LIKE THE DERBY, OAKS A WIDE-OPEN AFFAIR

An accomplished field of three-year-old fillies, expected to be reduced to 11 with the likely scratch of Fox Hill Farms' Eight Belles (Unbridled's Song), will face the starter today's 134th running of the GI Kentucky Oaks at Churchill Downs. Similar to tomorrow's Run for the Roses, the battle for the blanket of lilies looks to be

a very competitive event. Stonerside Stable LLC's Country Star (Empire Maker) was expertly managed last season by trainer Bobby Frankel, who resisted the urge to send the homebred filly to the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies follow-

ing her maiden-breaking victory in the GI Darley Alcibiades S. at Keeneland. Instead, he trained her up to the GI Hollywood Starlet Dec. 15, which she duly won by 2 3/4 convincing lengths. A minor setback cost her the early portion of her sophomore season, and she returned to action with a somewhat disappointing fifth to Little Belle (A.P. Indy) in the GI Ashland S. in Lexington Apr. 5. That subpar performance, combined with the fact that the filly has never tried a conventional dirt surface, could cause some more doubt this afternoon. But her sire was runner-up to Funny Cide in the 2003 Derby and her dam, Rings a Chime (Metfield), rounded out the exacta behind Secret Status in the 2000 Oaks. Country Star could be ready to provide Frankel with his third Oaks in the last 10 years (Keeper Hill, 1998; Flute, 2001).

BACK TO BLUE

While Godolphin's tally in Newmarket's G1 2000 Guineas reads two winners since 1996, recent forays have proved fruitless and it is up to Ibn Khaldun (Dubai Destination) to put the operation back in the winner's



spot tomorrow. Graduating through the ranks last fall, the homebred collected a nursery and the G3 Autumn S. at Ascot before a resounding success in Doncaster's G1 Racing Post Trophy. No winner of that contest, which is traditionally run as a Ibn Khaldun godolphin.com pointer for the following year's Derby contenders, has followed

up here, but Ibn Khaldun has the substance to defy the stats. "He has improved no end and worked very well all winter," commented Frankie Dettori, who scored on Mark of Esteem (Ire) and Island Sands (Ire). "We're very pleased with him and he goes there fresh and well. We have an unbeaten champion there in New Approach who sets the standard and an equally good horse in Raven's Pass, so we are just hoping for a good run."

She had the misfortune of running into Eight Belles in her two appearances this season, a runner-up effort in the GIII Honeybee S. Mar. 16 and a third in the GII Fantasy S. Apr. 6. Jockey Edgar Prado takes over from

Julien Leparoux and will have to work out a trip from the 11 hole. "We've got what we've got and I don't think they are gonna change it," trainer Bob Holthus said of the post draw. "Edgar is going to have to figure a way to save some ground somewhere."

Belle, 'Sonata, Doc Formidable Foes...

Little Belle carried the maroon and white silks of Darley to victory in the Ashland, but jockey Rajiv Maragh will don Godolphin blue for the first time this afternoon. The bay is three-for-four going two turns, including a success in Aqueduct's Busher S. on the inner dirt Feb. 24. Bsharpsonata (Pulpit) has handled just about anything thrown in her direction and has won short and long and on turf and dirt. She nearly got the job done in her first try over the synthetic last time out, leading by a head at the stretch call of the Ashland before ultimately being overhauled by Little Belle. California raider Golden Doc A (Unusual Heat) is the field's other Grade I winner, having annexted the Feb. 9 Las Virgenes S. at Santa Anita. Second as the favorite in both the GI Santa Anita Oaks Mar. 8 and in the GII Stonerside Beaumont S. at Keeneland Apr. 10, she will be making her first start on the dirt, but fired a bullet five furlongs over the Churchill main track Apr. 23.




Of the notables to be scratched from the £375,000 contest yesterday, only Ballydoyle's Jupiter Pluvius (Johannesburg) and Godolphin's duo Rio de la Plata (Rahy) and Fast Company (Ire) (Danehill Dancer {Ire}) have made a serious impact. Princess Haya of Jordan's New Approach (Ire) will start from the two hole, one out from the rail and the stall from which Mark of Esteem broke en route to success in 1996. Stonerside Stable's Raven's Pass has received a wide draw alongside Michael Kerr-Dineen's Stimulation, who will start from the same stall as the 2000 hero King's Best in 12. The latter has improvement to find off a narrow success in this venue's Listed European Free H. Apr. 16 and no winner of that prep has followed up here since Mystiko in 1991. Trainer Hughie Morrison is hopeful he can make the grade. "We'll find out whether he's good enough on Saturday, but he has always been a classy individual," he said. "I wouldn't want the ground to get any worse, as I think he's a fast-ground horse. The relaxed way he runs his races, we'd be very surprised if he does not stay at least a mile." Jeremy Noseda has yet to win this Classic and saddles a live outsider in Strike the Deal. Despite showing bountiful speed at two when winning Goodwood's G2 Richmond S. and finishing runner-up in both the G1 Middle Park S. here and Newbury's G2 Mill Reef S., he showed he can stretch out when fifth in the G2 UAE Derby at Nad Al Sheba last time Mar. 29. "Subject to the ground being good or faster, Strike the Deal will run in the Guineas," Noseda said. "We are rolling the dice a little bit, but the form he has shown through his career gives him every right to take his place in the line-up. If he were to finish in the first four or five, we would be delighted."

BIG BROWN BLOWS OUT THREE FURLONGS

Big Brown (Boundary), the 3-1 morning-line favorite for tomorrow's big race, worked a bit faster than trainer Richard Dutrow Jr. would have preferred, but the conditioner put his typically positive spin on things after the colt covered three-eighths of a mile in :35 2/5 yesterday at Churchill Downs. "I think maybe the track was a little bit fast and so is our horse," he said. "You can't get everything perfect all the time. It looked like a very good move to me. I'm not going to blame this work if he gets beat. It looked very good to me. I was very happy with it. I'm sitting on go here. We're ready." Partnered with exercise rider Michelle Nevin, Big Brown was clocked his opening furlong in :12, then went the final quarter mile in :23.40. "It looked good to me. I watched it from the frontside and I was as happy as I could be watching it," Dutrow added. "I could see when he turned around with the pony that right away he was just a little too aggressive, which you can expect, I think. It just went as good as it could have possibly went (sic). It didn't look like he did too much. It looked like he was well within himself. He cooled out well at the barn. It looks like he's as happy as he can be."

Desormeaux Talks Race Strategy...

When asked whether he is as confident as his ebullient trainer, jockey Kent Desormeaux, who has the call aboard Big Brown, answered unequivocally, "Yes." The veteran reinsman, who won the 1998 Derby with Real Quiet and with Fusaichi Pegasus in 2000, is not overly concerned about having drawn post position 20. "For me, it works out perfect because I can catbird someone, whoever leads me into the first turn," he commented. "If not, I think we talked about that, too, when the doors open I'm just going to feel it. I don't know where I'm going to be. It's just one of those things. Does pace make race? Yes, pace makes race, but my horse's pace, his ultimate maximum cruising speed is where I want to set him up at. That's just something I'm going to feel. I don't know where it's going to be. Big Brown will tell me where that is." Desormeaux knows he can't go too fast too soon.

"He's the kind of horse if you turn him loose he's going to step it out," he stated. "[Exercise rider] Michelle [Nevin] who rides him in the morning, and I both know that. But he's very intelligent and he works off our hands. She's done a great job of teaching him what we need from him as a rider. For me in the afternoon, he's very attentive to my needs. I'm definitely going to rein him in or he's going to go:21,:44." And that would be the kiss of death in the Derby.

Smooth Air Gets in His Final Work...

Mount Joy Stables' **Smooth Air** (Smooth Jazz), runner-up to Big Brown in the GI Florida Derby Mar. 29, blew out an easy three furlongs yesterday in :38 1/5 under the watchful eye of trainer Bennie Stutts Jr. "He just needed to blow out some of this Kentucky air," the conditioner commented. "I've never blown him out in the past [two days before a race]; I always breezed him. But we had to do something different this time. What I see, I like. I'd rather that he go slower than faster at this point. He'll go to the track again [today]. But he's dead fit." Stutts has been impressed with the way Smooth Air gets over the surface. "From what I see here, he's running on top of the dirt, just floating over it. I want him to come out of this race the way he's going into it."

Roussel Has His Chalkboard Out...

Jockey E.T. Baird will be participating in his first Derby aboard Recapturetheglory (Cherokee Run) and is having the time of his life. "It's a fantastic experience and time for me, especially since I've never been here before," Baird commented. "I've ridden races at Churchill Downs, but the Derby is a different game. But you have to remember as a rider that it's just another horse race and ride your horse accordingly." And how will he ride Recapturetheglory, who drew the 19 post? "I can only ride my horse and feel the way he's running," he stated. "With those other horses outside of me, who also have good early speed, we'll just have to see how things fall out of the gate. Louie and I just ran through different scenarios and you have to ready for anything." And the best case? "Oh, how about a half in, say, :50, and three-quarters in 1:15?" Baird joked.

An Eventful Morning for Tale of Ekati...

While stablemate and fellow Derby entrant **Big Truck** (Hook and Ladder) had a carefree gallop around Churchill yesterday morning, **Tale of Ekati** (Tale of the Cat)'s morning was a little more interesting. "He had to be pulled up because of a loose horse on the track," trainer Barclay Tagg said. "So he only galloped about a mile-and-a-quarter. But everything's OK." The GI Wood Memorial winner was originally scheduled to gallop 1 1/2 miles yesterday.

This is the second of two interviews regarding the issue of the division of revenue from advance deposit wager-

ing. In yesterday's TDN, we spoke with Bob Reeves, president of the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Group, which represents 18 horsemen's organizations in 16 jurisdictions. Today, Scott Daruty, the CEO of TrackNet Media Group, shares his perspective. TrackNet represents the racetracks owned by Churchill Downs and Magna Entertainment Corp., as well as the two ADW outlets, Twin Spires and XpressBet, operated by those

companies. Daruty was formerly the chief U.S. counsel for Magna Entertainment.

What is the current business model used by TrackNet when negotiating with advance deposit wagering companies?

SD: We approach this issue from the racetrack perspective, because TrackNet, first and foremost, represents racetrack companies. We have 18 racetracks whose content we sell, and the purpose of TrackNet is to help further the interests of those racetracks. When we look at the account wagering model, we compare where we are today to where we were historically in our industry. Historically, the host fees paid for account wagering were as low as 2 percent and, at the high end, up to 3.5 percent. TrackNet didn't believe that was sufficient. TrackNet believed that there needed to be much higher fees paid to the racetracks and horsemen; much more return to the industry by the account wagering platforms. We've been, for the past 12 months, pursuing our racetracks' strategy of what the right model should be. That model, in our opinion, consists of three components. There's a host fee component, which would be somewhere in the range of 5 to 8 percent, depending on the quality of content you're talking about. There's a source market fee, paid in the market where the wager comes from; we think that market fee should be 7 percent of the handle, and should be paid within a 25-mile radius of a racetrack. The last component is a television fee--a small fee in the range of 2 to 2.5 percent paid by the account wagering company to TVG, if TVG is televising the content on which the wager took place, or to HRTV, if HRTV is televising the content. (ed. note: HRTV is owned by Magna, in partnership with Churchill Downs Inc). Cont. p13



The television fee is designed to prevent free riders, because TVG and HRTV have a lot of investment in television--they spend a lot of money on the production and distribution of their television. There are other account wagering companies out there that don't have television, but their customers can just as easily watch HRTV or TVG. Our feeling is, when a company televises the product, it should receive a small percentage from the other companies that are taking wagering on that product. That gives you the essence of the TrackNet account wagering model.

Is this the model used by XpressBet and Twin Spires, the two ADW companies represented by TrackNet? SD: Our account wagering companies operate under this model. We pay host fees much higher than had been paid historically; we pay source market fees when we take wagers within 25 miles of a racetrack. There are certain jurisdictions that mandate, through regulations or statute, a different source market fee model; it might be more than 25 miles in certain states, or it might be a different percentage set by statute, but absent special regulation, that source market fee would be 7 percent. And it's very important to know that XpressBet and Twin Spires pay a television fee to TVG when they take wagers on content that's televised by TVG. The TrackNet account wagering model was set up by TrackNet as a model that's beneficial to the racetracks. It wasn't set up for the purpose of driving profits to the account wagering companies. Rather, it was set up to ensure more revenue to the racetracks and horsemen, while offering the account wagering companies a reasonable return for their efforts.

Why do you believe this is the best model for the industry?

SD: There's something that's important to recognize in the model that we've set up. Let's assume that a track has a 20-percent blended takeout, and let's say that there's a bet on a high-quality racetrack--a Santa Anita or a Churchill Downs or a NYRA race--and that the bet comes out of a source market area--that the person who made the bet resides within 25 miles of a racetrack. Add up all the fees that the account wagering company has to pay. It has to pay 7 or 8 percent (of the total handle) as a host fee, it has to pay a 7-percent source market fee, and a 2-percent television fee. You're at about 17 percent right there. The account wagering company also has to pay its own costs--Tote, tax, customer rewards or player marketing of a percent or two. You see that it adds up pretty close to the 20 percent of takeout. There's not a lot of money in that bet for an account wagering company. On the other hand, when you're outside of a source market area, say the customer lives 200 miles from the closest racetrack, now they don't have to pay that 7-percent source market fee.

The amount of money the account wagering company makes on that bet is much larger than the amount of money they make on a bet from a guy who lives across the street from a racetrack. The reason we believe that's the appropriate model for our industry is, if you are an account wagering company and you make very little when you take bets from someone close to the track, but you make a lot of money when you take bets from the guy who lives 200 miles away from the track, who are you going to market to? What customers are you going to try to build your business around? You're going to build around the guys who are 200 miles away from the track, right? To me, that's adding value to our industry. Maybe that guy gets into his car and drives four hours twice a year to go to the racetrack, but not more often because it's just too far away. But if the account wagering companies are marketing to him and he starts betting regularly through the Internet or telephone, that's money coming to the industry that it wouldn't have otherwise I think we want to reward the account wagering companies for that kind of wager.

How do the ADW companies feel about the model? SD: I have spent a lot of time talking with account wagering companies, trying to sell our racing content under the model I just outlined. And you know what happens when I try to do that? They tell me, 'You guys are charging too much, you guys are crazy, you guys don't leave us enough money. We need to make more money than that.' That's the God's honest truth. The account wagering companies that are not affiliated with TrackNet believe that we charge them too much. Of course, we don't charge them nearly as much as they'd be charged under the THG's model.

Why has TrackNet become the scapegoat in the issue? SD: I wish I knew why the horsemen have decided to take the action in the last couple of weeks that they've taken. They've been standing by while racetracks and ADW companies operated under 3.5 percent host fee contracts for years. Then TrackNet came along--and I'm not taking 100 percent of the credit for this, believe me. We've worked very closely with a lot of people, including horsemen, over the last 12 months. There have been a lot of people involved in trying to change the model, and we've been pretty successful going from 2- to 3.5-percent host fees up to 5- to 8-percent host fees. I think, as time goes on, the model's going to get better and better. Cont. p14

But I don't understand why TrackNet is under attack from the THG, when we're the ones who have been working with the horsemen to try and change the model. Keeneland opened three weeks ago, Evangeline Downs opened two weeks ago--off the top of my head, those are two that jump out at me that were not the focus of this kind of action. I believe this is a TrackNet focused issue; I think the horsemen came up with a strategy that they felt would work, and that was to exert as much pressure as they possibly could on TrackNet to get us to fold. If we gave in to their demands, they could then go push their demands over on everyone else.

What are the problems with the model proposed by the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Group?

SD: Let me give you what I see as five of the key problems.

- First of all, they want a simple approach and, in and of itself, I guess that's a noble objective. But I think it's somewhat unrealistic. They want a one-size-fits-all model, and we are not a one-size-fits-all industry. We are an industry of varying state regulations that we have to always take into account when we are structuring our business. Let me give you an example. The horsemen generally say they want a third of the takeout from every wager going to purses. Just to make the math simple, let's assume a 21-percent blended takeout. I'm going to talk about Lone Star, and that's a pretty accurate number for Lone Star. Under the horsemen's model, there would be 7 percent paid to purses. Then you have to look at the Texas regulations, and the Texas regulations say that when a racetrack inside of Texas sells its signal outside of Texas for wagering purposes, the horsemen get 37 percent of the revenue. The regulation goes on to say that the horsemen and the racetrack do not have the authority to negotiate a different split. Now Lone Star wants to sell its signal outside the state of Texas for an account wagering company to bet on, and the horsemen have said you cannot do that unless the horsemen get 7 percent for purses. Now you've got a mathematical problem. Now Lone Star has to sell its signal for a host fee of approximately 18 percent of handle so that the 37 percent mandated to the horsemen by Texas regulation equals the 7 percent of handle the horsemen demand. ADW companies had typically been paying 2- to 3.5- percent host fees. TrackNet and Magna and Churchill have been working very hard with the horsemen, with regulators, with others, and we're now up in the 5- to 8- percent range. But here we have the Texas horsemen saying, 'sell it for 18 percent or don't sell it at all.'
 - All horses in the *TDN* are bred in North America, unless otherwise indicated

- Let's go to a more traditional jurisdiction than Texas, where the host fee revenue split between the track and horsemen is a more traditional 50-50, or something close to it. Even in those jurisdictions, the fee you would have to charge the ADW companies now would have to go to 14 percent. You would give half to the horsemen, they get their 7 percent, they're happy; the track gets 7 percent, they're happy. But the ADW company is now paying 14 percent fees for all product, and on top of that 14 percent, the ADW companies have to pay their expenses, including television fees, Tote fees, and taxes. Furthermore, in many jurisdictions (such as California) the local regulations require source market fees that will bring the ADW company's share down to well below 7 percent. I'm not one to sit here and cry for the ADW companies, because I know the investment that the horsemen have in their horses, and how expensive that is, and I know how much money racetrack companies have invested in their racetracks. It makes the amount that the ADW companies have invested look very small. But they do have expenses, and if we can't let them pay those expenses and make a reasonable return, then they're going to just stop operating, and we're going to lose the revenue through that distribution channel. The economics of what the THG is proposing is unrealistic--I think it's infeasible for the ADW companies to do business under the THG model.
- I also think the THG is making a huge philosophical mistake by treating every bet the same no matter where it's placed. I've seen the horsemen, in a couple of their press releases, say when there's a bet at Lone Star Park, purses get 7 cents (on the dollar), and when there's a bet through account wagering, purses get 2 cents. I'm forgetting the exact numbers they quoted, but it's something like that. The person who comes to Lone Star and bets there on site, yes, you make more off that wager. But a lot of account wagering bets are coming from guys who are 3,000 miles from your racetrack. To me, I think it's unrealistic and unreasonable to say I want to make the same amount of money when somebody is sitting in Montana and bets on my race, as when somebody comes to my racetrack and bets on my race. My personal belief is that we want the ADW companies to make a decent profit when the people hundreds or thousands of miles away are betting on the races, because that's what gives them the incentive to go find those customers.

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- Whatever the business economic deal is that's ultimately reached, I think there's a major problem with the THG now demanding its own contracts with the guest sites. Under the federal law, the Interstate Horse Racing Act, and under the state law set up in relation to that federal law, you can look at how the simulcasting business has always been operated. The racetracks go out and sell their signals to all kinds of places--casinos, other racetracks, ADW companies. And under federal law, the horsemen have a consent right. They can say, 'Yes, we consent to that contract, go forward,' or, 'No, we don't consent to that; you can't go forward with that particular contract.' The horsemen are now demanding, as a condition of granting that consent, they have a direct contractual relationship with the guest site. That's the THG licensing agreement. It just doesn't work; it doesn't make sense. Say you start an ADW company--in the old days you would have had to negotiate a deal with the racetrack, and then the horsemen would either give consent or not. Now, to take a bet on one horse race, you've got to negotiate two separate contracts.
- Under the THG model, assuming you could get agreement on all of these different economic issues, and assuming you could somehow or other navigate through this bizarre scenario where two different people contract for the same thing, then the way the THG would have the deal work is to have a significant portion of the horsemen's money go directly to the THG, this national horsemen's organization. That money gets paid to them, and it goes into a big pot, that they control. You've got to understand just how vehemently opposed racetracks are to that concept. You've got to look at how the system works now. When Lone Star sells it signal, host fee revenue is paid to Lone Star, and Lone Star then divides it (63-37) with its horsemen. Part of the revenue goes to the track to operate and part of it goes in the track's purse account for the horsemen. Let's look at a source market fee--let's look at the Miami market. Let's assume that the bet on the Lone Star track took place in Miami--it was a Miami resident sitting in his Miami home who bet on the Lone Star race. Well, under our model, because that player was within 25 miles of Calder, there'd be a 7-percent source market fee paid to Calder. So 7 cents out of every dollar bet goes to Calder, and Calder splits it with its horsemen. Half of it goes to the racetrack and half of it goes to the Calder purse account for races run at Calder. That's how the system works now. Now let's look at the THG's model. A significant portion of what the horsemen are asking for goes to the THG, and the THG then decides how to allocate it. Let's go back to that example of the Miami bet on the Lone Star race. Let's assume that generates a stream of revenue to the THG.

The THG then has to decide--does this money go to the Florida horsemen or does this money go to the Texas horsemen? To me it seems like there's a big potential for the Texas horsemen and the Florida horsemen to get in a big fight over whose money that is. But let's assume for a minute that the Texas horsemen and the Florida horsemen reach agreement, and let's say the Texas horsemen say we're going to give 90 percent of it to Florida and 10 percent of it will go to Texas and we're happy with that. Who's to say that Lone Star and Calder agree to that? The purse money, while it's horsemen's money, is very important to racetracks, too. Why do the horsemen think that the racetracks are going to be comfortable with the purse split they come up with? And maybe it's going to be the other way, maybe Texas is going to get 90 percent and Florida is going to get 10 percent, but maybe Texas wants that purse money to go to Retama Park, not to Lone Star Park. Well that's not good for Lone Star; Lone Star's not going to agree to that.

I have worked a lot with Bob (Reeves, president of the THG) and I like Bob, and I've heard him say this a dozen times: 'The current model is too complicated--we need a simpler model. What's simpler than the THG's model?' But now that we've walked through this, and see how it really would work and how the different regulations work in Texas and then in Florida, and that you're going to have two people contracting for the same thing and you're going to have this whole other purse allocation issue that you've got to deal with, does this seem simpler to you?

One issue is the fact that it is so convenient to bet through an ADW company using your cell phone or blackberry, even if you are at the track, you might place your wager through the ADW company, which generates a lot less revenue for the racetracks and the horsemen. Is that a legitimate concern?

SD: That's a legitimate problem. I think we operate in a very, very complicated business environment, and I think that, with any model, you could create an example where that model doesn't work. I think people physically present at racetracks, betting through telephones to an ADW company, is a problem. One way we solve that problem is by making betting more convenient for our customers at the track. You'd better have enough mutuel clerks, so people don't have to wait in line very long, or you need people walking around with hand-held devices taking wagers, or, if they're big enough customers, they have their own hand-held devices. Many racetracks do that, but not all. And now I'm going to get up on my soapbox. Why don't we have better technology at racetracks for betting? At some racetracks, you walk up to a self-service machine and it looks like its 25 years old.

With today's technology, there's no reason you couldn't have a simple self-service machine at almost every table. Why is the technology so bad at most racetracks? Because for the last 20 or 30 years, every time a Tote contract has come up for renewal, we, as an industry, would go and do an RFP (request for proposal), and the Tote companies would come in with bids and the racetracks would always pick the lowest bidder. The percentage that the Tote companies make as their payment is .0000 something of the handle. We've squeezed the Tote companies down so low, they really haven't invested in technology and they really don't have the ability to upgrade the technology at the track. They have the technology, they know how to do it, but there's not enough money in their contract to justify it.

Do you see the same trend in the way the industry deals with the ADW companies?

SD: That is what I'm so worried about. We are at a turning point for the industry because advance deposit wagering is the bright spot; it's the growth area. We really have the opportunity to take advantage of this, and help move our product off the racetrack and into people's homes. We can make it more convenient and, hopefully, pick up a lot of new bettors in the process. But if we squeeze the ADW companies to such low margins, under the THG's model, then they aren't going to invest. They aren't going to have the best technology; they're not going to market. They're going to go for the low-hanging fruit, and we're going to miss this growth opportunity.

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Just like we squeezed Tote companies to such low margins that they couldn't invest in technology, we're going to squeeze the ADW companies to such low margins that they're not going to invest and we're going to let this whole opportunity pass us by. Technology is all around us and we've got to adopt it, but it does cost money. I think we need to strike a balance--the racetracks and horsemen have huge investments and certainly need more of the revenue, but we've got to leave enough money on the table for the ADW companies so that they have an incentive to build a business.

Is there any advantage to dealing with a national group such as THG, rather than individual horsemen's groups? SD: Mostly we want to deal with people who understand the business, who have an open mind, who are willing to be flexible and consider different issues. We can work together, tracks and horsemen, to move the industry forward. Whether that's one national group or whether it's individual horsemen's groups, it's more important to me how they deal and how they cooperate as opposed to whom it is. Right now, the problem I see with the THG is that they've just been intransigent in their one-third model. They have, I think, so much personally invested in the concept, that it's hard for them to hear that there are problems with it. As we were negotiating on the Lone Star signal and then on the Calder signal, we at TrackNet--and it was really on behalf of the racetracks--we as racetracks said, 'OK, you don't like what we're charging the ADW companies; we'll charge them even more than we were planning on. We'll bump the rates up and I think I can get the ADW companies to agree to that,' and they said no. Every time we made a move, they said it's got to be the one-third model. To me, that's not a productive way to try to solve this problem.

Where is the light at the end of the tunnel?


SD: I don't know. I'm sure an answer is out there, but right now I don't know how to find it.

CHRISTMAS COMES EARLY FOR CARROLL

Just five days before the 134th running of the GI Kentucky Derby, trainer David Carroll still did not know if there would be room at the inn. Carroll's Derby hopeful **Denis of Cork** (Harlan's Holiday) was 21st on the graded earnings list, one away from making the overflow field of 20, and the 48-year-old Irishman was trying to be philosophical. "I had resigned myself to the

fact that he wasn't going to be able to run," Carroll said yesterday morning after guiding young Denis through a gallop around the Churchill oval. "I was starting to live with that. But it was the most frustrating feeling. It was human error that was going to cost us, not equine error." Perfect in his first three starts, Denis of Cork captured the GIII Southwest S., and was slated to follow up in the GIII Rebel S. and GII Arkansas Derby, But, heeding advisors who felt the colt would be better served by a lighter schedule, owner William K. Warren called an audible that instead sent the bay to the GII Illinois Derby. A fifthplace finish as the even-money

choice at Hawthorne left the Florida-bred with a graded bankroll that very nearly came up short. To make matters worse, he bounced out of the race in the best shape of his life. "[Denis] never showed up [in Illnois], but it was just a throw out," Carroll said. "He trained beautifully after that race--and that made it even more difficult to take. He was absolutely fantastic, getting better every day. To have him peaking and not have the opportunity to run in the Derby--it was starting to really aggravate me." But the luck was with the Irish this time. A late defection put Denis of Cork in the Derby field and his trainer on Cloud 9. "This means everything to me, to my staff, to my family, to the owners," the elated horseman said. Carroll served an apprenticeship at the Irish National Stud and worked for trainer John Oxx in his native country. He was just 25 when he headed to the U.S. from tiny Kildalkey in County Meath. "I didn't really know what I wanted to do when I first came here," Carroll admitted. "I just knew there was a lack of opportunity in Ireland--the economy was terrible." After working at Taylor Made Farm for a year, he decided the racetrack was really where he wanted to be, and for the next six years worked for trainer Shug McGaughey. Carroll was the exercise rider for Easy Goer when he ran second as the Derby favorite in 1989. "It was great to be involved in that," said Carroll, who took out his training license in 1992. "It was a very exciting time. But this is more exciting. You work so hard, and you rarely get a horse of this caliber. It's great to get this far...and you just never know where it might lead."

CONS: Has twice won over the turf, and his Lane's End win came over the Polytrack...Only start over conventional dirt was a ninth, beaten 17 lengths, in the GII Fountain of Youth S., but Motion dismisses those surface concerns. "You'd be pretty unlucky to breed a horse to A.P. Indy and not get a horse that can handle the dirt," the trainer said. PEDIGREE: Adriano could provide A.P. DERBY, OAKS, TURF CLASSIC WAGERING ALLOWED ON TWIN SPIRES, XPRESSBET Offi-

cials at Churchill Downs announced yesterday that wagering on Friday's GI Kentucky Oaks and Saturday's GI Woodford Reserve Turf Classic and GI Kentucky Derby would be accepted at TwinSpires.com, the official advance deposit wagering platform for Churchill Downs Incorporated [the 'Company', and Xpressbet. com. The Kentucky Kentucky Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association (KYHBPA) and the Kentucky Thoroughbred Association (KTA) have blocked distribution of the remaining Churchill Downs signal to ADW providers, including TwinSpires.com and Xpressbet.com. "We are disappointed that the Kentucky horsemen have chosen to prevent horse racing fans from wagering on Churchill Downs races during the most important weekend for the horse racing industry," said Churchill Downs President Steve Sexton. "Wagering on the Kentucky Oaks and Kentucky Derby race day cards helps to supplement purses throughout the year at Churchill Downs Racetrack. The action of the horsemen's representatives today will have a negative impact on purses for the entire year." He continued, "We are perplexed that the horsemen would seek to penalize the ADW distribution channel. Since the Company's entry into the ADW business, we have successfully negotiated higher host fees paid by ADW businesses to our racetracks and horsemen partners. Both groups have benefited. "Fortunately, wagering on the Kentucky Derby, Kentucky Oaks and Woodford Reserve will be allowed under prior agreements." According to a release from Churchill Downs, representatives of the KYHBPA have rejected all offers from the track and have referred further discussions to the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Group (THG), led by Bob Reeves, who also sits on the board of the Ohio HBPA. Added Sexton, "Kentucky takes great pride in billing itself as the horse capital of the world. On Tuesday, we were encouraged by the discussions with KYHBPA representatives. On Wednesday, our offer was rejected, but neither the KYHBPA nor the KTA could tell us what was needed to resolve this issue. Today, the Kentucky horsemen have told us that if we want to send our ADW signal to the rest of the country, then we have to negotiate with and get permission from horsemen representing them in Ohio."



TATTERSALLS GUINEAS BREEZE-UP SALE

TODAY A fortnight after Tattersalls' record-breaking Craven Breeze-Up Sale, which featured an unprecedented 40 six-figure transactions, the Newmarket company hosts its 163-lot Guineas Breeze-Up today, beginning at noon. The Guineas Breeze-Up was added to the Tattersalls calendar last year, when it featured a pair of 90,000gns sales toppers, and most of the big vendors are represented today. The two-year-olds worked on the Rowley Mile track yesterday morning, and among those that impressed gallop watchers were several from Willie Browne's Mocklershill Stables, which topped the Craven Breeze-Up with a 540,000gns Mr. Greeley filly. The Co. Tipperary consignor is the best-represented vendor with 21 lots catalogued, including Lot 36, a Johannesburg colt out of Caramel Queen (NZ) (Turbulent Dancer), who cost \$150,000 as a yearling at Keeneland in January 2007; and Lot 95, a Johar colt who was bought for \$40,000 as a weanling at Keeneland two months earlier. Lot 127, a Dr Fong colt bred by trainer Mark Johnston and Mount Coote Stud, was another Mocklershill standout, as was the very last youngster to work, Lot 159, a speedy Choisir (Aus) colt who was withdrawn from the Goffs Kempton Park breeze-up in March. He made €62,000 as a yearling. Mocklershill's Lot 81, a Danetime (Ire) (Danehill) colt who made €110,000 in September, heads to Newmarket with one of the dearest yearling price tags, although Lot 72, a Green Desert colt, made 120,000gns as a foal, but only half that in October. Similarly, Lot 79--an Elusive Quality half-brother to GII Arkansas Derby winner Private Emblem (Our Emblem)-was a \$170,000 RNA at Keeneland in September, but cost \$150,000 as a weanling. Con Marnane's Bansha House Stables are also well represented and should make an early impact with Lot 11, I Give My Best (Black Mambo), a filly who cost \$10,000 at Ocala in August. Lot 94, a first-crop Pyrus (Mr. Prospector) colt, was one of several other Bansha House offerings to impress. Lot 30, a Dansili (GB) half-brother to G2 Royal Lodge S. winner Leo (GB) (Pivotal {GB}) bred by Hascombe and Valiant Studs, went well as part of Malcolm Bastard's draft, while Lot 130, an Elnadim half-sister to G2 Lennox S. winner Tariq (GB) (Kyllachy (GB)), was another well-bred two-year-old to put in a good display when representing Tony O'Callaghan's Tally-Ho Stud.

Lot 105, a U.S.-bred Galileo (Ire) filly who cost \$90,000 as a yearling, showed up well when offered from Mark Dwyer's Oaks Farm Stables, while Lot 113, a daughter of the same sire consigned from Norman Williamson's Oak Tree Farm looked a smart long-term prospect. Locally based vendor Emma O'Gorman looks to have a good draft with Lot 40, a first-crop Exceed And Excel (Aus) (Danehill) filly working impressively with her consignor in the saddle. "We've got a strong catalogue and there were some smart breezes yesterday morning," said Tattersalls Marketing Director Jimmy George, "We hope to build on the foundations laid at the inaugural Guineas Breeze-Up Sale and that the strong Craven Breeze-Up will have a positive impact today."
