

## **BROTHER DEREK RETIRED TO AIRDRIE**

Cecil Peacock's **Brother Derek** (Benchmark--Miss Soft Sell, by Siyah Kalem), a Grade I winner at two and three, has been retired from racing and will stand the

2009 breeding season at Mr. & Mrs. Brereton C. Jones's Airdrie Stud near Midway, Kentucky. A stud fee has not vet been determined. Bred in California by Mary Caldwell, Brother Derek was purchased for \$150,000 as a Keeneland September yearling, then was resold at the 2005 Barretts March sale for \$275,000 after breezing a guartermile in :20 4/5. Put into training with Dan

Hendricks, he won three of his five starts at two, capturing the GII Norfolk S. before finishing a highly creditable fourth in the GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile. He closed his freshman campaign with a victory in the GI Hollywood Futurity, then took his first three outings at three, the GII San Rafael S., the GII Santa Catalina S. and the GI Santa Anita Derby. Third in last year's GII San

Fernando BC S. and GII Strub S., he most recently returned from a 14-month absence to be second to subsequent GI Hollywood Gold Cup hero Mast Track in an Apr. 20 allowance at Hollywood Park. "Our single most important criteria for selecting our stallions is brilliance, and Brother Derek had brilliance in spades," said Airdrie Stud's Bret Jones. "To be able to come

through a two-year-old sale after going :20 4/5, break his maiden that May going 4 1/2 furlongs, win a Grade I at the end of his two-year-old year and then train on to dominate the GI Santa Anita Derby going a mile and an eighth shows the brilliance, versatility and true toughness that we believe will ultimately lead to his great success at stud. He's also an outstanding individual that the commercial breeder can really get excited about." Brother Derek retires with a record of 17-6-2-3 and earnings of \$1,611,138.

#### HENRY ODDS-ON FOR SUSSEX CROWN?

Despite his likely short price for today's G1 Sussex S. at Goodwood, it is impossible to find holes in **Henrythenavigator** (Kingmambo), and Susan Magnier's crack miler will have the bookmakers running scared as

he heads to post. Like the stable's 2002 winner Rock of Gibraltar (Ire), Henrythenavigator has annexed both Newmarket's G1 2000 Guineas May 3 and the Irish equivalent at The Curragh three weeks later, before adding the G1 St James's Palace S. to his tally at Royal

Ascot June 17. He has the beating of most of his rivals on that form, hails from a Ballydoyle stable in almost unbelievable form and is in the hands of Johnny Murtagh, whose confidence is well founded. #### 'Brown' Back In the Arena...


Fresh off an impressive six-furlong move in 1:10 4/5 at Aqueduct July 26, IEAH and Paul Pompa Jr.'s Big Brown (Boundary) appears poised to bounce back from a disappointing performance in the June 7-Belmont S. in Sunday's GI Haskell Invitational at Monmouth Park. "He looks like he's ready to run," said trainer Rick Dutrow Jr. yesterday. The GI Kentucky Derby and GI Preakness S. hero is expected to breeze threeeighths at Agueduct Friday and ship to Monmouth Saturday morning. "I can't see any kind of issue with him in any way. He looked good, he breezed really good and he looks as good as he can right now." While abundantly confident throughout the Triple Crown, the New York horseman adopted a slightly more reserved approach when discussing the bay's chances this weekend. "From what happened in his last start [Belmont S.], it is hard for me to feel as confident as I was before the Derby and his other races, but I still am as confident as I can be that he will go out there and run his race. I can't see him running anything other

than good. I don't know why he wouldn't."

While the colt's name made headlines on a regular basis following a disappointing Belmont performance, IEAH President Michael lavarone opted to contest the Haskell with Big Brown, who reportedly will receive a bonus for appearing at the Oceanport oval. With little chance of rain expected for Sunday's race, Dutrow was optimistic that his colt will handle the track surface and conditions. "I think he'll handle the track just fine," said Dutrow. "Except for his last start, he has done everything you would ever want a horse to do. I don't see him not getting along with the track over there, it seems like it's tailor made for him."

According to Dutrow, the ultimate goal for Big Brown is the GI Breeders' Cup Classic at Santa Anita Nov. 1, however, the trainer did

not completely rule out a tilt at Saratoga's GI Travers S. Aug. 23 along the way. "The Breeders' Cup is definitely on top of the list, even though [the Haskell] is more important than any race for him right now," said Dutrow. **3yo KODIAK KOWBOY** posts a determined win in Saratoga's Amsterdam S-G2 over favored Desert Key



"We're going to have to see what happens [at Monmouth], how he comes out of the race, and what is next for him. Depending on how things shake out at Monmouth, I have no idea what is going to happen

with the Travers. I believe that Big Brown is a horse that *should* run in the Travers, because it is such a prestigious race. I really want to run the horse in the Travers, but coming back in three weeks doesn't seem like it would be necessary. If everything looks beautiful and he runs his race, I am going to try to talk Mike into it--if I get the feeling. But the Breeders' Cup Classic is more important to us than the Travers, and we would want to do everything right to come to that race the right way."

Asked if he still worries about what happened in the Belmont, Dutrow was pragmatic about revisiting the past. "If Big Brown finishes his year out the right way, I'm going to try and forget about trying to figure it out," he offered. "I am still kind of concerned about Sunday because I know that he went

into the Belmont in very good condition and I have no idea what happened in that race. But if he does that again, then I will know something is wrong with him, and maybe we will have to discuss not running him anymore. We just have to wait and see."

Stonerside's Raven's Pass followed home Henrythenavigator when fourth in the Newmarket Guineas and when runner-up in the St James's Palace, when only 3/4 of a length separated the pair. With Twice Over (GB) back in third there, the homebred avenged an earlier defeat by that rival in Newmarket's G3 Craven S. Apr. 17, and he went on to complete the exacta again next time in the G1 Prix Jean Prat at Chantilly July 13. The Comic Strip Heroes's Winker Watson, out of action since winning the G2 Norfolk S. at Royal Ascot and Newmarket's G2 July S. last summer, returned to finish seventh in the Jean Prat, but trainer Peter Chapple-Hyam retains faith. He also saddles last year's G2 Lennox S. hero Tariq, who represents the Saleh Al Homeizi and Imad Al Sagar partnership. The four-year-old needs to rebound from a disappointing ninth in the G1 Queen Anne S. at the Royal meeting last time June 17.

"Tariq could do with a bit of rain, as it was probably too fast for him at Ascot last time, but he is in really good form and I am happy with him," said Chapple-Hyam. "With Winker, it is more of a finding-out mission. I am sure he stays the mile, but we want to find out whether he stays it at that level or whether we need to drop down a peg or two. That said, I think he will run well."

Firth of Fifth has to defy a penalty following his allthe-way win in Newmarket's G2 Superlative S. last time July 11, a feat achieved by Strategic Prince (GB), who beat none other than Duke of Marmalade (Ire) two years ago. Trainer Tom Dascombe is hopeful he can hold his own despite the extra burden. "It was a cracking performance at Newmarket," Dascombe said. "People have knocked him and have said that the jockey stole the race, but the horse won by a length and a quarter, so it's not like it was a fluke. He really wants a mile and, I should think, depending on how we get on, we need to step him up in trip." Ballydoyle, yet to win this race despite being represented by the likes of the aforementioned Duke of Marmalade and Aussie Rules, bids to put that right with Westphalia. He was sent off the 4-5 favorite when comfortably beaten by Bushranger (Ire) in the G3 Anglesey S. at The Curragh last time July 12 and tackles further here. Peter Chapple-Hyam relies on Sayif, who was beaten a short head by Classic Blade (Ire) in the G2 July S. at Newmarket last time July 10. Lord Shanakill brings the form of Royal Ascot's G2 Coventry S. into the equation here, having had Orizaba, Shaweel and Instalment behind when third in that June 17 contest. Shaweel, who finished third behind Firth of Fifth at Newmarket, warrants respect from the Mark Johnston stable successful with Lucky Story and Shamardal in 2003 and 2004, respectively.

Paco Boy took the Listed Spring Cup at Lingfield Mar. 15 before doubling his tally in Newbury's prestigious G3 Greenham S. Apr. 19. Sidestepping the G1 2000 Guineas, he was sent to Longchamp to contest that country's equivalent, the May 11 G1 Poule d'Essai des Poulains, but finished seventh after a bumpy ride. The bay was freshened up and had been the subject of positive bulletins due to his homework with today's G1 Sussex S. contender Major Cadeaux (GB). Settled wide in fourth early out of trouble by Richard Hughes, he hit the front approaching the furlong marker and was game as Stimulation rallied on his inner. "He was a bit feely going down and I wasn't happy with the ground, but he would die for you and is some brave horse to go through with it," Hughes said. Conduit burst onto the scene with an impressive success in a handicap on Epsom Derby day June 7 before stepping up to finish 3/4-length runner-up to Campanologist in the G2 King Edward VII S. at Royal Ascot last time June 20. Settled in the middle of the runners throughout the early stages here, the homebred made hard work of landing his cramped odds when edging ahead passing the guarter pole, but dug in to withstand the persistent challenge of Donegal. "It was a messy, stop-start race and he was doing too much early, didn't come down the hill well and then I had to go a long way from home," jockey Ryan Moore explained. "Things weren't really going his way today and he wasn't at his best, but he could do with faster ground." Ballymacoll Stud's Manager Peter Reynolds added, "He's a nice horse for the future--there is no target at the moment. He'll make a nice four-year-old and Sir Michael is the champion at training older horses." Conduit is out of Well Head, an unraced halfsister to G1SW Spectrum (Ire) and to the dam of champion Petrushka (Ire). Click for the Racing Post chart.



This was a case of the quick and the dead, and Finjaan came through the lightning test with a slither of an advantage over Bonnie Charlie. Having beaten the subsequent winner Ougba (GB) on debut at Newmarket May 4, the homebred found only Icesolator (One Cool Cat) too strong on unsuitably soft ground in the Listed National S. at Sandown last time May 29. Showing dash to stalk the furious early fractions forged in the duel between Rievaulx World (Compton Place {GB}) and Jargelle, the bay got the better of that duo in the final 100 yards and had enough in reserve to hold the late rush of Bonnie Charlie. "The front two went very quick, but this horse has got a lot of speed and I knew he would finish," jockey Richard Hills commented. "Martin Dwyer has been riding him a lot in his work and said he was one of the fastest two-year-olds he's ridden, so we were confident going into this." Trainer Marcus Tregoning added, "He's very quick and pretty useful, but is still a bit green and has more to learn yet. We haven't gone at him too much at home and I'm glad we didn't run him at Royal Ascot and gave him time to develop. The unsettled forecast made us run in this rather than the Richmond over six, but he'll get six and maybe even further. He's a very sharp two-year-old, and I will suggest to Sheikh Hamdan that we run him a few more times and go for the G1 Middle Park S. [at Newmarket Oct. 3]." Click for the Racing Post chart.

#### GHOSTZAPPER

Back in the old days--the last century--the most exciting time of the sales year came right after the Fasig-Tipton July yearling sale Keeneland July. In a time when glitz and showmanship still helped sell horses, when the September sale was more a stepchild than the great yearling supermarket it now is, there was nothing we looked forward to more than the new 'July Sale' sires. The first Secretariats (whoops), the first Seattle Slews, the first Affirmeds (whoops) and Alydars--the anticipation was palpable. We don't really have sales like that anymore. Saratoga and Deauville, those great August holiday destinations, do put on the style as much as they can, but Keeneland July was in a league of its own.

The demise of the Keeneland July sale after 2002, ultimately, was probably ascribable more to one factor above all others: sire power. In the old days, there was enough July Sale firepower to sustain a two-day sale. But as the old great July Sale sires started to die off, the two-day sale became essentially one day of the old July-type sires, and one day of what we now know as September Book 1 sires. Finally, after the 2002 July sale, Keeneland surrendered to the inevitable, and the stepchild (September) swallowed the parent (July) whole. Sounds almost mythic, doesn't it?

One worry for Keeneland was that they were then handing the opening top-tier 'barometer' sale of the year to their rivals at Fasig-Tipton, namely the Saratoga

yearling sale (Fasig July, which always came the weekend before Keeneland July, has always been a barometer of a middle sector of the market, not the top). But the gift proved short-lived, because, even with no Keeneland July, in 2005 the Saratoga sale was reduced from three days to two. Keeneland September Book 1 ate one of Saratoga's days, too.

This short history is worth recalling because this year we get a sort of flashback to the days when the first yearlings by a July Sale sire grabbed the headlines. His name is Ghostzapper, and, if

last November's foal prices are anything to go by (two averaged \$755,000), he could singlehandedly add \$3-\$4 million to Saratoga's gross, which last year was just over \$41 million. And there are sure to be plenty more by him in Keeneland Book 1. Ghostzapper is a half brother to GI Hopeful S. winner and successful sire City Zip, a son of the sprint sire Carson City. A homebred for Frank Stronach's Adena Springs Farm trained by Bobby Frankel, Ghostzapper was from the first crop of the 1998 GI Breeders' Cup Classic winner Awesome Again. Ghostzapper never ran

> further than seven furlongs until August of his four-year-old season. After winning three of his first four races, and finishing third behind Valid Video and Great Notion in the GI King's Bishop S., Ghostzapper looked a pretty useful horse, but no superstar. His King's Bishop third earned a 106 Beyer, his highest to that date. But all that was about to change, dramatically, for the better.

In his final six career starts, spread over three seasons, Ghostzapper was unbeaten, and never ran a Beyer below 114 (when just beating the following year's GI Breeders' Cup Classic winner Saint Liam in the 2004 GI Woodward S.). His

sequence began in his final start at three, when he trounced older horses in the GI Vosburgh, run that year at 6 1/2 furlongs in September. The son of Baby Zip won by 6 1/2 lengths and earned a 116 Beyer Speed Figure. **Oppenheim cont**.

The bay didn't reappear until the following July, when he recorded a 120 Beyer while winning the sevenfurlong GII Tom Fool H. by 4 1/4 lengths. Ghostzapper then caught a sloppy track at Monmouth in the GIII Iselin H., and won by almost 11 lengths, breaking the track record by three-fifths of a second and running a stunning 128 Beyer. Over the years I've learned to be skeptical of 'boxcar' figures run on off tracks, though. His next race was when Saint Liam gave him a run for his money in the Woodward. He then completed his four-year-old campaign with a three-length win, leading virtually all the way over Roses in May and Pleasantly Perfect, in the 2004 GI Breeders' Cup Classic, registering a Beyer 124 and deservedly claiming Horse of the Year honors. Ghostzapper ran just once at five, dusting Silver Wagon by more than six lengths in the 2005 GI Met Mile, running a 122 Beyer. If you use my rule-of-thumb conversion formula of (Beyer + 12 = Timeform), his last six races were run in the Timeform equivalents of 128, 132, 140, 126, 136 and 134. Personally, I throw out the Iselin figure, so my assessment is that Ghostzapper should be rated Beyer 124/Timeform 136. If that's not a proper 'July Sale' sire prospect, I don't know what is. In my opinion, he's the best racehorse we've seen in North America in the last 10 years.

## Loony Tunes...

Try telling this story in other, centrally regulated international sports like soccer, tennis, golf, Formula One auto racing: they'd laugh you off the stage. It involves my good friend, BBA Ireland bloodstock agent Patrick Cooper, in his role as a Racing Manager to two operations which have been victimized--there's no other word for it--by two Stewards' decisions, based on wildly different rules, in two different countries. The first is the notorious Green Girl case, in the GIII Suwanee River H., at Gulfstream Park in February. This, you'll remember, was when the winner, Green Girl (owned by Ronchalon Stable, Patrick Cooper, Racing Manager) tossed her jockey and ran free for 10 minutes before eventually being caught, remounted in the gate, and then winning the race. Connections of the second objected, and it later went before the stewards, who upheld the original result: Green Girl the winner. Then there was an appeal, the decision to be made by a single arbitrator, who was former Keeneland president Bill Greely. He read the very absurd rule (jockey must be aboard from the time he gets on the horse until they break from the gate) and threw out Green Girl.

That was enough for one lifetime, but Patrick got slighted by stewards twice in six months. This time it was in no less a race than the June 29 G1 Irish Derby, and involved our horse, Curtain Call, managed by Patrick and part-owned by him, and a group including Jimmy George and this (disgruntled) journalist. **Oppenheim cont.**

In this race, you may remember, Johnny Murtagh's mount, Alessandro Volta, abruptly turned left, running away from a right-hand whip, colliding with Curtain Call and carrying Tartan Bearer halfway to the outside fence. In Florida, Alessandro Volta would have come down, no questions asked, and been placed behind the two horses he impeded. But no, not in Ireland. There, as in Britain, disgualification is based on some gibberish to do with whether the horse improved his placing versus the horse he interfered with. The stewards decided Alessandro Volta had improved his placing vis-à-vis Tartan Bearer, but not Curtain Call, and reversed their placings, leaving Curtain Call in fifth. Aghast at this breach of natural justice, we naturally appealed. In the ensuing month before the appeal was heard, we heard all sorts of opinions from racing professionals, including 'he (Curtain Call) wasn't going anywhere anyway'; 'he (Curtain Call) never broke stride', etc. Do me a favor. If you were running full tilt and somebody collided into you doing 35 miles an hour, you're going to tell me it didn't affect the result? Stuff and nonsense. As have most of you readers, I have watched thousands and thousands of races, and my professional opinion--forget I own a piece of the aggrieved horse--is that no one can say what would have happened if they'd all run straight. Personally, I thought our jockey, Fran Berry, was just going for everything when Alessandro Volta collided with him. I wasn't surprised Curtain Call didn't make up ground on the perpetrator after the incident happened; would you, if you'd been run into at 35 mph? Nobody argues there was contact.

In France, all members of an entry are disgualified when one member is taken down. If they'd run the race in France, we'd have ended up third, because the winner, Frozen Fire, would have come down, along with his stablemate. But here's an even more sinister interpretation. I know Johnny Murtagh didn't do this--he was as surprised as anyone when his horse turned left. But let's just imagine he knew his horse was starting to tire (and, by the way, I'm told that's sometimes why horses run away from the whip, because they're tiring), and he knew the two horses on his outside were going to go by him. He could have deliberately gone for his horse right-handed, knowing he would drift left, take the other two out of the race, and leave it clear for his stablemate Frozen Fire, who sailed through outside of all the trouble. Of course he didn't do that--but here's the really disturbing thing: if he had done that, the stewards could have still made the exact same decision they did make.

I know I have the advantage of this 'bully pulpit,' which others do not, but these two incidents do illustrate why horse racing is in such a mess. One set of rules for everybody, please. Other sports do it, and they flourish. Our sport doesn't, and we're losing ground at every turn. Yes, I now know about the fickleness of rule-writing and stewards' decisions, but it could be the rules on race-day medication, registration of owners, you name it.



**REVIVING HIALEAH** By Bill Finley, special to ESPN.com Halsey Minor doesn't seem daunted by the task he has chosen for himself--bringing Hialeah back to life. He

should be. Reviving Hialeah won't just be difficult; it will be all but impossible. The once-beautiful old track needs some \$30 million worth of renovations, no longer has a barn area and will never get the prime winter dates it had in its heyday all to itself. That's if Minor gets his hands on it. Hialeah is still owned by the notoriously difficult John Brunetti, who says the dormant track isn't for sale.

Yet, Minor says that not only will he purchase Hialeah and re-open it, he will create something special, a track that will be economically viable, the same sort of racing showcase it once was and a model for the rest of the industry to follow. The odds of that happening may be 1,000-1, but Halsey Minor is clearly one longshot worth betting on. If determination, enthusiasm, business savvy, love of the sport and, yes, deep pockets, mean anything, then maybe Minor is the one person that can actually pull this off.

"I have been part of starting three multi-billion dollar companies and that hasn't been because I haven't been determined," Minor said. "The difference between that and me starting those companies is that this is so much more personal than any of the other things I have done in my life. I can't equate anything else I have done to the importance I put on saving Thoroughbred racing. I view Hialeah as a big part of that. I don't want my Thoroughbreds to turn into a petting zoo."

Halsey grew up in a horse-crazy family in Virginia, where he fell in love with the animal and decided one day he would own his own a stable of racehorses. His success in the business world gave him that chance. Minor, 43, is a technology entrepreneur and the co-founder of Nasdaq 100 technology news site CNet. In 2004, Forbes listed him as the nation's 15th richest person under 40, estimating his net worth at \$286 million.

While becoming more immersed in the racing game as an owner, he grew disillusioned with the current state of the slumping sport and wanted to do something major to help bring racing back.

"When I temporarily retired in 2002, I was going to start buying horses and living out my dream," he said. "It was really the first time I had taken a hard look at the state of the industry and, compared to where it was when I was a child, I was shocked. I was blown away by how much the industry had declined. I decided that rather than go buying a lot of horses I'd take a shot at helping to turn things around."

Initially, he concentrated on organizing a racing series that would encompass major events at tracks across the country. He also flirted with the idea of buying his own track. But as he became more cognizant of Hialeah's past and its subsequent demise, he decided that's where he would focus his attention.

"Hialeah already does so many things right," Minor said. "The act of bringing it back and bringing it back to where it was on its best day would be another way to signal the rebirth of Thoroughbred racing in America. I realized I would get a twofer: I would get a track that has a lot of proven elements and I would get a symbolic victory by taking something that has declined as the industry has declined and turned it around and brought it back to its glory days."

Minor willingly talks about how racing still doesn't get it when it comes to customer service and how his Hialeah would treat the \$2 bettor and the \$200 bettor alike--like royalty. As far as other ways he would bring people back to Hialeah, he may be short on specifics but he doesn't lack confidence that it can be done. One thing he will not rely on, he said, is slot machines.

"If the state of Florida forced me to put slot machines in at Hialeah I'd refuse," he said. "I'd rather go to jail. I think they are utterly corrosive. There is no overlap between the people who plays slots and the fans of horseracing. Slots are the industry's attempt to ask government for a handout. It's like they're saying they don't believe they can make their industry work anymore, so the government has to give us something."

One thing he doesn't have to worry about is Brunetti's insistence that he will not sell Hialeah. The track has been closed since 2001 and there's no hope that the track will ever re-open under his stewardship. Nor will he be able to develop the property with Halsey lurking out there promising to restore racing. He'd be crazy not to take Minor's money.

Hialeah's biggest problem will be finding a place on the racing calendar to call its own. Back when Hialeah worked, it had control of the prime mid-winter dates, which now belong to Gulfstream Park. Gulfstream obviously isn't going to give them up, which means Hialeah's only alternative may be to go head-to-head against the track to its north.

With the new Gulfstream facility so unpopular with fans and with its parent company Magna Entertainment in serious financial trouble that may not be as difficult as it once was.

"If they choose to put their dates on top of mine, so be it," Minor said. "They'll be going up against a beautifully refurbished Hialeah where the track is 100 percent attuned to the fan experience. I have competed with many companies in my life and I would not view this as one of the more significant competitive threats that I would face."

Still, it won't be that easy. There aren't enough horses in Florida to support two tracks and the established stables figure to stick with Gulfstream, at least initially. Finding horses to run at Hialeah could be a huge problem.

That's just one of many reasons Minor has his work cut out for him. Maybe bringing Hialeah back just can't be done. A bright guy with a lot of willpower says it can.
