It will be post seven for IEAH Stable and Paul Pompa, Jr.'s **Big Brown** (Boundary) in Saturday's GI Preakness

S. at Pimlico. The GI Kentucky Derby hero, who bucked 79 years of history when he captured the Run for the Roses after breaking from post 20, gets a much more manageable post for the second leg of the Triple Crown, at least historically speaking. Thus far, 11 Preakness winners have left from stall seven.

Pimlico odds-maker Frank Carulli installed Big Brown as the heavy 1-2 favorite. At the Preakness draw, IEAH president Michael lavarone confirmed that stud plans for the two-time Grade I winner would likely be announced today, and that Big Brown would definitely be retired after his three-year-old year. 'CASINO' TO RETURN TO JAPAN AFTER BELMONT

Casino Drive (Mineshaft) exited a 5 3/4-length score in last Saturday's GII Peter Pan S. in good order and is poised to take on all comers in the 1 1/2-mile GI Belmont S. June 7. "He is happy; he loves it here and is doing well," said Nobutaka Tada, managing director of Globe Equine Management Ltd. "We always felt he was a good horse, and he showed his ability the other day. We are hoping Big Brown wins [in the Preakness] on Saturday. We think the Belmont will be a very exciting race for everyone." Win or lose, the striking colt will return to Japan to prepare for a fall campaign, which will culminate with a start during the Breeders' Cup, contested during Santa Anita's Oak Tree meeting Oct. 25-26. "If we stay beyond 60 days [in the U.S.], then we face three months of quarantine in Japan," explained Tada. "So, he is going back to Japan after the Belmont." Stablemate Spark Candle (A.P. Indy), who finished sixth in the Peter Pan, will not run in the Belmont, "He came out of the race well, and we have some options with him," added Tada. "We might go on the turf in the [GIII] Hill Prince S. [June 6] or we might keep him on the dirt."

OVER AND OUT?

Twice Over (GB) (Observatory) has quickly become one of the season's talking horses, and his presence in today's G2 Dante S. at York will provide the main focus if trainer Henry Cecil gives the green light. Khalid Abdullah's G3 Craven S. winner has never encountered firm ground, and Cecil is concerned about the likely quick conditions on the Knavesmire. "He hits the ground hard and the ground will need to be safe," Cecil told PA Sport. "He wouldn't want it like a road." Cecil has saddled seven Dante winners over the course of his career. Twice Over has won thrice on good ground, most recently when besting Raven's Pass in the Apr. 17, and connections are keen to keep this date after bypassing the 2000 Guineas. "As long as there is no jar, the horse is likely to run," the owner/breeder's Racing Manager Teddy Grimthorpe added. "The aim is to run. I would think we will look at the racing [Wednesday] and look at it [tomorrow], and then make a decision." Cont. p6



Will Good Be Bad for Brown?

Up until yesterday, **Big Brown** has had some exceptionally poor luck drawing post positions. He drew post 12 for the Mar. 29 GI Florida Derby at Gulfstream, regarded by many as the kiss of death since no horse

had won from there since the track was reconfigured a few years ago. He put his doubters to rest with a five-length tally that earned him favoritism for the May 5 GI Kentucky Derby. His post there? The right-next-to-the-hotdog-vendor post 20. IEAH President Michael lavarone laughed yesterday at the

Preakness draw when asked about landing a favorable spot in the starting gate Saturday. "I don't know," he said. "He gets to save some ground for the first time. I'm not sure if that's a good thing or a bad thing. We'll find out." lavarone added that the IEAH team is still riding high after Big Brown's Derby romp. "For the first six days, we were still trying to figure out what happened, but for the last six days reality set in and it's been incredible, being able to share this with our family and friends," he said. But he added that a win in the Preakness is not assured by any stretch, regardless of what the toteboard says. "It's two weeks rest, and like any other Kentucky Derby winner you're going to face a bunch of new shooters in the race," lavarone said. "We all know how tough it is to win the Kentucky Derby and come back in two weeks and win the Preakness." Before leaving for Maryland yesterday on an afternoon flight that was delayed about two hours, Big Brown made one more visit to the track at Churchill Downs Wednesday morning. Trainer Richard Dutrow, Jr. said the colt went out for a gallop with his regular exercise rider, Michelle Nevin. "It was just a regular gallop," Dutrow said. "He went good." Dutrow added that he has scrapped a plan to give the colt a short breeze late in the week at Pimlico. Big Brown will gallop up to the race. "It's just what I want to see," he said. "Everything is good with him."

Gayego A Go...

Hollywood Park-based trainer Paulo Lobo put Gayego (Gilded Time) on a plane at 5 a.m. Wednesday, confident that his GII Arkansas Derby winner would have no problems enduring the cross-country flight from Los Angeles to Baltimore. The flight to BWI Airport was Gayego's third shipping experience in five weeks, as he first shipped to Oaklawn and back for the Arkansas Derby, then to Louisville and back for the Kentucky Derby. "He's a very good shipper," said Lobo, who expects to join his Preakness hopeful late Thursday. "He's a very, very calm horse and he's a very, very good eater. He's a big strong horse."

Baker High on Kentucky Bear...

At the Preakness draw yesterday, trainer Reade Baker expressed the same confidence he's shown all week in his lightly raced Kentucky Bear (Mr. Greeley), who ran third in the GI Blue Grass S. At Keeneland. "Big Brown beat a lot of good horses [in the Derby], but he didn't beat Kentucky Bear," said Baker. Yesterday, Kentucky Bear galloped twice around the Pimlico oval under exercise rider Cassie Garcia, who said the chestnut was "awesome." Baker said that he's seen a noticeable improvement in Kentucky Bear since his last race, "From the Blue Grass, he's really developed and put on weight," said Baker, "There's no grass to graze on in Florida, and once he got to the grass at Keeneland and Churchill, the horse has been doing phenomenal." Kentucky Bear, who has had only three career starts and was unraced at two, has had three five-furlong works since the Apr. 12 Blue Grass, one each at Churchill Downs (:59.60, muddy), Keeneland (:59, fast) and at Pimlico (1:01, sloppy). "Works obviously can be deceiving, but he was really coasting in those works," said Baker, who will saddle his first Preakness runner.

Three-time listed winner Assertive, third in the G2 Diadem S. at Ascot in September, closed last term with an off-the-board run in the G3 Bentinck S. at Newmarket the following month; it was his 15th attempt at pattern level. He just missed when runner-up in a blanket finish to the Apr. 17 Listed Abernant S. at Newmarket in his seasonal return, but he refused to buckle at the business end of this contest to register a career high. Moving sweetly on the tail of the leading quartet through the early fractions, the chestnut took aim at the guarter-mile marker, led at the distance and was driven out from there to prevail in determined fashion. "He's won [and been placed] in a stack of listed races and has always been there or thereabouts in group races," said winning rider Ryan Moore. "Today went pretty well as I got a lovely tow off Beckermet and, if anything, I got there too soon as he idled a bit once getting to the front. The boss has done a great job to keep him going for so long and still willing to do it. He's a game old horse."

Lush Lashes hit the jackpot when garnering the Parknasilla Hotel Goffs Fillies Million on debut at The Curragh last September, but found the deep mud too much of a hindrance when returning to run seventh in the G3 Park Express S. at the Co. Kildare venue in her sophomore bow Mar. 30. Noted for her closing rally when finishing a close-up sixth in the May 4 G1 1000 Guineas S. at Newmarket last time, she appreciated this firmer strip to trounce the opposition and claim a first pattern-race score. Keeping the leaders within range in fifth, the bay filly eased closer in early straight and broke loose once taking over inside the final quarter mile to outclass her rivals by daylight. "She did it very easy, considering there wasn't much early pace and that they quickened up a long way from home," explained jockey Kevin Manning. "There are no question marks about her getting a mile and a half." Trainer Jim Bolger issued a note of caution with regard to her participation in the June 6 G1 Epsom Oaks as representative Ger Flynn revealed, "Speaking to the boss on the phone just now, he said... Epsom and The Curragh are both on the cards. We'll see how she is when we get her home, but it's more likely to be The Curragh [the July 13 G1 Irish Oaks]." Click for the Racing Post chart.

Godolphin, who first collected this trophy in 1995 with Classic Cliche (Ire) and followed up with Moon Ballad (GB) seven years later, put forward a duo in Young Pretender and Co "TDN Rising Star" Co McCartney. The former was trained by John Gosden when winning the G3 Prix la Rochette at Longchamp in September and subsequently fifth in that track's G1 Prix Jean-Luc Lagardere on Arc day. McCartney, who was impressive when winning Doncaster's G2 Champagne S. for the Mark Johnston yard, may have been past his best when only seventh in the G1 Dewhurst S. at Newmarket in October. "Young Pretender is in good form and I am happy with him," trainer Saeed bin Suroor commented. "It will be a tough race to win, but we are looking forward to a good performance from him on his first start for us. The 10-furlong trip should be no problem for him. McCartney does not show us a great deal at home, but he is fit and ready. We are looking forward to a good run from him. I think the step up in distance could suit him."

John Gosden, who saddled Benny the Dip to win this en route to Epsom Derby success in 1997, relies on Michael O'Flynn's Centennial. That grey colt toughed it out on his sophomore bow in the Apr. 26 G3 Sandown Classic Trial. Sir Michael Stoute's four winners include subsequent Blue Riband heroes Shahrastani and North Light (Ire), and he will be hoping that Ballymacoll Stud's "TDN Rising Star" Tartan Bearer can improve off his Leicester maiden win Apr. 26 to make an impact.



What are some positive steps racing should take in the wake of the Eight Belles tragedy, both for the safety of the horses and in light of the mounting public criticism of the sport?

The death of Eight Belles--tragic and unintentional--was met by outrage by the American public, a public which is this week discovering that we routinely and intentionally send thousands more thoroughbreds to a cruel and inhumane death every single year in the slaughterhouse.

Monday night on HBO, Real Sports premiered a segment on horse slaughter, the first of several airings of this program. We have been told that a major American newspaper is planning a similar story. In July 2008, the New York Governors Task Force will hold a muchneeded public forum on the issue of retired racehorses. This issue is in the forefront of racing's current public perception hurdles.

Much has been written over the past few days about initiatives to make the sport safer for its equine participants during their racing careers. Any of these moves, of course, would be welcome and are clearly needed. That said, it is clear that these initiatives will take time and may be problematic to enforce in racing's decentralized circumstances.

In every state in the U.S. where horses were being slaughtered, the public and the legislatures overwhelmingly voted to shut them down. This is a trend that can be expected to continue as the American public is growing increasingly more concerned about animal welfare. If the federal legislation passes, transportation of horses to Canada and Mexico for slaughter will be illegal and for all intents and purposes, there will be no market to which trainers and owners can send their racehorses to be slaughtered. Why wait for this and allow thousands of Thoroughbreds to be transported to Canada and Mexico for a gruesome inhumane death?

The issue of humane retirement, however, can be addressed instantly and effectively through fairly simple measures. A national task force similar to the New York Governor's Task Force on Retired Racehorses is the first step. Racing can be proactive and take a stand to protect its retired athletes. Certain tracks have begun to take steps in the right direction: Suffolk Downs funds a TRF program to protect the horses on its backstretch, Penn National is working on such a program, Philadelphia Park recently announced its program and the Finger Lakes is in its third year of a similar program for horse adoption.

Many owners are responsible and plan for the retirement of their racehorses, but most are not able to or willing to do the same--especially at the lower level tracks where the horses are most at risk. It is for this reason that the Unwanted Horse Coalition model of 'promoting responsible ownership' does not relate to the racing business.

If the NTRA plans to market horse racing as a safe and humane sport, it will not pass muster without definitive action on the issue of funding racehorse retirement. There is no shortage of facilities and jobs in which to place retired racehorses--just the funds to care for them. Many should be humanely euthanized at retirement rather than have to suffer the trip to slaughter with an injury as is often the case.

It doesn't speak well of our industry that we can't, or won't, take care of our own. Don't do it because the eyes of the world are upon us. Do it because it's the right thing to do.

Since other forms of spectator entertainment became readily available, Thoroughbred racing has been slouching into oblivion. Our Establishment, in all it's manifestations--The Jockey Club, NTRA, Breeders' Cup, et al--has failed to arrest the decline. Conclusion, the Establishment is a failure. The people who make their living in the Thoroughbred industry must rise up and take over. Nothing except a revolution can save us. It can be "bloodless," if those in power admit their failures and depart.

Faced with our worst media exposure on record, what does The Jockey Club do? Appoints a committee which, except for Larry Bramlage, is typically the same old gang mustered to appear on every occasion of crisis. They will meet, talk and report; and that will be the end of it. The NTRA, instead of taking the lead, defers to The Jockey Club. Same old, same old, never prepared with an immediate response for foreseeable situations. Always wavering, vacillating, uncertain.

"If the trumpet give an uncertain sound, who shall prepare himself for battle?" 1 Corinthians, XIV, 8

As Oliver Cromwell told a British Parliament, "You have sat here too long for any good you might do. In God's name -- GO."

What we need now is leaders, not figureheads.

I went to the meeting in Louisville [Tuesday] night (see related story ATW p1) and was blown away by the lack of understanding many in our industry have of this situation. I started to get up and speak many times, but realized that I was 10 years younger than anyone in the room (which was also appalling). Here is what I took from the meeting.

All of us in the Thoroughbred industry have a duty to understand what is going on, and after going to the THG meeting in Louisville it is blatantly obvious many do not. Our business will not survive without one unified group that negotiates for the best interest of the horsemen. TOBA, NYRA, even the Breeders' Cup, while all have good intentions, none has any leverage.

The HBPAs hold the only card, they control the the ADW signals. They also understand that they don't have the the negotiating skills or money necessary to hire the kind of attorneys we need to represesnt us while negotiating with the likes of Churchill and Magna. THG is trying to create a nationally unified group of all HBPAs. Everyone in our industry must back this group and push everyone they know in any state that has not already joined to do just that. HBPAs are historically run by trainers, and that is just plain ridiculous. Not because trainers don't understand the issues, but because all a racetrack does when a trainer says something they don't like is cut his stalls. The other reason is even more simplistic. Trainers are not skilled negotiators.

I listened to members of the KHBPA and TOBA explain to the crowd of horsemen what they are doing-we get nothing from ADW's and we all know that. So the only rational course of action is to shut down the ADWs until they are willing to negotiate. Churchill's response was to cut purses and if you did not see that coming, you simply ignored the fact that it was their only obvious retaliation. Here is where the problem lies. A large majority of the horsemen want a quick fix and that simply won't happen. We are crying about a 20percent purse cut and are acting like we can't survive a week with it in effect. I guarantee you that every trainer and owner in that meeting has gone through long dry spells without a win. Point being, you will survive two months, six months even a year of purse cuts if it gets this ADW situation sorted out properly and forces tracks to give horsemen what they deserve. We won't survive when 10 years from now when ADWs make up 50 percent of overall money wagered and the horsemen get none of it.

During the meeting, Bill Casner pointed out that horsemen incur \$2 billion in expenses and that doesn't include the cost to acquire the horses themselves. Gross annual purses amount to \$1 billion. That makes it blatantly obvious that we're not trying to be irrational and we deserve a fair percentage of this.

One very significant owner, who has traditionally worn his emotions on his sleeves, brought up a boycott of racing and the crowd applauded. This is completely ludicrous. It will lead to a quickly scraped-together cure and the horsemen will be left with the short end of the stick. Once that is done, we are done, because we have then set a precedent that cannot be redesigned. We missed the boat when we allowed racetracks to sell simulcasting signals in the 80's for pennies and have been fighting an uphill battle ever since. Proof that if you allow yourself to be exploited in the beginning you will never be able to change that exploitation.

Tracks are going to portray us as greedy villains. Just read letters to the editor in the *Daily Racing Form* and it is obvious they are succeeding. Gamblers are funnelling their anger to horsemen because they can't bet. It's time we explained to the average gambler who the real villain is: the racetracks. It should be obvious, they are big corporations and their CEO's are paid to make as much money as possible for their shareholders. They don't care about us, they would drop us in a minute if they could prove that the public would bet just as munch on billy goats as they do on horses.

I was warned not to put my name of this letter because the likes of Churchill and Magna can make my life miserable. The way things are right now, I'll never be able to buy a box at Churchill and I sure as hell won't ever be able to afford putting a horse in training!

The point is that any quick decision will not be in our best interest. There's no cure-all. This has to be addressed and thought out and proper negotiations need to take place to make if fair for everyone.

ZITO WEIGHS IN ON TRACK DEBATE In the wake over Eight Belles' breakdown in the Kentucky Derby, there have been calls for the continued progression to synthetic tracks. Hall of Fame trainer Nick Zito, who has been skeptical of synthetic tracks, addressed the issue at Pimlico yesterday. "As you know, I'm a dirt-track guy," he said. "Eight Belles is going to come up over and over this week. You know just as well as I do, or better, it's more than the tracks. My thing right now is to try to protect the dirt surfaces as good as we can." Zito said he did some personal research on the recent Oaklawn Park meeting, where from some 4,600 starters, there were only five breakdowns (one a seven-year-old, one a nine-year-old) during the meet that went from Jan. 18 to Apr. 11--a 30-percent drop from last season. "They resurfaced the track this winter," Zito said. "They also installed an on-site soil analysis lab." Zito said the entire cost of the resurface and lab operation was roughly \$100,000. "If [Oaklawn] can do something like that with that least [amount of] money, there should be more research into dirt. I'm here to protect the game," said Zito.

CHURCHILL SUES KHBPA. KTA Churchill Downs Incorporated, Churchill Downs Technology Initiatives Company and Calder Race Course Inc. have filed suit against the Kentucky Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association (KHBPA), the Kentucky Thoroughbred Association (KTA) and officers of each organization. Submitted to the United States District Court for the Western District of Kentucky, the suit alleges violations under the Sherman Antitrust Act and is the result of the refusal of the KHBPA and the KTA to approve the distribution of the Churchill simulcast signal to national advance deposit-wagering operations (ADWs) and Calder Race Course. The suit requests that the defendants be prevented from boycotting racetracks and ADW operators that do not comply with their demands, which include uniform terms for the pricing of racing signals. "It is in the best interest of our racetrack, our horsemen and certainly our customers for the Churchill Downs signal to be made available to racing fans throughout the country," said Steve Sexton, executive vice president of Churchill Downs Incorporated. "Unfortunately, our negotiations with Kentucky horsemen have not advanced. We still have not heard from them what they are looking for, other than to be pointed to representatives in Ohio. The KHBPA and KTA continue to block the Churchill Downs signal from being offered to national ADW platforms and Calder, despite the fact that since our entry into the ADW business last year we have nearly doubled host fees paid by ADW businesses to our racetracks and horsemen partners." This suit amends a complaint filed Apr. 24 against the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Group (THG), the Florida HBPA and those respective officers over their refusal to export the signal from Calder Race Course to out-of-state OTBs.

MAGNA FIRES DRAGONE Chris Dragone, who was hired six months ago as president of the Maryland Jockey Club, has been fired by Magna Entertainment and replaced by Tom Chuckas, longtime president of Rosecroft Raceway. "Dragone, he was a nice fella, but it might have been maybe too much for him," Magna Chairman Frank Stronach told the Washington Post from Moscow. "[Chuckas] had more experience. We have in mind he will play a greater role. It happened he was available." Chuckas has been serving as an advisor to Stronach since May 1. Dragone, who replaced the Lou Raffetto, will stay on through Preakness weekend, Pimlico's signature event. "Right now, I'm president of the Maryland Jockey Club, and my focus is 100 percent on the Preakness," Dragone told the Post.

KENTUCKY HORSEMEN PRESENT UNITED

FRONT The Kentucky Horsemens' Benevolent and Protective Association hosted a forum at the Executive Inn East in Louisville Tuesday evening, encouraging the approximately 150 horsemen on hand to stand their ground in the ongoing stalemate with Churchill Downs regarding revenue sharing from advance deposit wagering (ADW) platforms. In spite of the recent 20-percent cut in overnight purses at the Louisville oval, horsemen remain nearly unanimous in their refusal to distribute the simulcast signal to ADWs. "I don't see horsemen wavering whatsoever on this issue," commented Marty Maline, executive director of the Kentucky HBPA. "The main purpose of the meeting was to provide information to our membership, regarding not only ADWs, but also what we feel is an unwarranted significant purse decrease at Churchill Downs. Those were the two issues we wanted to explain to horsemen so they could get a better understanding of why this action was taken, and secondly what our ideas will be regarding the purse decrease." Maline suggested that horsemen learned their lesson back in the early days of simulcasting, when they allowed the racetracks to negotiate deals on the cheap. "[The horsemen] recognize that this is the growth of our industry and as [HBPA President] Rick [Hiles] mentioned, we were kind of caught flat-footed with simulcasting. We allowed the racetracks to negotiate the deals for simulcasting and at that point, everybody saw that as new-found money. Now, whereas most of our betting was on track, now 85 percent of it is simulcasting, of which we get a very small percentage. If indeed ADWs are going in a similar direction, horsemen obviously need a more equitable share of that revenue." Maline remains optimistic that a deal can be reached, but that Churchill Downs should not expect a significant shift in the HBPA's position. "We're hoping that Churchill and [Churchill's ADW platform] TrackNet will recognize that horsemen are firm in their resolve regarding this issue, and that they will sit down and work out a reasonable approach to this new revenue," he stated. "We hope Churchill makes as much money as they can [with TrackNet], but we can't continue to operate under a scenario whereby the handle is growing tremendously, while our purses are decreasing. If horsemen are going to continue to operate in this business with rising expenses, we just need a larger share of the revenue." Also present at the meeting was Bob Reeves, president of the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Group, which represents 18 horsemen's group. From his standpoint, it was mission accomplished Tuesday night. "I thought it was a very good meeting and the feedback that I got following was all positive and people were thanking me for what we're doing," Reeves commented. "I don't see any panic among the horsepeople. I would use the word resolved. They are resolved to do what they have to do and see this thing out. They just want what's fair."

NTRA REPORT FROM CAPITOL HILL

FARM BILL CONFERENCE REPORT PASSES HOUSE

On Wednesday, the Farm Bill conference report was brought to the House floor for debate and vote, where it passed 318 to 106. The Senate will vote next. Congress has given itself until May 16 to finish the bill.

It is expected the Senate also will approve the final version of the Farm Bill and send it to the President for approval. Senate Finance ranking member Charles Grassley (R-IA) has indicated he will work to override a likely presidential veto. Like the House, which reached the necessary 2/3 majority of members present and voting to support an override, Grassley predicted the Senate would reach the 66 votes it needs as well.

The Farm Bill includes language to amend the depreciation schedule for racehorses and also makes equine farmers and ranchers eligible for emergency federal loans following a disaster. Horse breeders previously have not been eligible for these loans, while other livestock producers have been.




