#### **LUSH LASHES ON GO**

Lush Lashes (GB) (Galileo {Ire}) continued to impress connections as she prepared yesterday for a possible fourth Group 1 victory of the year in Sunday's

G1 Cathay Pacific Hong Kong Cup. The sophomore filly galloped at Sha Tin Wednesday, putting up 400 meters of :27.8, :27.7 and finishing with a final 400 meters in :24.4. "She went through her paces nicely," said jockey Kevin Manning, who was aboard for the gallop. "One of her strong points is that she's very straightforward and can be rid-

den any way. We can have her handy or slot her in behind." Manning added the Irish filly has handled the trip to Hong Kong in fine shape. "She has travelled over very well and she hasn't lost any weight," he said. "She has a very strong constitution and you wouldn't know she's been on the go for most of the year." Lush Lashes has made eight starts this term, winning the G1 Coronation S., G1 Yorkshire Oaks and G1 Matron S. Looking ahead to Sunday's race, Manning pinpointed his main competition. "Viva Pataca (GB) (Marju {Ire}) looks like the one we've got to beat," he said. As a three-year-old filly, Lush Lashes will receive between four and seven pounds from the rest of the field in her first test against the boys.

#### Aussie Invader Tunes Up for HK Sprint...

MG1SW Apache Cat (Aus) (Lion Cavern) geared up for Sunday's G1 Cathay Pacific Hong Kong Sprint with a sharp move over the Sha Tin turf yesterday. With regular rider Danielle Ellett aboard, the gelding covered 800 meters in :49.90, rolling home the final 400 meters in :22. "He really does feel great," Ellett offered. "He's very laid-back, very relaxed and takes everything in his stride. It doesn't matter to him whether he's going left handed or right handed and the change of environment hasn't bothered him." Trainer Greg Eurell also issued an upbeat bulletin. "I'm very pleased with him," Eurell said. "He's a horse who enjoys his work, did it pretty comfortably this morning and everything has gone as well as we could hope for." Apache Cat has posted five wins at the highest level in his native land this term, including the G1 Coolmore Lightning S., G1 Australia S., G1 T J Smith S., G1 BTC Cup and the G1 Doomben 10,000. He was last seen finishing second in the G2 Winterbottom S. at Ascot Nov. 29.

#### Major Cadeaux Breezes on All-Weather...

Major Cadeaux (GB) (Cadeaux Genereux {GB}), winner of this term's G2 Sandown Mile in April and G3 John of Gaunt S. in May, breezed an easy 800 meters in :53.70 over the Sha Tin all-weather yesterday. "He lost a little weight when he arrived, but he's put that back on and we are very happy with him," assistant trainer Richard Hannon Jr. said of the G1 Cathay Pacific Hong Kong Mile contender. "Many people back home think he wants soft ground--that's a fallacy--in fact I don't think he really liked the soft conditions at Deauville when he was third in the G1 Prix Jacques le Marois. We won't be using the ground as an excuse on Sunday." Hannon added that Major Cadeaux will turn in a faster work Friday when jockey Richard Hughes arrives. Major Cadeaux most recently finished ninth in the G2 Challenge S. at Newmarket Oct. 18.

"His first-up run was delayed, but he wasn't beaten all that far when he was only at about 60 percent in the Cup Trial and now he's much better off," Ho said of Packing Winner's seventh-place finish in the G2 Cathay Pacific International Cup Trial last time Nov. 16. "Starting the season at 2000 meters and then going up to 2400 meters is a challenge, but I think he will either lead or sit in second if the Australian horse [Douro Valley {Aus} {Encosta de Lago {Aus}] wants to take it up and he'll be staying on at the finish."

lose a lot, and looks in much better form than I expected. He put in an impressive canter today. I am really excited about Sunday's meeting." Laurel Guerreiro (Jpn) (King Halo {Jpn}) prepared for the G1 Cathay Pacific Hong Kong Sprint with a sharp 800-meter move over the Sha Tin lawn in :47.80, getting the final 400 meters in a scorching :21.40. "He looks in top form and galloped very powerfully," trainer Mitsugu Kon said of the G3 Hankyu Hai winner. "He hasn't lost any weight travelling here and he is also eating up well so we are very happy."

#### NEW APPROACH HRI'S HORSE OF THE YEAR

Princess Haya of Jordan's New Approach (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) was named Horse Racing Ireland's Horse of the Year at the annual Irish Horse Racing Awards in Dublin on Monday. The Jim Bolger-trained three-year-old was beating a quintet of compatriots including Duke of Marmalade (Ire) (Danehill) and Henrythenavigator (Kingmambo) to the honor following his successes in the G1 Epsom Derby, G1 Irish Champion S. and G1 Champion S. Aidan O'Brien received the Flat Award ahead of Bolger and jockeys Kevin Manning, Johnny Murtagh and Seamus Heffernan and HRI Chief Executive Brian Kavanagh said, "Despite the current economic downturn, 2008 was a very successful year for Irish racing. Our flat horses dominated throughout Europe and with the national hunt season getting into full swing, we have much to look forward to in 2009."

WHYTE WINS THIRD CXIJC Douglas Whyte, known as the "Durban Demon" and a perennial leading rider in Hong Kong, narrowly bested France's Christophe Lemaire by a score of 18 points to 16 to win Wednesday night's Cathay Pacific International Jockeys' Championship at the downtown racecourse at

Happy Valley. In racking up a third title in the event and successfully defending his championship, Whyte failed to register a single winner in the three-race affair, but did manage to post runner-up efforts in each, just good enough for the victory.

"I'm a happy guy," Whyte commented. "Sorry not to have had any wins, but it is points that count in these competitions, though I think I was unlucky in the final race. I had some great rides and good alleys. It would be marvellous to make it three in a row next year." The event got off to a rare postive start for American representatives, as Cornelio Velasquez came from off the pace to win with 13-1 chance Super Genki (Aus) (Dehere), while Gomez weakened to third aboard Classa Supreme (NZ) (Justice Prevails {Aus}) after stealing away on a loose lead (video). Germany's Andrasch Starke stormed home on the grandstand side to narrowly pip Whyte in the second of the three races, while Lemaire was third and remained in striking distance. The Frenchman, coming off his victory in the G1 Japan Cup, successfully guided Kenobe (Aus) (Keltrice {Aus}) to a popular win in the final leg, but when Whyte found a way to get Rewarding Star (NZ) (O'Reilly {NZ}) home for second, the crown was his again. Said Lemaire afterwards, "For a moment I was in trouble in the final race but he came home great. We have had great fun tonight." Starke and Velasquez finished tied for third place with 12 points each.

Joel Rosario, fresh off a five-win day at Hollywood Park, has been named to ride **Azul Leon** (Lion Heart) in the GI CashCall Futurity Dec. 20, trainer Doug O'Neill confirmed Wednesday. Azul Leon was a closing second in the GIII Hollywood Prevue S. Nov. 23 after winning the GIII Hollywood Juvenile Ch. S. earlier this year. In related news, **Axel Foley** (Officer), unbeaten in two starts on a synthetic surface in England, is scheduled to be flown here next week and supplemented to the Futurity. The Kentucky-bred is trained by John Best for Kent Bloodstock. He is scheduled to be flown here Monday and be stabled in the Doug O'Neill barn after clearing quarantine.

PELLEGRINI LURES STRONG FIELD Reigning G1 Carlos Pellegrini hero Latency (Arg) (Slew Gin Fizz) figures to have his hands full in Saturday's renewal at San Isidro, facing a stellar field of 19 rivals. The seven-year-old veteran will seek a repeat victory in South America's marquee event, but finds a field where young and old talent abounds. Latency's major adversaries are headed by several of South America's leading three-year-olds, topped by Argentine classic winner City Banker (Arg) (Lode), who is a proven Group 1 classic winner on the San Isidro turf course after comfortably capturing the Gran Premio Jockey Club in October. The ascending chestnut colt comes off a runner-up effort on dirt in the Argentine Derby and returns to his best surface Saturday. Also in the lineup is Sao Paolo Derby winner Negro Da Gaita (Arg) (Know Heights) and Peruvian classic winner Pechito (Arg) (Interprete), who headline a strong foreign delegation. Other contenders include MG1SW Eyeofthetiger (Arg) (Tempranero), G1SW Body Soguero (Arg) (Body Glove), 2007 Jose Pedro Ramirez and Latinoamericano hero Good Report (Arg) (Ride the Rails), recent Gran Premio Dardo Rocha winner Reraise (Brz) (Know Heights).

#### STEINS AIM HIGH WITH LA LEYENDA

Alberto and Renata Stein have turned breeding and racing Thoroughbred horses from a hobby into a way of life, and the couple is creating a new way of doing business in Argentina's racing industry with their newly formed La Leyenda.

"Alberto started going to the races on the weekends when he was 18 years old," explained Renata. "When he was 26, he bought his first filly. Since then, we have had five horses a year on the racetrack."

Alberto was CEO and owner of a steel manufacturing company with facilities in Argentina, Europe and the U.S., while Renata worked as an architect and as a professor at the Architecture University of Buenos Aires.

"In November 2006, Alberto sold his main business and we decided to start working on something we

really loved, but that had been a hobby until then," Renata recalled

The couple already owned a dairy farm near the town of San Antonio de Areco and, when they decided to invest in land for Thoroughbred breeding, they started their search there. In April 2007, the Steins purchased 622 acres of land that had previously been part of Haras La Florida.


Explaining the appeal of the property, Renata said, "It has rolling hills, something very rare in the Argentine pampas; it is one mile from town, has magnificent views and is in the middle of the Thoroughbred cluster of San Antonio de Areco."

After purchasing the land that would become La Leyenda, the Steins set off on a recognizance mission to the Bluegrass of Kentucky.

"We went to Kentucky and we took the TOBA course for breeders and spent an extra week visiting the best Thoroughbred farms in Lexington," Renata said. "This gave us the opportunity to understand how the industry works in the U.S., with its best practices and standards."

The Steins returned to Argentina and created a business plan that they hope will blend the best of both hemispheres.

"La Leyenda is a new business model, and our goal is to combine the best Northern Hemisphere bloodlines and best equine management in the world with Argentina's centuries-old tradition of horsemanship and of raising some of the best horses in the world.



"We will have a stallion center, shuttling proven stallions that are climbing upwards in their performance in the U.S. and, at the same time, we have created a new 'Breed to Race' business model," Renata continued.

"The model consists of a venture with Northern Hemisphere owners who will contribute selected mares for a period of seven years. Once the mare reaches Argentina, the owner

shares in the collective ownership of the offspring and still owns the mare at the end of the venture, hopefully with her value enhanced by the performance of her Argentine-born foals."

In order to bring the project to fruition, the Steins recruited long-time Three Chimneys farm manager Dan Rosenberg to act as director and North American representative for La Leyenda. Ricardo Correas, whose family has been involved with Thoroughbred breeding in Argentina for over 100 years, is the stud's general manager.

"We wanted to have a world-class operation, with the best management and facilities," Renata explained. "That is why we have Dan Rosenberg in the U.S. and Ricardo Correas in Argentina as part of our team."

According to Renata, racing in Argentina has mostly been the province of the rich. But La Leyenda will open up the sport to a new section of the population.

"Our model also enables Argentina's business class of professionals to become involved in the industry previously limited to only Argentina's ultra-wealthy," she said. "Most of the farms in Argentina breed to sell, and other farms are populated only with the horses that belong to that farm's wealthy owner. Our plan is to widen both the circle of people and the bloodlines available for Argentine racing."

Renata said that North American interests have been enthusiastic in their response.

"We have received a very positive response from



stallion owners and believe we will assemble a stallion roster second to none in Argentina," Renata said. "Response from mare owners has been very strong as well. Most of these people have experience in Argentina and love the country, its people, the quality of its horses and the level of horsemanship."

She also thinks the uncertain economic climate could encourage more owners to send their mares to La

Leyenda.

"The current economy and market conditions lend itself to this venture," she asserted. "People like the idea of having zero obligation for capital over a seven-year period, while they still own the mare, continue to enjoy the thrill of racing and have the possibility of coming up with the 'big horse.'"

La Leyenda began its broodmare band with the acquisition of five mares out of the Keeneland November sale. The stud purchased Key West Cammy (Street Cry {Ire}), Cinderella's Charm (Unbridled's Song), Candance in Aspen (Woodman), Summer Scent (Kingmambo) and Perfect Timing (Deputy Minister).


"We look for precocity and speed in the mares for the syndicate," Renata explained. "The Argentinian blood has a lot of soundness and stamina. It has been proven that a well-balanced combination of both bloodlines can create superior racing horses, like Asiatic Boy, Invasor and Bayakoa."

The new project is already generating speculation in Argentina, according to Renata.

"So far, we have been doing instead of talking, so there is a great curiosity and interest in learning more about us," Renata said. "Then, when we hired Ricardo Correas, who is one of the most prominent horseman in the country, the curiosity increased. People are very interested because this is something really different."

Renata and Alberto are hoping to attract new people to racing in Argentina through a combination of education and high-class facilities.

"We want to be able to communicate the excitement of racing and the passion of breeding," said Renata.

"We plan to follow the model of Cot Campbell's Dogwood Stable, which has been very successful in attracting new people to horse racing in the United States. We are building special guest facilities for our Argentine partners and investors when they visit, as well as our North American and European mare owners. We will provide special concierge services to our partners to make sure their investment is not just good business, but also enjoyable. That is a high priority for us."

Construction at La Leyenda is well underway.

"We have finished our first stage of construction," Renata confirmed. "The roads, the underground hardware, the paddocks with Centaur flex-rail fencing imported from the U.S., the waterers, the stallion barn with capacity for six stallions, the office facilities and some of the worker's housing and the social area are completed. The breeding shed, the light barn, the foaling barns, veterinary and more worker's housing are still under construction."

La Leyenda is also close to announcing its first stallion acquisition.

"We are very close to being able to make the announcement of our first stallion, and we are extremely excited about him," Renata said. "He is a horse that the entire Argentine breeding industry has been interested in. And we are negotiating for several other outstanding stallions. We have been very pleased with how stallion owners have received our idea and our business plan. We are very excited about 2009."-Jessica Martini

## PERCEPTIONS, REALITIES AND PRESSURE: CHANGING THE FACE OF RACING by RTIP Student Jim McVicker

"Can public pressure change the racing industry?" The answer is a resounding yes. One just has to look at the recent Massachusetts ban on greyhound racing. "Crisis of credibility," "tipping point in racing," and "change must come from within," were a few phrases used in discussing racing's current condition and concerns during a seminar on the subject at the University of Arizona's Symposium on Racing and Gaming Tuesday. A five-person panel consisting of Paul Estok, general counsel and corporate secretary, Harness Tracks of America: Mike Stone, executive director of The Louisville Winner's Federation; Jonathan Chavez, co-founder and director of analytics, SocialSphere Strategies; Eimear Dolan from the School of Health and Human Performance, Dublin City University; and Marsha Kelly, president, Kelly Media Consulting Inc., addressed several pressing issues currently facing the racing industry.

The key message was, "Get your house in order," and do it now. The panel advised implementing positive change and self-regulation based on ethical concerns, rather than waiting for legislative powers or societal pressures to do it. Cont. p2





Aside from the fierce competition the racing industry faces for the sports and wagering dollars, the overall integrity of racing itself has been called into question. Several recent events, including the breakdown of Eight Belles on national television and Big Brown's "bounce" immediately following a discontinuation of administered steroids have only served to exacerbate the problem.

Chavez stressed the seriousness of the situation by citing recent surveys which were conducted questioning "core" fans and "casual" fans. An outright ban on horse racing was favored by 50 percent of the "casual" fans surveyed. Many respondents indicated a belief that racing contains widespread cheating (wagering and race fixing), overmedication of horses on race day, and a lack of integrity in dealing with human and horse participants, as well as in wagering and in the treatment of fans.

Stone clearly illustrated the value and importance of investing in and maintaining the health and well-being of racing's human component. By choosing intervention costs versus treatment costs, he explained, not only does this demonstrate a concern for the racing work force, figures show a clear improvement to the financial bottom line.

Dolan presented an interesting study and findings regarding the health and performance of jockeys as it relates to their weight-restrictive lifestyle. Areas of concern presented included the detrimental effects of rapid weight loss, improper nutrition and bone density deficiencies, and proposed specialized education and support systems to address these issues.

It was stated that the Massachusetts legislation was successful in enacting the ban on greyhound racing due to a coalition of organizations with differing concerns, but a shared agenda: animal-rights advocates and anti-gambling forces. It was strongly recommended that racing form stronger coalitions within the agricultural sector in order to form a powerful and effective counterpoint to these opposing factors.

All signs indicate the current system is eroding public confidence and that perception is their reality. If the industry wants the public's support, and financial involvement in the sport of racing, then time, energy, commitment and money will be required to bring about change.

As Marsha Kelly stated in her closing, "The question should not be, 'can we afford to do this,' but, 'can we really afford not to?'"

## A PERSPECTIVE FOR RACING: THE ECONOMY by RTIP Student Jim McVicker

First the good news...well, there really isn't any. "We are experiencing the worst recession in decades, and it is on a global scale." So said Marshall J. Vest, director of economics and the Business Research Center at the University of Arizona's Eller College of Management, as he addressed the issue of today's economy at the University of Arizona's 35th Symposium Wednesday.

"We have been in a recession since 2007, and generally, when it is acknowledged that we are in a recession, the worst is almost over," Vest continued. "Not this time. This time the recession is more severe and is longer lasting than previous recessions since post World War II."

Vest stated that the recession can be expected to last until mid 2009, at the very least and, unlike previous recessions, consumer spending will not correct the problem.

For those wishing to gain a better understanding of the current financial crisis, he strongly recommended reading "Manias, Panics, and Crashes: a History of Financial Crises," by Charles P. Kindleberger, Robert Aliber and Robert Solow.

As many people are aware, the crux of the crisis is based on home mortgages and the high foreclosure rate, which resulted from the granting of loans to "anyone that can fog a mirror." Cont. p3

Vest also pointed to concern regarding government bailouts and the risk of "moral hazard." Will financial institutions engage in riskier behavior, believing that there is no cause for concern, since Uncle Sam will save the day? Additionally, what is the government's exit strategy from the financial markets once a turnaround takes place?

Vest did point out that the risk of experiencing a depression is slim based on four factors:

- 1) Falling oil prices
- 2) Swift and coordinated action by governments worldwide (unlike the U.S. depression of the 1930s).
- 3) Huge amounts of liquidity into the financial markets.
- 4) Additional financial stimulus from Washington, D.C. (approximately \$8.6 trillion).

He hazarded a guess that we will continue to see tremendous swings and high volatility in stock markets and oil prices. He also stated that self regulation of the financial industry has not worked as planned, and a balance must be reached in the area of regulation.

As Vest sees it, the public sector will continue to struggle to balance budgets; monetary and fiscal actions which have been implemented are working and solvency is key. In other words, pay your bills and strive to survive until a turnaround occurs.

## OBAMA AND TEAM FOCUS ON ECONOMIC RECOVERY PLAN

President-elect Barack Obama and his transition team are actively crafting a new economic recovery plan on the heels of last February's Economic Stimulus Act and in the wake of an ever-worsening United States economy. This continuing economic slide has put the recovery plan at the top of his agenda.

Obama and his team view their plan as one that will serve as a vehicle for job growth and an economy focused on improved health care and roads and clean energy. This mirrors policy ideas Obama laid out during his presidential campaign – providing doctors with the most current information on patients through computerized medical records, rebuilding infrastructure, and enhancing the nation's power grid in ways that reduce both carbon emissions and energy costs.

Although the nation's unemployment rate climbed to 6.7 percent in November and Obama would prefer to move as soon as possible, it is more likely that his new recovery plan will not be addressed until the 111th Congress convenes January 6, 2009.

## WAGERING, WHAT'S UP? by RTIP Student Matt Carter

The general consensus is that there needs to be greater integration in the wagering industry--integration between tote protocols as well as mutuel pools. The speakers discussed the wagering front from both an international and domestic perspective during a panel Wednesday.

J. Curtis Linnell, of the Thoroughbred Racing Protective Bureau, discussed the recent Inter-Tote System Protocol meeting that took place Dec. 9. In 2006 it was suggested that there be an ITSP standards committee, which would deal with the "integration of the pari-mutuel environment in North America," Linnell said. From the meeting came the adoption of ITSP version 6.00, which makes the inclusion of some international wager types easier as it allows other data transmission.

Willem Birkenstock discussed wagering through his company, Tabcorp, in Australia and New Zealand. Birkenstock touched on the implementation of ITSP in both those countries. Currently the protocol used was locally developed, but they are moving toward ITSP. Birkenstock also offered some advice going forward. He would like to see Flexi-betting to facilitate different currencies. He also suggested, "If a bet type already exists, don't invent a new name." As we move towards integration, the international punters may be confused.

The next speaker, Liz Bracken from the New York Racing Association, discussed how the Grand Slam wager was designed and implemented. The wager was designed by Bill Nader as a "Pick 4-Lite," requiring people to select the first-second-or third-place horses in the first three races and the winner of the fourth race. The process took seven months from concept to the writing and approval of the rule. While the wager has been around since May 2006, it has been "hard to generate interest when not all totes in North America can accept it," Bracken said.

Finally, Florence Gras talked about how the European Pari-Mutuel Association is trying to "promote pari-mutuel betting on horseracing and its business model in the European Union." The company wants to preserve the sports integrity, as well as to improve the international promotion of horseracing.

The panelists also had some thoughts on the longterm growth on the wagering front. "International commingling is the future," Gras said.
