In an action-packed week on both sides of the Atlantic, there were notable performances from quite a few stallions. For example, War Front had Grade I/Group 1 winners at Santa Anita and Newmarket, where his sons provided the exacta in the historic Middle Park S. Then there was the ever-reliable Dubawi, with his Grade I/Group 1 double at Santa Anita and Longchamp. And Dark Angel also deserves a mention, following the G2 success of his daughter **Juliet Capulet** and the brilliant performance of his son **Battaash** in the G1 Prix de l'Abbaye de Longchamp. He also supplied the second in the GI Turf Classic.

Even so, my nomination for stallion of the week must go to the great Sadler's Wells, even though this legendary sire died six years ago. For a start, the brilliant Arc winner **Enable** is inbred 3 x 2 to this 14-time champion sire, whose male line was also in magnificent form both in Europe and the U.S.

Needless to say, the charge was led by Galileo, with his G1 treble in the Cheveley Park S., Prix Jean-Luc Lagardere and Prix de l'Opera. He also had a G1 winner in Australia, thanks to **Foundry** in The Metropolitan. Galileo's stallion sons were also in fine form, with Nathaniel siring the Listed winner **Face The Facts** in addition to Enable. Frankel, for his part, came up with a likely classic contender in the G3 winner **Elarqam** and he wasn't far off scoring other Group victories with **Nelson** and **Lady Frankel**.

To the uninitiated, the new Treasury regulations redefining "the amount of a wager" published last week in the [Federal Register](#) might seem an unlikely cause for celebration. But these regulations, now final and effective as of Friday, Sept. 28, cap a 10-year odyssey that began with the bipartisan support of key Members of Congress. Along the way, the effort morphed from a legislative matter to a regulatory issue that saw breeders, owners, horsemen, racetrack and advance deposit wagering (ADW) operators, and thousands of customers join our allies on Capitol Hill in support of efforts to update antiquated tax treatment of pari-mutuel winnings. Galileo has to share the limelight with El Prado, another of Sadler's Wells's champion stallion sons, as El Prado's sons Kitten's Joy and Medaglia d'Oro both enjoyed Graded/Group race doubles. Kitten's Joy advertised his potential in Europe by siring the G2 winners **Roaring Lion** at Newmarket and **Taareef** at Longchamp, but pride of place went to Medaglia d'Oro, with **Elate** following up her victory in the GI Alabama S. with another wide-margin GI success in the Beldame S. Then Medaglia d'Oro came up with another contender for divisional honors when **Bolt d'Oro** impressively added the FrontRunner S. to his previous GI success in the Del Mar Futurity.

Both of these GI dirt winners by Medaglia d'Oro represent popular crosses, with Elate's dam being by Distorted Humor and Bolt d'Oro's by A.P. Indy.

Distorted Humor, of course, is riding high at the top of this year's broodmare sires' table, thanks in no small part to **Arrogate's** huge paychecks at Gulfstream Park and Meydan, but this is certainly no one-horse success story. In addition to Elate, Distorted Humor's daughters have also enjoyed GI success with Takaful in Saturday's Vosburgh S., Practical Joke in the H. Allen

Jerkens S. and New Money Honey in the Belmont Oaks Invitational (on turf).

It is no coincidence that two of these--Elate and New Money Honey--are daughters of Medaglia d'Oro, as are the Graded-placed 3-year-olds **Gato del Oro** and **Lady Montdore**. Medaglia d'Oro's 44 foals out of Distorted Humor mares also include the GI-winning fillies **Funny Proposition** and **Mrs McDougal** (the former on dirt, the latter on turf). That adds up to 9% black-type winners, whereas the overall figure for Distorted Humor mares is 4%.

The motivation for supporting Medaglia d'Oro with Distorted Humor mares, and other grand-daughters of Forty Niner, was provided by none other than **Rachel Alexandra**. This member of Medaglia d'Oro's first crop, who earned Horse of the Year honors, is out of a mare by Forty Niner's son Roar (a product of the same Wild Applause family which produced the very well-related Elate).

This strategy has now been tried via daughters of sires such as Coronado's Quest, Distorted Humor, Roar and West Acre and it continues to strike gold. This cross has produced four first-rate fillies, with Medaglia d'Oro's first foal out of a West Acre mare being **Songbird**. This nine-time GI winner and two-time champion is to be offered at Fasig-Tipton in November, when she will give us a good idea of Elate's value (though it is most unlikely that she will ever come on the market). **Cont. p4**

In the circumstances, we shouldn't be too surprised that Forty Niner's name also crops up in the pedigree of Bolt d'Oro, as the sire of Tour, his stakes-winning third dam.

Bolt d'Oro is one of Medaglia d'Oro's 89 foals of racing age out of A.P. Indy mares. At present, the sample's percentage of black-type winners stands at 7%, but this can be expected to rise, as 15 of the 89 are only two years old. The impetus for this

popular cross was provided by **Plum Pretty**, winner of the GI Kentucky Oaks in 2011 and the GI Apple Blossom H. in 2012 before being sold to Whisper Hill Farm for \$4.2 million. The Medaglia d'Oro-A.P. Indy partnership has a third GI winner to its credit in this year's accomplished turf mare **Dickinson**.

In recounting Medaglia d'Oro's story, I have mainly mentioned his daughters, simply because they account for 11 of his 17 northern hemisphere GI winners. It is worth adding though, that the GI-winning sons include **Violence**, who ranked as Medaglia d'Oro's only GI-winning two-year-old son in the U.S. until Bolt d'Oro's emergence. There have been other G1-winning juvenile colts in France and Australia, where the Ashford shuttler **Vancouver** won the Golden Slipper S. The future looks bright for the stallion prospects of Bolt d'Oro and Vancouver, judging by the eye-catching start being made by Violence.

Bolt d'Oro is quite unusual in that he has no inbreeding within five generations. It can do no harm that his second dam is by Lord At War, whose daughters produced numerous high-class performers, including War Emblem, Raven's Pass and Pioneer of the Nile. The up-and-coming stallion Munnings is another with a Lord At War second dam.

As might be expected of a \$630,000 Saratoga yearling, Bolt d'Oro has a solid pedigree--one which raises no worries about his potential stamina as a Triple Crown contender. **Cont. p5**

Pedigree Insights: Bolt d'Oro cont.

Medaglia d'Oro won the GI Travers S. after finishing second in the GI Belmont S., and a mile and a quarter also held no fears for A.P. Indy, Lord At War and Forty Niner, the sires of Bolt d'Oro's first three dams. Bolt d'Oro's dam Globe Trot, who died in 2016, gained at least two of her wins in all-weather routes, while his second dam Trip was a dual winner of the GIII Turfway Breeders' Cup S. over 1 1/16 miles.

It must also be very encouraging that the FrontRunner S. fell to Nyquist in 2015 and American Pharoah in 2014, and Bolt d'Oro's winning margin was much greater than theirs.

Waldrop: Horse Racing Wins and Here's How We All Did It cont.

Early indications are that the results are monumental, so amazing in fact, that it begs the question, "How did we as an industry accomplish such a positive result and why did it take us so long?" The short answer is that our tax modernization effort is the result of efforts spearheaded by the NTRA, which crucially pivoted some three years ago, ultimately leading to the final regulations published last week. How the industry arrived at this juncture is a story of perseverance, widespread industry cooperation and coordination, highly targeted Congressional support, and timing.

Prelude: 2007-2012

After preliminary conversations with Members of Congress back in 2007, NTRA secured introduction of the Pari-mutuel Conformity and Equality Act (PACE Act) in the House of Representatives the following year. A then-second-term Congressman, Rep. Charles Boustany, Jr. (R-LA), whose district included one of Louisiana's many ADW sites, sponsored the bill to eliminate the automatic federal tax withholding on pari-mutuel proceeds of \$5,000 or more at odds of 300-1 or greater--a combination likely to occur when bettors hit a multi-horse or multi-race wager that often requires a major investment to win. The bill saw little action but was reintroduced in 2009 under the co-sponsorship of Rep. Boustany and the then-sophomore Congressman Rep. John Yarmuth (D-KY), whose district includes Churchill Downs racetrack.

The following year, the bill was referred to the House Ways and Means Committee, whose members included both Boustany and Yarmuth. Again, the bill received little action and was not reintroduced in the 2011-12 Congress. It was, however, slated for inclusion in any Internet gaming legislation that might move during that session, though none did, despite numerous efforts by the broader gaming industry.

Pivot: 2013-2016

With efforts to eliminate the tax on gambling winnings at a standstill and few prospects for passage of any tax reform legislation, horseplayers and the NTRA's key lobbyist at The Alpine Group suggested an alternative tack: a regulatory approach that would circumvent Congress by redefining the "amount of a wager" in Treasury and IRS regulations. These individuals, along with leading handicappers in the racing media like Steven Crist and Andrew Beyer, demonstrated how the current process of withholding and reporting worked in their own experience. Redefining the amount of a wager, they said, would produce the same effect as the legislation previously sought, streamline reporting and withholding, and simplify tax compliance.

In 2014, and with the assistance of the NTRA legislative team, 17 Members of Congress, led by Reps. Boustany and Yarmuth, sent a letter to the Treasury and IRS outlining the need for a regulatory change. Another pivotal moment occurred Jan. 27, 2015, when Rep. Yarmuth arranged a meeting with senior Treasury officials, leading horseplayers Chris Larmey and Judy Wagner, and Kevin Flanery from Churchill Downs.

Several months passed with no action, but in March 2015, the Treasury and IRS issued newly proposed regulations related to keno, bingo and slots winnings. Buried within the nearly 9,000 words and 719 lines of draft regulations--regs which were overwhelmingly panned by the casino industry and never saw the light of day--were 154 words and 13 lines of type under the title, "Gambling Winnings Other Than From Bingo, Keno and Slot Machine Play." The section included the following: "The Treasury Department and the IRS are aware that taxpayers required to report winnings from pari-mutuel gambling may have concerns, similar to those addressed in these proposed regulations, relating to when wagers with respect to horse races, dog races, and jai alai may be treated as identical.

“In addition, comments are requested regarding whether the aggregate reporting method should be available for gambling winnings other than winnings from bingo, keno, and slot machine play.”

To say that the industry took full advantage of this opening would be an understatement. In short order, the NTRA facilitated the filing of nearly 12,000 public comments from horseplayers and key stakeholders in favor of proposed new language to redefine the “amount of a wager” as it relates to pari-mutuel winnings. Some 83% of all comments submitted to the Treasury about regulations covering bingo, keno, and slots instead were pointed toward the need for the Treasury and IRS to modernize regulations related to reporting and withholding of pari-mutuel winnings.

Throughout the comment period, the NTRA legislative team, including our tax counsel at the Washington, D.C.-based firm of Davis and Harman, also worked with elected officials who voiced their support for the proposed change via letters, phone calls, and discussions with Treasury officials. Members of the U.S. House and Senate, including House Appropriations Committee Chairman Hal Rogers (R-KY) and Kentucky’s then-Governor Steve Beshear, helped build the case for tax reform.

By mid-2015, and not long after the NTRA testified before an IRS committee on the proposed regulatory changes, Treasury Department officials chose to move forward on the issue. In the ensuing months, Members of Congress, acting with the guidance of the NTRA legislative team, maintained constant pressure on Treasury and IRS officials to act on the NTRA’s request. That our allies on the Hill were well-versed on this and other horse racing issues was in part due to the considerable influence of NTRA Horse PAC, the industry’s bipartisan political action committee led by chairman William S. (Bill) Farish that has supported allies of horse racing and breeding since its formation in 2002. These are just two examples from 2016:

- In March, Rep. Andy Barr (R-KY) submitted questions to Treasury Secretary Jacob J. Lew in conjunction with the Secretary’s appearance before the House Financial Services Committee. In response, Treasury’s Office of Tax Policy and the IRS Office of Chief Counsel acknowledged the significant input from our industry, saying such input was “very helpful in understanding these issues.”

- In June, the 30-member Senate Committee on Appropriations and the 52-member House of Representatives Appropriations Committee passed companion bills for fiscal year 2017 that made appropriations for the Treasury, IRS and certain other government agencies. Both bills included language that encouraged the IRS to modernize regulations for withholding and reporting of pari-mutuel proceeds. Following up on the appropriations bills, Reps. Boustany and Yarmuth again contacted the Secretary of the Treasury and urged the agency to move quickly.

In September, yet another pivotal moment occurred when the NTRA, with no fanfare or publicity, arranged a meeting with Treasury officials to answer specific technical questions arising from proposed changes to the way pari-mutuel winnings are reported and withheld. Keith Johnson of AmTote, which processes some 80% of U.S. pari-mutuel wagers, and Kevin Flanery from Churchill Downs accompanied the NTRA to this meeting. Both individuals provided excellent technical assistance that was greatly appreciated by the Treasury and IRS personnel in attendance. The NTRA drafted and submitted proposed language to further assist the process.

A few months later, as the Obama Administration drew to a close, timing also proved propitious as staff and leadership, charged to conclude projects by year’s end, finished their work on redefining “the amount of a wager,” by issuing a 31-page draft of proposed Treasury/IRS regulations Dec. 30, 2016, capping more than 2 1/2 years of unremitting Congressional and industry advocacy. The Treasury Department opened a second 90-day comment period which ended Mar. 30, 2017.

The Final Phase: Enactment

The NTRA submitted a comment letter requesting that Treasury enact the new regulations in its then current form as quickly as possible, while also requesting a 45-day grace period for uniform implementation. On a parallel path, the NTRA began meeting with Tote companies and racing operators in January to discuss the need to be prepared for immediate implementation of the regulations by as soon as April of this year.

The NTRA established a second online portal for individuals to submit email comments directly to the Treasury Department in support of the proposed regulations. **Cont. p7**

Almost 5,000 horseplayers and others responded to our call for support, further cementing the industry's unanimous front for the changes and paving the way for Treasury and the IRS to act quickly.

Treasury released an advisory Monday, Sept. 25, indicating its intent to publish the new withholding and reporting rules in final form Wednesday, Sept. 27, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Unfortunately, the paths of Reps. Boustany and Yarmuth diverged in 2016, with Rep. Boustany losing a bid for a U.S. Senate seat in the November elections, while Rep. Yarmuth was reelected and subsequently elevated to the position of Ranking Member of the House Budget Committee. Together, they began a process that built over time to involve thousands of individuals in the racing community and in government, including ranking members of Congressional committees that included Administration, Appropriations, Budget, Energy and Commerce, Financial Services and Ways and Means. We thank our PAC supporters, the NTRA's legislative team, horseplayers, industry stakeholders, members of the racing media, Members of Congress and their staffers, numerous other elected officials and a host of regulators within the Treasury and the IRS who helped bring this effort to a successful conclusion. The entire process, sustained for over 10 years and three Presidential administrations, required considerable resources by the NTRA and will prove to be worth every penny.

So that's how we did it; how we *all* did it! There are simply too many contributors to single out everyone. And the benefits will flow to every segment of the business. That's why we said when we first announced our success, "Horse Racing Wins."

Sidebar: IRS Reporting and Withholding Thresholds

Before last week, horseplayers wagering on pari-mutuel races were subject to reporting on proceeds of \$600 or more and automatic federal tax withholding on pari-mutuel proceeds of more than \$5,000 if the winning amount was also at least 300 times larger than the "amount of the wager." Previously, the "amount of a wager" was defined as the winning base unit, which virtually guaranteed that a high percentage of multi-horse and multi-leg wagers triggered reporting and/or withholding for horseplayers.

For example, the IRS considered the amount wagered to be \$1 in the case of a \$1 Pick Six consisting of 140 different combinations costing the bettor \$140. Because the 300/1 ratio is reached at just \$300 when the amount of the wager is only \$1, any payoff on this \$140 Pick Six wager in excess of \$600 triggered reporting and any payoff above \$5,000 triggered automatic withholding. This was a major problem because withholding and even reporting to some extent reduced players' liquidity during handicapping and adversely impacted pari-

mutuel handle and purses.

The new regulations published last week clarify "the amount of the wager" to include the entire amount wagered into a specific pari-mutuel pool by an individual, not just the winning base unit. Back to the example above, a \$1 pick 6 ticket costing \$140 will not be subject to withholding or reporting unless that winning payoff exceeds \$42,000 (300 x \$140 = \$42,000).

Thus, the new Treasury regulations more accurately reflect today's pari-mutuel wagering environment and will positively impact a significant percentage of winning wagers, particularly those involving multi-horse or multi-race exotic wagers. Although some independent estimates have placed the impact of this regulatory change at upwards of \$1 billion annually, the NTRA has been careful not to project the impact. In the end, it really doesn't matter whether the monetary impact is \$100 million, \$500 million, \$1 billion or more. The true impacts will be on a more personal level, playing out hundreds, if not thousands of times a day when individual bettors will no longer be penalized by outdated and misguided regulations written during a bygone era when there was virtually no exotic wagering other than a single Daily Double on the card.

The end result is a much-improved customer experience. The next time a horseplayer hits a nice score that one would expect to be a "signer," there's a very good chance he or she won't have to visit the IRS window or have any winnings withheld. This added liquidity will lead to more churn, which benefits racing operators, horsemen, jockeys, breeders, and government.

LOOKIN AT LUCKY FILLY TOPS FASIG FIRST SESSION

TIMONIUM, MD--A Lookin At Lucky filly consigned by CandyLand, Agent XX topped all returns Monday evening at the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic Fall Yearlings Sale when Kentucky-based horseman Spider Duignan stretched to \$175,000 to scoop up **hip 119**.

The first 150 hips went through the ring during day one, with the rest of the 513-horse catalogue scheduled to sell Tuesday. Monday's session was added to accommodate the large number of entries for the sale, which was conducted in one day in 2016.

Because of the format change, year-to-year comparisons should come at the conclusion of Tuesday's session, which will begin at 10:00 a.m. **Cont. p8**

Lookin At Lucky Filly Tops Fasig First Session:

On Monday, a total of 81 yearlings changed hands for \$2,109,200. The average was \$26,040 and median was \$15,000. The buy-back rate was 36.7%.

Duignan purchased Monday's top lot on behalf of a group of partners. She will be trained by New York-based Michael Dilger, who was standing next to Duignan during the bidding. Duignan and Dilger have teamed up before with the likes of multiple stakes-placed Dreams to Reality, who is also a daughter of Lookin At Lucky.

"She's a very good physical--classy," Duignan said of hip 119. "The mare's been a very good producer; all her foals have run good numbers, and her full-sister's a decent filly."

Trainer Gary Capuano paid \$14,500 for hip 119's dam Slow and Steady (Malibu Moon) as a weanling at the 2002 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic December Mixed Sale. A four-time winner and \$123,510 for Capuano and partners, she's been an even better producer, responsible for the likes of multiple stakes winner Steady Warrior and stakes winner Steady N Love (Not For Love). She also produced the two-time stakes-placed Hanky Doodle (Cherokee's Boy) and the 3-year-old full-

sister to hip 119 in multiple stakes-placed Lucky in Malibu, who annexed a Laurel allowance Sept. 15 for Capuano, Z W P Stable and Non Stop Stable.

"That was a little higher than what we expected, but she looks like a pretty special filly," said CandyLand General Manager Mike Palmer. "Her physical is second to nothing."

He continued, "I thought the filly could possibly bring \$200,000, but we're in the first day of a two-day sale that started at 4:00 for the first day. So I think it's an experimental thing, and I think if the filly sells tomorrow she brings \$200,000 because people start getting desperate for good fillies. This filly here, in my opinion, was a very special filly."

Palmer was soon greeted back at the CandyLand barn by Capuano and the filly's co-breeders, Dave Picarello and Foard Wilgis.

"That mare's just been a great producer, and we thought we had a really nice horse that maybe we could cash in on and get a decent price," said Capuano. "We're happy with it. The mare's

been a great producer--this is a really nice baby, and we thought maybe we could maximize our returns, but if we didn't sell her we were fine racing her. She's a really nice filly, and we're hoping she does well." --@BDiDonatoTDN

AUDLEY BACK IN ACTION AT TIMONIUM

Audley Farm hasn't consigned horses at a Thoroughbred auction in more than 20 years, but the historic Virginia-based nursery made a splash Monday in its return to the ring when agents Nick Sallusto and Hanzly Albina went to \$140,000 to acquire hip 28 on behalf of Maurice and Samantha Regan's Newtown Anner Stud.

Audley bred the filly's talented sire Bodemeister--responsible for the likes of this year's GI Kentucky Derby winner Always Dreaming--before selling him for \$260,000 at the 2010 Keeneland September Sale.

Dam Pink Champagne (Speightstown) won the 2003 GIII Natalma S. and Audley paid \$475,000 for her in foal to Speightstown at KEENOV '05. Her second dam was MSW/MGSP Turkappeal (Turkoman) and she hails from the family of Speightstown, Irap, Mani Bhavan, et al.

"We had high expectations for the filly--we really liked her," said Audley Equine manager Jamie McDiarmid. "I thought she was a beautifully lined filly and she was all class the whole week. We had a lot of action on her, everyone seemed to love her, and she showed great. I couldn't be happier for my people on the farm and the owners. That was the first sale for Audley Equine [as consignor] in over 20 years, and I think we had a pretty good one, so I'm very happy."

McDiarmid admitted that it was extra sweet to return to the sales with a filly by Bodemeister.

Audley is one of a number of consignors selling at the Midlantic Fall Yearlings sale either for the first time or first time in years, and cited similar reasons to others, which include a resurgence in the Thoroughbred industry in Maryland and the surrounding states. Audley's location in Virginia means its produce qualify for the new [Virginia-Certified Residency Program](#).

"We just thought in the Mid-Atlantic, Audley should be a part of the [scene]," said McDiarmid. This [region] is starting to lift off a little bit, as you can see, so we thought it might be a very good time to put our name out there. We'll be local sellers in this area--we have different people [consigning] in Kentucky--but when we came up here we thought the farm had the right juice to get us there."

Founded in 1749 and for more than a century owned by the family of George Washington, Audley raises both Thoroughbreds and purebred Angus cattle. It's current principals are residents of Germany.

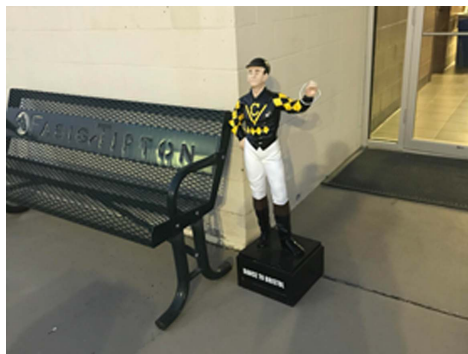
WANTZES, FROMMER DO MORE BUSINESS IN TIMONIUM

At the 2011 Fasig-Tipton Midlantic sale, David Wantz of Copperville Farm paid \$42,000 for a daughter of Speightstown from the Carrie Frommer consignment. Turned over to trainer Ollie Figgins III, the chestnut miss--eventually named Dance to Bristol--showed immediate promise--and took stakes at two and three before really blossoming at four, capping a seven-race win streak in Saratoga's GI Ballerina S.

Wantz and wife Susan did more business with Frommer in Timonium Monday when the noted Aiken-based horsewoman paid \$135,000 for **hip 77**, a filly by Maclean's Music consigned by Bill Reightler, agent. Susan Wantz bred the filly in West Virginia.

"I have a lot of faith that Carrie will do right by the horse," said David Wantz before Susan added, "I was crying before I saw Carrie bought her. That makes me feel good because I know she's in good hands."

An April 22 foal, the bay is the fourth foal out of the unraced Rowdy Woman (Fastness {Ire}), who was given to the Wantzes by the late trainer and breeder Donald Townsend.

"A friend of ours passed away, and we took the mare, and his wife wouldn't take her back," said Bill Wantz while standing right near the lawn jockey adorning his silks that guards the door to the sales pavilion. "It was his mare. We owned a share in Kela, and we

didn't have a mare to breed to him that year, and Donald said, 'You just take my mare' and we've had her ever since. I bred her to some stallions maybe not as good as [Maclean's Music], but she's producing runners."

Wantz noted that Rowdy Woman is back in foal to Maclean's Music, and that her 4-year-old son Kowboy Salute (Kodiak Kowboy) is nearing a first start at Charles Town.

As for hip 77, he said, "They looked at her until she was so tired that she didn't even want to come out of her stall, so we had a feeling, but you never know. Just look at her--she's beautiful. She's big, elegant. We've been a big believer in Maclean's Music since she went to stud. She's a little downhill; everything about her says racehorse."

HELP HAS ARRIVED, BUT SITUATION STILL GRIM AT CAMARERO

A plane carrying 20 tons of hay cubes and veterinary supplies arrived in San Juan yesterday, which will provide needed sustenance for the many horses still at Camarero Racetrack and help veterinarians and volunteers working to care for the horses.

The situation has been dire on the backstretch of Puerto Rico's lone racetrack since Hurricane Maria ravaged the island starting Sept. 21.

For some horses, however, the supplies arrived too late. According to Kelley Stobie of Caribbean Thoroughbred Aftercare, three more horses at Camarero have been euthanized within the last few days, upping the number of known equine deaths at the track to 11.

"The problem is that with a lot of the cheaper claiming horses, they haven't had anybody to take care of them or they do and the people just don't care," Stobie told the *TDN* from Puerto Rico. "The horses are just being left and are standing in water and horses can't handle that. They will founder."

Stobie added that she has been telling people who come upon abandoned horses to let them out of their stalls.

"Just let them out," she said. "At least that way I can find them and they can wander around and find some grass to eat."

Stobie reports that the situation has improved in recent days. She said early yesterday that she expected that every horse on the backstretch would have received at least minimal care, food and water by the end of Monday afternoon. There are still about 150 horses who do not have adequate shelter because they are in barns where the roofs have been blown off.

Stobie spoke to the *TDN* from the San Juan airport, where she was helping unload the cargo that had just arrived from the U.S. mainland. The work done to get the supplies and feed to Puerto Rico was a team effort from a number of groups, including Thoroughbred Charities of America, the American Association of Equine Practitioners, the Jockey Club and Ranch Aid, a FEMA appointed organization that assists with logistics and care for large animals during natural disasters.

The veterinary supplies and medications en route to San Juan were donated in part by MWI Animal Health and purchased by TEVA. Delivery was assisted by south Florida veterinary practice Teigland, Franklin, and Brokken. The hay cubes were donated in part by Cargill/Nutrena and purchased by the AAEP Foundation. Additionally, two satellite phones were purchased by the AAEP Foundation and delivery assistance was provided by south Florida Purina Animal Nutrition representative Shiela Conde.

"I have to commend the industry," said Shelley Blodgett, a member of the Caribbean Thoroughbred Aftercare team who is based in Florida. **Cont. p10**

“We got this plane in and it took Erin Crady of Thoroughbred Charities of America and others moving heaven and earth to make it happen. There were so many false starts with this. It is a mini-miracle that this plane actually got in and it is a credit to people in this industry who have a lot of influence. I am grateful for what people have done. This is literally lifeblood.”

According to a press release put out yesterday by TCA, Thoroughbred owners Terry Finley and Vince Viola played a vital role in cutting through the red tape and clearing the way for the plane to arrive in Puerto Rico.

Members of the Humane Society also arrived yesterday at Camarero and will assist with the rescue efforts and assess the situation.

Blodgett said that the biggest problems have been getting hay and clean water to the horses. Many have had grain but nothing else. She added that there is still a need for shavings and several horses are standing in stalls with no bedding.

“It has been 11 days since the hurricane, so for many of these horses, with the arrival of the hay and supplies, this will be the first day that they have had any forage,” Blodgett said. “It’s a lifeline for them. Some horses have had some grain but not enough forage or water, which is problematic. Having the forage will help them, help their digestive health so they don’t colic or founder. Water has also been a big problem. I’ve been told the water available at the track was not clean. On the flip side, there are folks hauling clean water in from their own homes or wherever they can get it from for their horses.”

Blodgett said that Stobie has been working nonstop since the hurricane hit and has had little help or rest. When reached yesterday, Stobie was clearly frustrated and said Camarero management has done little to assist her.

“It’s really been hard,” Stobie said. “There has been so much government crap and red tape. It’s unbelievable. I cannot believe it’s been almost two weeks since the storm and I am only now getting my first shipment of supplies.”

“I’ve always worked with the racetrack, but I am very disappointed with the way they have handled the care of these horses. They have enough people that could have helped me with this and they didn’t. It’s not like they are making me do everything because they couldn’t care less if I did anything. This is my job. I am here for the animals. I don’t care about anything else. I’m here to protect them and fight for their rights.”

The phone lines remain down at Camarero, therefore the *TDN* was not able to seek comment from management there addressing Stobie’s complaints.

Stobie said the heroes have been the grooms.

“It’s the poor people, the local grooms, they have been busting their butts to help these horses.”

Camarero has issued a press release saying it expects the track will reopen shortly for training and that racing will resume there within 45 to 60 days.

FORMER BREEDERS' CUP HORSE PULLED UP AT IDAHO FAIR

Chips All In (North Light {Ire}), a six-time stakes winner who competed in the 2013 GI Breeders' Cup Turf Sprint, was pulled up with an undisclosed injury and failed to finish as the 1-20 favorite in a \$1,750 allowance race at Sandy Downs on the Idaho fairs circuit on Sept. 30.

The injury comes just three weeks after *TDN* published a column that detailed the precipitous drop in class for the former southern California-based graded stakes competitor. Chips All In had been racing at Del Mar Thoroughbred Club as recently as Aug. 24, but resurfaced in the entries for the Eastern Idaho State Fair at Blackfoot and earned \$990 for winning an allowance there Sept. 3.

That *TDN* column, "From Breeders' Cup to Bullring" (read it [here](#)), raised the issue of whether a Thoroughbred who drops that far down the class ladder should be considered an "at-risk" horse even after passing required racing commission pre-race veterinary checks.

Chips All In had already been retired once by previous owners in 2014. But a year later, he was put back into training and subsequently switched owners several times after being claimed twice.

Ryan Hanson, one of the horse's current co-owners, had claimed Chips All In for \$32,000 June 10, 2017, at Santa Anita Park. In a Sept. 4 phone interview, Hanson defended his partnership's subsequent decision to run Chips All In over the half-mile Blackfoot bullring, saying "this horse just acts like he

needed a little confidence, so we sent him to the Idaho fair circuit to try and do that."

But Hanson wasn't amenable to an interview when contacted by *TDN* on Monday, two days after Chips All In pulled up at Sandy Downs. He refused to discuss the nature of the horse's injury beyond confirming that Chips All In is still alive.

"I'm not going to say anything about the horse. I don't like the way you portrayed the horse or the owners or anything about us in your article," Hanson said. "You did not do any fact-finding at all. I'm not going to tell you anything. You don't own this horse, and you've never paid a single training bill for this horse. It's none of your business."

When given the opportunity to cite and correct the parts of the column that he believed were incorrect or not factual, Hanson would not provide specifics. The column specifically stated, "It needs to be underscored that the current connections of Chips All In have violated no rules by claiming and racing their horse where they see fit."

Racing officials at Sandy Downs were unable to provide details on what happened in the race or about the current condition of Chips All In.

The Equibase official chart for the race lists the track condition as "fast" for that day's racing at Sandy Downs even though the weather listed in the charts was termed "rainy."

"The weather was pretty bad that day. I was actually running around trying to keep the track in shape and keep everything going," said Broc Gilstrap, the Sandy Downs racing secretary. "I actually didn't see it ... I'm not sure if he just didn't like the mud, the footing, or what, but that's what it looks like to me from what I heard. We didn't have any horses that were hauled off or anything, so I'm assuming he's fine."

Dave Wheeler, the Idaho Racing Commission state steward, told *TDN* he witnessed and officiated the race. But he said he would not comment on what he saw until he received an official report from the commission veterinarian.

A phone message to Dr. Kent Warner, the commission veterinarian assigned to Sandy Downs, was not returned prior to deadline for this story.

Chips All In is owned by a three-way partnership of Ryan and Jim Hanson and Robin Dunn. His trainer is Mark Hanson, who is Ryan's brother.

TDN knows of at least one standing offer to re-home Chips All In if the current connections are open to discussing that possibility.

Alan Cohen's Ocala-based Arindel ended the summer meet as leading owner with 13 wins, two more than Frank Calabrese and three better than Midwest Thoroughbreds. Arindel also led all owners with nearly \$700,000 in purse earnings.

With European racing's biggest weekend behind us, many of those who played leading roles at Chantilly on Sunday were already in Newmarket and in action early on Monday morning at Tattersalls in pursuit of the next crop of stars.

The Juddmonte operation is rarely without a superstar representative in recent years but while still happily receiving congratulations for the extraordinary Arc victory of Enable (GB) (Nathaniel {Ire}), the team's thoughts will be turning to the more commercial aspects of the stallion business and the members of the first crop of Kingman (GB) about to take to the ring for Book 1 of the October Sale. They include a half-sister to the Group 2-placed listed winner Abingdon (Street Cry {Ire}) and recent maiden winner Aim of Artemis (Ire) (Leroidesanimaux {Brz}), who, as lot 168, will be the second yearling from a major dispersal of the Ballymacoll Stud stock, which adds an extra element of pathos to Europe's biggest yearling sale. The five Book 1 yearlings from Ballymacoll--starting with a Sea The Stars (Ire) yearling out of the champion racemare Islington (Ire) (Sadler's Wells)--will all be offered at the end of Tuesday's session through Corduff Stud and will be followed next week by another three in Book 2.

Ballymacoll's long-term manager Peter Reynolds has been in Newmarket over the weekend to oversee the first batch of yearlings to be offered. He said, "There's been tremendous interest in the fillies and good interest in the colt as well. The difficulty I've had is trying to explain to people that there literally is no reserve on any of the horses. They're here to sell, whether people think they are worth 25,000gns or 200,000gns, and by the end of Tuesday we'll have five fewer horses. Corduff have done a brilliant job and it's been a great team effort as I have two of my Ballymacoll staff working with them as well. We move on after this and the next lot of yearlings will be coming in tomorrow evening."

He continued, "We've had to withdraw a Sea The Moon yearling from Book 2 and he will be offered in December instead, when we'll also have the mares and nine foals being sold by Norelands Stud. Laura Weinstock, Simon's widow, will be coming to Tattersalls for the mares' sale to see them go through. It's the end of an era." [Cont. p2](#)

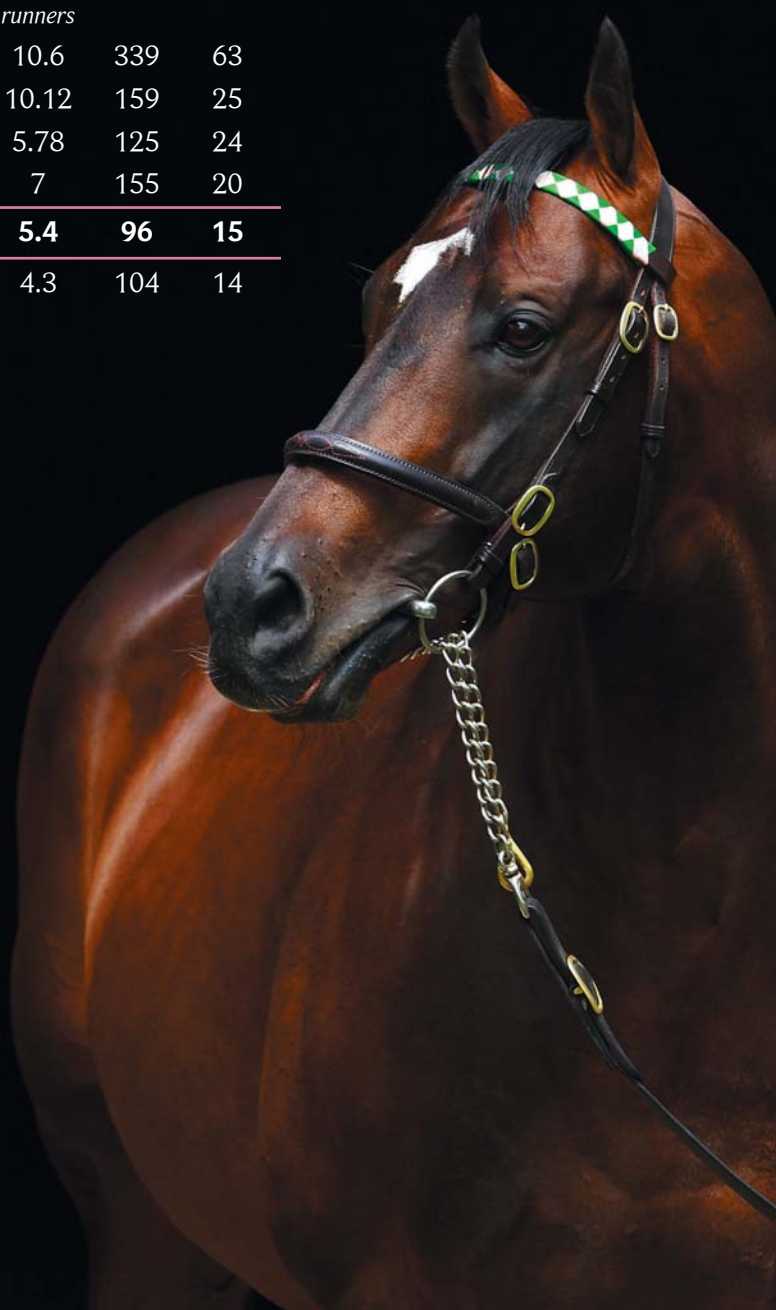

Though the dispersal brings to a close a significant chapter in bloodstock history, the Reynolds family's association with the Ballymacoll bloodlines will not end entirely as, with his son, Peter Reynolds now owns Roshanak (Ire), a Spinning World half-sister to G1 Melbourne Cup winner Fiorente (Ire) (Monsun {Ger}) who has produced the listed winners Araaja (Ire) (Iffraaj {GB}) and Tom Melbourne (Ire) (Dylan Thomas {Ire}) among her offspring. The latter was beaten just half a length in the G1 Epsom H. at Randwick on Saturday, thus providing another update to his dam's yearling half-sister by Cacique (Ire), who sells as **lot 772** in Book 2.

Ballymacoll Stud is far from the only major breeder to have used Kingman in his first year at stud. Twenty-five of his yearlings have been slated for Book 1 and he is in good company among the freshman sires.

Deutsches Derby winner Sea The Moon (Ger) has already been well received in his native country, where his first yearlings were the talk of the BBAG Sale last month. Similarly, the first crops of No Nay Never and Australia (GB) were met with approval last week at Goffs, and all three have significant representation throughout the three sessions of Book 1, along with fellow Group 1 winners Charm Spirit (Ire), Noble Mission (GB), Olympic Glory (Ire), Slade Power (Ire), Toronado (Ire) and War Command.

Elarqam (GB), a son of the Classic winners Frankel (GB) and Attraction (GB), was one of the leading lights of last year's Book 1 when selling for 1.6 million gns to Shadwell and he gave the sale a further boost when notching his first stakes victory at Newmarket's Rowley Mile last Thursday, appropriately in the G3 Somerville Tattersalls S. Only a mile away as the crow flies, his half-brother by Dubawi (Ire) was settling into his temporary new digs at Park Paddocks and will be the ninth lot into the ring on Thursday morning (**lot 347**).

In the last nine years since the global recession figures have climbed consistently for Book 1, with just shy of 50 million gns changing hands back in 2008 through to last year's record turnover of 88 million gns. It will be no surprise to see that tally bettered again this year.

INNOVATION KEY AT IFHA CONFERENCE

By Kelsey Riley

Paris, FRANCE--Innovation was a common theme at the 51st International Conference of Horseracing Authorities hosted by Longines and the International Federation of Horseracing Authorities in Paris on Monday. The discussions and presentations included a panel on racehorse aftercare; an update on the redevelopment of two of Europe's key racecourses, The Curragh and Longchamp; the transition of racing on wagering from a local to a global market; and how the racing and breeding industries will be affected by Brexit.

Aftercare: An International Responsibility...

"Aftercare initiatives are, and should always be, an essential part of our business planning regardless of geography," said IFHA Vice Chairman Jim Gagliano, also vice president and chief executive officer of the Jockey Club, in opening a panel on Thoroughbred aftercare. "If we hope to prosper as an entertainment option, we need others to know that we're taking good care of our horses."

Gagliano provided a recap of the key points presented by the International Forum for the Aftercare of Racehorses at the Pan American Conference in May. IFAR's objectives are to raise awareness, improve education on, develop a network for and promote racehorse aftercare on a global scale. In its first year it has targeted its audience through direct communication and media coverage, and has generated keen interest worldwide.

"International interest and participation in IFAR before and after the conference has been overwhelming in the best sense of the term," Gagliano said.

The second IFAR forum will be held in conjunction with the 37th Asian Racing Conference in Seoul, South Korea May 13 to 18, 2018. **Cont. p4**

Gagliano pointed to one specific initiative as a success story for Thoroughbreds and wider communities: the Man O'War project, which was spearheaded by horse owner and philanthropist Earle Mack to measure the effectiveness of equine-assisted therapy for war veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder.

"The Man O'War Project is the first university-led research trial to determine the effectiveness of equine-assisted therapy and to establish guidelines for the application of equine-assisted therapy for veterans with PTSD," Gagliano said. "Equine-assisted therapy programs benefit not only the humans, but also the horses, including the many retired Thoroughbreds used in these programs. These programs are ideal second careers for our retired equine athletes and we look forward to the results of this very important research."

Paulick Report publisher Ray Paulick spoke about horse welfare and aftercare from a media perspective. Paulick pointed to three incidents that thrust aftercare and welfare into the national spotlight in America: the overseas slaughter of Exceller and Ferdinand, and the breakdown of Eight Belles at the 2008 Kentucky Derby.

"For the most part the mainstream media, the daily newspapers and television, and the trade press, the daily, weekly and monthly Thoroughbred publications, paid no attention to this issue for decades," he said. "But there were several game-changing events that would soon take place, forcing the media to shine some light on the subject."

Paulick spoke about the good to come from all three tragedies: The Exceller fund for ex-racehorses was created, and Ferdinand's death spurred proactivity by both the Americans and Japanese in repatriating pensioned stallions. [Cont. p5](#)

Eight Belles's death prompted a federal government hearing in the U.S. congress examining drugs and other issues that put aftercare under the attention of the national media.

Other positive developments for racehorse aftercare have included the development of the Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance, and an increase in Thoroughbred horse shows, which showcase the abilities of ex-racehorses, as well as an increase in positive coverage in the media about retrained racehorses.

Redevelopment For the Future...

Brian Kavanagh, chief executive officer of Horse Racing Ireland and vice chairman of the IFHA, opened the 'Special Presentation of the New European Racecourses Redevelopment' with some insightful statistics on the impact of Irish racing returned by a recent Deloitte economic impact study. The Irish racing and breeding industries have a core economic impact of €1.05 billion annually, and a direct and stimulated expenditure of €1.84 billion. The Irish industries support 9,500 direct jobs and 28,900 total jobs from offshoot industries. Ireland boasts the highest number of horses per 10,000 people (50) of any racing nation, with Australia coming next at 28, followed by Britain at five and the U.S. and France at four. Twenty-five percent of Ireland's adult population has an interest in racing, up from 22% in 2010. Racing is Ireland's second-most attended sport.

These figures signal a bright future for the industry in Ireland and highlight the necessity of bringing The Curragh up to speed as a world-class facility, Kavanagh said.

"The Curragh is a very versatile, very high-quality track, but the problem with The Curragh down through the years is that the facilities at The Curragh did not match the track," he said. "The Curragh was last redeveloped in 1962, and since then there's been some bits and pieces of work done but no major redevelopment."

A public/private partnership company was established to help fund the €72-million redevelopment, which began earlier this year. The investors in that company, which now owns one-third of The Curragh, with the other two-thirds owned by HRI and the Irish Turf Club, are His Highness The Aga Khan, Godolphin/Sheikh Mohammed, Derrinstown Stud/Sheikh Hamdan, Moyglare Stud Farm and the Coolmore partners: John Magnier, Derrick Smith and Michael Tabor.

Kavanagh was followed by Curragh CEO Derek McGrath, who spoke about specifics of the project, including the new four-level, state-of-the-art grandstand and the reconstruction of the stable yards, one half of which is already completed. McGrath said the project is, however, about much more than the physical aesthetics of the new buildings.

“This is far bigger than just a building,” he said. “For us we have to really build something which is for the future. We know a lot about racegoers but I think it’s very important we’re focused very much on listening and learning and experience, not attendance. We want to understand what’s important for people. We’re talking to three sets of audience: the racing professionals, the racegoers and our local community. We’re not just building a new building, we’re setting ourselves a much higher goal, and that’s to take flat racing to new heights.”

The same lofty ambitions are held for the new Longchamp, which is set to open next April after construction began two years ago. Longchamp stages 17 of France’s 28 Group 1 races and generates €450 million in betting turnover annually, but France Galop Chief Executive Olivier Delloye pointed to the threat that has plagued racing in

the country since online betting was legalized in 2010. Wagering on racing has been on a steady decline over the last five years, while wagering on other sports has risen.

“Since the opening of online betting, other sports have taken €1 billion from racing turnover,” said Delloye. “That has resulted in a sharp decline of the revenues of France Galop. In that context, the revamp of Longchamp, which will cost around €140 million [wholly funded by France Galop], is a bold move. But we’re seeing it as a no-miss, because no company can gain new clients if it doesn’t invest in the future.”

Hong Kong enjoyed the greatest year-on-year growth of racing turnover of any major racing nation last year, up 10.7%, while Australia (+8.4%), Japan (+5%) and the U.S. (+0.7%) also showed increases. Wagering on racing in France was down 1.5% last year, and it was down 1.1% in the UK.

In comparison with sports betting as a whole, wagering on racing globally was down 13.6% between 2012 and 2015, while sports betting was up 6.2%.

“This shows the real threat to our market share from sports betting,” said Engelbrecht-Bresges. “Other forms of gambling are projected to grow faster in future years. Racing is projected to grow by 7% in 2022, while sports betting is projected to grow by 52%. Horse racing has lost approximately 1% of the sports betting market share between 2012 and 2015, during which period lotteries have grown by 3%. This shows that we have to think about strategies: how can we grow our revenues and keep our market share?”

He stressed the importance of “keeping our house in order,” in terms of value creation in racing, which is done by a combination of strong governance, putting on a strong product for racing fans (facilities and good experiences for fans and owners) and a strong wagering product (a good race programme and large fields to maximize the wagering potential).

“The full integration between the racing organizers and the wagering operator gives you, from a data perspective, if you understand your customer, the ideal combination,” said Engelbrecht-Bresges. “Unfortunately, this only happens in very few jurisdictions--if one looks at Japan, Hong Kong and Singapore--where you have a completely integrated model that you can really understand what the customers needs are.”

He also stressed the importance of being savvy with wagering products and parimutuel offerings, and taking into consideration what will be more successful in today’s global wagering market.

While the HKJC employs a commingling strategy, Japan has developed a simulcast model with separate pools on overseas races, and Japan Racing Association President and Chief Executive Officer Masayuki Goto was on hand to talk about his country’s process, which began with having laws changed in 2015 to allow for wagering on overseas races when a Japanese horse is participating. The number of Japanese horses running in group races overseas rose between 2015 and 2016, and the average turnover wagered in Japan for the major international races with Japanese participation in 2016 was an average of \$12 million per race.

Xavier Hurstel, chairman and CEO of the PMU, described the international market as one of four pillars of the organization’s 2020 strategy. The PMU first linked pools with Monaco in 1987, and the first foreign programme it imported for simulcasting was the 1997 Breeders’ Cup. It now has relationships throughout Europe, North and South America, Russia, Africa and Australia with both common and separate pools. Looking to the future, the PMU hopes to develop programs in high-potential markets like South Korea and Hong Kong, and to launch a specific PMU Hub catered to its foreign partners.

To conclude the session, Richard Cheung, the HKJC’s executive director, customer and marketing, spoke about the club’s commingling strategy up to this point, and how commingling countries should work together for future development. Cheung reiterated Engelbrecht-Bresges’s assessment that a pillar to developing a successful commingling product is maintaining an industry with integrity and a strong racing product, and he also spoke about how the HKJC has learned to tailor its product, like its racecards, to foreign audiences. He outlined key steps the HKJC used to resonate with its commingling partners overseas, including developing an “ecosystem” of media partners and key opinion leaders; greater education in Hong Kong racing overseas; and targeting overseas Chinese. The HKJC’s strategies of ongoing development of its commingling pools include working with its partners to participate in exotic bet-types that are popular in other jurisdictions.

Brexit and Racing...

Brian Kavanagh later returned to the podium to talk about the challenges Brexit poses to the European racing industry.

“It has challenged us to look at the fundamentals of our business and I see nothing but cooperation and unity amongst particularly Britain, Ireland and France,” he said.

Specifically related to Ireland, Brexit could cause complications between the racecourses and stud farms in Ireland and Northern Ireland, which currently operate as one. It could see tariffs imposed on trade, and the impact of the exchange rate as it relates to the sterling is already being seen. Kavanagh noted that the British and Irish industries are highly integrated, with movement of about 17,000 horses between the two countries each year. They operate under a single stud book, 80% of Irish bloodstock exports are to Britain and many of Ireland’s media rights contracts are in sterling.

“It’s the best example you’ll find in the sporting and business world of total integration of two countries,” Kavanagh said. “The horse racing and bloodstock industries in Britain and Ireland effectively operate as one.”

IFHA Chairman Louis Romanet brought the conference to a close by saying, “There are many challenges that each of us must meet in our own countries and across borders. The future will be equally daunting, but I remain optimistic that the passion of our stakeholders and customers will lead us to more fruitful days.”

BHA RELEASES TRAINERS' NON-RUNNERS TABLES

The first tables of trainers' non-runner rates were published as part of a series of measures with the objective of decreasing non-runner rates in British racing following an extensive [review](#), the British Horseracing Authority (BHA) announced Monday. Separated between [jump trainers' non-runners table](#) and [flat trainers' non-runners table](#), the BHA will begin publishing the non-runner rates quarterly (accessible [here](#)), with any trainer with more than 100 declarations in the period with 50% above the average non-runner rate being suspended from using self-certificates for 12 months. Trainers above the threshold, but not included within the published data (with fewer than 100 declarations during the previous 12 months) would have their individual situation reviewed. The non-runner rate threshold percentage would be 14% for flat racing and 12% for jumps racing, with automatic suspensions for trainers above the thresholds not being applied until the end of March 2018.

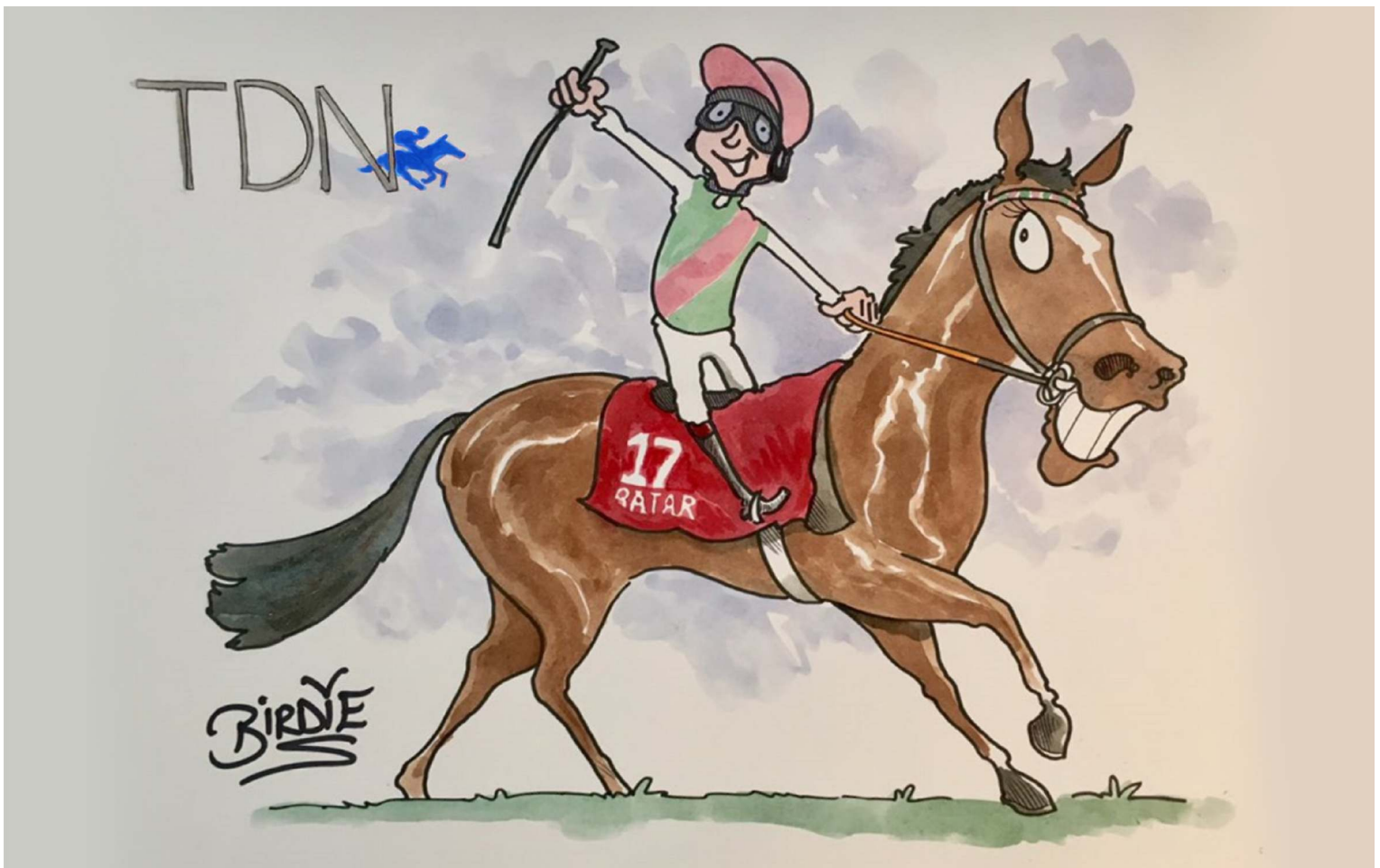

IRISH YEARLING SALES SHOW INCREASES

The Irish throughbred yearling market is up approximately 8% compared to last year after September saw the conclusion of the Tattersalls Ireland September Yearling Sale and Goffs Orby and Goffs Sportsman's Yearling Sales, Horse Racing Ireland announced Monday. Held from Sept. 19-20, the Tattersalls Ireland September Yearling Sale compiled record turnover of €11,451,000, as well as record median and average marks. The gross, average and median were also records in Part II of Tattersalls Ireland on Sept. 21, while Goffs Orby sold two seven-figure yearlings. Irish Yearling Sales Show Increases Cont.

The Sportsman's Sale saw a 5% increase in turnover to €4,834,500 compared to Part I of the 2016 Sportman's Sale. Overall on the year, demand for Irish horses is up 10% on all Irish throughbred sales when compared to 2016.

WINX GALLOPS AT FLEMINGTON PRIOR TO TURNBULL

Australian wunderkind **Winx (Aus)** (Street Cry {Ire}) galloped 1200m at Flemington Monday morning in advance of a start in the G1 Turnbull S. on Oct. 7. Winx, searching for her 21st consecutive victory, carted regular jockey Hugh Bowman over the course, and will face only 10 rivals at this time, with race nominations for the A\$500,000 2000-metre feature extended to Tuesday.

“She trailed approximately 200 metres behind stablemate **Japonisme (Aus)** (Choisir {Aus}) in her gallop to give her a lead and she worked over 1200m conservatively,” trainer Chris Waller told Racing.com. “She steadily built momentum into the work to ensure she knew what the long Flemington straight was all about and attacked the line well. Both Hugh [Bowman] and I couldn’t have been any happier with the work.

It was a good work out which she recovered quickly from, I am therefore happy with her fitness. She ran approximately 1.04 for the 1000 metres and the last 400m in :23 seconds.”

Regarding her further preparation for this Saturday’s Turnbull, Waller said, “She will have a very light gallop on Thursday morning prior to her media commitment at Flemington which we will be in touch with later in the week. It was great to see her settle in so quickly and not take any harm from the travel.”

EVEREST FIELD FINALIZED

Following the successful return of 2017 G1 Golden Slipper heroine **She Will Reign (Aus)** (Manhattan Rain {Aus}) in the G1 Moir S. at Moonee Valley on Sept. 29, the Gary Portelli-trained dark bay gained her pilot for the A\$10-million G1 The Everest at Randwick in Corey Brown, *racenet.com.au* reported. The 3-year-old will bear only 112 pounds in the race and face 11 others (*see table below*) barring scratches prior to Oct. 14.

Originally planned to be ridden by Ben Melham before that jockey announced he could not make the weight, She Will Reign was slated to have Kerrin McEvoy next, who rode her with so much success in the Moir. That hoop decided to honour a previous commitment to the Peter and Paul Snowden-trained **Redzel (Aus)** (Snitzel {Aus}), leaving She Will Reign once again without a jockey. Everest hopeful **In Her Time (Aus)** (Time Thief {Aus}), who had the services of Brown en route to a win in the 1200m G2 Premier S. on Sept. 30, was overlooked by slot holders and did not make the Everest field, leaving Brown free to ride She Will Reign.
