RECORDS FALL AT MAGIC MILLIONS

Underpinned by unprecedented activity by Patinack Farm, the Conrad Jupiters Magic Millions Yearling Sale surged to new records late Thursday afternoon, with Patinack Farm Director Roger Langley signing for a pair of colts at A\$2.2 million apiece, eclipsing the A\$2



million Magic Millions record set last year for a Sadler's Wells {Ire}--Sunday Joy (Aus) colt which was knocked down to trainer Gai Waterhouse. Coolmore bought the colt as a weanling at Magic Millions last May for an Australasian record A\$1.15 million, and over the last 10 months or so at the Jerry's Plains farm, the youngster has deliv-

ered a return on the investment that works out at around A\$3,500 per day--an enviable profit by any standard. The daring pinhook paid a A\$1.05 million dividend when Patinack outstayed trainer Tim Martin, acting on behalf of Perth businessman Paul Silvestro, to snare the Redoute's Choice (Aus)--Gypsy Dancer (Aus) colt, a three-quarter brother to multiple Group 1 winner Dance Hero (Aus). Coolmore's Tom Magnier was delighted with the sale of the highlight of their draft. "It's a great result," Magnier said. "Deep down I was hoping for A\$2 million, but at a sale you never know. This is the first colt we've pinhooked and it's been a great success."

As 11 of the world's leading Thoroughbreds stepped onto Dubai's refurbished Nad Al Sheba racecourse on Mar. 27, 1996, one of racing's most ambitious dreams was realized. The brainchild of Sheikh Mohammed bin

centerpiece, the World Cup, which at \$6-million holds the distinction of being the world's richest race. With that kind of fanfare and backing, the 10-furlong event has had no problem reeling in the champions, and during its 12-year history, no fewer than eighth international champions have scored in the famed event. **Dubai Dreaming cont. p6**





A Seven-Figure Salvo...

The opening bid on hip 785was A\$1 million and rapidly escalated in A\$100,000 increments to \$2.1 million, with Martin succumbing to pressure after his A\$50,000 salvo was answered by the same amount from Patinack. Langley said the colt was among the



best in the catalogue. "You just have to look at his three-quarter brother [Dance Hero], probably one of the best two-year-olds ever to race," Langley said. "He won the Triple Crown [G1 STC Golden Slipper, G1 AJC Sires Produce S. and G1 AJC Champagne S.] and he also won the Magic Millions. We are definitely planning to bring this colt back

next year for the Magic Millions two-year-old race. He's a very strong, forward type of horse--an ideal two-year-old. He's got everything going for him, he meets all our criteria. He is an ideal sire prospect; quite simply, a very exciting horse to have," Langley added. A couple of hours later, Patinack again came with all guns firing to secure a Redoute's Choice (Aus) three-guarter-brother to last Saturday's G1 Chipping Norton S. winner Casino Prince (Aus) (Flying Spur {Aus}), himself a tried purchase for Patinack. The strongly made colt with a bold white blaze was offered by dominant vendor Baramul and bidding began at A\$1.05 million. Underbidders included trainer Graeme Rogerson, With principal Nathan Tinkler present, Patinack's sale-ring splurge continued unabated through Thursday. In total, Patinack has given A\$18,660,000 for 58 yearlings at an average of A\$322,069. Some 26 colts and 32 fillies--the least expensive being a A\$45,000 Choisir (Aus) filly--included eight by Redoute's Choice and six by Encosta de Lago (Aus).

What They're Saying At The Sales...

Andy Williams, World Wide Bloodstock, South Africa: "Good horses are fetching good prices and bad horses are going through the cracks. I would like to see more pedigree, at the end of the day, we have bought on type and the South African bench has 28 horses so far. The standard this year is down a bit, to be truthful, but anyone in the game must accept this is due to the impact of El. Our National Yearling Sale in on Apr. 4 and there are a lot of South Africans involved in the Dubai World Cup meeting so a few people that were coming here have had to cancel because the timing was wrong--but there will be 30 or 40 South Africans here next year when the sale goes back to January. Timing-wise, it has panned out wrong, but we have done our bit and spent about A\$6 million between us."

Mick Dittman, buyer for Singapore clients:

"People have got plenty to spend and Magic Millions do a great job promoting the sale, and the raceday itself is fantastic, it is good for new owners and the quality of some of the horses here is pretty high--but there's a lot of horses. For the numbers they have got, the sale has stood up well and I would think breeders would be pretty happy. They are a bit expensive for Singapore, but we've bought well here with champion stayer and champion sprinter Lim's Objective and Lim's Figher; they cost A\$60,000 and A\$90,000 and they are top horses in Singapore. The horse doesn't have to be perfect, if they have the ability to run and they are managed well, it is surprising how far they can go."

Kieran Moore, bloodstock agent:

"The sale is long and arduous, there are too many yearlings and it should be seeded--there are too many ebbs and flows in the day and the sale loses its impetus. Perhaps what is starting to come through now is the influence of horses that are share foals and they come into the market unprotected, they have to be sold regardless, and that might be having an impact. All of the bigger buyers have teams and all of them seem to be on the same horses; if it is not on their lists then it is in the wilderness."

Mark Kavanagh, trainer:

"It has been a successful sale and I think vendors have been rewarded for presenting excellent horses at the top end, where it is very strong, and there are some bargains down the bottom end."

Brian Nutt, Attunga Stud:

"There is no tail, as far as I am concerned, and that has lessened the atmosphere at the sale. If you are willing to meet the market then they sell, we have had 100 percent clearance, but there is no fat in the market."

Lee Freedman all but ruled out a second trip to England for the June sprints at Royal Ascot after her triumph last year in the G2 King's Stand S. "Rarely do those sort of trips work twice and we achieved what we were after there last year," he said.

Setting the Standard...

For the inaugural edition of the World Cup, Cigar arrived in the United Arab Emirates following a stellar previous season, which culminated in a Horse of the Year title for owner Allen Paulson and trainer Bill Mott.

A winner of 10 races--eight at the Grade I level--during his undefeated five-year-old campaign, the powerful son of Palace Music made his first (and only) start outside of the United States in Dubai. He came into the World Cup off 13 consecutive victories, including the previous season's GI Jockey

Club Gold Cup, GI Pimlico Special, GI Woodward and GI Breeders' Cup Classic, and his sole prep for the World Cup, the 1996 GI Donn H. Facing the likes of G1 Queen King George VI and Elizabeth Diamond S. hero Pentire (GB) and two-time G1 Eclipse S. victor Halling, the robust bay confirmed his supremacy on a global stage with a 1/2-length victory over U.S.-bred Soul of the Matter, with another American representative, L'Carriere, further back in third. Richard Edmondson of *The Irish Times* summed it up best:

"America's great horse kept his reputation intact, the crowd saw the stunning animal they had been promised and, perhaps most of all, Sheikh Mohammed was granted a result which will give his nation maximum exposure around the world."

Like Father, Like Son...

It wouldn't take long for Shiekh Mohammed to get one for the home team with the help of the globetrotting Singspiel (Ire). Crowned North American Turf

champion after a season which included victories in the G1 Japan Cup and GI Canadian International, as well as a runner-up finish in the GI Breeders' Cup Turf in 1996, the Darley representative had to wait for his date with destiny after torrential rains hit the area the week leading into the champion-

ship day. Originally slated for Mar. 29, 1997, Dubai World Cup day was postponed until the following Thursday, the only time the World Cup was not contested in March. With jockey Jerry Bailey in the saddle, the handsome bay rolled home a 1 1/4-length winner over Siphon (Brz), with Sandpit (Brz) back in third.

Trained by Michael Stoute, the Irish-bred added scores in the G1 Coronation Cup and G1 Juddmonte International S. later in the season before retiring to an illustrious career at stud. The story would only come full circle six years later when Singspiel's son, Moon Ballad (Ire), winner of the G2 Dante S. and G3 Select S. at two, gave Sheikh Mohammed his fourth victory in the event, following a score by Godolphin's Dubai Millennium (GB) in 2000 and Street Cry (Ire) in the 2002 edition. In triumphing by five lengths, the second widest winning margin in World Cup history, the flashy chestnut beat home an accomplished bunch, including GISW Harlan's Holiday and multiple Group 1-winning Nayef. New Millennium...

If ever there was a horse that was destined to win the World Cup, it was Dubai Millennium. In the summer of 1998, Sheikh Mohammed met with David Loder to

oversee some of the Darley stable's two-yearolds, and upon the advice of the English trainer, Sheikh Mohammed decided to rename the unraced Yaazer, calling him Dubai Millennium. The handsome bay marked his career debut-and his sole start at two-with a dazzling five-length victory at Yarmouth

Oct. 28, 1998. Back with another ridiculously easy score in a Doncaster allowance May 3, 1999, the colt added four more wins at three, including the G1 Prix Jacques Le Marois and G1 Queen Elizabeth II S. Despite his one and only loss in the G1 Epsom Derby, the statuesque bay closed out the season as the highweight three-year-old colt in England at 7-9.5f. In the year of the Millennium, Sheikh Mohammed had one goal in mind for his star colt, and that was to win the Dubai World Cup. To that end, trainer Saeed bin Suroor prepared Dubai Millennium for the big show with a courserecord victory in the Maktoum Challenge Round 3 Mar. 2. Facing the likes of American Grade I winner Behrens, as well as Hong Kong star Indigenous (Ire) (Marju {Ire}), Dubai Millennium, accompanied by regular pilot Frankie Dettori, made short work of his rivals. He left his nearest pursuer, Behrens, six lengths behind and established a new track and stakes record of 1:59.50 in the process. Partnered by Jerry Bailey for his career finale, Dubai Millennium galloped home an easy winner in the G1 Prince of Wales's S. June 21, 2000, and after sustaining injury in August, was retired to stud. Seemingly poised for bigger and better things at Dalham Hall Stud in England, the superstar died of grass sickness with only one crop of foals to his credit.

Foreign Invasion...

Prior to this year's World Cup, only two horses have eclipsed the two-minute mark since the race's inception in 1996. Dubai Millennium accomplished the feat first in



Invasor (Arg) Dubai Racing Club 2000, and it was a runner campaigned by another member of the Dubai ruling family who realized the dream in 2007. Invasor (Arg), a Uruguayan champion and Horse of the Year at three, won all four of his U.S. starts for Sheikh Hamdan's Shadwell Stable in 2006, including the GI Whitney H. and GI Breed-

ers' Cup Classic. With an eye on Dubai, trainer Kiaran McLaughlin had the newly crowned U.S. Horse of the Year prep for the cross-Atlantic test in the GI Donn H., and the bay completed the task with relative ease, scoring by two lengths. Attracting an international cast of seven, which had amassed an imposing 19 Group 1/ Grade I victories between them, the Dubai jewel turned out to be merely a procession. Invasor battled GISW Premium Tap in the final furlong, but asserted his superiority in the drive to the wire, winning by 1 3/4 lengths. Cont. p8

in Cigar. A victory assured they would be back for more, and trainer Bob Baffert was among the most faithful of U.S.-based supporters. 'Dubai Bob' brought 1997 Kentucky Derby winner Silver Charm to the desert in 1998, and with the help of jockey Gary Stevens, the grey collected the trophy for Bob and Beverly Lewis. Back for another try--this time for the lion's share of a \$6-million purse--with Mike Pegram's Captain Steve in 2001, Baffert bagged another victory for America, the third in six

years. The win represented the third score for Jerry Bailey, and the Hall of Famer would set the mark the very next year for most wins by a rider when guiding Street Cry (Ire) under the wire first in the marquee event. Subsequent American-based runners to win the World Cup are Diamond A Racing Corp.'s Pleasantly Perfect in 2004; Roses in May, who strode to a threelength score in 2005; and the most recent to accomplish the feat was Invasor (Arg) in last year's edition. Saeed bin Suroor tops the training ranks with five victories, including four wins for Godolphin: Dubai Millennium (2000), Street Cry (Ire) (2002), Moon Ballad (2003) and Electrocutionist (2006). His remaining victory was realized with Sheikh Hamdan Al Maktoum's Almutawakel in 1999. - *Christina Bossinakis*

It took him a long time to receover from that race and we seriously considered retiring him afterwards." Connections regrouped and entered Premium Tap for a 1600meter event at the Janadriah Racecourse Mar. 7 and, while he only won by a nose, there was a sense of relief. "It wasn't a great race, but he showed he retains his hunger," McGovern commented. Still, the racing manager is realistic about his chances of defeating the likes of Curlin this weekend. "Clinically the horse is fine, but if you are asking if he's the same horse as last year, I'd have to say no." Premium Tap will be equipped with blinkers for the first time on Saturday and will have Sebastian Madrid in the irons, replacing Kent Desormeaux. -Alan Carasso



Sheihk Mohammed bin Khalifa al Maktoum's Asiatic Boy (Arg) (Not for Sale) rolled through his first five starts at Nad Al Sheba with condescending ease, so it came as a shock to all involved with the horse when he went down to defeat at odds-on in the G3 Burj Nahaar S. on Super Thursday Mar. 6. Trainer Mike de Kock has all but insured a more competitive performance in the World Cup. "He'll be a lot fitter, a lot tighter and a lot sharper," the conditioner commented. "He was carrying some condition-a bit like his trainer-and was lethargic when beaten last time. He's in better shape now and definitely readier, but the question is whether he's good enough. If the old Asiatic Boy turns up then you know he'll run a good race, but I guess the reality is that Curlin will have to run below his best if anybody else is going to win."



Has Romans Found Kindred Spirit in Massive Drama?

While the saying goes that the personalities, and even sometimes the looks, of dogs and their owners can be very similar, the same kind of comparison hasn't typically been made of racehorses and their connections. Nonetheless, assistant trainer Henrietta Steele can't


Dettori Excited about World Cup...

A crowd of 3,000 flocked to Nad Al Sheba for yesterday's "Breakfast with the Stars," watching as the Dubai World Cup meeting horses went through their final preparations. The palpable excitement of the fans was matched by one of those stars, jockey Frankie Dettori. "I'm waiting for the big day," Dettori enthused, adding that his status as a World Cup veteran hasn't lessened his passion for the event. "If anything it gets more exciting every year, this event just grows and grows," he said. Dettori has the first call on some of Godolphin's biggest threats tomorrow, including Jalil (Storm Cat) in the G1 Dubai World Cup, Gravitas (GB) (Mark of Esteem {Ire}) in the G1 Sheema Classic, Literato (Fr) (Kendor {Fr}) in the G1 Dubai Duty Free, and Diabolical (Artax) in the G1 Golden Shaheen. "There's a lot of pressure and I'll feel nervous; this is a big day for Godolphin," admitted Dettori. "It's our back yard, so to speak, so of course you feel it." Dettori declined to nominate what he thought was his best chance on the night, saying, "I've got a lot of good rides all with chances, but I'll be happy if I come away with just one." Dettori added that choosing Literato over the Creachadoir (Ire) (King's Best) might have been his toughest decision. "To be honest, it was a toss of the coin," he said. "I just felt his recent work was slightly the better. It's very competitive, there are probably five or six with good chances."

"This is often the toughest race on the card and this year it's the strongest I've seen it," he said, "But my horse is the winner of the Futurity S. which is some of the best form we have in Australia at the moment." He added, "All of the other horses are dangers, but I only have to worry about my

horse. This will be his third race this season which has always been the plan. He's travelled over well and eaten up well and I hope he can run a good race."

To her credit, Finsceal Beo (Ire) (Mr. Greeley) took the G1 English and Irish 1000 Guineas last spring and would have made it three Classics in as many countries but for a narrow defeat at the hands of Darjina (Fr) (Zamindar) in the French equivalent. "We are in the same boat that we were in before we went to Newmarket last May, and we won't know if Finsceal Beo is back on song until Saturday, but she has travelled and eaten well and her temperature and weight is just where we want her," commented trainer Jim Bolger. "The sunshine in Dubai clearly suits her, as, despite not yet having been clipped, she already has her summer coat. Last year she was woolly when she went to Newmarket, but she is a month ahead this time around."

OUR AMBITIONS FOR THE MIDDLE EAST

By Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum

NOTE FROM THE PUBLISHER: This article originally appeared in the January 12-13 edition of the Wall Street Journal, just prior to President Bush's visit to Dubai. It seemed particularly appropriate to republish it, with the permission of Sheikh Mohammed and the WSJ, on the eve of the Dubai World Cup.

During President Bush's visit to Dubai on Monday, he will find a big city like no other that has risen from the Arabian desert. The joke making the rounds here is that the crane should be designated as Dubai's national bird,



so extensive is the engineering activity. We also plan to keep on investing in markets and businesses abroad, including in our own neighborhood, where economic development has long been uneven.

Our plans do not flow from mere ambition; they are a necessity. Consider that only 3 percent of our revenue is from exports of diminishing crude-oil reserves; 30 percent is from tourism, and there's increasing revenue from manufacturing and other sectors such as hospitality, technology and transportation.

But to term our emirate "Dubai Inc.," as some do, suggests that commerce, more than anything else, is our leitmotif. It is true, of course, that Dubai has been a trading port and a commercial hub for several centuries. But the ethos of Dubai was, and is, all about building bridges to the outside world; it was, and is, about creating connections with different cultures.

As a child, I learned how important it was to establish an enabling economy where the government pro-



vided incentives and an ethics-based regulatory environment, but left it to the inventiveness and energy of the private sector to expedite economic growth.

I learned my capitalism in the bazaars and boardwalks of Dubai. And perhaps the fundamental question that I

learned to always ask was: How can we serve as agents of positive change? That's why I prefer to call Dubai "Catalyst Inc." We live in a tough neighborhood. We live in a country that has been surrounded by difficult issues for several decades--the Iraq-Iran war, the invasion of Kuwait, the current war in Iraq. Despite all that, Dubai has learned how to reinvent itself and cope.

We believe that helping to build a strong regional economy is our best opportunity for lasting social stability in the Middle East. That's why, for instance, we



strongly support the new Gulf Common Market, which was launched on Jan. 1 and which will eventually lead to more regional economic integration, enhanced intra-Gulf trade, and a common currency for the six countries that form the Gulf Cooperation Council--Bahrain, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates (UAE).

There are more initiatives underway, many of which are aimed at ensuring prompt payment of salaries, and improvements in working conditions for

unskilled foreign workers. While capitalism doesn't always create egalitarian societies, I like to think that in Dubai we are making the effort to cast the net wide when it comes to sharing prosperity.

I also like to think that we in Dubai also learn from our mistakes. We have had some object lessons. The Dubai Ports episode in the U.S. last year was one.

We analyzed our experiences, and we now approach our international investments in a much more holistic manner. We take the time to analyze the social, political and economic landscape, identify the stakeholders, and

then carefully prepare the way by ensuring that the concerns of all parties are properly addressed. When disputes occur, we generally find a way to work through them.

When there was resistance to our investment in some European bourses, we listened

carefully to various ar-

guments and then successfully negotiated our way through the situation. As with CEOs in corporate boardrooms, leaders of sovereign nations need to act collaboratively in order to engender progress.

It doesn't take the visit of a capitalism-boosting American president for this region to freshly understand that it needs to accelerate economic progress.

When you look at the region, there are parts that are behind compared to the rest of the world--behind when it comes to the economy, business and social develop-



ment. We would like these lessdeveloped parts of the region to be like Europe, Japan, Singapore and the rest of the industrialized world.

Nearly 1.5 billion people live in our neighborhood, and more than 50 percent of them are under the age of 25. In the Arab world alone, some 80 million young people--out of a total population of 300 million-are seeking jobs. I look at these young people as extraordinary resources for nation-building. If we can take our vision beyond Dubai, I think we can save a lot of young people from humiliating unemploy-

ment, from becoming extremists.

Education and entrepreneurship are the twin underpinnings for building a safer world. With these two institutions, we'll have fewer angry young people, fewer frustrated youths ready to embrace radicalism because they have nowhere else to turn.

I am often asked, "What does Dubai really want?" Well, here's my answer: What we want is the continuation of a journey that began with my forebears. I truly believe that human beings have a tremendous capability of changing and improving their lot. Change and modernization are inevitable in this age of galloping globalization. But we in the Middle East need to continually and carefully calibrate that change in the public interest. I am also often asked, "What are Dubai's political ambitions?" Well, here's my answer: We don't have political ambitions. We don't want to be a superpower or any other kind of political power. The whole region is over-politicized as it is. We don't see politics as our thing, we don't want it, we don't think this is the right thing to do.

We are engaged in a different type of war that's really worth fighting--fighting to alleviate poverty, gen-

erating better education, creating economic opportunity for people, and teaching people everywhere how to be entrepreneurs, to believe in themselves.

Humility and tolerance run deep in the Maktoum family and are very important in trying to serve one's people. I am anchored in that tradition, which is why my favorite activity is listening.

I always ask: How can I help? What can I do for people? How can I improve people's lives? That's part of my value system.

It's too late for me to change that system, but it isn't too early for me to say to the world that the Dubai narrative is all about changing people's lives for the better through smart capitalism, willpower and positive energy.

Sheikh Mohammed has completed two years as ruler of the Emirate of Dubai, and vice president and prime minister of the United Arab Emirates. His memoir will be published later this year.

When Liberty Bull came home two lengths clear in the \$600,000 WinStar Derby Mar. 16 at Sunland Park, he did more than pick up a \$300,000 check for his third win in six starts. The iron grey colt provided owner Ken Maier--who has just three horses in training--with his biggest payday yet in the business, a potential GI Kentucky Derby candidate and volidetion in Maiorle own independent.

validation in Maier's own judgement. After 21 years with Allstate

Insurance, Maier accepted a severance package in 2006 and decided to dabble in another field.

"I wanted to do something a little different," the 48-year-old said. "I wanted to get involved with horses."

Having been involved with a few racehorses since 1993, the Gurnee, Illinois resident decided to try his

hand at pinhooking. He bought a pair of yearlings at the 2006 Keeneland September Sale, including a \$50,000 daughter of Grand Slam--Belle Cherie and an Include--Woman's Touch colt for \$28,000. The following month, Maier had another colt catch his eye, but wound up missing out on the son of Holy Bull.

"I tried to buy this horse at Fasig-Tipton October," he recalled. "I liked him, and was the underbidder at \$36,000. I thought I might have him, but George Parrish bid \$37,000 and got him."

Maier sent his purchases to Gabriel Dixon, who offered them the following spring at OBS April. The Grand Slam filly, produced by a half-sister to MGISW Octave, was sold for \$50,000 to Highfield Stock Farm, but Maier wound up buying the Include colt back for \$47,000 after setting a \$49,000 reserve. While the experiment didn't go quite as planned, it gave him another chance to look at the colt now doing business as Liberty Bull.

"I saw that he was selling at OBS, where I was trying to sell some horses," Maier explained. "I figured I liked him in the fall, and I went back to take another look. I thought he would bring at least \$40,000. It was not a very good sale--a lot of horses were not bringing what they should have."

The son of Lasting Sensation (Dehere) had grown up over the winter and, while the first two dams were pretty light on the page, Maier noted that the third dam, Courtney's Day (Roberto), was a full sister to Brian's Time.

"I remember Brian's Time winning the Florida Derby," Maier said. "And then he became a leading sire in Japan."

"I wanted [the colt] again," Maier continued. "He was a lot taller; more stout. As a yearling, someone said his back end looked a little weak. He had the same good walk at OBS and more of an engine behind."

"You can watch the videos and see how they move," Maier added. "As yearlings, they're not under tack yet; you rely more on pedigree and conformation. At a two-year-old sale you can see if they move through [their flaws]."

As he puts it, Maier "used some more of that severance package to buy this horse."

It's been a pretty good use of a golden parachute. Purchased for \$30,000 from the Parrish Farms consignment, Liberty Bull was sent to Tom Amoss. The colt graduated in his second start Nov. 14 at Churchill before closing out 2007 with a second to the streaking Sok Sok in the Sugar Bowl S. at Fair Grounds Dec. 22. He kicked off his sophomore campaign with a score in the Smarty Jones S. Jan. 21 at Oaklawn, then deadheated for third behind Denis of Cork in the GIII Southwest S. Feb. 18. After his New Mexico payday, Liberty Bull will head back to deeper waters.

"He's a nice colt, but we don't know yet if he's a top-level horse," Maier acknowledged. "We were thinking about the [GII] Illinois Derby [Apr. 5 at Hawthorne], but we're leaning towards [GII] Arkansas Derby [Apr. 12]. We know he likes the track at Oaklawn, and it gives him an extra week after his last race. He does better with a little more time."

If he does make it to the big dance, the longtime handicapper Maier has an Illinois-bred mare named Court Lite (Illuminate) to thank.

"Back in 1993, I was going to apply for a mortgage," he explained. "I went in for a meeting the loan officer, who said the owner [of the company] is in the horse business. I did get the loan, and saw him at the track a few weeks later. We won some money that day. He called me later and said he and some partners were buying a horse Court Lite for \$6,000, and did I want to buy a quarter interest for \$1,500? So I did."

Maier went to see the five-year-old Dec. 29 at Hawthorne; she was in a \$5,000 state-bred claiming race. So how did it go?

"It was 30 degrees, with 45 mph winds," he remembered. "She won by six lengths, and I was hooked."

It hasn't been all smooth sailing--Maier has faced the usual disappointments of racehorse ownership--but he's certainly had an education.

"I learned a lot by hanging around people in the business," he said, "But sometimes you figure things out quicker if you go off on your own. If you've got someone buying for you that's working for a lot of different people, you may not get the one that's the best."

Liberty Bull may have filled the coffers for now, but Maier doesn't see himself changing his current philosophy.

"I come from a conservative Midwest background," he explained. "I can't bring myself to pay more than \$50-60,000 for a horse--you do need to get lucky."

"I'm not sure if I'm lucky, but if it's luck I'll take it." -M Kizenko


Nakatani, Colonel John Reunited for SA Derby:

Third behind the subsequent listed winner Salsalavie (Fr) on debut at Deauville in July, the homebred was off the mark next time at this track in November and took advantage of a gifted lead to open his stakes account on his first try. Already clear of the eventual runner-up when kicking soon into the straight, the bay was beyond recall as that rival failed to close the sizeable gap. "This is a horse I quite liked last year, but he had a setback in his first run at Deauville," trainer Elie Lellouche explained. "After a long break, he did not let me down when winning at the end of the season. I was very happy to see him bowl along in front today as that is what he likes best. 

Q and A: Emmaneulle Bour, General Manager, France-Galop

Emmanuelle Bour took over Louis Romanet's position at France Galop January 1, 2008. As the new General



Manager of the French Jockey Club, she faces a difficult issue: the European debate on control of the growth of online betting on horseracing. With the launch of several new sites by new bookmakers' organizations, principally based offshore, regulations are expected to be proposed in 2008 by the European Commission. Bour spoke with a reporter from the TDN's sister publication in France,

Emmanuelle Bour JDG the JDG, and said her principal goal was to influence those important regulatory measures.

Q: Why does the European Commission wish to force France to change its betting and racing system? Bour: The betting market is, of course, a most unusual one and it is one of the few which has yet to be regulated by the Commission. For the time being, each member country draws up its own rules, but in the near future, the Commission wishes to bring these different regimes into a European norm. The first step in this process was to demand that each member state open its domestic market for betting on racing and sporting events to competition. If this is enforced, France will be obliged to break the PMU's monopoly on betting on racing and allow bookmakers to take bets and establish themselves in France. France Galop opposes this for obvious reasons and this was the beginning of its negotiations with the Commission.

Q: What is the current state of these negotiations? Bour: At the moment, we are trying to construct a

common legal framework acceptable to all member states. The aim of this framework is to protect the European Union from the negative side of online betting--money-laundering and breach of copyright, for example--and to set out the scope for each country to control its own betting system. If the framework is accepted, France will be able to maintain its pool-betting monopoly.

Q: Why is France opposed to the introduction of bookmakers?

Bour: On March 6, the representatives of the majority of the European racing countries met in Brussels. Both thoroughbred and trotting organizations were represented and each outlined its anxieties. The German and Belgian representatives explained how the introduction of bookmakers to their countries had killed the racing business, which was progressively starved of funds. The French system is based on the PMU's monopoly and works well, but it is fragile and if the return to racing from betting were to decline steeply, then the racing business would surely follow suit and in 10 years' time, French racing and breeding would hardly exist at all.

Q: Do you really believe that?

Bour: Yes, I do, and I would go further and say that if the French system is destroyed, the whole of European racing will be undermined. The European racing countries should be trying to emulate our model and build new foundations for long-term development. All of the racing professionals who took part in the March 6 meeting signed a joint statement to this effect, including representatives from Britain. All of those present, including those from countries where there are bookmakers, wish to establish the principle of financing racing through betting in an equitable manner which guarantees the integrity and transparency of racing, and provides a basis for long-term development.

Last year's G1 July Cup hero will use the five-furlong contest as a warm-up for a campaign at the highest level in 2008. "He's fine and he's cantering away and the idea is for us to aim at the Group 1 sprints in the middle of the summer," he told PA Sport yesterday. "We'll try to give him a run before those and my present thinking is that he might start in the Palace House S. There are opportunities abroad, I think there's a six-furlong race at the Breeders' Cup that might be a possibility. There's also the G1 Hong Kong Sprint and there are the two races at Royal Ascot and the July Cup back here. It'll obviously depend on whether we're tackling five or six furlongs as to whether we'll try the G1 Nunthorpe S. and maybe we could go to France for the G1 Prix Maurice de Gheest if he's wanting further."

DARLEY BUYS INTEREST IN VON COSTA DE

HERO Darley Australia has confirmed it has purchased a 50-percent share of the David Hayes-trained G2 VRC Sires' Produce S. winner Von Costa De Hero (Aus) (Encosta de Lago {Aus}--Piavonic {Aus}, by Scenic {Ire}) for an undisclosed sum. "We are pleased to have secured 50 percent of Von Costa De Hero (Aus)," said Darley Australia manager Olly Tait of the colt bred by Sheikh Mohammed bin Khalifa and purchased by agent James Bester for A\$1.2 million at the 2007 Inglis Easter Yearling Sale. "We look forward to racing him with his current owners and think he has a bright future," Tait added. Von Costa de Hero (Aus) is on the fifth line of betting at 12-1 for the G1 Golden Slippers April 19 at Rosehill. The colt, raced by Tim Hughes, David Hayes, David Paradice and three others, was fifth on debut in the Listed Debutant S. behind Sugar Babe (Aus) Oct. 17 at Caulfield, then reappeared to finish fourth to Wilander (Aus) in the G3 Blue Diamond Prelude S. Mar. 3 at the same track. He won the G2 Sires' Produce S. Mar. 8 at Flemington. Hayes' bloodstock manager Mark Pilkington said, "It is safe to say he's probably the most expensive two-year-old in training ever sold in Australia". Von Costa De Hero becomes the first horse owned by Sheikh Mohammed's Darley Australia operation to race with the David Hayes stable. "David is very excited at the prospect of training a horse for Sheikh Mohammed and the colt will race in his colours in the Golden Slipper," said Pilkington. "We weren't prepared to sell the whole horse and the owners will all remain in the ownership. We are delighted that Darley have agreed to allow us to race the horse in partnership with them both in his racing and stud career." G1 Manikato S. winner Piavonic was purchased by Sheikh Mohammed bin Khalifa for A\$660,000 at the Inglis Easter Broodmare sale in 2002. Her three named foals, including Al Yamama (Aus) (Fusaichi Pegasus) and Khataaf (Aus) (Grand Lodge) are all winners. She has a Redoute's Choice yearling filly and an Encosta de Lago (Aus) weanling filly, and was not covered last spring.
