crown Series. Not among the original 449 nominees to the Triple Crown, he would have to be supplemented by Mar. 29 for a fee of \$6,000. According to Albertrani, the move came as no surprise to the New York-based trainer. "After [Barrier Reef] broke his maiden [Dec. 8], we discussed the possibility about the horse being transferred at that time and maybe even going to Dubai," Albertrani told DRF. "The decision was made that maybe it was better for the horse to stay and get a little more seasoning before making a journey like that."

Veteran actor and broadcaster Gil Stratton will be honored by Santa Anita Park on Sunday, Feb. 17. Stratton, who for many years was a sports anchor on KNXT (now KCBS) in Los Angeles, also hosted a popular 30-minute live horseracing show on Saturday afternoons entitled, "The Santa Anita Feature Race," from 1955 into the early 1970s. Originally sponsored by Union Oil, the show emanated from Santa Anita, Hollywood Park and Del Mar, and was carried on CBS affiliates in 34 western markets ranging from Mexico to Canada and as far east as Salt Lake City and Phoenix.
