KEENELAND SEPTEMBER CONCLUDES

Keeneland wrapped up its marathon September Yearling Sale yesterday with a 15th and final session. The

sale went out much like in came in, with numbers down in the 10 to 15 percent range (see p2). But the general consensus seems to be that September held up well given the current troubles affecting Wall Street, the United States and beyond. Here are a few key indicators:

- Average \$90,984. Down 10.3 percent from '07; it is the first time since 2004 the cumulative average dipped below \$100,000.
- Median \$37,000. Down 11.9 percent.
- ▶ Gross \$327,999,100. Down 14.8 percent from '07, but the fourth-highest grossing September in history. A total of 5,555 were catalogued this year, two more horses than in '07; 4,795 were sent through the ring, or 2.2 percent fewer than the 4,901 who went through last year.

Geoffrey Russell, Director of Sales at Keeneland, said many in the industry expected a softer market in 2008 after a series of exceptionally strong Septembers.

"I think most people went into the sale knowing the market was about to correct," Russell said yesterday. "I don't think this is a great surprise to anybody. We knew it was going to be down, and it was down about what we thought it would be. Without the participation of the international markets in the last three or four books, I think the correction would have been more severe. Even starting earlier in the sale--the Russians were here from Day 1 to Day 15. Given the current woes of several economies, not least of all the United States, I think the Thoroughbred industry had a very good experience here at the September Sale." Cont. p2

LARRY JONES TO RETIRE?

According to published reports, trainer Larry Jones is planning to retire after the 2009 season. The trainer of

the ill-fated GI Kentucky Derby runner-up Eight Belles, as well as leading three-year-old filly Proud Spell, Jones broke the news to turf writer John Piesen during a Tuesday morning phone conversation. "It's been a long, hard year," the conditioner said, "and it's taken its toll on me and my family. I've been thinking about quitting for some time now and I made the decision right after I

won the Alabama with Proud Spell and the Iselin with Honest Man on the same day. I just figured, it can't get any better than this." Piesen reports that Jones has advised his major client Rick Porter of his decision and that Porter has hired Jeff Buckley, an associate of trainer Bob Holthus, to replace Jones. Cont. p6

Solid Sale, Given the Circumstances...

September's RNA rate fluctuated from very good on some days to near 30 percent on others, but Russell said the cumulative RNA rate of 24.8 percent was acceptable.

"Last year was 22.8 percent, which was probably an industry standard for a sale this long," stated Russell. "We always like the RNA rate a little less than [24.8 percent], but we have to live with what we have."

One of the other things the sale had to live with was an unstable economy that took a drastic turn for the worse midway through the sale, when Lehman Brothers declared itself bankrupt, Bank of America took over Merrill Lynch and insurance giant AIG needed a massive emergency loan.

"I think if it had happened before the sale, say in mid-August, I think it would have had more of a direct effect," Russell said of the financial market meltdown. "But I think people had already decided on their spending levels and didn't have to adjust too much."

So what does the conclusion of the biggest yearling sale in the world tell us about the state of the market-place?

"I think it tells us that, while the market is correcting and down, that there is still great interest in the Thoroughbred industry," said Russell. After all, this is our fourth-largest September Sale, and we grossed nearly \$328 million."

Chapel Royal Colt Tops September Finale...



Taylor Made Leads Consignors...

For the fifth straight year, Taylor Made Sales Agency led all consignors at Keeneland September. In 2008, the Taylor brothers' operation sold a total of 374 horses for \$48,929,900, an average of \$130,828 per yearling. At the conclusion of selling Tuesday, Taylor Made's Mark Taylor said he was content with the way things turned out.

"Going into the sale, my instincts told me the market was going to be off about 10 percent," explained Taylor. "Internally, our sales were down about 15 percent, and I think that extra five-point swing, given the state of the economy and everything that happened during the sale, is not that bad. We're grateful that it wasn't a lot worse; we still had a lot of demand for our product. Overall, the general feeling on our team is relief."

Taylor said that Taylor Made-consigned yearlings failed to meet their reserve at roughly the same rate as Keeneland's cumulative RNA rate--24.8 percent. But Taylor said a renewed focus on after-market selling-selling privately those yearlings who RNA'd--helped boost Taylor Made's overall clearance rate to nearly 90 percent. The most obvious example of that effort is Taylor Made's new website www.taylormaderna.com.

"We would upload photos of the horse as soon as it would get bought back, and post what the hammer price was and what the asking price was," explained Taylor. "People could call and get vet grades, and we put all our RNAs at one spot on the farm. The website really took us to a new level. We had people from all over the world get on there and see pictures. They would say, 'Hey that's a pretty good-looking horse. I'm gonna have my agent go check it out.' We were able to get our customers horses moved and get more money in their pockets, which, ultimately, is what our business is based on."

One horse that didn't get sold--either in the ring or through the website, was the Storm Cat colt out of Goulash, a half-brother to champion Ashado. The colt was Taylor Made's most expensive buyback at \$725,000; the website listed the asking price at \$750,000. The colt was bred by longtime Taylor Made clients Aaron and Marie Jones.

"We had several people make an offer to buy half the horse and race in partnership, but Mr. and Mrs. Jones don't really like partners unless it's an extreme circumstance," said Taylor. "They love the horse, and I think he might be a future stallion at Taylor Made. It was kind of bittersweet--we like to get our horses sold--but in that case we are happy to put the tack on him and get a stall ready for him at the stallion barn."





The CBA's Good Book...

The man who wrote the book had a pretty good sale. Rob Whiteley, author and/or editor of the popular CBA booklets that address veterinary issues in sale horses, yesterday concluded a very strong 2008 Keeneland September Sale. Whiteley, through his Liberation Farm, was the breeder or co-breeder of no fewer than 89 yearlings that sold at September. Remarkably, not one horses was bought back. Included in the group were two seven-figure yearlings: an El Prado (Ire) colt who brought \$1 million from Legends Racing; and the Medaglia d'Oro filly who was knocked down to Dr. Karen Sanderson for \$1.1 million and who was later resold to Bobby Flay privately.

As happy as Whiteley is with Liberation's September success, he might be just as happy with the reception of those booklets published by The Consignors and Commercial Breeders Association (CBA). The first of the "Plain and Simple" series was put out in 2005 and was entitled "Vet Work - Plain and Simple: Scoping." A year later came "OCDs in Sale Horses." Both were written by Frank Mitchell and edited by Whiteley. Then came "Buying Sales Yearlings," and, this year, "Success at the Sales," both written by Whiteley.

According to its website, the CBA's mission is to work "democratically on behalf of every consignor and commercial breeder, large and small, to provide representation and a constructive, unified voice related to sales issues, policies, and procedures."

The aim of the CBA booklets is to be a representation that "unified voice," and to bridge the gap of understanding between buyer and seller, particularly when it comes to veterinary issues.

"Talking to a variety of people, the feedback is that the booklets have had a growing impact on the willingness of buyers to forgive minor irregularities in yearlings and other racing prospects," said Whiteley. "The booklets represent an important first initiative for the CBA."

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Formed in 2005, the CBA is comprised of some of the most recognizable names in the business: Mill Ridge's Bayne Welker is its president and chairman; Taylor Made's Mark Taylor is vice president, while Brookdale's Joe Seitz acts as secretary and Denali Stud's Craig Bandoroff treasurer.

Talking about the CBA's inception, Whiteley explained, "The CBA came about through conversations that I had with Pat Costello [head of Paramount Sales] over a two-year period regarding sales issues. Pat was instrumental in pulling together a core group of consignors. The snowball quickly gained mass and momentum. Bayne Welker has provided tremendous leadership, and membership has grown to over 300 consignors and breeders who account for nearly 80 percent of the annual auction revenue in North America. Our board is structured to represent small and large consignors alike. We're all on the same page about the importance of improving the sales scene for all participants through education, and thus we embarked on the "Plain and Simple" series, to better inform buyers of the facts related to vet issues and racing performance."

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

Keeneland's Geoffrey Russell on oversupply:

"It's a question of profitability for breeders, some of whom suffered a painful reality check during this sale. There are still too many non-commercial horses being offered. This market adjustment will have a positive effect in the reduction of production costs."

Rob Whiteley, Liberation Farm:

"Overall, the sale was very sobering. My heart goes out to those breeders who didn't have the big hit to even things out. Many commercial breeders were badly hurt. With costs rising across the board, the number of profitable yearlings declined, by my estimate, to the lowest level that I can remember. Stud fees, sales fees and vet fees must come down if our breeding industry is to remain viable."

Brereton Jones, Airdrie Stud:

"The first week was a pretty good sale, and after that it got pretty rough. We have to get the purses up at the tracks, or else we're going to lose a lot of the industry. And when we lose a lot of the industry, the farmland will end up being sub-divisions, and Central Kentucky will change a lot if we don't get this straightened out."

Reasons Behind Jones's Decision...

Following the breakdown of Eight Bells in the Kentucky Derby, Jones was subjected to harsh criticism, nearly all of it from outside the racing industry. His client and friend Brereton Jones, for whom he trains Proud Spell, believes that criticism has played some role in the conditioner's decision. "Larry is one of the finest people I've ever known in my life, and has been under a lot of stress from the Eight Belles situation," said Brereton Jones. "There were so many people that didn't understand the situation--some of the weirdos out there who would write letters and say things when they didn't know what they were talking about. Larry, of course being a good person, was hurt by that. If you're a bad guy and somebody's hurling things at you, it might not bother you much. But if you're a good guy, it makes a difference. Also, Larry is such a fabulous trainer, that everybody wanted to have horses with him. And Larry never wanted to be a trainer that had more horses than he could care for himself. He's a hands-on trainer--he rides them, he hauls them--that's the way he enjoys doing things, and it's why he's such a good trainer. But I think he got so much bigger than he anticipated, and I think that's why he made the decision to not take any more two-year-olds next year."



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HISTORY ON JACKSON'S MIND

As Saturday's GI Jockey Club Gold Cup looms on the horizon, Stonestreet Stable's **Curlin** (Smart Strike) stands on the doorstep of history. A successful defense of his championship in the prestigious 10-furlong event will make the four-year-old North America's first horse to earn in excess of \$10 million. But while owner Jess Jackson in honored to be in this position, he insists it isn't about eight-figure earnings.

"It's really not about money, but I truly believe he's a champion," the Kendall-Jackson winery owner said during a national media teleconference Tuesday afternoon. "He's proven it. No horse has done what he's done already. He's has already proven he's one of the best, one of the best in the last half-century, if not a whole century. That's an owner's view of a horse he loves, but that's how I feel."

The horses that currently reside directly above and below Curlin on the career-earnings list are also both Gold Cup winners. Cigar (\$9,999,815) posted his 11th straight victory and ninth of 1995 when he took that year's Gold Cup by a length over Unaccounted For, who he beat into third in the GI Breeders' Cup Classic in his next start. The Allen Paulson colorbearer was the 1-5 favorite to repeat, but caught a tough sophomore colt in the form of Skip Away. Three years his junior and in

receipt of five pounds under the weight-for-age conditions, the Carolyn Hine runner defeated the reigning Horse of the Year by a head and came back to win the 2007 renewal by 6 1/2 lengths. He retired with earnings of \$9,616,360.

"Cigar was a great campaigner," Jackson opined. "He left an indelible memory and he was always a competitor in every race. Beating his financial record is a very

big part of Curlin's legacy, but only because people in our society are more focused on dollars than they should be. The fact is that Curlin on his own merit is a great horse. To be compared to a Cigar or a Secretariat or any other great horse is an honor. We're very excited that he could beat the record."

As for race selection, connections did not wait very long to announce following his win in the GI Woodward S., that Curlin would make his next stop at Belmont Park. The choice, on many levels, was logical, given Curlin's previous success at Big Sandy. The decision to be made following his Gold Cup will be significantly more complicated.

"It's one race at a time and right now we're totally focused on the Jockey [Club] Gold Cup," Jackson commented. "It's a good field and after we get him out of there and he tells us he's fit and ready, we'll consider all options, including the Breeders' Cup."

With that in mind, Jackson, a California resident, has been down to Santa Anita to observe the installation of the new Pro-Ride surface. While he is comfortable that the new track will have eliminated the problems caused by Cushion Track last winter and spring, there is still an element of uncertainty and caution as Jackson mulls over the near future.

"Until they start running and see whether closers really close well and whether early speed displays itself, we won't know whether the Pro-Ride surface is everything it's tracked up to be," he stated. "What we do know is that at this point in time, the speeds are much faster." Indeed, workout times at the Arcadia oval have been extremely fast. Jackson continued, "When you have a magnificent horse the size of Curlin with the speed and stamina he has, it's going to be an interesting factor, because speed can cause him to bear out a little bit more, so we're worried about the speed as well. I'd really like to see Curlin on the [Santa Anita] track, but we're not going to run him until we see him prove his worth in the Jockey Club Gold Cup again."

Why then select the Gold Cup over a race like Saturday's GI Goodwood S., a race which would provide immediate answers to any concerns and get Curlin a race at this year's Breeders' Cup venue? Cont. p9



Again, it's all about history, Jackson says.

"What do you do when you have the chance to run in the Jockey Club Gold Cup and win it for a second time?" he asked rhetorically. "The Jockey Club Gold Cup was the test for the champion in the old days before we had the Breeders' Cup. I am very much a historian and I wanted to track what other great horses have done to show Curlin's ability compared to that particular venue. That's why went to the Woodward. We had never run at Saratoga. At the same time, we have followed the legacies of other horses and tried to emulate or in some cases exceed, like by going to Dubai or considering going to the Japan Cup. We're focused on the Jockey Club Gold Cup because of its historic importance in racing."

Jackson knows that in Curlin he has the closest thing to a lock, but he's willing to take nothing for granted while assessing the competition.

"You always wonder about a horse like [GI Travers S. runner-up] **Mambo in Seattle** (Kingmambo), who obviously is improving considerably, but he's going to have to carry weight he's never carried before. Nick Zito always adds five lengths in major races, so I'd keep an eye on [Woodward third-place finisher] **Wanderin Boy** (Seeking the Gold). He could pull some more magic out of his hat, and Nick is known for doing that."

Trainer Todd Pletcher confirmed that he will have two representatives in Saturday's race, The Allen Paulson Living Trust's A.P. Arrow (A.P. Indy) and Michael Tabor's Ravel (Fusaichi Pegasus). The former, runner-up in the GI Donn H. in February, was fourth to Curlin in the G1 Dubai World Cup the following month and filled the same spot behind the champ in the Woodward Aug. 30. Ravel was a promising three-year-old of last season, winning Santa Anita's GIII Sham S., but was sidelined eight months by injury. He has one win from four starts since his return and his last, a fourth in a Saratoga allowance, marked his first on a conventional dirt surface. Pletcher could have shipped Ravel back to California for another start over the synthetic, but is trying to shift gears with the colt.

"We like the idea of a mile and a quarter and while he did run pretty well on the synthetic surfaces, the last couple of experiences we didn't think were great," the champion trainer commented. "We feel like he's a dirt horse and we might find our way back to the synthetic at some point, but we want to try him in a legitimate dirt race."--A.C.

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The connections of several of the top Eclipse contenders have indicated that they may not run in the Breeders' Cup because they feel their horses will not perform as well on Santa Anita's synthetic surface as they do on conventional dirt. Should the surface factor so heavily into the decision of whether to run or not? Do you think that skipping the Breeders' Cup for this reason should count against a horse in the Eclipse voting?

Team Valor International Owner Barry Irwin:

Everybody is going to answer this question from their own self-serving perspective. Media representatives, as



they do each year in bullying owners into supplementing their ineligible horses for the Breeders' Cup, will want to see all of the top horses run for their own amusement and to have something to write or gab about. Racetrack owners will want to encourage owners to run their horses because it will shore up their position. But owners and trainers, who have hard bucks on the line, will take a reasoned approach, because they are the ones with the real personal investments to consider. The real

question is not whether horses that don't run in the Breeders' Cup should be penalized for not participating. The real question is whether the media will have the courage, intellect and sportsmanship to vote for a horse that did not run in the Breeders' Cup races. Based on what I have seen in the past, I don't think they will vote fairly.

Winchell Thoroughbreds owner Ron Winchell:

Synthetic surfaces seem to severely diminish the predictability of performance for many horses. I see

synthetics as a third surface, for the simple fact that they play differently than conventional dirt or grass! So by that fact alone, it will definitely play a role in the decision making process of entering horses and will ultimately play a role in the outcome. I believe BC victories should play a supporting role in deciding Eclipse awards, not the sole reason. BC races represent one race on one day, not the accomplishments of a



horse all year long. For that reason, I do not believe skipping the BC because its run on a synthetic surface should count against a horse in the Eclipse voting.



The National Thoroughbred Racing Association (NTRA) announced yesterday the creation of an 11-member advisory panel that will serve on the Horseplayers' Coalition, a consortium of horseplayers whose common objective is to seek legislative and regulatory solutions to tax and business issues that impact racing fans and pari-mutuel racetracks. Chairing the Horseplayers' Coalition is Mel Moser, a retired attorney from Kentucky. Other members of the advisory panel are: Herman Bell, an IT professional from Maryland; Steve Byk, an entrepreneur, radio personality and horse owner from New York; Gupta Etwaru, an ophthalmological surgeon from California; Ron Geary, a racetrack and racehorse owner from Kentucky; Jim Goodman, a simulcasting and marketing manager from Kentucky; Bob Hansan, a software entrepreneur from Virginia; Louis Licata, an attorney from Ohio; Mike Maloney, a professional horseplayer from Kentucky; Mike Mayo, a healthcare entrepreneur from Texas; and Judy Wagner, an insurance executive from Louisiana. Members of the Horseplayers' Coalition Advisory Panel will serve for a minimum of two years, be available for grass roots lobbying in Washington, D.C., and help the Coalition identify, shape and prioritize issues that affect horseplayers at the Federal level. "The advisory panel will play a critical role in our grass roots lobbying and Congressional communications," said Peggy Hendershot, senior vice president of legislative affairs for the NTRA. 

TRAINER RIDES TO THE RESCUE

Lindemann is helping Suffolk horses avoid slaughterhouse

The Angel of Suffolk Downs is a gentle soul, always smiling, except when asked about the Killer.

Trainer Lorita Lindemann scowls when she describes the past practice of Suffolk Downs horses being loaded on trailers for the long journey to the slaughterhouse.

She says she never called the meat buyer--the man who sells horses by the pound at auction--by his name. She simply called him the Killer.

To his face.

"Now the Killer, you just look at him and know he's a bad guy," says Lindemann. "He's a grubby guy. He'd come through here and in a real cocky voice say, 'Whaddya got? Whaddya got for sale? I'll give you a hundred bucks.'

"You have to be stupid not to know where your horse is going. Your horse isn't going on that trailer so somebody can have a nice riding horse in their backyard somewhere. It's going to slaughter and to wind up in a fancy restaurant in Paris."

She says the Killer called her worse than what she called him. "He's probably called me every name in the book," she said. "I'm the first one to say something to him."

In two decades at the track, Lindemann by her own account has rescued 100 horses from being slaughtered. When the truck came, she would grab horses and hide them. As a liaison for the Thoroughbred Retirement Foundation and the Communication Alliance to Network Thoroughbred Ex-Racehorses (CANTER) New England, she would help rescue horses and find them homes. She'd fill out the paperwork the horse owners didn't want to bother with. A horse advocate first, trainer second, she would tell owners when their horses risked injury by running and needed to find greener pastures.

"She's pretty amazing," says Ellen O'Brien, executive director of CANTER New England. "Lorita is a godsend; we're lucky to have her. She's incredibly selfless. I can't tell you how many thousands of hours she's spent out of the goodness of her heart trying to assist these animals."

In 1989, 342,877 horses were slaughtered in the United States, according to the US Department of Agriculture. In 2007, US slaughterhouses were shut down, but tens of thousands of horses are still exported to slaughterhouses in Canada and Mexico. One horse is slaughtered every five minutes, according to the Animal Welfare Institute.

Horse meat is considered a delicacy in France, Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, and Japan.

Some champions are retired to stud and live their lives in Kentucky bluegrass. Others become tourist attractions. Most are not. Ferdinand, the 1986 Kentucky Derby winner and Horse of the Year, died in a Japanese slaughterhouse in 2002.

But no one will be eating low-level Suffolk Downs horses anymore. The East Boston track recently became the first in the nation to ban any trainer that allows horses to be sold for slaughter. That's a lifetime ban, zero tolerance.

"It's about doing the right thing," says Sam Elliott, the Suffolk Downs vice president of racing who first dubbed Lindemann an angel. "The horses are the stars of the show, and I thought it's time to start treating them as such."

She Takes it Personally...

Lindemann says in the past her calls to save horses went unheeded. And though appearances by the Killer's truck dwindled considerably in the last 20 years, it was still allowed in the backstretch.

Now the truck can't get past security.

"We just told them they weren't welcome here anymore," says Elliott.

New Suffolk Downs owner Richard Fields has given grants to both the TRF and CANTER to find homes for these retired athletes. Fields himself has adopted four Suffolk horses for his farm in Wyoming.

Lindemann is thrilled.

"This is the first year I've gotten any help," she says. "Anybody else who was at the track I couldn't get to. I mean, 'Who was I?'"

She is a special person, according to David Sears, executive director of Watchtower Farms in Deerfield, N.H.

"She probably cares more about horses than herself," says Sears. "She's the one person that would do anything to save a horse."

Watchtower, a six-year-old stallion Lindemann trained, was purchased by Sheikh Mohammed Bin Rashid Al Maktoum, the ruler of Dubai, a man worth \$18 billion, according to Forbes Magazine. He is trying to obtain all 56 foals of the great Dubai Millennium, a



sensational horse who won 9 of 10 starts, including the 2000 Dubai World Cup, but died prematurely.

Lindemann coordinated every detail of Watchtower's retirement to the New England Thoroughbred Retirement Center, which cares for retired Thoroughbreds and retrains some for adoption. Sears named her "Horseman of the Month" and renamed the center for Watchtower.

"She probably spends as much time taking care of horses in danger as she does working with horses in the stable," says Sears.

Lindemann takes no horse manure from slaughterhouse buyers because she was tricked by one as a child. Her very first horse, Federal Sin, wound up being sent to a slaughterhouse from Rockingham Park.

"I can't believe as a kid I watched my own horse get on a truck thinking he's going to be fine," she says. "I finally realized what it's all about. It's unreal. I've watched tapes on it. It's just awful, it's so inhumane."

The horse auctions are nearly as bad, she says.

"Nine out of 10 Thoroughbreds don't sell because of their injuries," she says. "Then they line them up behind the auction and truck them to Canada. Now they usually use double-deckers. They pigpile the horses in there, and they end up sustaining worse injuries."

She says the horses are terrified.

"Horses know absolutely everything," she says.
"They are not dumb. Oh my God, they smell horror.
They smell death. When horses have to be euthanized, it's unbelievable how they act. I think they talk in the middle of the night."

Word Spreads...

Last Saturday, Hall of Fame trainer Nick Zito is brought Commentator to race in the GII Massachusetts H. at Suffolk Downs as a show of support for the track's pro-horse stance, according to Elliott.

Other tracks are considering the anti-slaughter ban. Penn National Race Course in Grantville, Pa., has already implemented a horse safety policy.

And more changes are possible. The Prevention of Equine Cruelty Act of 2008, currently in committee on Capitol Hill, would make the exporting of horse meat intended for human consumption a criminal act. But powerful opponents charge that starvation and neglect are far worse fates. The livestock industry believes a ban would embolden animal rights activists to go after the cattle and poultry industries.

But Suffolk Downs's lifetime ban is an important first step, animal activists say.

"I'm delighted they are keeping these vultures with false pretenses off the track," says Dr. Nick Dodman, co-founder of Veterinarians for Equine Welfare. "Other tracks should follow their lead.

"I've seen the executions. The whole process disgusts me. In Canada, 70 percent of the time the stunguns are used improperly; the horse is flopping around like it's running on ice.

"Following 'stunning,' they are suspended, some still conscious, and their throats are cut seconds before their lower limbs are amputated.

"In Mexico, instead of using a stun gun, they stab the horses repeatedly into the spine with puntilla knives, rendering the poor creatures paraplegic before suspension and bleeding out. It's horrible."

Lindemann says diners who think horse meat is healthier than other beef should beware.

"These horses are on medications for racing, like bute [phenylbutazone]," says Lindemann. "They don't feed or water them on the trailers because they're trying to get the medications out of their systems. It's a delicacy, so they want the toxins out. It's really awful."

Goats and Cats Welcome...

Stable 7 in the backstretch of Suffolk Downs is by no means heaven. The stables are ancient, and some of the wood has been nibbled away by nervous Thoroughbreds.

Lindemann, as always, has been working since before sunrise. She has just finished wrapping the legs of a seven-year-old named New York Cat, who looks as if he's laughing.

Lindemann is a softie. She has rescued an abandoned goat named Moose and gotten him shelter in a bunker just outside the stalls.

"He keeps the horses calm," she says.

She adopts every stray cat at the track and takes them to her New Hampshire home. The stable has posters all around it promoting horse retirement. "Give me your tired, your poor, your weary . . . " says one.

It's a better atmosphere since the Killer can't come around anymore, she says.

"These horses are my everything," she says. "Once I started, I couldn't stop."

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THIS WEEK IN RACING...

September 26, 1942...The Jockey Club stewards revoked jockey Eddie Arcaro's license for one year after a display of "rough riding" aboard odds-on favorite Occupation in the Cowdin S. September 19. In the race, Arcaro deliberately drove his horse into another, Breezing Home, knocking jockey Vincent Nodarse into the infield. Nodarse and his mount had crowded Arcaro at the start, almost causing him to be unseated.

September 27, 1947...Armed, then the world's leading money-winning Thoroughbred, met 1946 Triple Crown winner **Assault** in the first \$100,000 winner-take-all match race, held at Belmont Park. Armed won easily over a less-than 100 percent Assault.
