

De Kock Doubles Up...

It wasn't accomplished with the same ease as stablemate Asiatic Boy (Arg), but Honour Devil provided trainer Mike De Kock with his second consecutive win in this first leg of the local Triple Crown and third in the last six years. The South African also conditions the runner-up, owned in part by Sheikh Mohammed bin Khalifa. "It's a fantastic result for Sheikh Mohammed [bin Khalifa] and we're all indebted to him for his support of the stable," De Kock stated. "Honour Devil just doesn't know when to lay down. But take nothing away from the runner-up who hadn't run for 257 days and did not have the best draw [13]." The two stablemates will make their respective next appearances in the Listed Al Bastakiya S. over 1800 meters on the Super Thursday program Mar. 6.

According to his website, part of Bill DiScala's vision as the head of the Karakorum Racing Partnerships is to "bring Thoroughbred ownership to the average racing fan, the person who would not otherwise have the means or knowledge to compete with the sport's wealthier Thoroughbred owners." That vision will carry 50 or so investors to suburban Baltimore this weekend when the stable's **Karakorum Starlet** (Skip Away) makes her graded stakes debut in the Fritchie.

"I think she's going to run really, really well," DiScala commented yesterday. "She's at the top of her game, she's getting better all the time and I think [seven furlongs] is her best distance."

Born in 1963 on Staten Island, New York, DiScala attended Eastern Michigan University before returning to the East Coast to launch a career on Wall Street. An executive at Shearson Lehman Brothers at just 27, DiScala, who admits to having been around horses for most of his life, but never attended a horse race until his 30s, was lured into the Thoroughbred business in earnest by a client of his and he put together the Karakorum partnerships in 1997.

DiScala explains that the Karakorum horses, mostly New York-breds, are purchased at public auction and that they typically spend between \$15,000 and \$50,000 per horse. On the advice of pinhooker Pat Hoppel, Karakorum Starlet was bought for just \$13,000 out of the 2004 Fasig-Tipton October yearling sale. DiScala said that she was something of a chip off the oľ block.

"She really kind of travels like Skip Away," he offered. "She was really strong and was built just like him."

The attractive chestnut was winless in four starts at two before graduating by nearly 14 lengths in her first

sophomore start in 2006, and completed that season with three wins from four outings, all in statebred company. After venturing outside restricted competition in early 2007, she returned to Empire-bred stakes competition and gave the stable one of its bigger thrills, winning the Union Avenue S. at Saratoga

last August.

"That was just fantastic, to win a big race like that at Saratoga," DiScala recollected. "We were all really proud of her."

She padded her credentials with another restricted black-type win in the Iroquois H. in October, then was runner-up to More Angels (Slew of Angels) in the Smart Angle S. at Aqueduct the following month. Fourth to Control System (Lion Hearted) in the Dec. 1 Garland of Roses H., Karakorum Starlet improved to be runner-up to the Fritchie favorite in the Jan. 1 Interborough H. She enters Saturday's race off a one-length score in the Ruby Rubles S. versus state-breds Jan. 11 and DiScala is looking forward to the opportunity facing him this weekend.

"I really believe she's the horse to beat," he says.

Apache Cat, winner in his last start of the G1 Lightning S., is the 13-10 favorite and trainer Greg Eurell is brimming with confidence. "He's proven at the trip and is dynamite second-up," Eurell summed up. "He's thrived since his Lightning win, he's spot on." Apache Cat is attempting to emulate Miss Andretti (Aus), who became only the fourth horse in history to complete the Lightning--Australia S. double when she won both features in 2007. Five-time Group 1 winner Miss Finland will go to the barriers without Craig Williams, her partner for 22 starts, with connections deciding earlier in the week that Steve Arnold would replace Williams because they believe the mare has become complacent with her regular rider. "We love Craig. We think he has done a terrific job. There has been a wonderful bond between the two of them and he has been very kind to her," said managing part-owner John Messara. "It was simply that Miss Finland had lost her spark and someone new may bring it back. A change might spark her up a bit."



try his luck in both stakes races. "I don't want to pass [the Hollie Hughes] up in his own backyard where it looks like he's supposed to win," Dutrow told Daily Racing Form. "I'm very happy with the horse. I'm going to see what happens here Saturday before I make any decisions." Local hero Ah Day (Malibu Moon) is out of Monday's feature after sustaining an injury to his right shoulder Wednesday. "The injury happened while he was in the stall," said trainer King Leatherbury, who currently ranks third on the all-time win list with

6,232 victories. "This happens in horse racing. I can't explain it and the vets don't know why, but did tell me it will take three months to heal. He will be back."

Runner-up in last year's General George, Ah Day was sidelined with a hind-end problem following a second-place finish in the GII Churchill Downs H. May 5. The five-year-old posted a rousing victory over track and trip Jan. 19 in the Fire Plug S., giving Leatherbury hope that he'd be in the winner's circle on Presidents' Day. The average book size of Kentucky stallions has climbed from 54.3 in 2005 to 62.3 for 2007. Kentucky was also home to 102 stallions which covered at least 100 mares, up from 96 in 2006. The average among those 100 + book sires fell slightly, however, from 132.1 to 130.4 from 2007 to 2006. Are large stallion books good for the industry? What is your prediction for 2008? Will book size continue to grow?

Stone Farm Owner Arthur Hancock III:

About 20 percent of the yearlings sold at the last September sales at Keeneland made money. The only people who made a profit across the board were the stallion owners. A breeder cannot survive legitimately



when he owns one of 50 to 80 yearlings in a sale. The inescapable conclusion is that the oversupply is breaking the breeder who buys a stud fee to a stallion who has an oversold book.

Also, I firmly believe (as did my father and grandfather) that overbreeding a stallion compromises the quality of his offspring and that, in the long run, it is destructive to the breed. Their philosophy was that 100 covers was the right number, so today if a stud averages 1.5 covers per mare, he should have 65 mares (in the old days they averaged

2.5 covers and had 40 mares). The stud fee can then be set accordingly, and it is a win-win situation for the breeder, the stallion owner and the buyer. What is being done to our industry today is absolutely sickening. I have refused to participate in this practice and will continue to do so. It is unfair to the breeder and the breed.

Overbrook Farm Manager of Stallion Operations Ric Waldman:

In a word, No. Large book sizes are not good for the industry, but for the most part, are here to stay. It has gotten to the point that a stallion is judged to be popular only if he breeds over 100 mares. Stallion managers are in a 'Catch 22.' They are aware that a continuing shrinking gene pool is the price that the industry is paying for large books, but how does a stallion manager, pressured by owners to maximize cash flow, turn mares away? Adding "a few extra mares" is an easy way to enhance a farm's bottom line. At the margin, accepting that extra mare is a 'no-brainer.'

Normally, I am a 'free market' person--I believe in not tampering with a market and allowing it to take care of itself. But, what part of this market function protects the stud book? Who is going to look out for the future of our breed? I do not see breeders nor stallion managers having enough concern nor a sense of responsibility for the future of the breed.

One added bit of pressure on stallion managers to control the size of their stallions' books will be the continued backlash from breeders from having to compete in the marketplace with too many yearlings by the same sire--in a growing yearling market, no problem, but in a yearling market which is at best, leveling off, excessive representation of a particular sire will be more of a glaring problem.

My guess is that the number of stallions will decline; the average book sizes will increase, but at a decreasing rate; the number of stallions which breed 100 + mares might increase slightly; the average book size among the stallions which breed 100 + mares might stay very close to where it has been the past couple of years.

Hill 'n' Dale Owner John Sikura:

The question of stallion book size should address a lot more than what is the optimum number of mares a horse should breed. It is complex, as breeders only want to breed to the same horse and have little or no patience waiting for a stallion to get runners.

We must therefore meet the demands of breeders while subsidizing the rest of our roster. If breeders want to have choice, they must also be part of the solution and patronize a wider number of stallions. You cannot limit the books of your popular horses while breeding 40 mares to a new horse. The solution is therefore a collaboration of restraint by stallion owners and more loyalty from breeders.

Dapple Bloodstock Owner Mike Akers:

Well, I guess it decides which side of the fence you're on. If you're selling seasons and own a stallion, of course you'd like to generate as much revenue as possible. If you're a mare owner, you'd like less competition

in the marketplace. That's supply and demand working. But being able to get my mare into a stallion in a timely fashion, when she really needs to be bred, is very important to me as a mare owner. Different stallions have different libidos, but much past 150 mares on a book, it starts getting tougher in terms of getting in when you need to get in. I think, with a natural cover and the laws of nature, I think the number's going to end up around there. Some-

times, certain stallions are very fertile and they can service more mares and you'll have a higher number.

There are no rules, and it's fair for a man to make as much money as he can. If the marketplace decides there's too much competition, you back off and look elsewhere. I think that's the beautiful thing about our industry. It's a pure market with no regulation, and the marketplace dictates the pace.

As far as price, I think, in the American market at least, that an athletic individual will always sell well, even if there's a number of paternal half-siblings in the sale. There are so many good people out there scouring the sales, if you have a really good yearling, even if his sire has a lot of foals in the marketplace, you'll get paid.

Bluewater Sales owner Meg Levy:

From a consignors point of view, the hardest part about it is placing the progeny of a given stallion in the sales, especially when the book of that stallion is ap-



proaching 200. There's only so many horses are ready for the Fasig-Tipton July Sale--and I only want to bring horses there if they're really at the top--and at [Fasig-Tipton] Saratoga you're talking about horses with serious pedigrees, which means there are a lot at Keeneland September. And the horses with the larger books, you're generally talking about new sires in the \$10,000 to \$30,000 range--Books 3, 4 and 5 of the Keeneland Sale. There's a glut of Meg Levy bluewatersales very similar type horses. Some horses are unlucky and get put in

Book 5, when they very well could have qualified for Book 3. One of the things we've talked about with Keeneland is, whey does there have to be Book 3 and 4? Why not have a Book 3 that covers four days?

We are one of the few consignors that use Timonium [Fasig-Tipton Midlantic], which helps us. For example, last year, we had access to quite a few Harlan's Holidays. We had one who ended up being a \$300,000 horse at July, then we had one in at September and another at Timonium. I don't want to have two horses of similar ilk in the same draft; you don't want to compete against your own type. If one's a filly and one's a colt, that's okay. That's me, though. Some people feel differently about it, especially consignors who stand the stallions at their farm. They might have five from the same sire in their shedrow.

Country Life Farm Co-Owner Michael Pons:

It's almost getting to be like a Wal-Mart, K-Mart thing. You won't need the mom and pop breeding farms if you can get everything at Wal-Mart. The problem you get with that is that you don't know where the next good stallion is coming from.

They're not always the most likely suspects; they're not always the first-round draft picks. We had Malibu Moon here. He raced twice. He was very impressive and an unbelievably good-looking horse, but would he have gotten a shot in today's market, compared to 2000, when he went to stud? I worry long term, because so many stallions are failures. At the end of the day, you put an awful lot of water in the soup. I'm a traditionalist; I wish there were more manageable-sized books, and there was a more level playing field.

On the other hand, we had Allen's Prospect here, and he was one of the first horses in the country to breed up around a hundred mares. We'd go to the local sales, and there would be 25 or 30 of his babies, and my guys would be crowing at me, 'Oh my God, look at all the Allen's Prospects here.' But they were so much better than everyone else that it was the honey that draws the bees; there were people coming from all around the country to buy babies by him. It was a lovehate thing.

Now, with some books around 200, it gets very difficult to be Best in Class, and then Best in Show, at the sales with the offspring of a certain sire.

Economically, it magnifies everything. The market knows much more quickly the good stallions and the bad stallions than in the past.

Journeyman Stud Owner Brent Fernung:

Last year, [Journeyman stallion] Wildcat Heir bred 177 mares, which I think was tied for third-most in North America. This year, just through the natural progression of his career, it will be down from that. I don't have any problems with large books. I think during their first couple of years at stud, stallions need big books in today's market, because, frankly, people turn away from them as they get to have horses to make the races. Consequently, I don't mind big books in the first and second years. It's more of an economic pressure. You have to pay for these stallions, and the business is such that business tails off in the third and fourth years. Probably not so much here [in Florida] than in Lexington.

North Miami resident Bea Oxenberg has raced a number of successful horses over the past few decades, including homebred millionaire **Best of the Rest** (Skip Trial), and she added a pair of colts to her stable at last year's OBS March sale. Those purchases, **Hey Byrn** (Put It Back) and **Smokin' Bee** (Two Punch), have proven to be astute ones for Oxenberg. Last Sunday, Hey Byrn trounced the highly touted Bordeaux Bandit and Jockey Ridge by 14 1/2 lengths in a Gulfstream allowance, and the following day, Smokin' Bee stepped up off a maiden victory to take third in the \$75,000 OBS Sprint S. Both colts were purchased on Oxenberg's behalf by longtime trainer Eddie Plesa, Jr.

"I've known Bea for about 20, 25 years," said Plesa. "She's got about a half-dozen horses in training now."

At \$160,000, Hey Byrn was the highest-priced juvenile in 2007 for his sire, who stands at Bridlewood Farm in Ocala. The son of Honour and Glory has carved out a reputation nationally with top sprinters In Summation and Smokey Stover as well as the unbeaten filly High Resolve.

"He was by a sire that I like a lot, Put It Back," Plesa said

when asked about Hey Byrn. "He was a big, good-looking horse, very athletic, and [he was] from a consignor that I've got a lot of faith in--Barry Eisaman."

"I had watched this horse train before he got to the sale and really liked him," Plesa added. Hey Byrn, the second foal from the stakes-placed Skip Trial mare Restraining Order, was purchased as a yearling by

Eisaman for \$30,000 at OBS August from the Bridlewood consignment.

Second in his debut last July at Calder to Smooth Air--winner of the GII Hutcheson S. Jan. 5--Hey Byrn graduated in his second start Aug. 5 before running second to Wise Answer in the FSS Affirmed S. Sept. 1. He ran fourth to that colt in the Sept. 22 Foolish Pleasure S. before being sidelined with an infected tooth, according to *Daily Racing Form*. His dental problems are behind him, now.

"I was taking two of her horses up to Ocala for the stakes," Plesa offered. "This race was available, and it was easier for her to get to Gulfstream."

"In all honesty, I thought he was about a work away from where I wanted him to be," Plesa continued. "Was it a surprise that he won? No. Was I surprised about the way he won? Yes. The way he totally dominated two horses [whose connections] were looking on to bigger things..." Hey Byrn earned a 97 Beyer Speed Figure for his impressive score, covering a mile in 1:37.

Any sharp winner at the Gulfstream meeting guarantees interest from the big operations--witness Curlin last year--and Hey Byrn is no exception.

"We've gotten a lot of calls and a number of offers," Plesa confirmed. "Maybe if one knocks her socks off, then she'll sell. [But] she's got the resources, and she's in it like everyone else--to have a good horse." Hey Byrn will continue to carry Oxenberg's hot pink silks.

"We're looking to run in an allowance before the [GI] Florida Derby [Mar. 29]; if not, then we'll train up to it," Plesa added.

As far as his stablemates go, Smokin' Bee--a \$50,000 purchase at OBS March--needed four starts to put it all together, but is heading in the right direction.

"We dropped him in for a [\$62,500] tag," Plesa explained. "He won, and the light went on for him." The Kentucky-bred grey broke through at Gulfstream Jan. 14 before his third in Ocala.

"He's always shown promise. I think he'll be a solid horse, maybe not quite like the other one," the Calder-based conditioner said.

In any case, Hey Byrn and Smokin' Bee have a long way to go before supplanting Best of the Rest in Oxenberg's and Plesa's affections. The homebred, born in 1995, earned over \$1.4 million while winning 16 of 32 starts over the course of seven years.

"He's my all-time favorite," said Plesa. "He had the class to

participate at the highest level, but he had knee problems. He was laid up three times--once for as long as 18 months." Best of the Rest captured the inaugural Sunshine Millions Classic in 2003 at the beginning of his eight-year-old campaign, and added the GIII Skip Away H. three months later. Oxenberg purchased a

yearling by her old stalwart



in 2006 for \$4,000 at OBS August. That filly, First is Best, captured a pair of turf outings at Calder before finishing sixth in the Darley OBS Championship S. last Monday.

Still owned entirely by Oxenberg, Best of the Rest currently stands at Ocala Stud Farm for \$2,500. His first crop numbered 10 foals, of which seven have made it to the races; six of them have won. His best runner to date is the stakes-placed filly Hidden Wish.

WALDROP TO TESTIFY BEFORE CONGRESS

National Thoroughbred Racing Association President and CEO Alexander M. Waldrop has been asked to testify before the Energy and Commerce Committee's Subcommittee on Commerce, Trade and Consumer Protection. The hearing entitled, "Drugs in Sports: Compromising the Health of Athletes and Undermining the Integrity of Competition," will take place Feb. 27. "The NTRA welcomes this opportunity to continue its dialogue with Congress on the matter of medication in pari-mutuel horseracing," Waldrop said. "Over the past several months, our legislative team members--along with representatives from the RMTC and RCI--have been meeting with individual members of Congress, communicating to them the many ways in which the horseracing industry has been working to build and improve the infrastructure for medication research and regulation. The invitation to share our work in more detail with the Members of the Committee via public testimony at the hearing is a logical extension of those efforts."

J BE K RETURNS TO ACTION TODAY With the likes of Pyro, Kodiak Cowboy and Z Fortune in his barn, Steve Asmussen isn't lacking for talented three-year-old colts. Still, his barn received yet another last week when Ahmed Zayat, frustrated with the situation in Southern California, moved J Be K (Silver Deputy) to his care. J Be K makes his first start for Asmussen in today's eighth race at Fair Grounds, a six-furlong entrylevel allowance race. The \$350,000 FTFFEB juvenile purchase has drawn the one hole and will be partnered with Shaun Bridgmohan. Bob Baffert previously trained J Be K, who captured his one and only start in trackrecord-setting style. J Be K blitzed a 5 1/2-furlong maiden special weight at Saratoga last August by 7 1/2 lengths while stopping the clock in 1:03 flat. The dark bay was sidelined for the rest of the season, but had been working like a good thing for Baffert at Santa Anita before ongoing track issues in Arcadia prompted Zayat to ship his horses east. GOVERNOR BESHEAR'S PROPOSAL CALLS FOR 12 CASINOS IN KENTUCKY Kentucky Governor Steve Beshear released a proposal to the General Assembly today that would allow 12 casinos in Kentucky. Governor Beshear's proposed amendment, which must be passed by the state's senate, would appear on the November ballot, allowing the people of Kentucky to vote on the issue. "For too long the people's wishes conveyed through surveys and trips to casinos on our borders have been pushed aside," Governor Beshear told The Courier-Journal. "For too long this revenue option has been ignored while we've hemmed and hawed. It is time for resolution." Seven of the casinos would be at racetracks, including Churchill Downs, Ellis Park, Turfway Park and Kentucky Downs. Keeneland Racecourse in Lexington would share a license with the city's harness track, the Red Mile. "We thank Gov. Steve Beshear and the legislators who have worked on this issue for their leadership on a matter of great importance to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and to the horse industry," Churchill Downs Incorporated President and Chief Executive Officer Robert L. Evans said. "The governor's plan launches us on a process of putting Kentucky's horse industry on equal, competitive footing with racing industries in an increasing number of states that have already implemented casino gaming at racetracks. The governor's proposal will also keep Kentucky revenues in Kentucky and attract new revenues to the Commonwealth from neighboring states that have had gaming for several years. These additional revenues are required to fund important programs and projects throughout Kentucky. We look forward to working with Governor Beshear and lawmakers, and to participating in the dialogue on this important issue."


Horse Industry to Benefit From Stimulus Package:

There are provisions beneficial to the horse industry which are included in the economic stimulus package signed into law by President Bush Feb. 13. "The new law includes two tax incentives that would allow a much bigger write-off for horses and other depreciable property purchased and placed in service during 2008," said Jay Hickey, President of the American Horse Council. "This should provide an additional incentive for people to invest in more horses for racing, showing and breeding as part of their business activities." The first of the incentives increases the so-called Section 179 expensing of horses bought and put into service in 2008 from \$128,000 to \$250,000. For example, if a horse business purchases \$750,000 of depreciable property, it may write off \$250,000 on its 2008 tax return and depreciate the balance. The second incentive brings back 50 percent first-year bonus depreciation for horses and most other depreciable property purchased and placed in service during 2008. To illustrate bonus depreciation, assume that in 2008 a business pays \$500,000 for a colt to be used for racing and \$50,000 for other depreciable property, bringing total purchases to \$550,000. The young colt had never been raced or used for any other purpose before the purchase. The business would be able to expense \$250,000, deduct another \$150,000 of bonus depreciation (50 percent of the \$300,000 remaining balance), and take regular depreciation on the \$150,000 balance. The Jockey Club's 2008 Fact Book On-Line:

The Jockey Club's 2008 On-Line Fact Book is available on the organization's web site, www.jockeyclub.com. According to statistics in the book, available purse money in the U.S. in 2007 increased 5.4 percent to a record \$1,180,587,881. The increase was attributed to racino revenue in several states, including Pennsylvania where the first full year of slot machine gaming at Philadelphia Park and the opening of Presque Isle Downs boosted purses in the state by 77.8 percent from 2006 to 2007. The contribution to purses from alternative gaming at racetracks helped boost purses in Louisiana by 26.9 percent and in Oklahoma by 16.6 percent. Total handle on U.S. Thoroughbred races in 2007 declined 0.4 percent to \$14,724,681,108. The sales section of the fact book reveals that total gross auction sales reached \$1,234,507,606 in 2007, a 2.5-percent decline from the record 2006 statistic. Gross sales and averages for broodmares in 2007 increased, but were offset by declines in gross and average price for weanlings, yearlings and two-year-olds.

From the draft of Moyglare Stud, hip 937 is a half to the top-class Twilight Agenda; Market Slide, the dam of Media Puzzle, Refuse to Bend (Ire) and Domestic Fund (Ire); and to Irish Edition, responsible for Go and Go (Ire). Eamon Reilly was not to be denied for the producer of two winners who was sold in foal to Araafa (Ire). "She comes from a super family and has already done guite well having produced two winners from two runners," he said. "I've bought her for a new client and she will be staying in Ireland." Reilly paid €60,000 for another Moyglare gem in the form of the 15-year-old mare Super Gift (Ire) (Darshaan {GB}). Offered as hip 768, her pedigree includes the group and graded-stakes scorers Simple Exchange (Ire) and Sights on Gold (Ire) and the champion Grey Swallow (Ire). She was offered pregnant to Refuse to Bend (Ire). "She's been bought for an established client to stay in Ireland," he commented. "She was a decent racemare and has already bred a few winners. An obvious attraction was that she is a Darshaan mare. She was sold with a good covering and she has fillies by Sadler's Wells and Galileo to run for her." Eight lots after snapping up the session topper, Reilly was signing for Eyrefield Lodge Stud's 10-year-old Flying Millie (Ire) (Flying Spur {Aus}), dam of last year's Listed Silver Tankard S. winner Siberian Tiger (Ire) and smart Fabuleux Millie (Ire). Also in foal to Refuse to Bend, the relative of Bold Arrangement (GB) was purchased for €115,000. "I bought her on behalf of Colin and Melba Bryce of Laundry Cottage Stud in the UK," he explained. "This mare has already proved herself and she will be going out to America to be covered by Gone West. We have been able to secure a nomination to him and it's a good chance to use a very good sire." Breaking BBA Ireland's monopoly was another stalwart of Goffs in Peter Doyle Bloodstock, who paid €87,000 for Jockey Hall Stud's hip 760, the four-year-old filly Starry Messenger (GB) (Galileo {Ire}). The half-sister to last year's group-placed Tuscan Evening (Ire) from the family of the 1997 G1 Prix d'Ispahan winner and sire Sasuru (GB), 1990 G2 Challenge S. scorer Sally Rous (GB) and 2001 G1 Poule d'Essai des Pouliches (French 1000 Guineas) heroine Rose Gypsy (GB) managed a win on the track in the famed Oppenheimer silks. "She's a fine big filly with a lot of Galileo about her," Ross Doyle said. "It's a good young family with plenty happening and a daughter of the dam has a two-year-old with Andre Fabre this year, so hopefully he might do his bit for the family. She has been bought for a client."
