
Third Street Partners is the nom de course of Chicago-based Earl Silver and Mike Eiserman. The men provide the financial backing to buy yearlings that are trained and re-sold as two-year-olds by O & H, the pinhooking operation of Bo Hunt and Terry Oliver.

"They put up the money, we train the horse and we split it 50-50," Hunt explained after the sale of Red Vow for \$625,000. "They're great guys. We've been doing a lot with them lately, buying horses to run and stuff like that."

Hunt described the men as non-practicing lawyers who have myriad investments. Third Street Partners was the name on the sheet when Red Vow was purchased at Keeneland September for \$65,000, and Hunt said the May 1 foal has progressed nicely since joining O & H at its Belleview, Florida base.

"He was immature as a yearling," said Hunt. "He was attractive, but not flashy. He was a May horse, and we hoped he would grow up a bit and he did. But he's still kind of a plain horse. He's real smart and he looked good on the track; he's a pretty-moving horse. And he's really well-balanced."

Oliver and Hunt have had success with sons of Broken Vow before, having sold subsequent multiple Grade II winner Private Vow for \$180,000 at the 2005 Keeneland September Sale.



"We owned Private Vow together, and we really like

that sire," said Hunt. "I think he can get you any kind of a horse."

Hunt added the final price of the colt was a pleasant surprise.

"I didn't know the players on him," he said. "But I knew he had plenty of vets and was a nice horse. I thought he'd be well-sold at \$250,000 or \$300,000, and would have been tickled with it. I was really excited, because most of the time you know when you're going to get that money, but this time we had no idea." Hunt added, "I think we got a bit lucky with

the sale. People have been telling me there a lot of really good fillies here, and I think being a colt made him stick out a bit." While 625,000 is nothing to sneeze at, it is far from the biggest score for Third Street and O & H. Two year's ago, they sold Mercantile, a juvenile by Golden Missile, for 2 million at the Fasig-Tipton Calder Sale. *-L.M.*



Leprechaun Wins the Prize...

Leprechaun Racing, it seems, stretched its St. Patrick's Day luck into yesterday's first session at OBS March. After purchasing a Florida-bred Pure Prize colt



for just \$30,000 at last year's OBS August Sale, Leprechaun turned around and sold the handsome chestnut for \$550,000. Darley's Jimmy Bell, perched against a wall in the pavilion, saw off a determined challenger seated not far away. Bell signed the ticket for Darley advisor

John Ferguson.

"This is a colt that we liked since the first breeze," said Bell. "Every eighth that he went seemed better than the one before. Obviously, he vetted very well. After John talked with Sheikh Mohammed, we felt this was a colt that we want to pursue. He was a very balanced individual and very uncomplicated; he was very straightforward."

Bell said that while Ferguson did not make an appearance in person at the OBS sales grounds, "With modern technology the way it is, he was very close."

It is undecided if the colt will stay in the U.S. or continue his career in Europe. "Sheikh Mohammed will decide that in due course," Bell said. "We'll let the dust settle here first."

Catalogued as hip 128, the Pure Prize colt put buyers on notice with a snappy :10 flat breeze Mar. 9.

"He galloped out like a monster and had been vetted 13 times here," said Leprechaun chief Mike Mulligan.

Mulligan added that he had faith in buyers being able to separate the top horses in the sale, which had been a bit of a question mark, as OBS's newly installed SafeTrack had resulted in a tighter grouping of fast workout times, both in February and before this sale. During the Mar. 10 breeze show, for instance, consignor Niall Brennan's Exchange Rate filly (hip 276, see *Hip Happenings*) earned the bullet in :9 4/5, followed by no fewer than 13 who had :10 flat breezes. Three of those were Leprechaun consignees.

"I think that all of us, as consignors, have to respect the buyers' ability to find the good horses," Mulligan said. "When people talk about not being able to separate the horses on the surface, I think that's untrue. Two of our :10 flats sold today. We had a Cuvee filly who looked like a sprinter, looked like she'd be early, and brought 90,000--which was fine. The Pure Prize colt did it differently. He looked like a horse that would be able to carry his speed a route of ground, and all the buyers found him. While our other horses had two or three vets, he had 13. There may be some static about not being able to separate them, but once buyers look at the quality at the end of the shank, buyers will find the good ones." -L.M.

Big One-Two Punch for Off the Hook...

Carlos Morales and Joe Appelbaum's Off the Hook was one of the leading consignors on day one. Among those that sold from its draft was hip 196, a colt by Lemon Drop Kid who made \$525,000; and hip 213, a colt by Giant's Causeway who sold for \$450,000.

The winning bidder on the Lemon Drop Kid colt was trainer John Kimmel, acting on behalf of Manhattanbased client Eli Gindi. Kimmel said that Gindi is involved in real estate.

"He's dabbled in racing," said the conditioner. "This is the most he's ever spent on a horse."

Asked if he expected to add to Gindi's purchases, Kimmel laughed and said, "I think this'll be enough for his diet for awhile."

Hip 196, regarded by many to be one of the better colts in the sale, was purchased by Off the Hook for \$150,000 at Keeneland September. He was produced by MSW & GSP August Storm (Storm Creek), who herself was bought by Caldara Farm for \$150,000 at the 2003 Keeneland November Sale. Caldara bred hip 196 in Kentucky.

"Well, there wasn't much not to like," Kimmel said about the colt, who breezed an eighth in :10 1/5 (<u>video</u>). "Physically, he had tremendous balance, scope, a great walk, and good bone to him. He looked good on the racetrack. "And Lemon Drop Kid is coming around as a sire. He's as good on his physical parameters--x-rays, scoping--as anything I've had. He reminds me of a horse like Premium Tap. He's a beautiful, well-balanced colt. No white on him, good eye, good foot on him."

Kimmel added, "I think he's going to be quick enough to run as a two-year-old, but he's got breeding that says he'll stay on. That's the other thing I like about him."

A Giant Right Hook...

About 20 minutes after the Lemon Drop Kid sold, Off the Hook followed up with a Giant's Causeway colt who was hammered down to California trainer Ray Bell. Bell paid \$450,000 for the colt, who was purchased for Robert B. Irvin.

"He's a longtime California resident and he's just in a position where he wanted to go after a really good horse," explained Bell as he signed the sale sheet in the rear walking ring. "He sold his business and he wants a nice horse, and maybe one with sire potential. [Hip 213] is by one of the leading sires in the country, he's out of a good mare and he's a beautiful individual."

Hip 213 was produced by the stakes-winning Smart Strike mare Bisbee's Prospect, a half-sister to the dam of MSW and last year's GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies fifth Smarty Deb--also by Smart Strike.

Off the Hook acquired the colt for \$200,000 at the September Sale and last week he breezed an eighth in :10 2/5, an average time that had his handlers worried.

"His breeze wasn't as spectacular as we would have liked, and I thought we'd get hurt by that," admitted Off the Hook's Joe Appelbaum, who was quick to offer his congratulations to Bell. "But in the end, I think buyers saw through that. Bidding got pretty spirited on him there for a while."

Appelbaum added that both colts met expectations.

"The Lemon Drop Kid, especially, got a lot of interest from all the right people, so it wasn't surprising," he said. "That was in the upper range of where we thought he could go, and he went there."

Included in Off the Hook's Wednesday consignment is <u>hip 240</u>, a well-built son of Holy Bull who breezed a quarter in :21 2/5 at the Mar. 10 show.

Gilchrist Adds a 'Tiger' to the Stable...

The Northern California-based duo of Harry Aleo and Greg Gilchrist have done very well purchasing two-yearolds in Ocala. The ill-fated champion Lost in the Fog (Lost Soldier), who RNA'd for \$195,000 at the 2004 March Sale, was acquired privately thereafter. Victorina (Delaware Township), a \$160,000 OBSAPR graduate, annexed Calder's GIII Azalea Breeders' Cup S. sporting Aleo's orange silks. The unbeaten MSW High Resolve (Put It Back) was a \$135,000 OBSAPR purchase.

Aleo and Gilchrist were at it again yesterday, securing hip 132, a filly by freshman sire Roar of the Tiger, for \$370,000. She is out of the unraced mare Toss the Change (Time for a Change). From the family of Charismatic and Millennium Wind, the bay was bred in Florida by Richard and Linda Thompson. The \$75,000 FTKJUL yearling worked an eighth in :10 1/5 at the first breeze show.

"The first thing that attracted us to her was her video," Gilchrist commented. "She had everything you would like in a racehorse. Obviously, somebody else liked her, too. The one thing that really sold us on her was the way she moved."

The strapping filly was consigned by Hartley/De Renzo Thoroughbreds LLC, agent. Dean De Renzo said, "She looks like a supermodel. She's a big gorgeous filly. She's done everything right and kept her composure wonderfully throughout all of this; that's a nice sign of a good horse. We're real happy with where she's going to go. I think it all fell into place just exactly the way we would've dreamed."

Roar of the Tiger, a full brother to leading sire Giant's Causeway, stands at Hartley/De Renzo, Walmac South for \$6,000. --*S. Sherack*

B Wayne Puts 'em Back-to-Back...

B. Wayne Hughes made some noise on consecutive offerings, acquiring a pair of colts by freshman sires City Place and Cuvee for \$320,000 and \$310,000, respectively. Richard Mandella will train the duo.

Consigned by Hoby and Layna Kight, agent for Welcome Gate Farm as hip 48, the City Place colt is from the family of Dubai-bound Diamond Stripes (Notebook). The son of Romantic Honor (Honor Grades)--bred in Florida by Robert John Harris Training Center--worked a quarter mile in :21 2/5 at the first breeze show. The dark bay went through the ring once before, selling for \$95,000 at Keeneland September.

"They both worked very well," Seth Semkin, racing manager for B. Wayne Hughes, said. "The City Place might have been my favorite at the sale. He's an absolutely beautiful horse. I thought he performed really well on the track, he's very light on his feet. He seemed to do it within himself. He's a classy horse. Mr. Hughes is willing to take chances on first-year sires."

Hip 49, bred in Kentucky by Ironwater Farms Joint Venture, was consigned by Hartley/De Renzo Thoroughbreds LLC, agent. The son of the track-record setting mare Royal Dove (Ire) (Royal Academy) worked an eighth of a mile in :10 1/5. He was a \$200,000 KEESEP yearling.

Capuano Lands Congaree Colt...

Trainer Dale Capuano isn't often seen mixing it up for horses approaching the half-million mark, but yesterday the Maryland-based horseman came out swinging for hip 175, a striking colt from the first crop of Congaree, and walked away with the massive chestnut for \$410,000. Capuano signed the ticket for Kaleem Shah, for whom he purchased the horse.

"The \$400,000 was what we were shooting for, so we had to go just a little over," said Capuano, who added of his new purchase, "He's a big, good-looking horse. He's got a good head on him, and Congaree could do anything."

Capuano began training for Shah about two years ago, and though they've yet to partner on a stakes winner, that could soon change.

"I think we've got about 10 two-year-olds now," Capuano explained. "We purchased a number of yearlings at Keeneland September."

Shah--who is not to be confused with the famed Pollywood actor--is the founder and president of Calnet, Inc., a technology and intelligence analysis company.

Shah purchased five yearlings at last year's September Sale for \$655,000, including a Giant's Causeway filly he acquired for \$340,000.

"He's really stepping up to the plate," said Capuano, who added with a smile, "He says the rest is up to me."

The Cal-bred hip 175, a son of SP Ali's Dancer (Marshua's Dancer) and a half-sibling to SW Sweet Stepper (Candy Stripes), was acquired by trainer Brian Koriner for \$130,000 at BESOCT. He was consigned to the sale by W.D. North Thoroughbreds. North sent the colt out to a :21 3/5 work Mar. 9 (video). -L.M.

Tom Gentry Lands Mr. Greeley Filly...

Tom Gentry, agent, went to \$550,000 to acquire a

Mr. Greeley filly from the family of Questroyal at Liberty Stud stallion Jade Hunter. Her unraced dam, Bacardi Cat (Tale of the Cat), is a half to the aforementioned sire of champion Azeri. Consigned as hip 199 by Jerry Bailey Sales Agency, agent, the dark bay got an eighth of a mile in :10 2/5 at the first

breeze show. Purchased for an undisclosed partnership, she will head overseas and join Jim Bolger's yard.

"What didn't I like about her? I just thought she was beautiful," Gentry offered. "She had all the parts and pieces in the right places; very racey. She's just one of those fillies that caught my eye the first time I looked at her."

Bolger has had plenty of success with another filly by Mr. Greeley. Under his care, Finsceal Beo (Ire) reeled off victories in G1 1000 Guineas S., G1 Irish 1000 Guineas and the G1 Prix Prix Marcel Boussac. Finsceal Beo was crowned highweight two-year-old filly in England, Ireland and France, and was also named the champion two-year-old filly in Europe.

Gulf Coast Farm purchased Bacardi Cat at the age of four at the 2005 Keeneland January Sale for \$72,000. This filly RNA'd for \$245,000 at Keeneland September. --S. Sherack

Smart Yearling Buyback Brings \$400,000...

Dr. Allison Foil, a local veterinarian in Ocala, was part of group that bought a Najran colt now named Cornerstonecharlie for \$22,000 as a Keeneland November weanling in 2006. Some 10 months later, Foil wasn't quite ready to end her relationship with the gray, and after the colt RNA'd for \$40,000 at last year's September Sale, she bought out the other partners. Foil's now looking pretty smart, as is Paul Sharp, who had short-listed Cornerstonecharlie as a yearling and who yesterday sold the horse to Hoods up Stable for \$400,000.

"We loved the filly at Keeneland, and she was just a little bit out of our budget," Sharp explained. "Foil knew I liked the horse, so she gave her to me to train."

Offered as hip 161, Cornerstonecharlie is out of Will Be a Bates (Bates Motel) and is a half to the stakesplaced Reel Prime (Volponi), who is currently racing in California with trainer Walther Solis.

Cornerstonecharlie registered an impressive :10 flat breeze at the Mar. 9 show (<u>video</u>). Asked if the colt moved up on the SafeTrack surface at OBS, Sharp replied, "I couldn't really tell the difference. I know that he took to the track very well here, but he was always a good horse anyway on the dirt track at home."

As for the purchase price, Sharp said, "You don't want to get your expectations too high with anything, but we knew that everybody liked him. People were shopping the horse very hard. He sold very well, and everyone concerned with the horse is very happy." -*LM*

OBS on Pace for Record March...

As OBS General Manager and Director of Sales Tom Ventura reminded reporters shortly after the hammer fell on yesterday's trading, it's only halftime. But following a very strong opening session, the OBS March Sale is on record pace to set new marks for average and median, and Ventura is confident the momentum will spill over into today's finale. "I haven't gone through it horse by horse, but I think we have an equally good group tomorrow," he said. In all, 110 horses sold yesterday for \$15,734,500, an average of \$143,041.

That is a massive 47.9-percent jump from last year's first-day average of \$96,683. The OBS record average of \$108,545 was set in 2006. The median was \$90,000, up 12.5 percent from the record median of \$80,000, set last year. Yesterday's buyback rate of 35.6 percent was nearly even from last year. "It was beyond expectations," Ventura commented afterwards. "I think the first sale this year [February] was excellent, and we felt confident we had a very good group of horses for this sale as well. They showed themselves well on the racetrack, all the right buyers were here-not only the top-end buyers. The depth of buyers was excellent. It looked on the surface like we were going to have a very good sale. The only concern was the current economic climate; we didn't know how that would affect things. It's been tough times in the stock market. But that hasn't affected us, at least so far." -LM

SECOND WELFARE AND SAFETY SUMMIT A SUCCESS The second Welfare and Safety of the Racehorse Summit, held Monday and Tuesday in Lexington, has been declared a success by those in attendance.



There were 62 participants at the Summit, 36 of whom had not been on hand for the original conference in October of 2006. Together, they drafted action plans in seven specific areas, including track surfaces, catastrophic injuries, medication and laboratories, and

implementation and regulation (see Primary Objectives). "This is a great way to bring people together for the common good, and Keeneland is proud not only to play host to it, but to assist the various committees in any way we can," Keeneland President Nick Nicholson said. "I once again commend Grayson-Jockey Club Research Foundation and The Jockey Club for putting the summit together." Nicholson added, "At industry conferences, people often look for a way not to do things, but I think there's been a feeling of mutual respect permeating the air at the summit, just as there was at the last one. Now we have to keep the momentum going and continue to make progress in the time between summits." Ed Bowen, president of Grayson-Jockey Club Research Foundation, remarked, "The original Welfare and Safety of the Racehorse Summit...was not meant to begin and end with the meeting in Lexington, and I think the progress we've seen in the 17 months since then is both reassuring and gratifying. With many new faces in attendance this year, I think we were able to identify additional areas of concern and realistic actions plans to address those issues." The Summit was coordinated and underwritten by Grayson-Jockey Club Research Foundation and The Jockey Club, and hosted by Keeneland Association.

Synthetic Tracks May Not Reduce Fatalities...

According to a report in the Daily Racing Form, a presentation by Florida state veterinarian Dr. Mary Scollay during a five-hour discussion on track surfaces at the Welfare and Safety Summit Monday indicated that the rate of catastrophic injuries on synthetic tracks may mirror that of fatalities on conventional dirt tracks. Scollay stated that the data used for the study was not, in fact, statistically significant, and did not include results from California's four all-weather surfaces. But, using information collected since June 1, 2007, from 42 racetracks, Scollay found that there were 244 fatal injuries from 123,890 starters on conventional dirt, a rate of 1.96 per 1,000 starts; there were 58 fatalities from 29,744 starters on synthetic surfaces, a rate of 1.95 per 1,000. The DRF reported that the California statistics, compiled using their own statewide system, revealed a much different storty. The California tracks showed a rate of 3.18 fatalities from 1,000 starters on traditional dirt from 2004-2007, as compared to a rate of 1.24 per 1,000 on synthetic tracks in 2007.

Overall, she has a record of 9-6-2-0 and earnings of \$627,864.



GOING TO WAR

Turf War (Dixie Union) has more than enough gradedstakes earnings to make it into the line-up for the 2008 GI Kentucky Derby. The dark bay colt earned \$400,000 for his dead-heat victory in the Dec. 7 GIII Delta Jackpot S., but he has been off the board in two other graded attempts, and he will have to prove to his connections that he belongs on the Triple Crown trail. He'll get the chance in Saturday's GII Lane's End S. at Turfway.

What will he have to show in the 1 1/16-mile test to take the next step toward Louisville?

"He's going to have to be right there," trainer Mark Casse said.

Turf War made his sophomore debut in the Feb. 18 GIII Southwest S. at Oaklawn Park, but never got into the hunt and finished ninth, some 8 1/4 lengths behind Denis of Cork. Casse is cutting the colt some slack for the performance.

"The problem in the Southwest was that he was coming out of the Delta Jackpot, where he made a big, big run from 15 lengths back," the conditioner explained. "I'd been watching the races all day [at Oaklawn], and it seemed like everything was running close to the lead. I had to make a decision of whether to change it up or not, but I talked to [jockey Calvin Borel], and said, 'let's not change tactics.'

"He broke bad, and grabbed himself pretty bad--that's just now healed up--and after a half he was maybe 25 lengths out of it. That was just too much to overcome. But we're going forward, and we're not going to make any excuses for him. He's going to have to be right there if we're going to consider the Kentucky Derby."

Turf War, owned by George Bolton and W.S. Farish, is a May 23 foal, and his full brother Grasshopper didn't earn any attention until the summer of his three-yearold season. But immaturity is not expected to be a factor in the Kentucky-bred's Triple Crown chances.

"He's a big strong colt, and I've never looked at him as a horse that needed to mature," Casse said. "I have looked at how his brother has improved at three and four, and I've always thought he'd be a horse that would get better as he got older. I did see a big improvement in him from last summer to the fall. He grew up.

"But he still has to prove that he's good enough-that's what we're trying to figure out Saturday. He's a nice horse and he's run one very big race, but he needs to run a couple more."

Added distance should not be an issue, either.

"Normally, you would look at a Dixie Union and think he'd be more of a miler type, but you have to go to his full brother," Casse continued. "He was second in the Travers, and he looks like he'll run all day. This horse trains that way. He's a push-button horse, and that might have been part of the trouble in the Southwest. If you sit on him, he'll just gallop along. I think that Calvin got a little overconfident, thinking when he asked him, he'd kick a little harder than he did. But you can position him anywhere, and I think that's a big part of running long. You have to be able to relax early so you can finish."

Turf War is not the only Casse-trained three-year-old with Triple Crown aspirations that will be running at Turfway Saturday. Stablemate **Miner's Claim** (Mineshaft), campaigned by Briarwood Stable (W.S. Farish, et al), will make his stakes debut in the Rushaway S. on the undercard. His connections believe he could be the best in the barn.

"I think Miner's Claim is a very good horse," Casse said. "We had some really good colts last year, and I thought he was the best of them all."

The dark bay, a \$175,000 KEESEP yearling, opened his career with a three-length maiden win in a sprint at Woodbine in October, and added a two-turn allowance score in Toronto in November. He makes his first start since in the Rushway.

"He ran into a few little problems--he ran a temperature, nothing serious--and it put us behind as far as the Kentucky Derby," Casse said. "I do believe he is Derby quality. He has the pedigree, and he went in 1:09 4/5 first time out.

"He is the only Mineshaft to break his maiden first time out, and his pedigree says he'll get better and better with each start. Well, if he does that, the sky's the limit."

Time, however, is running out for Miner's Claim to earn himself a spot in the May 3 GI Kentucky Derby.

"If we have hopes for the Kentucky Derby, he'll definitely need another start," Casse said. "Right now, we're just trying to get to this race. If he puts in a big performance, there are a couple of ways to go. We could point for the Coolmore Lexington [GII, Apr. 19], and forget the Derby, or go to the Blue Grass [GI, Apr. 12]. But we're looking more toward the Preakness and the Belmont. We're behind the eight ball, and we realize that. We'll just play it one race at a time."

SOPHOMORE MID-TERMS

Silver Deputy's son **Posse**, a seriously fast and early two-year-old who went on to win the seven-furlong GII Riva Ridge S. at three in 2003, was Leading Freshman Sire of 2007 in North America. He had progeny earnings over \$1.75 million, and no fewer that seven individual stakes winners. Yet, by the end of the year his lead over second-placed **Harlan's Holiday**, sire of GI CashCall (formerly Hollywood) Futurity winner Into Mischief Dec. 22, was down to just over \$100,000; and numbers three and four, **Proud Citizen** (like Harlan's Holiday, an Airdrie Farm stallion) and **Van Nistlerooy**, weren't so far behind, each with progeny earnings over \$1.4 million.


Through the first 11 weekends of 2008, Harlan's Holiday has not just grabbed the lead on the second-crop sire list by cumulative (2007-08) earnings from Posse, he has opened up a margin of over \$200,000. As he was \$100,000 behind him at the end of last year, you can see that Harlan's Holiday's 2008 runners have so far earned \$300,000 more than Posse's.

In fact, Harlan's Holiday leads the list of 2008 North American sophomore sires in progeny earnings, with over \$518,000 (from Bloodhorse.com), while Posse is taking a while to gear up this year; he is sitting in 16th place in 2008 progeny earnings, at just \$213,000 so far. Harlan's Holiday has six three-year-old winners at one mile plus which have made the *TDN* Progeny PP lists. That does suggest they'll go on; he certainly did. More importantly, he has three graded-stakes horses already this year.

Denis of Cork won the GIII Southwest S. at Oaklawn Park Feb. 18 (Beyer 96), in what *TDN* pointed out, in Monday's edition, is beginning to look like a key race; the Southwest second Sierra Sunset came back to win the GII Rebel last weekend, and Southwest third Liberty Bull won the \$600,000 WinStar Derby at Sunland Park.

Besides Denis of Cork, the Harlan's Holiday colt Into Mischief came back to run second to pro-tem California divisional leader Georgie Boy in the GII San Vicente S., while the 2007 Grade III-winning filly Tasha's Miracle came back to run third in the GI Las Virgenes S., also at Santa Anita.

In his column yesterday, Andrew Caulfield was primarily talking about Storm Cat and Tribal Rule, but his observations about Georgie Boy's female pedigree (which was actually a pretty good family developed by the late Diane Kem in Oregon) illustrate how 'bush' form now shows up increasingly in the pedigrees of top American horses. Harlan's Holiday is a very good example of that in a couple of respects, though in one very important way his pedigree is very conventional 'good' stuff: his dam, Christmas In Aiken, is by a top broodmare sire in Affirmed and comes from a for-real top-flight family. Her granddam was Princessnesian, by Princequillo, the top broodmare sire of his generation. She beat the boys in the Hollywood Gold Cup and was a half-sister to Boldnesian, arguably Bold Ruler's most important sire son, since he sired Bold Reasoning, who in turn sired Seattle Slew. So Harlan's Holiday comes from a proven, top-class sire family, which can't be said about too many successful American sires these days.

In other respects, though, certain elements of Harlan's Holiday's pedigree are decidedly down-market. For instance, he was foaled in Ohio. Not that there's anything wrong with Buckeyes, I hasten to add, it's just not known as a breeding ground of champion Thoroughbreds. It came in handy, though; as a two-year-old, Harlan's Holiday, a \$97,000 Fasig July yearling, ran second in his first start for trainer Ken McPeek in a five-furlong maiden special at Churchill Downs in June. His next three starts came in Ohio: he broke his maiden as the even-money favorite in the \$40,000 Cleveland Kindergarten S., restricted to Ohio-breds, won another \$40,000 Ohio-bred stakes at 2-5, then stepped up to open company and won the \$200,000 Cradle S. at 1 1/16 miles at odds of 6-1.

McPeek took him back to Kentucky, where he ran second to Siphonic in the GII Breeders' Futurity at Keeneland and won the GIII Iroquois S. over one mile at Churchill Downs. In his six starts at two, Harlan's Holiday was worse than second only once at any call in any of his races; he was showing a lot of speed.

At three and four, though, Harlan's Holiday proved himself to be a very high-class nine-furlong horse, first for McPeek, who trained him through the Preakness, then for Todd Pletcher, who trained him for the remainder of his career. Harlan's Holiday won three Grade I races at nine furlongs: the Florida Derby and Blue Grass S. at three, and the Donn H. (Beyer 113) at four. He also won the GIII Pennsylvania Derby at that distance in his first start for Pletcher. He was beaten all seven times he was tried over further, though he did place in three 10-furlong Grade Is. It certainly augurs well for his future prospects that he himself continued to improve at three and four.

Harlan's Holiday went to stud at a fee of \$17,500 with some impressive credentials: he was a winner of \$3.6 million, a graded-stakes winner at two, and captured three Grade I races at three and four, placing in another five.

His sire, Harlan, was a question mark, however. Harlan's dam, the Halo mare Country Romance, had won four stakes in Alberta as a two-year-old, though she did 'go east' to place in three stakes at Woodbine at three. Still, like Ohio, Alberta is hardly known for producing horses of top international standard.


Bred by Overbrook and Arthur Hancock and trained by Wayne Lukas, Harlan was from Storm Cat's first crop. Eventually he proved to be a really good sprinter. But, after being disqualified after winning his first start, at six furlongs (though not until October of his three-year-old year), he was then campaigned exclusively at a mile and a mile and a sixteenth for his next 13 starts, breaking his maiden for real and winning four allowance races. He dropped back to seven furlongs to win a \$40,000 handicap at Saratoga in August of his four-year-old year, and only twice ran at a mile after that, finishing well down the field both times. In his next start he ran second to Birdonthewire in the GII Forego H., and his only stakes win also came at seven furlongs, in the GI Vosburgh H. at Belmont Park at five.

Harlan's first crop was foaled in 1996 and, truth to tell, he was probably one of the best stallions of what was not a great sire class. He sired only 98 foals, of which six were stakes winners, in four crops. But he had Menifee (2007 A Runner Index: 1.75, and probably the best sire yet exported to Korea) in his first crop, and Harlan's Holiday in his fourth. Harlan's last appearance on the APEX lists came at the end of 2002. At that time his figures read: 2.10 A Index, 2.10 B Index, 2.54 ABC Index and 2.32 ABC Index. So he would most likely have been a very useful sire had he lived.




"The two big stories so far this year are not the 14 percent drop in gross, nor the almost five percent rise in average, from 2007. More indicative are the near-1000 horse decline (12 percent) in number catalogued, and the near-ten percent drop in the number sold, of those catalogued, since 2005. It's beginning to look like 2006-07 was a market peak, and 2008 is looking more like 2005."

A final point about Harlan's Holiday is that he is one of those sires who forced his way into the limelight by siring a lot of good-looking yearlings. According to the *Instatistics* feature on <u>thoroughbreddailynews.com</u>, Harlan's Holiday finished fifth among North American sires with 10 or more yearlings sold in their first crops, in 2006, behind Empire Maker, Vindication, Mineshaft, and Sky Mesa, and just ahead of Aldebaran. Fifty-eight yearlings from his first crop averaged \$96,699, with a median of \$72,500--over four times his initial stud fee. They looked the part from day one.

Who knows, 6 1/2 weeks from now, after the Kentucky Derby and Kentucky Oaks have been run, the second-crop sire list could look a whole lot different. Proud Citizen's GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies second Proud Spell finally turned the tables on Indian Blessing in the \$400,000 GII Fair Grounds Oaks.

Van Nistlerooy's Grade III-winning filly from last year, Elusive Lady, came back with a second in the GIII Florida Oaks, and his G2 Richmond S. winner from last year, Strike the Deal, is pointing for the G2 UAE Derby on Dubai World Cup night.

Florida sire **Repent**, second to Johannesburg in the 2001 GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile and winner of the next year's GII Louisiana Derby, is second on the 2008 second-crop sire list, with GII Robert B. Lewis S. winner Crown of Thorns, and last weekend's GIII Tampa Bay Derby second Atoned (it's worth buying one by Repent just so you can name it), and has improved from 13th at the end of last year to eighth. **Mineshaft**, third on the 2008 list and sire of GII Fountain of Youth winner Cool Coal Man, has moved from 17th to 13th; and **Vindication**, though he is still short of stars, has moved from eighth to fifth.

But, for now, and with a sire-class leading nine stakes horses to date, Harlan's Holiday has claimed top spot among North American second-crop sires, and a whole battery of runners with some class suggests that, having reached the top, he won't be that easy to dethrone.

An interesting inclusion on this list is **Hussonet**, who stood only the 2004 season in Kentucky. A multiple champion sire in Chile, he is now at Arrowfield Stud in Australia. His oldest Australian crop is now three, but six months older than his American crop, so he must have stood there in 2003, then come to Kentucky, then returned to Australia and stayed there. He's currently number one on the Australasian Two-Year-Old Sire List, runaway number one on the Australasian second-crop sire list, and number five on the 2007-08 Australasian General Sire List -- in other words, he's a real star down there. He's only number 31 on the North American F2005 list, but it's an odd case. He's not a horse commercial breeders in Kentucky would have had much of a feel for, and I doubt he got anywhere near the kind of mares he got at Arrowfield.

PART 2: NA SIRES IN EUROPE

In this season of two-year-old sales, once again a significant number of the juveniles catalogued in Europe are American-bred, by American sires. Here we publish a table of the 35 leading North American sires with 20 or more year-starters in Europe 2001-2007 (p17). Click <u>here</u> for the complete alphabetical list of North American Sires with 8+ starters in Europe from 2001-2007.

With Jim Bolger's Group 1-winning filly duo of Finsceal Beo and Saoirse Abu representing him in 2008, there wasn't much danger of **Mr. Greeley** (7.46 European A Index) being dethroned from his position in the top among North American sires in Europe. His index fell a bit--normal, as sires have more and more runnersbut there's no doubt his runners like Europe just fine. He also had two stakes-placed two-year-old 'B Runners' in Europe last year, Great Barrier Reef and Swiss Franc.

Tied for second, each with four 2001-2007 European A Runners from 31 year-starters (6.45), are Shadwell's **Sahm**, by Mr. Prospector out of Salsabil, and--look, here he is again--**Smart Strike**. Both were assisted by old stagers in 2007: six-year-olds Mustameet, in Ireland, for Sahm, and the useful stayer Tungsten Strike for Smart Strike. Kevin Prendergast, who trained Mustameet for Sheikh Hamdan, also had the three-year-old Dundalk (AW) Listed winner Red Moloney, for Norman Ormiston, by Sham.

Two more Irish trainers were responsible for 2007 A Runners by **Arch** (6.41), who previously had British Group 1 winner Les Arcs to represent him. Last year, six-year-old Arch Rebel, trained by Noel Meade, won a Listed Race and placed in six more black-type races; while the three-year-old filly Arch Swing, trained by John Oxx, ran second to Finsceal Beo in the G1 1000 Guineas. Unlike the three ranked above him, two by Mr. Prospector himself and one by Gone West, Arch is a grandson of Roberto, by Kris S. So it's no surprise they act in Europe either.

Kingmambo, also, of course, a son of Mr. Prospector, is the runaway leader among North American sires by number of A Runners in Europe, with no fewer than 36 among his 470 European year-starters since 2001. With exactly 10 times the number of European runners during that period as Mr. Greeley, it's not surprising his European A Runner index (3.83) isn't as high. It's still plenty high enough, when you consider it's almost exactly the same as the overall figures for sires like Smart Strike (3.87 in all regions) and Distorted Humor (3.70). Those are the numbers of top-level sires, no doubt about it. Kingmambo had three group-winning two-year-old A Runners in Europe in 2007: Henrythenavigtor, Thewayyouare and Alexandros.

TATTS FILES SUIT OVER DECEMBER MARES

Bloodstock agent Charlie Gordon-Watson has become involved in a lawsuit with Tattersalls over his client's non-payment for three purchases at the auction house's December Sales last year, according to *Racing Post*. The trade daily claims a High Court writ states an amount of £2,751,262.50 remains unpaid with regard to the purchase, on behalf of client Michael Baker, of G1 Prix Vermeille heroine Sweet Stream (Ity) (Shantou), for 1.1-million guineas; dual Group 3 victress Silverskaya (Silver Hawk), for 750,000 guineas; and Mora Bai (Ire) (Indian Ridge {Ire}), an unraced half-sister to High Chaparral (Ire), for 380,000 guineas. All three mares are now back in the possession of Tattersalls. "There is an issue relating to three mares, but we are confident that it will be resolved in due course," a Tattersalls representative told Racing Post. The trade daily also alleges that Baker, who faces trial at Maidstone Crown Court next month for attempting to dishonestly obtain property from trainers Henry Cecil and Oliver Sherwood, convinced Gordon-Watson he had sufficient funds to make such purchases. "I can't say anything about the High Court writ, but we are hopefully going to get it resolved in the next few days," Baker told the Post. "I have been talking to Bracher Rawlins, who are dealing with Tattersalls, and a compromise has been reached, I believe." Gordon-Watson was not available for comment.
