Eagle Mountain, who also notched a second to Authorized (Ire) in last year's G1 Epsom Derby, finished his sophomore season with a narrow runner-up finish to Literato (Fr) (Kendor {Fr}) in the G1 Champion S. in October. He was absent for 348 days before reappearing to annex Newmarket's one-mile G3 Joel S. Oct. 3. Eagle Mountain then shipped to the U.S. for the Breeders' Cup, where he took on the 1 1/2-mile trip of the Turf. De Kock is confident the 2000 meters of the Cup, or about 1 1/4 miles, is a better fit for Eagle Mountain.

"I think this trip will really suit him," he said. "He had the speed to set a track record for the mile at Newmarket on his first run back, and then was close to a breakneck gallop in the Breeders' Cup Turf and was only found wanting in the last 150 meters or so."

De Kock concluded by handing his charge a nice compliment. "I think he has the ability to be equally as good as Archipenko (Kingmambo) and maybe even be better," de Kock said, referring to his winner of the G1 Audemars Piguet QEII Cup at this course and distance in April.

Getting 'Good' for the Mile?

Winless in his last three, Hong Kong's reigning Horse of the Year **Good Ba Ba** (Lear Fan) drilled 1400 meters over the turf yesterday with jockey Christophe Soumillon in the irons. The Frenchman, perenially a fan



The six-year-old Good Ba Ba, who is looking to defend his title in the G1 Cathay Pacific Hong Kong Mile, stopped the clock in :22 for the final 400 meters. Trainer Andreas

Schutz was pleased with the work and declared Good Ba Ba in the same form as when a short-head winner of this race a year ago. "He wasn't at his best when the season started," Schutz admitted. "He was coughing, and it only cleared up about three days before his first run. It's been a different preparation this time around with different results, but he's still as good as last year, no question."

Good Ba Ba capped a five-race winning skein in the G1 Champions Mile in Hong Kong last spring before shipping to be well-beaten in the G1 Yasuda Kinen in Tokyo in June. In his two starts this autumn, Good Ba Ba was sixth to Viva Pataca (GB) in the Listed Sha Tin Trophy and then third to Egyptian Ra (NZ) (Woodborough) in the Listed Cathay Pacific International Mile Trial Nov. 23.



"He has come on as I would have hoped since the Mile Trial and, now back to level weights, I'm confident of him running to his best form," added Schutz. Schutz said that he hoped Good Ba Ba would find a post position "somewhere in the middle" at Thursday's barrier draw. "I wouldn't want him to draw along the rails or on the outside," he said.

The four-year-old had his first sighting of Sha Tin yesterday, but was restricted to just a gentle canter around the all-weather under the watchful eye of trainer Ralph Beckett,

who explained he is trying to perform a balancing act to keep his charge happy. The trick with Muhannak, Beckett said, is to keep him stimulated and occupied because "he loves to do new things, but he is difficult in that I always have to keep on top of him, but at the same time keep him fresh." Though Muhannak's last three victories, including a listed victory at Dundalk, came over artificial surfaces, he has also shown good form over the turf, and Beckett expects a good showing on Sha Tin's green Sunday. "He will like the track here, and, although he loves synthetic surfaces, I am very hopeful the surface at Sha Tin will be to his liking," said Beckett. "He has the action for it, and I am confident of another good run. He owes us nothing after his win in California but, believe me, that was no fluke."

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Drawing a 'Bead' on International Races...

Jockey Darren Beadman carries plenty of ammunition entering this weekend's International races. Included among his live mounts is the likely favorite for G1 Cathay Pacific Hong Kong Cup, the six-year-old

{Ire}). Beadman has ridden Hong Kong's highestrated performer in nine of his last 10 starts and says the gelding is in his best form ever after returning from a five-month break. "His two wins this season [the '08/'09 season] have been very comfortable, without going to the bottom of the tank either time, and he's

pulled up terrifically well from both those runs," said Beadman. "His feet are good, he's working well, and at this stage everything has gone to plan." Viva Pataca, runner-up in the G1 Dubai Sheema Classic at Nad Al Sheba in March, concluded Hong Kong's '07/'08 season with a third to Archipenko in the G1 Audemars Piguet QE II Cup Apr. 27 and a second as the chalk in the Citi Champions & Chater Cup May 25. Viva Pataca has registered two wins since the break, taking the Listed Sha Tin Trophy Oct. 26 and the Listed Cathay Pacific International Cup Trial Nov. 16. Viva Pataca is expected to have his last serious bit of work this morning.

In the G1 Hong Kong Vase, Beadman will ride the veteran seven-year-old **Douro Valley (Aus)** (Encosta de Lago {Aus}) for Australian trainer Danny O'Brien. "He's a nice horse," said Beadman. "I've ridden him once before and we won a good [listed] race at Caulfield. Going right-handed is a little question mark against him, but he's been targeted at the race, and I'm happy to be on him. If we can find a nice position in the run to the first corner then he'll be competitive."

Jockeys Ready for Battle...

Twelve of the world's leading riders will take part in this evening's Cathay Pacific International Jockeys' Championship. Yesterday, the jockeys donned boxing gloves in a show of force at a preview at Happy Valley Racecourse, which will host the competition in advance of Sunday's International races at Sha Tin. While there's likely no Pacquiao in the group, the competition figures to be fierce when the three-race series gets underway in race three. Races five and seven are the other two races which comprise the competition, the winner of which will get a HK\$200,000 bonus. The runner-up will receive HK\$100,000. The Jockeys' Championship is based on a points system.

A pair of jockeys from the U.S. will compete--Eclipse Award-winning rider Garrett Gomez and the four-time Breeders' Cup hero Cornelio Velasquez. Both traveled to Hong Kong from Japan, where they were to ride in the G1 Japan Cup Dirt. Velasquez was aboard the unplaced Frost Giant, while Gomez's mount Mast Track was scratched. **Cont. p5**



Eight lots later, Frederic Sauque purchased a colt by Marchand de Sable out of Entente Cordiale (Ire) (Ela-Mana-Mou {GB}) from the draft of Haras du Mezeray for \in 60,000. The half-brother to this year's G1 King's Stand S. hero Equiano (Fr) (Acclamation {GB}) had many admirers, but it was this sale's stalwart Saugue who prevailed. Earlier, another major domestic buyer in Marc-Antoine Berghgracht paid €47,000 for hip 773, a son of Theatrical (Ire) from the consignment of Haras de Coulonces. He is out of Mark My Words (Aptitude), a half to the listed-placed duo Hayhaat (Irish River {Fr}) and Palomar (Chester House) from the international family established by fourth dam *Glad Rags II. Both colts had been offered earlier this year at Argana's August Sale: the Marchand de Sable colt was bought in at \in 70,000, while the son of Theatrical RNA'd at €100,000.

Of the fillies, it was Haras de Grandcamp's hip <u>802</u> who provided the highlight when selling to Agence Caballis for \in 25,000. By Statue of Liberty (Storm Cat), she is a granddaughter of the 1989 GII Schuylerville S. winner Golden Reef (Mr. Prospector), who was also runner-up that year in the GI Spinaway S. and GI Matron S.

The record price helped shore up the average, which at \in 7,561 stood at only 11 percent down on 2007, but the median of \in 4,000 suffered a now-familiar heavy fall by a third on last year. Yesterday's session was the final one for the sales company in 2008 and, at its close, Argana's President Eric Hoyeau reflected on the year. "The August Yearling sale returned a record turnover, allowing Argana to increase its share of the European yearling market by seven points and to occupy a prime position on a global scale," Hoyeau said. "Our annual aggregate closes 13 percent down on the record figure achieved in 2007, yet it remains higher than the total turnover recorded in 2006, which was already a vintage year. Up until September, all our sales maintained the upward trend initiated in 2006, before proving admirably resilient in a context of global financial turmoil that took the Thoroughbred market by storm. We analyse such satisfactory results as a combination of several factors. First of all, we must praise the healthy fundamentals of the French market, notably the high level of prize money as well as of the breeders' and owners' premiums. The strict selection policy implemented by Argana since its set-up, and the progressive deployment of our commercial network on the various continents have also ensured the constant upgrade of our offer as well as the widening of our client base. Considering these good results and the current economy, we intend to maintain and intensify this strategy in 2009. More than ever, the restricted format of the sales on all market segments together with a rigorous selection will be essential assets in an attempt to cope with a more restrictive demand." 


THE REAL PROBLEM

There was a short piece in last Thursday's *TDN* which I found disturbing. "Handle Figures Decline", it was titled, and it got me thinking. The article reported that handle on U.S. racing declined by 9.7 percent in November, compared to November last year, according to Equibase. Handle for the year is down by 6.2 percent, while purses, down 2.3 percent in November, have declined by a fraction of one percent in 2008.

This sent me scurrying to that most-revered of reference books on horse racing in North America, The American Racing Manual, published by *Daily Racing Form* since its inception at the end of the 19th century. Here I learned--well, as usual, that there are a lot of conflicting figures being published, which is par for the course in this business--but also that the racing side of the business in the U.S. has been mostly stagnant for the whole of the 21st century. U.S. pari-mutuel handle, which had been just under \$9 billion in 1988, had increased by 60 percent, to \$14.3 billion, by the year 2000. U.S, handle reached a high of nearly \$15.2 billion in 2003, but the last three years has hovered in the \$14.5 to \$14.7-billion range, and this year will probably be fortunate to hit \$14 billion. In other words, since cresting the \$14-billion mark in 2000, the handle on U.S. racing has been essentially the same.

In 1993, U.S. purses totaled \$692.1 million. Purses then grew for eight consecutive years, by 54 percent cumulatively (almost seven percent a year), to a new high of \$1.067 billion in 2001. Though this year's total should approach and maybe even surpass last year's record of \$1.18 billion, that would still then equal just 12-percent growth over the last seven years--about 1.7 percent per year. If handle is stagnant-to-falling, purses cannot be far behind, since, in the U.S., purses are invariably tied to handle, with perhaps a one-year delay.

When we talk, optimistically, about the breeding sector, and the rest of the world emerging from the current recession, this is something breeders need to be paying attention to. Between 1978 and 1986 purses increased by 83 percent--over 10 percent per year. Even during the last recession in this business, from 1986-1992, purses still increased by \$100 million.




Now, after a boom period in which purses only managed to increase by less than two percent a year, we are likely to see actual declines in purses. In other words, the bad deal for racehorse owners not only isn't improving--really hasn't been improving--it's actually getting worse. For the breeder, the racehorse owner has to be the end user, or he/she, the breeder, is going to be. And breeders have known for decades that putting horses in training, on the whole, is a big loser.

Thus the immediate concern about the handle. It has to go up for purses to go up, and if it goes down, and purses go down, there is even less incentive for prospective owners to buy racehorses. But there is a longer-term concern about the handle, and that's the one where we talk about the very survival of horse racing in the U.S. Horse racing's share of the gambling market has been shrinking since the legalization of casinos more than 50 years ago. To a large extent, that is a result of the proliferation of gambling as governments discover the benefits of voluntary taxation. That is inevitable. But what isn't inevitable is the decline of horse racing, socially, as a fun thing to do for an American public which will, eventually, get back to having lots of entertainment dollars to spend. Horse racing, with its rapidly aging demographics and still without a user-friendly portal through which to enter, is progressively slipping off the radar of each succeeding generation of young people with money to spend.

The problem, really, is consciousness of horse racing, in the U.S. in particular. In many countries in Western Europe and Asia, especially, as I've noted before, in former British colonies, horse racing is still a major sport/vehicle for gambling. It's dwarfed, of course by soccer, and I mean as a gambling vehicle as well--just ask betting officials in Japan and Hong Kong about the impact of betting on soccer on their handle. Even so, horse racing has a much bigger space in public consciousness--and on the sports pages--in many other countries than it does in the U.S.


Borrowing ideas which have worked elsewhere is often a sound strategy; in that regard I can recommend the website of the International Federation of Horse Racing Authorities (www.ifhaonline.org), chaired by the eminent Louis Romanet, formerly the supremo of French racing, and long a positive force in trying to rationalize racing globally. The IFHA's annual report, published with their annual conference in Paris during Arc weekend, always makes for interesting reading. We learn in their 2008 report, for example (downloadable from the website), that worldwide handle in 2007 was an estimated \$130 billion (a little under 10 percent in the U.S.), and that the U.S. is the single biggest country in terms of total purses (about \$3.2 billion globally), and also in number of mares, and foal crop (about 30 percent of a reported worldwide total in 2007 of around 118,000). Yet in many ways U.S. racing is out of step, or lagging behind, racing in the rest of the world--particularly in the area of public consciousness within its society. Cont. p9

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I am not the first person to have noticed this problem. It's been on our radar screens for some time, but almost more conceptually. But now that stagnation is turning to decline in handle and purse figures, it's a problem that needs to be more on the minds of industry thinkers and doers. There are lots of ways to address the problem, many locally, but some nationally. The Breeders' Cup this year successfully invested in high-end televised visibility, and succeeded in creating a two-day festival in which thankfully no horses died. That was a big, high-end win for the industry. But stallion farms and breeders can only pay for so much, especially when their revenues are likely to be down a guarter to a third in the short term. Education is a great way to reach people. Accessibility has always been a problem for this industry, and now that there are programs ranging from the University of Arizona's Racing Industry program to Darley's Flying Start ensuring that bright young people are exposed to the industry, maybe it's time we turned our attention to the problem of accessibility by the American public.

One of the most effective advertising campaigns I've ever seen was a television and billboard campaign launched by the American Dairy Association. It consisted of two words: 'drink milk.' They had the notinconsiderable advantage that people already knew how to drink, they just needed to tell them what to drink. We couldn't do that, but a national ad campaign with a simple slogan, combined with local educational programs which would make people want to come back to the 'front side,' and teach them about handicapping and gambling, would be more the idea.

Besides a long-term approach aspiring to improve public vibes about horse racing, there is a short-term issue which could improve the handle: on-line betting. This is what handicapping guru Andy Beyer had to say when I spoke to him about racing's 'handle problem': "The racing public has always had an aging demographic. People in their 60s are more likely to have time for an afternoon-long weekday entertainment than people in their 20s.

"Horse racing's best hope today," he continued, "lies in the fact that it is so well-suited to online distribution. Players don't have to spend five hours in a grandstand to bet the horses. They can download data, analyze it, watch races and bet them via computer. This modern version of the racing game is one that ought to appeal to a younger demographic.

"Of course," concluded Andy, "the industry is doing its best to screw up this potential advantage. With all the skirmishing over ADWs, and with the industry's failure to clarify the legal status of on-line betting, players face a lot of unnecessary obstacles when they try to watch and bet races from their home."

No doubt about it, trying to implement any or all of these programs would cost real money and require funding. But if ever the term 'investment in the industry' was appropriate, that time is now.

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AND THE WINNERS ARE...

From a handicappers' standpoint, the six best active synthetic surface sires standing in North America are: A.P. Indy, Belong to Me, Exchange Rate, Put It Back, Slew City Slew, Tribal Rule.

The criteria? I set out to find out merely how many winners a sire had had on synthetic tracks or even their number of stakes winners on the surfaces, but whether or not their progeny improve on the synthetics. The offspring of those sires present excellent bets when they race over synthetic tracks. **Cont. p10**

<u>TDN CRITERIA</u>

Assisting me in the project, Jerry Brown and George White of Thoro-Graph put together a comprehensive list of data covering how the offspring of sires are faring in a number of categories when it comes to synthetic surface racing. Only the six sires listed above qualified on four criteria: on synthetic tracks they must have had at least 30 wins; their offspring must win at least 16 percent of the time on synthetics; their offspring must produce an overall flat-bet profit; and their offspring must also produce a flat-bet profit when making their first starts on synthetic tracks. The data runs through Oct. 31.

Though this is a horseplayers' approach to the tricky subject of synthetic tracks, it's also a productive way for the breeder and buyer at the sales to identify sire lines that will excel on synthetic tracks. Sires that produce horses that are good betting opportunities on synthetic tracks are the same sires the breeding industry should be turning to when trying to identify stallions that are synthetic specialists.

A look at the six "Synthetic Sensations":

A.P. Indy: It figures he's a good synthetic sire, as his offspring are, basically, good at everything. According to the Thoro-Graph data, A.P. Indy had had 55 wins on synthetic tracks, for a 16.62 winning percentage, and his offspring showed a return on investment on a \$2 win wager of \$2.15. A.P. Indys were winning 18.03 percent "first-time synthetic" for an ROI of \$2.51. A.P. Indy's recent stakes winners on synthetic tracks include Little Belle (Ashland S.), Adriano (Lane's End S.) and Marchfield (Autumn S.).

Belong to Me: His offspring are winning at a rate of 18.87 percent on synthetic tracks and 19.75 percent of the time in their first synthetic starts. He shows strong, positive ROIs in both categories. His best synthetic surface runner may be Jack Sullivan, a Polytrack specialist who raced primarily in England this year. He's 5-for-11 on synthetics and won a \$50,000 stakes at Wolverhampton in May.

Exchange Rate: His offspring win an amazing 23.15 percent of the time on synthetic tracks and 25 percent of the time in their first synthetic starts. The ROI for a \$2 win bet for all Exchange Rates making their first synthetic starts is \$3.28. A number of Exchange Rate offspring have had big years at Woodbine, including Southern Exchange and Juliet's Spirit, both dual stakes winners in 2008 north of the border.

Put It Back: He is the sire of In Summation, who, perhaps more so than any other horse, saw his career take off when switched to synthetic surfaces. A modestly accomplished turf sprinter before trainer Christophe Clement hauled him out west, In Summation has won four stakes on synthetic surfaces, including the Grade I Bing Crosby in 2007 at Del Mar. Petty Things is another example of a Put It Back excelling on synthetic surfaces.

An allowance winner this fall at Keeneland, he lost by 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ lengths in his career debut at Churchill only to come back a month later at Arlington, where he won by 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ lengths at 9-1. Put It Back's offspring win 24 percent of the time on synthetic surfaces for an ROI of \$3.13 and win 27.78 percent of the time first time synthetic for an ROI of \$6.01.

Slew City Slew: He's had 60 wins on synthetic surfaces, where his offspring win at a rate of 16.30 percent. His offspring win 13.89 percent of the time first time synthetic with an ROI of \$2.80. He is the sire of Lava Man, a Grade I winner on grass, dirt and synthetic surfaces. He's also the sire of Victory Romance, who has placed in several stakes on Woodbine's Polytrack surface.

Tribal Rule: A son of Storm Cat who stands in California, he's benefited greatly from that state's switch to synthetic surface racing. His offspring win 19.8 percent of their races on synthetic surfaces, with an ROI of \$2.42, and 16.98 percent of the time when racing on a synthetic surface for the first time, with an ROI of \$3.48. His best horse to date has been Georgie Boy, a winner of four synthetic surface stakes, including the Grade I Del Mar Futurity. Tribesman, winner of this year's California Cup Sprint, is another son of Tribal Rule that has excelled on synthetic tracks.

A look at some other notable synthetic sires:

Unbridled Jet: Standing for \$4,000 in New Jersey, he might just be the best bet for bargain hunters looking for a stallion whose progeny figure to excel on synthetic tracks. He's had only 14 horses try synthetic surfaces, but they are a 23-for-70 combined for an ROI of \$2.79. Miss Lombardi, a 6-year-old mare by Unbridled's Jet, is 2-for-2 on synthetics, having won at Presque Isle Downs and Keeneland.

Skip Away: Though he's largely been a disappointment at stud, the former Horse of the Year is showing promise as a top synthetic sire. He has had 51 synthetic wins and his offspring are winning at a 15.79 percent rate on synthetic tracks. His top earner this year was Secret Getaway, who won, among other races, the Victoria Park S. over the Polytrack surface at Woodbine.

Smart Strike: Curlin's defeat in the Breeders' Cup Classic may have been the most notable synthetic surface flop this year, but Smart Strike is by no means a poor synthetic sire. In fact, he's among the best. His offspring have won 69 races on synthetic tracks or 15.58 percent of the time they try the surface. His offspring also have positive ROIs on synthetic tracks and when trying synthetic tracks for the first time. After Curlin, his second top earner this year was Square Eddie, the winner of the Grade I Lane's End Breeders' Futurity at Keeneland and the runner-up in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile over synthetic surfaces.

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STEWART SET TO RETURN TO WORK?

Dr. Rodney Stewart, an equine veterinarian who was banned for five years by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission (KHRC) for the possession of cobra venom, could resume his practice soon. In a hearing held Tuesday in Lexington, attorneys for Stewart and the KHRCagreed that the vet may return to his practice, from which he was initially banned for five years, but was extended to an indefinite suspension by chief steward John Veitch in December 2007 when Stewart failed to provide documents and computer related to the case. Robert Watt, a lawyer for the KHRC, confirmed during Tuesday's hearing that Stewart has now come forth with the requested material, and Veitch said he will issue an order to end the indefinite suspension, according to Daily Racing Form, but a release from the Commonwealth of Kentucky suggested the outcome is less certain. In part, the statement read, "Dr. Stewart has not been issued a 2008 racing license by the KHRC, which is required to practice veterinary medication on race track properties. Should he decide to ever apply for a KHRC racing license, his application would be referred to the Commission's license review committee to determine his eligibility to receive any Kentucky racing license." Tuesday's hearing was the continuation of a similar one conducted Dec. 3. DRF reports that commission investigator Don Kolioutas was the lone witness during yesterday's reconvened session, and he offered testimony regarding his initial investigation. During a June 2007 search of the Keeneland barn of trainer Patrick Biancone, Kolioutas reported he discovered three vials of cobra venom in a soft-sided cooler belonging to Stewart. The veterinarian allegedly testified at the Dec. 3 hearing that he did not know that the substances were in the bag, and that he stored the bag in Biancone's refrigerator to keep it cool while he worked in Keeneland's backstretch area. Stewart also testified that Biancone, who recently returned from a one-year suspension, did not know the contents of the coooler. A state hearing officer said he expects to issue a recommended order to the KHRC in February.

Racehorse Ownership--From Bloodstock to Stock Market by Jim McVicker

When one thinks of racehorse owners, it is not a stretch to associate images of luxury automobiles, yachts, expensive homes along with the scenario. A tried and true method for being a racehorse owner is to have amassed a substantial fortune. The "Sport of Kings" moniker does little to dispel this long held notion.

However, these fortunate few alone can not sustain an entire industry. A fair percentage of wealthy or moderately wealthy owners are leaving the industry, feeling the risk-to-reward ratio is not in their favor or worth the trouble.

Two speakers at the University of Arizona's 35th Symposium on Racing addressed the issue of racehorse ownership from differing perspectives and differing proposals as methods for remedying the current state of affairs.

Both stressed the urgent need to bring new participants into the industry. It is not merely the current financial environment that is presenting us with the troubling figures that show that bloodstock sales are down and RNAs are up. Buybacks are up and attendance is down.

Jeff Lifson, EVP, Midwest Operations, West Point Thoroughbreds, Inc., spoke of how those that have a desire for racehorse ownership, but also seek to minimize risk can achieve those goals by participating in fractional ownership. He indicated that it is an everincreasing trend in North America.

Lifson emphasized West Point's philosophy of creating brand recognition by providing the clientele with the utmost satisfaction in all aspects of their involvement with the ownership experience. He stated that with fractional ownership one can additionally enjoy and appreciate feeling a connection to the backside environment of racing.

The need to attract new enthusiast/participants into the industry was a key point thatwas also addressed. The need for a 21st-century approach and West Point's response to that includes evolving client services such as the use of popular technology, including posting workouts on Youtube, fan pages on Facebook and big race week diaries and blogs.

Valentine Feerick, CEO, www.blood-ex.com, takes a much more innovative approach in her business. A highly innovative, on-line, real-time, fractional ownership of racehorses throughout the world resembling an equine stock exchange. Participants can buy/sell shares in horses, form partnerships and syndicates, and compete against other individuals or partnerships for status and prizes.

The proof of concept proved highly successful during a trial run at England's Royal Ascot's 2008 meet, and enthusiasm and interest has been expressed form the traditional financial marketplace.

While the participating individual can enjoy the financial rewards of fractional ownership , the industry overall could benefit from the financial liquidity this scenario offers by a redistribution of funds back into the industry. This type of fractional ownership involves no expense for costs associated with horse maintenance, but neither does it reap the rewards of any purses the horse may win.

The Power of Blogs by Matt Carter

This year's Mark Kaufman workshop, titled The Power of Blogs, dealt with the social media and how the racing industry can use it to their advantage. The workshop is named after the former Turf Publicists of America President, who passed away in 1995. The panelists included: Jennie Rees, Louisville *Courier-Journal*; Jonathan Chavez, co-founder and director of analytics for SocialSphere Strategies; Patrick Patten, writer of the Thoroughbred racing blog "Handride;" and Bill Knauf, assistant general manger and assistant vice president of marketing operations for Monmouth Park. The panel session was moderated by Eric Wing, President of the Turf Publicists of America.

While the focus was blogging, the definition of "blog" was expanded to include social media sites such as Facebook. As Bill Knauf put it, "Hi, my name is Bill Knauf and I'm addicted to Facebook." Prior to the panel session, during the TPA Big Sport of Turfdom Award, Larry Jones, the trainer of back-to-back Kentucky Derby runners-up, said blogs "[help people] form an opinion on something they've never heard before." The panel session touched on the importance of the bloggers' experience. "People want [to read] personal, honest experiences," Mr. Patten said.

The importance of the persona posting on the social media site was also discussed. When asked about the effectiveness of social media programs, Mr. Chavez replied, "personality, bottom line." He continued the people do not want to read from a "nameless or faceless person." Jennie Rees discussed how the *Louisville Courier- Journal* has put an emphasis on their staff creating blogs, and "there are practical uses for the blog," such as putting up her full or unedited article. She also discussed the accountability of those bloggers.

"[There] needs to be very clear bright line policies about what they can and can't talk about," Mr. Patten said. The panel concluded with a question about where social media is headed and what is next to come. The answers varied, but in general, social media needs to be about collaboration, "bringing anything and everything together," Mr. Patten said.

Numbers Fall at Fasig Midlantic Sale
