

LA BREA TO FEATURE 10

The final Grade I race on the calendar for 2008 should be a doozy. Santa Anita's GI La Brea S. has drawn 10 sophomore fillies, topped by two swift Indian Charlie fillies, **Indian Blessing** and **Indyanne**. A multiple



Grade III winner this season, Indyanne was forced to scratch out of the Breeders' Cup F/M Sprint with a fever; in her only appearance since, the grey faced males in the Sausolito S. at Golden Gate Nov. 22 and was caught late by veteran Siren Lure. The La Brea will also feature the return of **Country Star** (Empire Maker), who looked to have

the world at her feet following wins in the GI Darley Alcibiades and GI Hollywood Starlet for breeder Stonerside in 2007. Unplaced in her first two outings this season--the GI Ashland S. and GI Kentucky Oaks-the dark bay won an allowance on the Saratoga lawn in her only subsequent start; she flipped in the starting gate before the Sept. 13 GI Gazelle S. and was scratched. The big filly has posted several solid local drills in recent weeks, including a bullet six furlongs in 1:11 2/5 Dec. 18, as she prepares to run in Darley's colors for the first time.

"[Georgie Boy] was too fresh, too rank, and he came up a little tired," trainer Kathy Walsh told *Daily Racing Form*. The gelding has worked well since then, most recently posting a best-of-62 :58 2/5 drill at Hollywood Dec. 20.

Fab Oak Stable's **Nownownow** (Whywhywhy) is back



with trainer Patrick Biancone. After starting his career for the Frenchman, the bay colt captured the inaugural Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf in 2007 when saddled by Francois Parisel and was sent to Ireland. Last of five in the G1 Irish 2000 Guineas, the homebred filled the same spot for Jason Orman upon his repatriation in the GII La Jolla H. Aug. 9, and was beaten just 1 1/2 lengths when fourth in the GII Del Mar

Derby Aug. 31. Nownownow was third

in an Oak Tree optional claimer Oct. 1, and makes his all-weather debut following an eighth in the GII Oak Tree Derby Oct. 25. "I've had the horse back for about a month," Biancone said. "I know the Malibu is a tough race and he may be a bit short, but he's going to improve very much off this race. We'll just take a shot. If he gets second, we'll be very happy. We're preparing for the [GII] Strub [at 1 1/8 miles Feb. 7], but this is the first step. He'll be more competitive in the Strub."

Trainer Bob Baffert, still looking for his first win in this contest, will saddle **Guns on the Table** (Carson City) for owners John and Anita Connelly of Stetson Land & Cattle LP. The chestnut hasn't faced the starter since scoring in optional-claiming company over this strip Oct. 24. "It's a little step up--like a gigantic one," said Baffert. As for how the colt was named, Baffert offered, "John and Anita named him after an episode with their grandson. They gave him a western gun set, and he came in one day and told his grandfather, 'I'm going to put my guns on the table,' and that's how they got the name."

### 2009 RULES: 'VALUE' EQUALS QUALITY

They say 'value' is a relative term, and never has that been more evident than it must be this year to breeders budgeting for their 2009 matings. Breeders are entitled to think nothing is good value this year, and if 2011 prices haven't rebounded from this year's levels, when you could count yourself fortunate if a yearling brought more than the retail stud fee, they would be right. But here is one iron-clad guarantee: whatever prices do in the next three years, they will not be the same as they are in 2008. They may be lower, though I doubt it; if prices fall again, that will be next year. By the time next year's matings come to market as yearlings, there's a good chance the yearling market will be showing some semblance of recovery.

That's small--or no--consolation to breeders faced with signing contracts that mean sooner or later they'll be writing a check, and knowing that breeding horses is, after all, a longer-term investment. No matter how good times have been, if you got drubbed at the sales this year, the cost of credit, if you can even get it, is almost prohibitive. So it's no wonder those breeders who choose to persevere will be looking for big price cuts and generous payment terms from studmasters.

At the same time, the one thing all market breeders know now is that in tough times what demand there is focuses on quality. The top tier of the market held up far better than the rest, and not because you might be able to get the two titans, Darley and Coolmore, interested, but because even forking out \$200,000 on a horse is a lot of money. Plus, as demand shrinks, the bar--what the buyers will actually bid on--gets higher. You may not be able to afford the six-figure stud fees for the top sires, but whatever the level of your investment, the horse you breed to in 2009 better have some pretensions to quality at his level. There were literally thousands of horses offered at auction this year that nobody wants. The only way to adjust for that is to try to breed quality. It's the safest investment in tough times.

What breeders want to see, above all, is prices slashed, and where better to start than at the top? True, not many breeders can afford even 'low' six-figure stallions, but, for those who can afford to be involved in the higher ranges, three top-quality North American sires have seen their prices slashed over the last two years: Distorted Humor, Giant's Causeway, and Unbridled's Song. Distorted Humor's price has been cut in half, back to \$150,000 from \$300,000 this year.

Giant's Causeway dropped 44 percent in 2008, from \$225,000 in 2007 (and as high as \$300,000 in 2006, from which crop 67 yearlings averaged \$269,719 this year) to \$125,000; he didn't need to drop any further. Unbridled's Song, who peaked at a high of \$200,000 for 2007, has been adjusted downward by 37.5 percent, also to \$125,000, for 2009.

Traditionally--by which I mean before the bubble of the early '80s--the highest stud fee was always \$150,000, and though Galileo, A.P. Indy, and possibly Kingmambo will stand for more than that in 2009, that's about it. It's a good price for Distorted Humor, who ranked third on the North American general sire list in 2007, when he led all sires with 20 stakes winners for the year. He ranks fourth on the general sire list in 2008, which is pretty good considering he didn't have as many stars, with 'just' 10 stakes winners to represent him this year. Distorted Humor stood for \$150,000 in 2006, from which crop 33 yearlings averaged \$416,220 this year (all sale statistics per TDN's Instatistics, available on the website)--2.77 times his 2006 stud fee. It'll be small consolation to breeders who paid \$225,000 in 2007 and \$300,000 this year, but at least this is one sire about whom you can say, if yearling prices in 2011 are the same as prices in 2008, and as long as Distorted Humor sustains his position as one of the top five sires in North America, this is one of the few sires you'd still have a fighting chance to make money with. 


Giant's Causeway's 44-percent plunge in stud fee for 2008 earned him this column's accolade as 'value stallion of the year 2008.' He ranked number four on the 2007 general sire list, with 16 stakes winners. This year he ranks second only to Smart Strike, and leads all sires with 24 stakes winners in 2008, 11 of them graded/group winners (Northern Hemisphere crops only). He has had massive crops--over 650 foals in five 'Northern' crops of racing age, including 152 two-yearolds this year (according to Bloodhorse.com), which include an unbelievable 83 runners, of which his 17 winners include this year's G1 Dewhurst S, winner Intense Focus. But it's worked, those big crops, because he's siring as high a proportion of good horses as stallions with far fewer foals, and he's made it into the top five on the general sire list about twice as fast as most other stallions do. He was chart-topping value at \$125,000 for 2008, and he's still great value (relatively speaking, to be sure), at the same price, for 2009.

The crop of sires which had their first foals in 1998 was one of the strongest of recent times, and Unbridled's Song, along with Smart Strike and Pivotal, was always one of the top three sires of this very strong group. He's been a big success since day one, and his stud fee climbed to as high as \$200,000 in 2007. He's down to \$125,000 for 2009 (or \$112,500, if the breeder chooses to pay by Nov. 1, 2009 and receive a 10-percent discount from Taylor Made). Considering his crop of two-year-olds, that could look a very good buy after the first Saturday in May, 2009. He's the number two sire of two-year-olds in North America in 2008, siring not only GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner Midshipman, but also the deeply impressive GII Remsen victor Old Fashioned late last month. After his initial disappointment as a sire of sires with Buddha, he's looking better on that front, too, courtesy of first-crop Grade I winner Songandaprayer (see below) and firstcrop Grade II winner Even the Score, number eight on the freshman sire list and sire of the recent Grade III winner Four Gifts. If this crop of two-year-olds follows through at three, Unbridled's Song would finally qualify as one of the elite World Top 12 Sires, after knocking on the door for most of his stud career. If that happens, his 2009 price of \$125,000 is really going to look good value.


I don't mean to infer that these three top-flight sires are necessarily better than others of their contemporaries who rank among or near the World Top 12. The reason they made this list is dramatic price cuts. Virtually all the top sires are down from 2008 or 2007; these have just seen the most dramatic cuts. By the most succinct standards, all proven six-figure sires provide good value, because they can sire top horses.




(yearling and mixed) sales were off 28 percent in gross. Usually a more reliable guide, yearling sales were down 19 percent; but the mixed sales coincided with the world credit collapse, and their gross was down 40 percent. One way to read that is the horse market is down 20 percent, but the credit collapse sends it down another 20 percent."

At the end of 2006, Forestry looked poised to give his illustrious barnmate at Taylor Made, Unbridled's Song, a run for his money as the farm's first sire to break into the World Top 12. Already standing for \$100,000 in 2006 as a result of his early exploits (his first foals raced in 2003), he began the year with a \$16-million Calder two-year-old (subsequently to become The Green Monkey), shattering the all-time auction record set by Seattle Dancer 21 years earlier, and ended it with Discreet Cat's imperious win in the GI Cigar Mile, running a Beyer 116. Forestry's stud fee went up the \$125,000 for 2007, but then it all went quiet. Having ranked 20th on the general sire list in 2006, he dropped to 57th in 2007, when The Green Monkey and Discreet Cat didn't win a race between them. At least in 2007 Forestry sired nine stakes winners; this year he ranks 73rd on the general sire list, with only three 2008 stakes winners. But now Taylor Made has dropped him to \$40,000 (\$36,000 on Nov. 1 terms)--less than a third of what he stood for two years ago. Yet he comes into 2009 with 98 two-year-olds sired at a \$100,000 stud fee, and 94 yearlings sired at \$125,000. It's the classic time to roll the dice on a horse like this--so much so that his enticing 2009 stud fee makes him this column's 'number one value sire' for 2009. He only needs to achieve what he did before Discreet Cat and The Green Monkey came along for that to be a good buy.

In the 'oldies but goodies' category, the winner this year has to be the British sire **Selkirk**, whose fee has



dropped to £25,000 from £40,000 two years ago. A member of the 1994 sire class (first foals that year), which also included A.P. Indy, El Prado, Pleasant Tap, and In Excess, Selkirk is the sire of 70 stakes winners and is a very successful damsire as well, especially under the

Danehill branch of Danzig, by which his daughters have produced the likes of English Ballet, Simply Perfect, Mount Nelson, and Vital Equine. When an elder sire becomes a successful broodmare sire, people often forget they are usually very good sires of colts as well-Rainbow Quest, sire of top European two-year-old colt, Crowded House, being a good example. Selkirk is just about bombproof as a sire, and, though 21 and therefore not as sexy as some of his juniors, he's excellent value at this price. **Cont. p6**

**First Foals 2002: Stephen Got Even** had GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner and champion two-year-old colt Stevie Wonderboy in his second crop, and stood for as much as \$25,000 in 2006, resulting in 107 two-yearolds for 2009. He's down to \$7,500 for next year, and his 2008 two-year-olds include I Want Revenge, who narrowly missed upsetting Pioneerof the Nile in last Saturday's GI CashCall Futurity.

**First foals 2003:** Two horses who moved to Kentucky for the 2005 season (foals of 2006) had good success from their first Kentucky crops, yet have suffered big price cuts nonetheless. **City Zip**, a half-brother to Ghostzapper by Carson City, moved down from New York. His 2006 crop includes five two-year-old stakes winners this year and ranks him 15th on the juvenile sire list, yet his stud fee is down to \$12,500 from a high of \$20,000 two years ago. It's the same 37.5percent decline as Unbridled's Song, but with one less zero. He'll have 112 two-year-olds next year.

**Songandaprayer**, Unbridled's Song's first successful son, ranks 16th, just one spot behind City Zip. He has 32 two-year-old winners from his final Florida crop, has crops of 139 and 128 following on from Kentucky, yet at \$22,500 for 2009 is just half of what he was two years ago.

**Put It Back** started in Florida and remains there, up to just \$8,500 from \$7,500 last year. His 2.56 A Runner Index and 1.76 ABC Index are very much for real, which no doubt helps account for the fact that he bred 156 mares this year. He was five-for-five at six and seven furlongs himself as a three-year-old, culminating with a win in the GII Riva Ridge S. on the Belmont Stakes undercard

**First Foals 2004:** This is a key year for this group of stallions: the year their first four-year-olds run. They have three crops racing, including their third crop of two-year-olds. If it hasn't happened by now, it's not likely to. In a group headed by Street Cry and Johannesburg in America, and by Invincible Spirit and Rock of Gibraltar in Europe, there are five stallions standing for under \$20,000 which look like they're heading in the right direction even as their stud fees remain level instead of going up; or even falling. In the U.S., E Dubai (\$15,000) and Pure Prize (\$12,500) remain level after having seasons which, in any other year, would have seen stud fee hikes. E Dubai ranks fifth on the 2008 North American third-crop sire list, with earners this year over \$4 million, including the inaugural Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint winner Desert Code. Pure Prize ranks ninth on the same list, with earners of more than \$3.4 million this year, including 10 2008 stakes winners.

Pure Prize's three-year-olds include the Grade I-winning filly Pure Clan, while his two-year-olds include Coronet of a Baron, second to both Azul Leon and Midshipman in California graded two-year-old stakes, and third in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf.

Two F2004 stallions with plenty to recommend them have had their fees halved, each from \$35,000 in 2008 to \$17,500 in 2009. Officer was a \$700,000 two-yearold, bought by the late Prince Ahmed Salman's Thoroughbred Corp. He won his first five races at two, including the GIII Best Pal S. by seven lengths, running a Beyer 106 (very high for a two-year-old), and the GI Champagne S., before setting the pace and fading to fifth, behind Johannesburg and Repent, in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile. He was fourth on the 2006 North American freshman sire list, with six two-year-old stakes winners; dropped a bit, to seventh, on the 2007 second-crop list, but had 10 stakes winners; and is sixth on the third-crop list this year, with six stakes winners. He has foal crops of 74 and 83 coming, and covered 114 mares this year at \$35,000.

The other horse whose price has been slashed identically, from \$35,000 to \$17,500, is **Include**. Though he's sired the winners of over \$3.2 million this year and his first crop is now up to six stakes winners, including Grade I winners Cash Included and Panty Raid, he hasn't had many big names since. Still, he has 74 twoyear-olds coming for 2009, plus 131 yearlings sired for a \$25,000 fee, and covered 82 mares this year at \$35,000. At half that price, and with this many bullets in the pipeline, he must make some appeal.

My European value candidate from this sire class is 2001 G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winner and GI Breeders' Cup Classic second Sakhee, who was been dropped to £8,000. He's not everybody's cup of tea; he has one Group 1 winner, the sprinter Sakhee's Secret, from a family of such dominant sprinters that the stallion involved is never affecting distance capability--six furlongs is always the maximum--though they must impart something, possibly class. Otherwise, Sakhee has no other group winners. His next four best horses are just listed winners. But my earnings-based 'A Runner' calculations tell a different story, which is that all those listed winners and a few more group-placed horses are actually making money. On Aug. 1, the last time we did the calculations (they'll be updated at the end of the year), Sakhee's A Runner index was a sky-high 3.71. You can hedge and qualify it until the cows come home, but when a young sire puts up a number like that and is standing for £8,000--that would do me. They aren't two-year-olds, though (0.57 Two-Year-Old ABC Index).

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**First Foals 2005:** It's a moot point now, but if you managed to get one of the 50 or so farm seasons to **Nayef** at £15,000, you've done some very good business--especially as four seasons sold by the farm on-line made between £25,000-29,000 earlier this month. A half-brother to Unfuwain and Nashwan by Gulch, he has sired the top three-year-old French miler, Tamayuz and G1 Prix de l'Opera winner Lady Marian, among several other pretty decent horses, in his first crop. The farm received over 350 applications to breed to him in 2009. He will have relatively small crops of 38 and 45 coming up, but covered 110 mares in 2008, at £10,000.

In Kentucky, I like the look of **Repent**, who earned his way up from Florida, but still stands for a very reasonable \$7,500 fee. Himself a Grade II winner at two and three, and second to Johannesburg in the Breeders' Cup Juvenile and to Medaglia d'Oro in the GI Travers at three, he has surprised many observers by siring 11 stakes horses, including six stakes winners, of which two are graded stakes winners at one mile-plus. He covered 137 mares in Florida earlier this year.

First Foals 2006: I would be amazed if you can still book seasons to Candy Ride for \$12,500, but if you



can, I would sure do so. I've become really cagey about believing freshman sire statistics over the years--witness Posse and Acclamation in 2008--but I can't see where this horse has ever done anything wrong. He was unbeaten in six starts on the racetrack, including a three-length win in the 2003 GI Pacific Classic, winning in 1:59 flat while registering a

huge Beyer figure of 123. In his first crop, he's sired 20 winners, two of them Grade III winners, plus another stakes winner. He also has a colt who has placed in four stakes in Canada, and placed horses in both last weekend's GI Hollywood Starlet and GI CashCall Futurity. He is a screaming bargain if you can still get to him for \$12,500.

In Europe, I'm impressed by **Kheleyf**, the number two freshman sire by earnings in Europe. A winner of the G3 Jersey S, himself by emerging sire of sires Green Desert (sire also of Cape Cross, Invincible Spirit, and Oasis Dream), Kheleyf has sired 31 winners in his first crop, including seven stakes horses, of which three are stakes winners. He'd first really appeared on the radar screens at the 2007 yearling sales, when 66 yearlings by him averaged over 60,000-10 times his original stud fee of 7,000. He's up to 12,000 for next year, but they've run like they looked, and lately that has been a very good pointer to sire success, and not just as a freshman sire, either. **Oppenheim cont. p9**

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#### Unknown Territory...

Here we're quessing, but hopefully it's at least an educated guess; and it's about gambling on stallions with credentials whose fees have declined and/or are low.

First Foals 2007: Seven first-crop stallions averaged over \$100,000 at the 2008 yearling sales, four in North America and three in Europe (Motivator narrowly missed there, with an average of \$99,752). Of the four in North America, Ghostzapper will stand for \$150,000, and Saint Liam is dead. The other two also look pretty fair bets, and their stud fees have dived around 40-50 percent. A lot of the judges were raving about the yearlings by Rock Hard Ten, who had 43 yearlings average \$151,111, and whose stud fee has dropped from \$50,000 down to \$30,000. They must have liked the Afleet Alex yearlings, too; he had 69 sell for an average of \$120,679, yet his stud fee has now been cut in half, from \$40,000 to \$20,000.

In Europe, 2004 European champion two-year-old and dual 2005 French Classic winner (vintage Dettori rides in both cases) Shamardal had 47 yearlings average \$126,227, yet his stud fee drops from  $\in$ 40,000, in 2007, to €20,000 in 2009.

At the lower end of the stud fee scale there is Ashford's Powerscourt, now down to \$7,500, having stood his first season, in 2006, for \$12,500. He won the GI Arlington Million twice, though he lost one in the stewards' room, and generally proved himself a topclass Group/Grade | performer at 10-12 furlongs, especially at four and five in 2004-'05. I don't see why he couldn't make a sire.

Ditto Antonius Pius for the same team (Coolmore) in Europe. Down to €5,000 for 2009 from an original  $\in$  8,000, he placed in the G1 St James's Palace S., G1 Prix de Moulin de Longchamp and GI Breeders' Cup Mile, all of which were after he had the G1 Poule d'Essai des Poulains won, only to throw it away by jinking into the fence inside the last 100 yards. Top-class threeyear-old mile form has always been a fair pointer to sire success in Europe, and this fellow qualifies on that score, as I read the form. Oh, and he's by Danzig.

First Foals 2008: This year's three top European threeyear-olds--Henrythenavigator, New Approach, and Raven's Pass--had all been very high-class two-year-olds in 2007. In the excitement about this trio's accomplishments in 2008, the glow of the previous year's top European two-year-olds might have ever so slightly dimmed. Probably it shouldn't. The 2006 G1 Dewhurst S. was a tremendous race between unbeaten Teofilo and Holy Roman Emperor (see below). The clash between the two in the next year's G1 English 2000 Guineas was eagerly anticipated. But neither horse ever raced again: Teofilo was injured and retired, and Holy Roman Emperor was whisked out of Ballydoyle and called on to cover the mares going to George Washington, who had proved virtually infertile.

In a very depressed market, Holy Roman Emperor was the only European stallion with five or more sold who averaged over \$100,000 at the weanling sales last month; he had 17 sold, of 28 offered, for an average of \$121,790. His stud fee has dropped from its original  $\in$ 40,000 to  $\in$ 25,000 for 2009. The judges like this horse, and plenty of people think he would have beaten Teofilo if both had made the Guineas.

In America, Bernardini put up what used to be Julysale type figures with his first weanlings. Bluegrass Cat was a distant second, just ahead of Henny Hughes. It's slightly splitting hairs to single out Henny Hughes for special mention, since the stud fees for both Bernardini (\$75,000 from \$100,000) and Bluegrass Cat (\$40,000 from \$50,000) are both down, by 25 and 20 percent, respectively. Henny Hughes is also down 25 percent, from \$40,000 to \$30,000. The other two are great prospects, too, but Henny Hughes did something particular that has proved in the past to be a good pointer to sire success: he came back from a very arduous campaign as a two-year-old (including, in his case, runnerup finishes in the GI Hopeful, GI Champagne, and GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile) to absolutely scorch the field in the GI King's Bishop S. at seven furlongs at Saratoga. That race has proven a fair sire pointer all by itself in the past, and he won it much easier than other horses who have since made sires. Cont. p10



But we can't just be touting  $\in 25,000$  and \$30,000 stallions here. We know that, and the cheaper option who makes sense from all angles is **Sharp Humor**, who started out at \$12,500 in 2007 and remains at \$12,500 for 2009--which he should, because he was priced right in the first place. He won the GII Swale S. at Gulfstream as a three-year-old, and gave Barbaro a fright in the GI Florida Derby, which was really farther than he looked like he wanted to go. In other words, he had a lot of speed, and he carried it. WinStar tabbed him to stand alongside his sire, the great Distorted Humor, and the breeders agreed. He had 114 foals of 2008, of which 12 averaged \$49,917--almost four times the stud fee--in November, and he covered 134 mares this year.

**First Foals 2009:** A clean sweep for Darley. **Hard Spun** drops \$10,000 (\$50,000 to \$40,000), having covered 181 mares (he's by Danzig, you know) and averaging even more as a covering sire at the November sales than his more expensive barnmate, Street Sense. **Discreet Cat**, discussed above under his sire Forestry, was a genuine rocket up to a mile as a three-year-old. At the end of 2006, he looked like one of the best horses Godolphin had ever had, yet he now stands for \$25,000 (down from \$30,000). If he had retired unbeaten at the end of the 2006 season, he'd be standing for two or three times that now. He covered 149 mares this year.

In Europe, **Teofilo**, discussed above under Holy Roman Emperor, covered 158 mares, and has dropped from  $\in$ 40,000 to  $\in$ 25,000, the same as that rival. Considering the form of both horses as two-year-olds, that makes them both great buys in my book. *Bill Oppenheim may be contacted at bopp@erb.com. 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

You've heard the Thoroughbred breeding truisms. Like how the progeny of Storm Cat are known for their speed and precocity. Or that the sons and daughters of Unusual Heat can be expected to improve the first time they try the grass. Or how anybody out of Toussaud or Hasili (Ire) is destined for Grade/Group 1 success.

If only it was that simple.

Edwin Anthony's *The American Thoroughbred: Volume I*, a 594-page tome of pedigree analysis, inspects the ancestry of Thoroughbreds from the early 19th century through the present. And while the book should delight anybody who is serious about Thoroughbred genetics, this publication isn't for mass consumption.

While it's easy to overestimate the influence of sire lines and female families, it's more important to evaluate how every ancestor interacts within a pedigree, Anthony suggests.

"Most often, it is not just one thing that serves as the spark for success; it is the cumulative effect of several key connections that serve as the bridge for continued superior performance or the catalyst for great change in a positive direction," he asserts.

To illustrate, Anthony shows the pedigrees of prominent racehorses and highlights the crosses he believes contributed to their success. For example, the potent Nasrullah/Princequillo combination is strong in the pedigree of Bernardini (A.P. Indy), with both sires appearing six times in his pedigree.

Anthony is a proponent of balanced inbreeding, where an ancestor who appears multiple times in a subject's pedigree passes through a male *and* a female relative. He makes finding examples of balanced inbreeding simple by adding either the letter "X" or "Y" following the name of ancestors who appear multiple times, with the letters representing the chromosomes they passed along.

"Many pedigree consultants (myself including) believe that balanced inbreeding increases speed in the resulting progeny of such matings," he writes.

The strengths of *The American Thoroughbred* are the sheer number of pedigrees and the extensive research Anthony has included. Those are also its weaknesses. To learn the book's lessons, one must pay attention to the details, which can become tiresome during prolonged readings. The paragraphs in bold type and analysis at the end of chapters do help explain Anthony's main points, but this is not a book for casual perusal.

But to purchase or breed a horse with the talent needed to win one of the 488 graded stakes in the United States, one must be willing to do the necessary research and analysis, Anthony argues. And while it is easy to be overwhelmed with the amount information presented in *The American Thoroughbred*, the book should be a handy reference for those interested in learning more about the genetic patterns that are conducive to producing success on the racetrack.

"It really is an all or nothing game, and the difference between success and failure can be razor thin," Anthony writes. "Dismissing details as trivial can really cost you."
