GINGER PUNCH TAKES ANOTHER SWING

Trainer Bobby Frankel took back-to-back editions of the GI Ogden Phipps H. in 2003-'04 with Sightseek, and nearly added a third renewal last year when Ginger Punch (Awesome Again) ran Take D' Tour to a neck in

what was essentially a two-horse affair. Ginger Punch more than made amends for the loss, however, earning a divisional championship after capturing four of her next five in 2007, including the GI Go For Wand H., GI Ruffian H. and GI Breeders' Cup Distaff. Ginger Punch picked up right were she left off by annexing the Sunshine Millions Distaff in January and, despite a disappointing third to Zenvatta in the GI Apple Blossom H. in April, showed she's still Ginger Punch at the Breeders' Cup the best older filly on the East Coast with a driving win in the GII Louisville S.

at Churchill May 2. Now she and Frankel are back for a second go in Saturday's Ogden Phipps at Belmont, and the Hall of Fame conditioner is feeling confident. "Physically, she looks better than she did last year," commented Frankel. "She's been training well." Seven fillies were entered for the 1 1/16-mile Phipps, including Ginger Punch's stablemate Spring Waltz (Silver Charm), whom Frankel said he entered as a precaution. Ginger Punch will tote 123 pounds and will spot her rivals from four to nine pounds. Last Saturday, on Belmont Stakes day, Ginger Punch went six furlongs in 1:12.30 in advance of the Phipps.

CURLIN CALM, ASMUSSEN EXCITED

A relaxed Curlin (Smart Strike) visited the paddock at Churchill Downs yesterday before the fifth race for a bit of schooling in advance of Saturday's GI Stephen Foster H. The reigning Horse of the Year, who will make his first start since capturing the Mar. 29 G1 Dubai World Cup, didn't turn a hair as a young lady petted his nose. The colt's trainer was more animated as he talked about launching the second half of Curlin's four-year-old campaign. "I'm very anxious to run him," admitted Steve Asmussen Thursday morning. "He's a very exciting horse to be around, and this is his purpose. He's very dialed-in." Asmussen said that he was at Churchill Downs when Street Cry (Ire), another World Cup hero, romped by 6 1/2 lengths in the Stephen Foster, and said that he planned Curlin's trip to Dubai with the Godolphin runner in mind. Prior to his World Cup win, Curlin was sent out to victory in a Nad Al Sheba handicap. "He [Street Cry] had a prep before the World Cup and then ran dynamite in it," Asmussen said. "I was here that day for his Stephen Foster, and wow! I thought, 'Oh, my goodness.' So that form influenced us in going over there and spending the time, because I thought that horse had the best performance off winning the World Cup."

DUKE HEADS PRINCE OF WALES'S 18

Susan Magnier's and Michael Tabor's Duke of Marmalade (Ire) (Danehill), already successful twice at the highest level this term, heads a maximum field of 18 still eligible for next Wednesday's G1 Prince of Wales's S. at Royal Ascot. Leading a Ballydoyle guartet, the four-year-old bids to follow up successes in the Apr. 27 G1 Prix Ganay and May 25 G1 Tattersalls Gold Cup. Michael Ryan's dual G1 1000 Guineas heroine Finsceal Beo (Ire) (Mr. Greeley), back to form with a runner-up finish in the latter of those contests, also remains a contender and will seek revenge in the £375,000 10-furlong event if she bypasses Tuesday's G1 Queen Anne S. Godolphin still have Happy Boy (Brz) (Ski Champ) and Literato (Fr) (Kendor (Fr)) engaged and other possibles include France's sole entry Loup Breton (Ire) (Anabaa) and G1 St Leger heroes Sixties Icon (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) and Lucarno (Dynaformer). Patrick Fahey's Ask (GB) (Sadler's Wells), a last-out winner of the Apr. 25 G3 Gordon Richards S. at Sandown, has attracted recent support in the ante-post betting and is a likely starter according to connections. "I have been away and it's entirely up to the trainer and the weather, but the owner did tell me that he has spoken to Sir Michael Stoute and he's been entered and hopefully he'll run," Fahey's racing manager Simon Christian told Racing Post. "He's been entered and I would imagine he'll run if it's not too firm and any rain would be appreciated. He seems effective over 10 and 12 furlongs and gets 12 furlongs well, but if conditions are in his favour over 10 [furlongs], a fast run race on decent ground, he is effective."

Antipodeans Respond to Drugs Challenge...

Australian trainers Joe Janiak and Peter Moody, set to be represented by Takeover Target (Aus) (Celtic Swing {GB}) and Magnus (Aus) (Flying Spur {Aus}) in next week's major sprints at Royal Ascot, have reacted strongly to British trainer Mark Johnston's suggestion that Takeover Target should not have been invited back to compete at the meeting following a failed drug test for HPC [17-alpha-hydroxyprogesterone hexanoate] in Hong Kong in 2006. "[Mark Johnston] has presumed we've got an advantage by using that drug," Janiak told a press conference at Newmarket's Jockey Club Rooms. "It was available and was recommended, by a vet, to be given to horses which travel. It is only [used] to keep the horse on his food and to get him to the track in proper racing condition. At no stage does it give any advantage as far as race performance is concerned." Taking a wider stance, Moody continued, "The drug standards which we race by are among the strictest and far outweighs any testing done in this part of the world. In fact, I was amazed by the lack of drug testing when I came here last year." The pair were responding to comments written by Johnston in his stable newsletter, the Kingsley Klarion, which questioned whether British rules banning trainers from giving horses steroids ought to apply to runners from overseas jurisdictions when they run in Britain.

Haatef, Out of Jubilee, Out Period?

Sheikh Hamdan bin Rashid Al Maktoum's Haatef (Danzig), hero of last term's G2 Diadem S., will miss his intended engagement in next week's G1 Golden Jubilee S. after suffering a serious injury in training. The Kevin Prendergast trainee, most recently fifth in the May 14 G2 Duke of York S., has fractured a hind cannon bone and may have run his last race. "[Haatef] fractured his hind cannonbone two days ago, has had surgery and will not be taking part," Racing Manager Angus Gold told PA Sport. "He's recuperating at stud and will be all right in about four or five months, but is out for this year. He's four already, has won a Group 2 and he's by Danzig, so he is going to make a stallion. We will see how it mends. I've still got to speak to Sheikh Hamdan, but I would think he may not want to risk him again next year. The fracture itself isn't too bad, it's been pinned and hopefully it is nothing worse than that."

KATIYRA POINTING AT IRISH OAKS His Highness The Aga Khan's Katiyra (Ire) (Peintre Celebre), third in the June 6 G1 Epsom Oaks, will bypass the June 28 G1 Pretty Polly S. at The Curragh and instead point straight to July 13 G1 Darley Irish Oaks at the Co. Kildare venue, trainer John Oxx revealed yesterday. "We were thinking about the Pretty Polly at the [Irish] Derby meeting, but I think we'll wait now," the trainer told Setanta Sports. "She's not a filly we are going to be too hard on this year. She has a potential four-year-old career as well so I think we'll freshen her up now and wait for the Classic. It's the most obvious race, especially with Look Here (GB) likely to give it a miss. If she isn't going there is even more reason for us to go." Reflecting on the bay homebred's third-place effort in the Epsom Classic, in which she stumbled at Tattenham Corner, Oxx added, "Obviously she is very inexperienced and it was asking a lot for her to handle the [Epsom] track, but she just got stopped by a horse falling back and she lost her hind legs going across the path so there were excuses. She didn't come down the hill too well, but I think that was more due to interference rather than not handling the track. She seemed to be travelling well up to that point, but she recovered and we were very happy with her final position."

AUSTRALIAN EQUINE INFLUENZA

EI INQUIRY FAULTS AQIS Retired Australian High Court judge Ian Callinan issued his report on last year's Equine Influenza outbreak in Australia, pinning the blame for the spread of the disease on a systemic failure at all levels of the Australian Quarantine Inspection Service and irresponsible behavior by horse grooms, veterinarians and farriers. The report suggests that the virus came into Australia through infected horses brought in from Japan and taken to the Eastern Creek quarantine facility in Sydney. "What I describe bespeaks an organisation that lacked clear lines of communication between those responsible for formulating procedures and work instructions and those responsible for implementing them; one in which there was insufficient training and education in relation to the procedures and instructions to be followed; one in which there was no checking to ensure that those procedures and instructions were being implemented; and one in which any business plan or other reporting system did not alert senior management to these failures," the report said. It continues, "The most likely explanation remains that the virus escaped from Eastern Creek on the person, clothing or equipment of a groom, a veterinarian, farrier or other person who had contact with an infected horse and who then left the quarantine station without cleaning or disinfecting adequately or at all. Those who treated and cared for the horses in Eastern Creek ... must take some responsibility for the failure of guarantine. Their failure to decontaminate themselves and their equipment contributed to the probable means of the virus's escape from Eastern Creek." Commenting on behalf of the Thoroughbred Breeders Australia, John Messara, chairman of the organizatio, praised the Callinan report. "Justice Callinan and his Inquiry colleagues have done a first class job in investigating the outbreak and making 38 recommendations to minimize the risks of a re-occurrence in the future," he said. "We totally endorse the recommendations as necessary to repair a dangerously inadequate guarantine system and strongly support the Federal Government's decisive and resolute response to the report. Nobody knows better than the thoroughbred industry the economic and social costs of El. Barely any breeder in NSW or Queensland escaped harsh losses and a great many in Victoria and other States suffered as a consequence." Callinan said ultimate responsibility for the breakdown lay with the secretary of the agriculture department Conall O'Connell, the executive director of AQIS Stephen Hunter and the executive manager of quarantine within AQIS Jenni Gordon. Hunter has offered to resign, according to published reports. Callinan also recommended the creation of an inspector-general of horse importation with powers to conduct spot checks and to audit quarantine procedures as necessary.

The sun is already blazing hot and it's only 6:30 in the morning. Not a cloud in the sky as far as the eye can see. I can't think of any place in the world I'd rather be than on the backstretch of the racetrack. The horses always have the right of way and the only ones who ignore this rule are the bright colored chickens



who are constantly in the way pecking at the ground hoping to find some crumbs that have lost their way from the food truck. An exercise rider is singing his favorite song in some strange mix of his native Jamaican dialect and some kind of English that no one can ever really understand. He is atop a keyed-up colt that is dancing on his toes the whole way back from a jog over the training track. The other riders from the same barn are arguing playfully about whose horse is going to breeze the fastest in the next set and who is

the better rider. Everyone is smiling and waving their good mornings as they head to and from the track for each set. People from all walks of life are working with these horses on the backstretch and the one common thread that holds us together is that almost all of us genuinely love what we do.

As I lean on the rail drinking a ridiculously strong cup of track kitchen coffee that somewhat resembles tar, I feel complete tranquility within. The worries of the world are left outside those gates of the track and the only sound I hear is the continual rhythmic blowing that comes from the horses as they gallop past at a nice, steady pace. Their hooves hit the ground in that same methodic motion. This, to me, is what horse racing is all about. This is where it all starts and this is where the glory is born.

Every day I think to myself how fortunate I am to be a part of such an incredible sport. I recognize a filly that recently won a Grade 1 as she jogs next to an older maiden who will probably never win a race. I get the chills up my spine as I think of all the horses that have trained over this very track and all the greats that have won races in front of huge crowds right here. My heart quickens as I vividly remember some of my favorite races over the past few years and I can instantly hear the crowds roaring as the horses charge around the final turn and head for home. I smile thinking about some great stretch runs as the favorites are dueling down the final furlong, both horses refusing to give in. I can picture the little boys who will line up in the afternoon along the same fence after the race begging for a high five or a dirty pair of goggles from their favorite jocks.

I walk from the rail through the tunnel to the paddock and not a soul is in sight. I stand for a long time in the middle of it all and imagine the paddock filling with people from all over the world coming in to preview the greats before a big race. I can picture the jockeys strolling down the path decked in brand new silks of all colors, shiny black boots, twirling their whips with handles that smell like sweat and are wrapped in sticky electrical tape for better grip. I can smell that sweaty leather. I can almost hear the lingering murmurs that have hung in the air over the years as the owners admire the beauty of their horses. There is so much excitement in the paddock; I can feel the electricity as the imaginary jocks are legged up on to their horses and the stewards call these magnificent beasts to the parade ring for one final viewing. This is it. Now it is up to the horse. No one can do anything except say a prayer and hope their horse gets a good trip. The bugle is played and the crowd erupts into cheers as the entire lineup heads to the track for the main event. This is horse racing.

I've witnessed this same ritual hundreds of times at the actual races and to me each time is as exciting as the last. I always race from the paddock to my seat not knowing why I have a seat in the first place because I know I'm going to be on my toes yelling most of the race. I love horse racing.

Unfortunately, horse racing is not always this picture perfect painting. This past Triple Crown, among other horse racing events, had some lows that accompanied the highs. Somewhere along the way the true beauty of the sport was buried beneath the soiled handmade blanket of mankind. The horses have become far from the main focus and because of this, a black cloud of negativity has crept over OUR horse racing world. Resentment and frustration have built up all over and the country and on a day when all horse racing fans should have been beyond ecstatic to try and place the third jewel in the Triple Crown, something was definitely missing. The electricity was not there on that sweltering hot afternoon of the 140th running of the Belmont Stakes. But this didn't just happen overnight. Poor behavior and bad decisions plagued us for many decades and now the spotlight is on us.

Allegations of animal abuse, misrepresentation and deceit at equine auctions, over medication and illegal medication at the two-year-old sales and races, and most recently extreme immodesty, arrogance and poor sportsmanship by those representing the horses are just a few examples of how our business has gone sour. At the very moment we should be starving for the attention as a means to lure newcomers to our sport, we are almost embarrassed to admit we are fans. The media is using our inappropriate behavior to expose the rest of the country to what must be becoming our true colors. This cannot go on. Though we didn't get to experience a Triple Crown this year and since I wasn't born the last time this historical feat took place, I can only hope that maybe next year we will, so that I can experience the thrill so many fans felt 30 years ago. But even more important than witnessing a Triple Crown, I hope we can regain our integrity that has somehow been pushed aside. We need to be accountable for our actions and clean up the murky reputation of the horse industry. If we want to keep this sport alive and continue to have chances to watch Triple Crown winners in the future we need to act now.

This goes to everyone who is involved in any way in the Thoroughbred world from the breeders, consignors, agents to the trainers, vets, journalists, jockeys, and whoever else plays a role. We need to take a good look in the mirror and ask ourselves if we are being morally honest, ethical, and modest in our daily dealings within this industry. If we can't say yes to our own conscience then now is the time to make amends.

Take a minute to think of a memory that first attracted you to this industry. Maybe it was watching your first foaling, maybe it was being in your first win photo, maybe it was making a small profit on a yearling at the sales or maybe it was your first 6 a.m. trip to the rail on the backside of some track years ago. Remember how happy that moment made you feel and how addicted you eventually became to the sport. If the passion is running through your veins and you want to keep it alive, then help out our industry by stepping up and making the right decisions. You all know what I'm talking about, so take some responsibility and let's change the direction in which our sport is headed. --Anna Seitz

What is your biggest accomplishment since you've been involved in the business, both personally and with WinStar? Personally, my biggest accomplishment is finding great peace and happiness with Katie--we are a great match, and I thank God every day for putting her into my life. Professionally, I am most proud of the team we've assembled at WinStar Farm and the results that the farm has produced for the Troutts and Casners. For a commercial operation, to have produced two different Classic winners in our first eight years of existence is special. Furthermore, the fact that we've sold those Classic winners, along with three other Grade I winners (One Cool Cat, Spring At Last, and Sharp Lisa) only validates our commercial emphasis and, hopefully, will bring buyers back for more WinStar Farm product.

Do you still own the dam of Da' Tara, Torchera? Sadly, we don't own her anymore. But she really did her job for us as a commercial mare who was purchased to support our stallions. While she was with us, she was bred to four different WinStar stallions, and each of the progeny was sold at auction (one as a weanling, one as a short yearling, one as a yearling, and one as a two-year old) to help support our stallions and get their progeny into the market and eventually into top trainers hands. The ultimate goal for us is to produce a Grade I winner like Da' Tara by one of our stallions, because then the owner wins, the WinStar stallion wins, and all our shareholders and/or breeders who supported our stallion win.

How many mares does WinStar own? 105.

If you could change one thing in our sport, what would it be? I would try to balance the inequality between what owners spend to participate in racing and what they have the opportunity to earn back in purses. Right now, it's a 2-to-1 ratio of expenses to purses. If we could ever improve that to just a break-even opportunity, then not only would the tracks be more vibrant, but there would be a hugely positive trickle-down economic effect to breeders, trainers, farm managers, van drivers, grooms, etc.

Did you take any pleasure in playing the role of spoiler in the Belmont, as your brother Steve rode the last Triple Crown winner?

You know, as a racing fan, I was rooting for Big Brown to win. But at the half-mile pole, I put on my WinStar and Tiznow hat and switched allegiances when I realized how easy Da' Tara was moving on the lead. I always wear the Cauthen hat, so I guess I'm glad Steve will get his annual interview series around Derby time in 2009. It's fun to see your brother relive a great moment in his life, and I think his daughters really enjoy it, too.

Most underrated stallion?

It has to be Tiznow. Don't get me wrong, I think he is appreciated by breeders a great deal for his quality, size, and the durability and stamina he provides to the breed. But to think that for under \$100,000 you can breed to a two-time Breeders' Cup Classic winner, who had a Breeders' Cup winner and champion in his first crop, who has two Grade I-winning colts in this crop along with three other graded winners this year, and whose runners relish dirt, turf, and polytrack surfaces-- it's a bargain.

If you could name a stake for anybody, who would it be and why? It would be the "Tex Cauthen" Handicap. My dad came from a very humble background in Sweetwater, Texas, and he's always been a hard-working, positive, and humble man. He and my mom (who deserves a stake too) encouraged my brothers and I with a wonderful balance of love and "enforcement."

If you could have a conversation with one horse, who would it be, and what would you ask him? I'd ask Secretariat how he did it, and how can I identify his next coming at the yearling sales.

If you could have dinner with one historical figure, who would it be, and why? Jesus. My faith is integral to whatever success I might have, and I feel blessed for so many things in my life. I'd like to say thanks, and ask a lot of questions.

What is your favorite vacation spot? Harbour Island in the Bahamas. Katie and I were married there May 31st, so it will always be a special place to me. The beach and the food is tremendous, too.

Favorite food or meal? My mom's spaghetti. It's awesome!

What's your favorite film? "Rocky." I love the underdog.

What's playing on your CD player right now? A great mix of George Strait, The Rolling Stones, Van Morrison, and Dave Mathews that Katie put together for me.

What is your drink of choice? Ice tea--every day at lunch.

Have you ever sung Karaoke in a bar in front of people?

Unfortunately for those is attendance, I did the night I completed the Bar exam. I was clearly not thinking straight after two days of headache.

Best place to grab a burger in your hometown? Sam's Diner, as long as you aren't looking for fancy decor. Nobody beats a Samburger.

What would you do if you weren't in horse racing? I have no idea. This is all I ever wanted to do and I'm blessed to be writing in to the *TDN* on WinStar's behalf!



He gets on the mechanical horse in the jockeys' room in the afternoon and 'rides' four races. After workouts, he runs around the track twice."



LION HEART FILLY TOPS MM FINALE A striking filly by Lion Heart topped the third and final session of the Magic Millions National Yearling Sale at the Gold Coast Thursday. Offered by Furlong Stud, the filly was secured by local horsewoman Debbie Newham for A\$70,000. Newham had to pull out all stops to edge out Deagon based horseman Shaun Dwyer in a fierce bidding battle. The yearling is the third foal from the lightly raced Secret Savings mare Under the Mattress (Aus), who is a full sister to Agua Blessing (Aus), a stakes-performed winner at two at trips from 900m to 1850m. She hails from the family of star international Group 1 winners Kamar, Key to the Moon, Gorgeous and Swain (Ire). During yesterday's final session of a marathon National Sale, 128 yearlings changed hands at a session gross of A\$849,400 with an average of A\$6,636. "It was very tough early, but buyers got into the swing of it as we went," Magic Millions managing director David Chester said. "The smart buyers were there again picking up some quality youngsters at great value prices." Chester added, "Our international buying bench was busy again--with a number of yearlings set to head to Korea, Singapore, Hong Kong and the Philippines."



BERNSTEIN TO STAY IN U.S. FOR '08 SEASON

Central Kentucky-based sire Bernstein (Storm Cat--La Affirmed, by Affirmed), Argentina's Stallion of the Year for the 2005 and 2006 season, will not be shuttling back to Haras La Biznaga in Argentina for the forthcoming Southern Hemisphere breeding season due to a minor foot problem. The 11-year-old stallion stands for \$20,000 at the Ryan's family Castleton Lyons in Lexington. Through June 2, Bernstein has sired 20 graded or group winners from five crops of racing age, including Argentine champions Storm Military (Arg), Storm Marcopolo (Arg) and Storm Mayor (Arg), the latter of whom was distinguished as Argentina 's 2006 Horse of the Year and back-to-back victor of South America 's prestigious G1 Gran Premio Carlos Pellegrini in 2005-'06. Bernstein, Argentina 's leading freshman sire in 2005, has also sired Argentine Group 1 winners Stormy Kiss (Arg), Stormy Nimble (Arg), Stormy Vil (Arg) and Stormy Niña (Arg). "The horse has a minor foot problem and we thought it was best not to take any risks," said Juan Ithuralde, general manager of Haras La Biznaga. Bernstein, who had shuttled to Carlos Blaquier's Haras La Biznaga each of the last seven years, is slated to return to La Biznaga for the 2009 breeding season, according to Ithuralde.
