TAKING STOCK: ARROGATE DEATH A BLOW

The unexpected death of **Arrogate** (Unbridled's Song) on Tuesday was a devastating blow to his connections at Juddmonte and to the industry at large. He was the horse that Juddmonte had expected to base its boutique North American stallion operation around and he was the last great hope that his late sire would deliver a top-of-the-line stallion, something Unbridled's Song has been unable to do yet during an illustrious career as an excellent sire of racehorses, including 22 Grade I winners, and an outstanding sire of broodmares. Those expectations have now been all but dashed unless horses like Liam's Map and Cross Traffic build on their excellent starts at stud.

Only seven years old at his passing, Arrogate--a '**TDN Rising Star'--**was his sire's best runner and the second of four consecutive sophomore champion colts for Bob Baffert, after American Pharoah (Pioneerof the Nile) in 2015 and followed by West Coast (Flatter) in 2017 and Justify (Scat Daddy) in 2018. Unfortunately, his placement in this chronology between two Triple Crown winners tends to dim his reputation next to their historic accomplishments.

EMOTIONAL TIMES FOR AFRICAN-AMERICAN JOCKEY CARMOUCHE by Bill Finley

Kendrick Carmouche said he has never experienced racism, at the racetrack or elsewhere. But that doesn't mean that the events surrounding the death of George Floyd at the hands of Minneapolis police officers didn't hit home for the 36-year-old jockey. The New York-based Carmouche is one of only a handful of African-American jockeys riding in the U.S.

Earlier this week, Carmouche posted an emotional video on social media. With tears streaming down his cheeks, he spoke of the heartache he had been experiencing since the Floyd killing.

"It is very sad to see what is going on in the world," Carmouche said in the video. "I have a white wife and two kids and it's sad to see that it just never ends. It just never ends."

Carmouche said he had several restless nights after Floyd's death and wasn't able to get to sleep until he let his emotions run free on the video. **Cont. p6**



He wasn't a Classics contender and he only came into his own as a top 3-year-old in late August, when he won the GI Travers by 13 1/2 lengths in a track-record of 1:59.36 in his stakes debut. He was 11-1 that day and beat 5-1 stablemate American Freedom in the race with future Horse of the Year Gun Runner in third. His demolition job in one of the most prestigious races in the country made him the immediate leader of the class, and he went on to prove that the Travers wasn't a fluke.

In hindsight, Arrogate's Travers is even better than it appeared at the time. Future Grade I winners Gift Box and Connect were fourth and sixth, with GI Belmont S. winner Creator seventh and GI Preakness winner Exaggerator, the favorite, 11th.

The Travers began a remarkable win streak for Arrogate in four highly sought-after Grade I dirt races. They fell between his late 3-year-old and early 4-year-old seasons, and they helped to make him the richest North American-trained Thoroughbred of all time. Those wins also put his name among some of racing's best, albeit briefly.

Arrogate next appeared in the GI Breeders' Cup Classic, where he was the second choice to favored 5-year-old California Chrome, the 2014 GI Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner and Horse of the Year who'd made a remarkable comeback after a mismanaged career at four. It was a tall task to ask Arrogate to take on the best older horse in training at weight for age in only his second stakes start. Historically, iconic older horses have



usually bested the best of the sophomores, like Seattle Slew did with Affirmed and Affirmed with Spectacular Bid, in fall races. More recently, American Pharoah defeated older horses in the Gl Breeders' Cup Classic, but he didn't have a horse of magnitude to deal with. Justify never raced against older, Rachel Alexandra never met Zenyatta as a 3-year-old and Curlin's main competition were his crop-mates Hard Spun and Street Sense.

In California Chrome, Arrogate had a serious adversary at the top of his game, and the Breeders' Cup Classic lived up to the billing. Chrome, physically mature and a picture at five, looked a confident winner in deep stretch, but Arrogate's inexorable run inside the last furlong saw him win by a half-length in 2:00.11, with almost 11 lengths back to Keen Ice in third. It was another tour-de-force performance for the colt, perhaps even more impressive than his Travers win. Keen Ice, remember, had upset American Pharoah the year before in the Travers at the same distance, and the first three home were immediately followed by Grade I winners Hoppertunity, Melatonin, Frosted, and Effinex. By all measures, this race stacked up as an indicator of class. Because it was only Arrogate's second stakes and second Grade I win of the year, California Chrome was given the Horse of the Year title, but it seemed a foregone conclusion that Arrogate would get his award in 2017.

You know the story from here. Arrogate began the new year with an impressive victory in the GI Pegasus World Cup Invitational S., which he won by almost five lengths in the excellent time of 1:46.83. The race was somewhat anti-climactic as California Chrome got hurt in the running and the rematch between the two never materialized.

However, Arrogate's next race defined him as exemplary and brought out the accolades from everyone, including his trainer. His reputation was at its apex. Why? Because he broke badly in the Group 1 Dubai World Cup, got banged around, and trailed

the field in last place early, but somehow he won by 2 1/4 lengths from Gun Runner. "That's the greatest horse I've ever seen run," Baffert blurted in the heat of elation, and if whether he'd be held to that view now is debatable, at that time many views of the horse were in the same zip code as Baffert's.

Post Dubai...

Those four consecutive Grade I wins strung together by Arrogate were as great as or better than any in recent memory, and they should be remembered as such. All told, Arrogate, who was bred in Kentucky by Clearsky Farms and purchased by Juddmonte for \$560,000 at Keeneland September, won seven of 11 starts and earned \$17,422,600.

After Dubai, Arrogate was clearly not the same horse, losing three consecutive races, including the Breeders' Cup Classic to Gun Runner, who ended up with Horse of the Year honors in 2017. Those who'd doled out the lofty platitudes when the big gray was winning went silent after Arrogate ended his career on these losses. Even some leading breeders who couldn't wait to use him when he was winning were nitpicking his credentials when he entered stud. These folks were disappointed that Arrogate hadn't continued to be the superhero they'd originally imagined, and they took it out on him rather harshly, I thought.

I've addressed Arrogate's post-Dubai performances in print before. This is from North American Trainer magazine:

"And this brings me to where the real issue for Arrogate may lie: the Dubai World Cup. It's fashionable these days to make fun of the Dubai 'bounce,' and there's a vocal community, especially on social media, who'll torch you for saying it. But just because a number of horses haven't subsequently bounced from Dubai doesn't mean the bounce isn't applicable to specific instances, particularly for Baffert-trained winners of the DWC. And, I should add, for the other DWC winners from California.

"Six California-based runners have won the Dubai World Cup and Baffert has trained three of them, Silver Charm (1998), Captain Steve (2001), and Arrogate (2017). Post DWC, Silver Charm was second in the GII Stephen Foster at Churchill on June 13 and fifth in the then-GIII San Diego H. at Del Mar on July 25 before winning his next start. Captain Steve, likewise, was second in the Stephen Foster, on June 16, and fourth in the GI Hollywood Gold Cup July 1. Captain Steve was then third in the San Diego on July 29 and finished his career with a fourth in the GI Pacific Classic Aug. 19.

"The other three DWC winners from California were Pleasantly Perfect (2004), Well Armed (2009), and California Chrome (2016). Pleasantly Perfect was trained by Richard Mandella and made his first start after Dubai in the San Diego Aug. 1. He was second. He then won his next start, the G1 Pacific Classic on August 22. Well Armed, trained by Eoin Harty, was eighth in the G2 San Diego on August 8 and never raced again. Only California Chrome, trained by Art Sherman, won immediately after Dubai, in the G2 San Diego on July 23. He was also the only one of the six to acclimate in Dubai before the DWC, winning a handicap at Meydan a month before the main event. **Cont. p6**

"Winning the DWC takes a lot out of a horse, particularly since the North Americans are going off Lasix in the race. The ship to Dubai and back is twice as long for the Californians, too. Perhaps acclimating in Dubai is the answer. But for whatever the reasons, five of the six Californians haven't won immediately after winning the DWC, and Arrogate fits that pattern."

Unbridled's Song's Legacy...

On Sunday, two days before Arrogate was put down from a condition that hasn't been fully understood yet, the undefeated Deep Impact (Jpn) colt Contrail (Jpn) won the Group 1 Japanese Derby. Previously, he'd won the G1 Japanese 2000 Guineas, and he's slated to contest the G1 Japanese St. Leger, attempting to secure the Japanese Triple Crown like his sire did. Contrail is a son of the Unbridled's Song mare Rhodochrosite. Altogether, daughters of Unbridled's Song have produced 179 BTWs.

With at least 23 G1/GI winners to his credit so far as a broodmare sire, Unbridled's Song--who died in July of 2013, just months after Arrogate was born--has established a reputation as one of the best sires of mares of recent times. However, he's had a checkered career as a sire of sires, and he hasn't yet had a top-class son to carry his name forward. He's got some promising young sons still making their way, though, including the aforementioned Cross Traffic at Spendthrift and Liam's Map at Lane's End. Arrogate, however, will have only three crops with which to make a name.

Arrogate's first yearlings will sell this year, and it's important to remember that as his sire's best racehorse and as his last major son to go to stud, some of Arrogate's sons could still emerge over the next few years to carry his name forward. It happened to Dubai Millennium with Dubawi from only one crop, and Arrogate has three. I was a fan of Arrogate, as I am of this very American dirt line that traces to Mr. Prospector through Unbridled's Song, Unbridled, and Fappiano. I'm betting Arrogate will achieve posthumous success and gain a measure of revenge against some of those who doubted him, and that this branch of Unbridled's Song will carry forward.

"Finally, I got a good night's sleep," he said. "This was tearing me apart. It took me three days to get myself to say something. I just felt I should spread the love."

That is the message Carmouche wants to convey, that love is more powerful than hatred.

"I want to touch people and spread love," Carmouche said. "Happiness and love is so much better than negativity. I am the most positive person you will ever meet."

Carmouche returned to Belmont Wednesday after New York racing had been shut down for 80 days due to the coronavirus. Before the first race, the jockeys held a moment of silence in the paddock for those who have lost their lives to the virus and then they took a knee, their way of showing solidarity with the protestors. Carmouche said that John Velazquez came to him before the race and the two came up with the idea of the jockeys taking a collective knee.



"As a black guy, it was very nice to see all the Hispanic riders supporting us," he said. "That made me love them even more. They did that because it was the right thing to do and their hearts are in the right place."

Carmouche cont.

Carmouche, the son of a jockey, grew up in Louisiana. He was raised among whites and blacks and said he never gave much thought to the color of his skin.

"I never thought anybody treated me a certain type of way because I am black," he said.

He won his first race in 2000 at Evangeline Downs in Louisiana, but would make a name for himself at Parx, where he won seven riding titles. He came to New York in 2015. Wherever he went, there were not many black jockeys or trainers, but Carmouche says he does not think that is a sign that racism is prevalent on the racetrack.

"It doesn't bother me," he said of the lack of blacks in prominent positions in racing. "I came from Louisiana and I made it all the way to New York and I have traveled to a lot of places. I have never felt any racism."

But Carmouche says he understands what others have had to endure. He has watched the video of the last minutes of Floyd's life with horror. Admitting that perhaps he has been naive, he says he simply can't understand how a person's skin color could mean the difference between life and death. He wants everyone to have the same outlook on life that he has.

"I am a loving person. I don't hate anybody and I don't dislike anybody," he said.

He is behind those who have been protesting, but not those who have turned violent or have been looting stores. He sees the battles with police in cities all over the world and wants that to stop.

"There are good cops and there are bad cops," Carmouche said. "The four cops that did what they did to that guy, they don't represent all the good cops out there, and that pisses me off. The people that went out and protest, I take my hat off to them and I thank God for them. The people doing the vandalism and looting, whether they are black, white or purple, I don't care for them."

While understanding there are no easy fixes to the problems, Carmouche can't help but wonder why some people treat others with disrespect. He says that will never be how he goes about leading his life.

"What my mom and dad taught me is to respect everyone," Carmouche said. "I won't ever flip the switch off and be ignorant, I can't do that. Being that way has helped me get to where I am."

Trying to stay positive at a time when doing so is not easy, he hopes that Floyd's death will result in change.


"It's not going to get fixed in one day, but I think it is going to go in the right direction," he said. "What has happened has opened up so many people's eyes."

CHITU COLT CLAIMS QUARTER-MILE BULLET AT OBS THURSDAY by Jessica Martini

A colt by Chitu (hip 297) turned in the fastest quarter-mile breeze of Thursday's fifth under-tack preview for next week's Ocala Breeders' Sales Company's Spring Sale of 2-Year-Olds in Training when covering the distance in :20 3/5 for Kenny Davis and Sherry Mansfield's Hawk's Nest. The youngster, one of three juveniles consigned to the auction by the couple, was purchased by Davis and partner Gary Logsdon for \$48,000 at last year's OBS October sale.

"When I bought him as a yearling, I figured he could do it," Davis said from his Summerfield farm Thursday afternoon. "That's why I bought him," he added with a chuckle. **Cont. p8**

Catalogued in Book 1, the colt was originally scheduled to breeze Monday, but connections were forced to call an audible late last week.

"We took him up to the sale and the next morning we galloped him," Davis said. "The following morning, he didn't eat his breakfast and he had a temperature. I called Tod [Wojciechowski] at the sales company and explained the situation. I wanted to switch places with him and my Exaggerator colt. He wouldn't let me do that, but he told me he'd work me in. I called him the other day and he scheduled me to go today. We gave him two or three days and I guess he must have been perfect today because he laid it down."

While Davis hasn't been to the sales grounds since shipping his horses in, he gives credit to trainer Manny Ortega for getting the colt ready to breeze Thursday.

"He's been with me 12 or 14 years," Davis said of Ortega. "He gallops horses for Todd Pletcher at his training center. He's been there about 15 years. And this is what he does on the side. He works a regular job in the morning and then he helps me and pinhooks a horse or two on the side. He does excellent work and he's a very hard worker."

The 75-year-old Davis first took out a trainer's license in 1969.

"I was a little raggedy boy running around Keeneland grooming horses for \$35 a week," he recalled. "I worked for a guy named Frank Carter and I groomed a mare called Sal Allen. She belonged to Mary Anne Hockensmith. Mr. Carter told her, 'You won't let me run this mare for a claiming price, you might as well take her home. I can't make you any money on her.' So she took her home. A couple months later, I went down and talked to Ms. Hockensmith and told her I'd like a chance to train the mare. I trained for her for 27 years."

Of the exploits of his first trainee, Davis said, "Sal Allen was the first horse I ever won a race with. I was a rookie trainer. I ran her in a \$5,000 claimer at Churchill and she ran second. I think I ran her against the boys. The next time I ran her in an allowance race at River Downs. She won. And the next time I ran her, I ran her in a stakes at River Downs and she got beat a nose, ran third. That shows how much I knew about a condition book. However, Mary Anne Hockensmith has always been there when I needed her."

Logsdon, an attorney in Brownsville, Kentucky, is another longtime associate and friend.

"We've been partners for 50 years," Davis said. "He is a very good friend. I met him at River Downs. He wanted me to claim him a horse, he was just a young feller, and I claimed him his first horse. We did all right. And then we ended up in the pinhooking business. We used to buy near 10 a year. Now we just buy a couple. If we have six or eight mares and if a couple don't have foals, we'll buy a yearling or two to replace them with."

Davis had already purchased a yearling by Exaggerator (hip 950) and thought he was done shopping when he saw the colt by Chitu last October at OBS.

"I was with a guy named John Wall and he does my eyeballing," Davis explained. "I can't hardly walk, so he goes to the barns and looks at what I like and tells me what he thinks. I had bought the Exaggerator colt and I bought a filly and I thought that would do me. But then I saw that colt walk and he was coming to the sales ring. I saw him about barn eight or nine and told John to go look--he had the kind of walk I like and look I like. So I was talking to John and I'm looking the colt over and Joe Pickerell comes over and asks if I was going to try to buy him. I said, 'Yep.' And he said, 'Well I was thinking about trying to buy him.' When the bidding got started, I wanted to quit, but John and Joe pushed me to go ahead and buy him. They pushed me into buying a nice horse."

Davis and his wife Sherry Mansfield maintain a broodmare band of around 10 head on their Florida farm.

"Sherry plays a big role in our breeding--she's the pedigree person and I'm the eyeballs," Davis said. "I check out the conformation and she checks out the pedigrees. We've done it that way for years. When she got out of college and went to work for me, all she knew how to do was lead a horse. She's been with me 54 years. She is as sharp as they come."

Of his expectations for his bullet worker ahead of next week's sale, Davis said, "We are proud to have the colt and if we have a good sale, maybe we will make some money. And if we don't, we'll run him. That's the way we normally do it. We take them to the sales and if we get them sold, if we make some money, we sell them. And if we don't make any money, we bring them home to race them. We've done that for years."

Three juveniles shared Thursday's fastest furlong time of :9 4/5.

Grassroots Training and Sales sent out a filly by Street Boss (hip 730) to work in :9 4/5. The chestnut is out of the unraced Andariel (Ire) (Excelebration {Ire}), a half-sister to multiple group placed Bannock (Bertolini). Bred by Green Lantern Stables and PM Equine Investments, she was purchased by Grassroots for \$50,000 at last year's Fasig-Tipton July sale.

Hip 869, a filly by Not This Time, also worked the furlong in :9 4/5 Thursday. Out of stakes placed Chilling Effect (Gold Fever), the chestnut is a half-sister to multiple stakes winner Archidust (Verrazano). She is consigned by Harris Training Center. The filly was purchased by Meah/Lloyd Bloodstock on behalf of Voric Stables for \$60,000 at last year's Fasig-Tipton July Sale. Bred by Wolverton Mountain Farm, she sold for \$40,000 as a Keeneland November weanling.

Completing the trio of bullet furlong works Thursday, hip 840 turned in a :9 4/5 work for Kings Equine. The bay filly from the first crop of Grade I winner Frosted is out of multiple graded stakes winner Carolyn's Cat (Forestry) and is a half-sister to multiple graded stakes winner Mufajaah (Tapit). Bred by Bonne Chance Farm, she was purchased by Scott and Evan Dilworth for \$170,000 as a weanling at the 2018 Keeneland November sale.

The under-tack show continues through Saturday with sessions beginning daily at 7:30 a.m. The Spring sale will be held next Tuesday through Friday. Bidding begins each day at 10 a.m.

YOU CAN'T CHOOSE YOUR FAMILY, UNLESS YOU'RE HUNTER O'RILEY By Katie Ritz

Hunter O'Riley (Tiz Wonderful) last saw the starting gate just over a year ago. Some may remember him blowing up their ticket that day, as it was when he snuck up from the outside to win the GI United Nations S. at odds of 14-1, beating the likes of eventual GI Pegasus World Cup Turf S. winner Zulu Alpha (Street Cry {Ire}), as well as the near-millionaire graded stakes-winning Channel Cat (English Channel).

Co-owner Mike Ryan has had his share of pinnacle moments in racing as the bloodstock agent for multiple Breeders' Cup champions, most recently Structor (Palace Malice) and Bricks and Mortar (Giant's Causeway). But he said he remembers watching that race at Monmouth like it was yesterday.

"It was one of my greatest thrills in racing," he said. "We were on vacation at the beach, and I remember sitting in the living room. When Hunter started to make his move mid-way on the turn, we all jumped out of our chairs. I couldn't speak for two days." "Hunter" officially retired this year as a seven-year-old with 22 starts, two graded stakes wins, and over \$620,000 in earnings. He has remained a part of the Ryan family since, now under the care of Mike Ryan's daughters Allaire Ryan, the sales director at Lane's End Farm, and Sarah Sutherland, also a sales director at nearby Indian Creek Farm.

"My sister and I have grown up riding," Allaire said. "Over the years if Dad had a horse coming off the track, we would either help re-home it or keep it ourselves. I had always loved the way Hunter looked, a really cute bay with white socks and a white blaze. And I fell in love with his personality. He was the kind of horse that if you were having a bad day and you were at the track watching training, he would make your heart light up. He would always have his ears pricked and he had this big, energetic, uphill stride. He just loved to train."

The son of Tiz Wonderful is now slowly learning the ropes of becoming an eventing horse under the care of veterinarian and equestrian Marty Whitehouse.

"Marty and I grew up riding together," Allaire said. "Hunter is actually the third horse she has worked with of ours. She's taking it really slow with him but, she's excited because he's so athletic to sit on. For her to think as highly of him as she does right now is really great because she's brought a lot of horses along."

While Allaire has stepped away from the eventing world, she said the thought of showing him someday isn't far from her mind. "He's a horse I would love to show one day, but for now my sister and I are happy being his fangirls. He's so straightforward and would be happy to try anything. He's one of those horses that will be in our family for life."

Although he's now inseparable from the Ryans, Mike originally purchased this beloved gelding as a pinhooking prospect.

Hunter O'Riley was purchased as a yearling by Ryan's pinhooking partnership group for \$120,000. He was sent to the Fasig-Tipton Midlantic 2-Year-Old Sale, but a below-average breeze time kept buyers away. Ryan and Sean Shay bought out the rest of the partnership group for \$50,000. **Cont. p10**

"He had no early speed," Ryan said. "But when he trained, the farther he went, the better. There was no bottom in him. You would gallop him and think you'd done enough but he would have gone another mile if you asked him. He just wasn't fast enough for the 2-year-old sales."

From the start, Ryan said the horse loved his job.

"He was always very healthy, never sick a day in his life and just one of those horses that felt good every day," Ryan said. "He always showed up in training. As soon as you put a saddle on him, it was always as if he had a smile on his face."

Trained as a 2-year-old under Joe Sharp, the flashy bay broke his maiden in November of 2015 at Churchill Downs.

"I remember his dam [Oblige (Bernardini)] was in the Keeneland November Sale that year," Ryan recalled. "Jody Huckabay [Elm Tree Farm] bought her either an hour before or an hour after the race, I can't remember. But she was in foal to Will Take Charge, and they sold the resulting offspring for \$975,000."

As a three-year-old, Hunter O'Riley was transferred to the barn of New York-based trainer Jimmy Toner.

"I wanted to leave him in New York because I knew he needed those extended races," Ryan said.

While the sophomore's connections were certain of his ability, it took time for his true talent to be seen on race day.

"He was a bit pace dependent," Ryan said. "It was hard to get through to the riders that he was a bit like a bicycle. You had to keep peddling him. When he broke from the gate he would drop the bridle and canter around in a merry fashion. The problem was that most people would let him get too far back."

Their persistence was rewarded in the summer of Hunter O'Riley's 4-year-old season when he won the GII Bowling Green S. at Saratoga under Florent Geroux. Ryan said, "He got a very good ride that day. There was enough pace that he was able to run them down."

After an unplaced start in the GII Dixiana Elkhorn S. at Keeneland the next spring, the 5-year-old tore his 'XYZ' ligament and was given the remainder of the year off. He was sent to Niall Brennan Stables in Ocala.

"Hunter was like a family pet down there because he would usually winter there every year," Ryan said. "They all loved him."

Back in training as a 6-year-old, Hunter O'Riley ran unplaced in three graded stakes before he captured the Grade I victory in the United Nations S.

"We told Paco [Lopez] that you can't let him get too far out of it," Ryan said. "When you get him out of the gate, put him in the race and make him stay in the bridle."

With Grade I status, the gelding made the trip back to Saratoga in hopes of a repeat victory in the Bowling Green S. However, a sudden injury kept him from making it to the starting gate.

"The Sunday before the race, they went into his stall and he was dead lame," Ryan said. "He wouldn't put his right front on the ground. It was very weird; I'd never seen anything like it. There was no cut, no puncture wound, no laceration. His X-ray and ultrasound were clean."

Anti-inflammatory drugs brought forth no response, and the next day Ryan said he was no better. It was discovered that his white blood cell count was up, so he was sent to Rood and Riddle Equine Hospital in Saratoga, where they found an infection in the tendon sheath.

"He was at the clinic for almost three weeks," Ryan recalled. "They flushed the sheath multiple times a day. I thought he was going to die, but Dr. Kathryn Dern and her staff did an unbelievable job. He lost a lot of weight, but he survived."

Defying the odds, Hunter O'Riley would go on to train again and even breeze back at Niall Brennan's farm last November.

"He was doing great and was back in training when Niall noticed a little filling in that ankle joint," Ryan said. "We could have given him another six or eight months off and tried to bring him back, but I said he was too nice of a horse. He had just turned seven, so we decided to retire him."

That was when Allaire received the long-awaited call saying Hunter was ready for her. "The horse had stayed so dang sound that I had gotten tired of waiting and ended up getting another horse," Allaire said with a laugh. "I told Dad I can't have two horses at once, but I said let's get him to Lexington and bring him home."

While the timing may not have been perfect, there was no question that the horse would stay with the family.

"Hunter made the decision pretty easy," Allaire said. "He's given us so much over the years and I would say that he's Dad's favorite horse he's ever owned."

Mike Ryan hesitated when asked if this was true, citing multiple other top-level horses that have worn his silks over the years, but in the end he agreed with his daughter.

"From a personality standpoint, I would say he's my favorite," he conceded. "There's something about this fellow and his personality. He's like a kid that is always happy no matter what you ask of him. When you saw him with his head hanging out of the stall with his floppy ears, he just made you smile."

Ryan continued, "He really would have been good as a 7-yearold because we had finally learned how to ride him. He was a trier and he was as good on dirt as he was on turf. If the turf races ever came off, we were never afraid to run because he would give you just as much effort on dirt."

Hunter O'Riley has had no issues with his past injury since starting his new career, and he has recently been hard at work maneuvering through his first cross-rail courses.

"He's not a horse that wants to be retired out in the field," Allaire said. "The plan is for him to go to some schooling shows with Marty this summer and see how he takes those. If he is the upper-level horse that we think he is, we'll keep showing. He's not afraid of anything, but not in a reckless way, more of a confident, eager way. He just wants to make you happy."

Her dad added, "He'll be a fun horse for Marty and the girls. He would jump the Eiffel Tower if you asked him. He has no fear and he's just a cool character."

SHUG MCGAUGHEY TALKS CODE OF HONOR, BELMONT REOPENING, FBI INDICTMENTS ON TDN WRITERS' ROOM

There was no better place to be in American horse racing than Belmont Park Wednesday morning as the track prepared to reopen New York racing later in the day after months of being shuttered by the coronavirus pandemic. That's where Hall of Fame trainer Shug McGaughey called in from as the Green Group Guest of the Week on this week's *TDN* Writers' Room podcast presented by Keeneland. In a wide-ranging discussion, McGaughey talked about the return of stable star Code of Honor (Noble Mission {GB}), racing finally resuming at his Big Sandy home base, his reaction to the FBI's indictments of Jason Servis and Jorge Navarro and more.

"He had a little bit longer vacation than I expected," McGaughey said of Code of Honor, last year's GI Runhappy Travers S. winner and runner-up for champion 3-year-old male who is slated to make his return in Saturday's GIII Westchester S. at Belmont. "But I don't think that's hurt anything. We gave him off until the first of February and put him back in training, and he's an athletic type of horse, so it doesn't take a whole lot to get him ready, and I think he's ready. He had a good winter at Payson Park and his two works here at Belmont have been just as good as I can expect. We're looking forward to running him on Saturday."

Asked about goals for Code of Honor's 4-year-old season beyond Saturday, McGaughey said, "The Metropolitan could be on the map, the Whitney can really be on the map, the Woodward or Jockey Club Gold Cup. Who knows how they're going to have those scheduled. We would definitely like to get to the Breeders' Cup, especially with it being at Keeneland, which has a special meaning for me and Mr. [Will] Farish. But we'll still let him tell us like we did last year."

As the conversation turned to the much-anticipated start of the Belmont spring/summer meet, McGaughey commented, "I'm a Belmont guy. I'd rather train here than anywhere. I love the races here. I think for New York and for us, as racing people and in the sports world, getting Belmont going is going to be a big addition. This is the first big sporting event that's opened up here. I'm excited about it. I was getting a little flustered that we weren't getting open, but we're here now, all systems go."

Known as one of the cleanest big-name trainers in racing, McGaughey was asked for his opinion on the bombshell indictments from March and what it's like, as a person who tries to do things the right way, to lose races to people he knows are cheating. The pill was especially bitter to swallow for McGaughey last year when Code of Honor finished second in the Eclipse voting behind Servis-trained Maximum Security (New Year's Day).

"Navarro never was a big problem for me, because I didn't run against him much, but Servis was," he said. "I had a hard time with a horse that breaks his maiden for \$16,000, winning the Kentucky Derby and Florida Derby and all that it did. I read every sentence of those indictments and it's pretty disappointing. It's also disappointing when I look at what the [indicted] veterinarians are doing, when most of the time, they've gotten an education and when they graduate they're sworn to uphold their doctors' commitment, and they're doing things that I think they know better that they shouldn't be doing. I'm hoping that, in the long run, we can get a hold on this thing, and that everybody feels like when they go over there, they've got an equal chance to everybody else."

Elsewhere on the podcast, in the West Point Thoroughbreds news segment, the writers remembered the great Arrogate after Tuesday's news of his tragic death, and conducted a fantasy draft of 3-year-olds for a new contest that will run through the end of the Triple Crown. KING GUILLERMO, PNEUMATIC, SWISS SKYDIVER TOP LATE NOMINEES TO TC

King Guillermo (Uncle Mo), '**TDN Rising Star' Pneumatic** (Uncle Mo) and two-time graded-stakes winning filly **Swiss Skydiver** (Daredevil) are the marquee names among 22 3-yearolds that have been made eligible for the 2020 Triple Crown series at the late closing stage.

The late additions to the three-race series, which this year begins with the GI Belmont S. June 20, take the total number of Triple Crown nominees to 369, pending late mail.

Victoria's Ranch's King Guillermo entered the 3-year-old discussion with his 49-1 upset of Sole Volante (Karakontie {Jpn}) in the Mar. 7 GII Tampa Bay Derby and proved that effort was no one-off with a hard-trying, runner-up effort behind the recently retired Nadal (Blame) in the GI Arkansas Derby May 2.

Pneumatic earned 'Rising Star' status with a fast-finishing allowance victory when making his two-turn debut in Hot Springs Apr. 11 and gave an excellent account of himself when a pace-pressing third to Maxfield (Street Sense) in the GIII Matt Winn S. beneath the Twin Spires May 23.

Swiss Skydiver caused a minor upset in the GII Gulfstream Park Oaks and followed up with a defeat of Venetian Harbor (Munnings) in the GIII Fantasy S. at Oaklawn May 1. Mooted as a possibility for the G1 English 1000 Guineas, she has since been rerouted and goes in this weekend's GII Santa Anita Oaks.

An interesting potential new shooter is **Cezanne** (Curlin), who fetched \$3.65 million to top last year's Fasig-Tipton Gulfstream sale and who is down to debut from the rail in a 6 1/2-furlong maiden as the 4-5 favorite in Saturday's sixth race at Santa Anita. Late entries to the Triple Crown were due to close in late March at a fee of \$6,000, but was postponed due to the coronavirus outbreak. The late period closed Wednesday, June 3, with the fee slashed to \$3,000.

RACING ECONOMIC INDICATORS DOWN IN MAY FROM 2019

The Thoroughbred Racing Economic indicators for the month of May released by Equibase Thursday reflected the effects of the coronavirus pandemic, which halted racing in March. Including worldwide commingled wagering on U.S. races, wagering was down 30.16% (\$908,504,654) from May of 2019 (1,300,923,869). Other figures that showed marked decreases in 2020:

- U.S. Purses \$31,971.002 (-72.39%)
- U.S. Race days 123 (-450)
- U.S. Races 1,059 (-70.99%)
- U.S. Starts 9,145 (-64.77%)

Figures which showed increases over the corresponding period in 2019 included: Average Field Size, increasing 21.44% from 7.11 in 2019 to 8.64 this year. Also showing gains was Average Wagering Per Race Day, up \$155.50% to \$7,386,217 from \$2,890,942 and Average Purses per Race Day was up negligibly to \$259,927 from \$257,282 in 2019.

Year-to-date figures in 2019 and 2020 showed similar trends. Wagering on U.S. races decreased 13.34% to \$4,057,074,219, while U.S. purses dropped by 40.60% to \$254,693,053 in 2020. Race days fell from 1,605 to 1,001 and races also showed a significant drop from 13,552 to 8,421. Average wagering per day increased by 38.94% to \$4,053,021, while average purses decreased by 4.77% to \$254,439.

DR. TONY RYAN BOOK AWARD SEMI-FINALISTS ANNOUNCED

A total of six semi-finalists, from 15 submissions, for the 2020 Dr. Tony Ryan Book Award have been selected by a panel of racing industry and literary judges.

The semi-finalists are:

- Better Lucky Than Good: Tall Tales and Straight Talk from the Backside of the Track, by Louisville Story Program
- Justify: 111 Days to Triple Crown Glory, by Lenny Shulman
- The Key to the Quarter Pole, by Robin Traywick Williams
- Spectacular Bid: The Last Superhorse of the Twentieth Century, by Peter Lee
- The Travers: 150 Years of Saratoga's Greatest Race, by Brien Bouyea and Michael Veitch
- The Triumph of Henry Cecil, by Tony Rushmer

"This year's 15 titles are of consistently high quality, which is proven by the excellent books that just missed the semi-finalists cut," said lead judge Kay Coyte, adding that judges emphasized "clarity and elegance of writing, a book's ability to entertain, and an author's commitment to his or her subject."

Customarily announced in April, the award timeline was altered this year due to COVID-19. The three finalists will be revealed this summer, with plans to honor the winner yet to be determined.

The brainchild of the late Dr. Tony Ryan, the award combined the horseman's passions--racing and literature. The competition was established in 2006 to honor the best of long-form writing in racing, with a \$10,000 prize to the winner.

Texas Champions Day, originally scheduled to be contested at Sam Houston Race Park in March, but cancelled due to a blown transformer, will be hosted by Lone Star June 14. Texas Champions Day includes the Bara Lass S., Groovy S., Richard King Turf S., San Jacinto S., Spirit of Texas S., Star of Texas S. and Yellow Rose S. Three additional stakes--the Lone Star Park Turf S., Grand Prairie S. and Lone Star Mile--are scheduled for June 28. The Stars of Texas Preview July 5 features the Wayne Hanks Memorial, Lanes End Danny Shifflett Scholarship S. and the divisional Texas Stallion S., made up of a filly division and colt & gelding division.

The final four stakes of the season will be contested July 26 as part of Stars of Texas Day. They are the Valor Farm S., Highlander Training Center Assault S. and Texas Thoroughbred Futurities, the filly division and the colt and gelding division. Each will run for an estimated purse of \$100,000.

"We have worked closely with the Texas Horsemen's Partnership and the Texas Thoroughbred Association to put together a schedule that benefits everyone, especially our horsemen," said Lone Star Park's Vice-President of Operations, Kent Slabotsky.

JUVENILE BONUSES AVAILABLE AT DEL MAR SUMMER MEET

Two-year-old runners will have additional incentives to shoot for this summer at Del Mar as the track will have bonus programs centering on freshman stallion Runhappy, as well as a unique package for all juveniles in its maiden special weight division.

The Runhappy arrangement is the culmination of a two-year sponsorship Del Mar established last year with owner and breeder Jim McIngvale.

If able to win one of Del Mar's \$50,000 maiden special weight races, offspring by Runhappy will receive an additional \$100,000 bonus.

"I think you'll see his babies running off the charts at Del Mar and I'm looking forward to rewarding those people who cash in on him early," McIngvale said.

The shore track's "Juvenile" bonus is aimed at encouraging Southern California's smaller outfits--trainers with 60 or fewer horses in their care--to take shots in Del Mar's maiden special weight races.

The bonus adds 25% on top of all winning purses, meaning all placings from first through fifth, in maiden special dirt races.

Two-year-olds who have raced elsewhere and ship in to Del Mar to run get the added benefit of being eligible for the track's "Ship & Win" monies, meaning a \$2,000 check just for starting, then a 20% bonus on all purse monies earned for finishing anywhere from first to fifth.

"We're hoping to get owners and trainers with 2-year-olds from out-of-state interested when they see the monetary incentives," said Del Mar's executive vice president for racing Tom Robbins. "At the same time, we're encouraging our local owners and trainers to go to places like Kentucky and Florida and bring back 2-year-olds that could be double earners under our arrangement."

WEATHERING THE STORM

While many questions regarding the Coronavirus pandemic remain unanswered, and with a stock market experiencing extreme volatility, there is continued uncertainty as to what could happen in our industry over the next few years. But many people in the industry have been through such ambiguity before. We sought the advice of industry leaders who successfully made their way through the Great Recession, and we asked what they learned from it and how they will use their experiences to advance through the coming years.

TOMMY EASTHAM, Legacy Bloodstock

The effects of 2008 were of course devastating to the value of our horses. But with tough times, there are lessons to be learned and things you can take away with you.

In 2008 we took a financial setback. As a horseman and based on how we operate our business, we went forward with a very conservative business plan. We decided to be very careful with growth, expansion, and managing expenses.

One of the best pieces of advice I ever received came from Dr. Jim Morehead of Equine Medical Associates. Back in 2008, I remember sitting at his truck one day and he saw how our business was starting to gain traction and have success and he said, "Low overhead puts kids through school." So we took that to heart and try to live by it still today. There has been opportunity for us that would have added growth and risk to our business and we have declined to go through with them because we want to stay with that principal and not overcommit ourselves financially on things that aren't necessary. **Cont. p16** As we go through this economic event now, we are very grateful for the position we are in today and not completely worried about every bill that comes in the mailbox.

Looking forward, we're reminding our clients that there is still a point of quality that you need to have in order to compete in this market, no matter how unprecedented it may be. There is a fine balance when it comes to horse inventory. We have been trying to advise our clients to ride that edge, meaning still breeding to the nicer horses but also being conservative in their investments.

Taking advice from Cot Campbell, if an investment does not go your way and it is a financial fatality for you, don't do it. Cot had a book called *Lightning in a Jar*, and at one point he talked about bringing investors and partners into his business. He told them that if it was an investment that they couldn't afford to do, don't do it. So that's what we're doing right now.

In the last few years, we felt like the market has had a bubble, that maybe things were going a little too well at sales. So we've been advising our clients on keeping expenses low and waiting for safe opportunities.

Looking towards this sales season, we are putting an emphasis on female families. During all of the market corrections that I've been through, the importance of the stallions and demand for freshman sires is still without a doubt part of the business plan you need to implement. Always give the buyers what they want. But I've noticed that during the corrections, there's an emphasis on female families. The buying population's risk tolerance drops. So as we look at our client portfolios, we are putting a focus on female family. The old saying was that if a mare produced two foals that were unprofitable, she might not be the best for your program. Now, we all know she could be a stakes winner five years from now. But we advise to be quick to walk away from investments that aren't working out. Put your money where you have the best chance to be successful.

FAIR HILL POSTPONES MARYLAND 5 STAR

The Fair Hill Organizing Committee (FHOC), an affiliate of the Sport and Entertainment Corporation of Maryland (The Sport Corp.), has postponed the inaugural Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill until Oct. 14-17, 2021. Originally scheduled for this October, the international three-day eventing competition has been postponed due to health concerns over the coronavirus pandemic. The FHOC made the decision in conjunction with the Maryland 5 Star at Fair Hill planning committee, its competition management partner, Fair Hill International (FHI), and additional constituents including the State of Maryland and Cecil County.

"It was a very difficult decision and we are very disappointed for the competitors, fans and Eventing community," said Jeff Newman, President of the Fair Hill Organizing Committee. "From the start of the pandemic until now, like many sports and entertainment properties, we've fully vetted out different scenarios ranging from a scaled back event with some fans, a competition-only event without spectators, or postponing the event to 2021. Ultimately, we felt that the uncertainties and risks that will remain throughout the year are too great to overcome. As a result, with the support of our sponsors and key constituents, postponing the inaugural event to 2021 best enables us to achieve our original goals and set the foundation for a tradition that will continue for many years."

Two-time Classic-winning trainer Michael Matz will judge the 86th annual Maryland Horse Breeders Association Yearling Show. Open to all yearlings eligible for Maryland-bred registration, the show has been rescheduled for 2020 and will be held Sunday, July 19 at the Maryland State Fairgounds' Horse Show Ring in Timonium. Entries are due by June 20.

Based at Fair Hill Training Center, Matz is responsible for undefeated 2006 GI Kentucky Derby winner Barbaro and GI Belmont S. hero Union Rags. Matz also trained multiple Grade I-winning turf runner Kicken Kris, GI Breeders' Cup Distaff heroine Round Pond and Grade I-sprinter Visionaire.

Prior to launching his racing career, Matz won the U.S. National Show Jumping Championship six times and competed in three World Championships, winning a team gold medal in 1986. Matz competed in the Olympics on three occasions, earning a team silver at the 1996 games in Atlanta.

The list of judges in the MHBA Yearling Show's history consists of 26 Hall of Famers, and Triple Crown-winning trainers, including James "Sunny Jim" Fitzsimmons, Max Hirsch, Lucien Laurin and Billy Turner. Among Maryland-bred yearlings to have competed in the show are 2019 GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile Fillies Turf winner Sharing, Eclipse Award-winning Hall of Famer Safely Kept, Eclipse Award-winning juveniles Smart Angle and Declan's Moon, and millionaires Cathryn Sophia, Urbane and Cherokee's Boy.

JACK MILTON FILLY OFF LAST, CHECKED, GREEN, STILL ROMPS TO BECOME 'TDN RISING STAR' AT CHURCHILL



Tobys Heart | Coady

Tobys Heart (Jack Milton), broke last, made a sustained move from the rear of the field, steadied on the turn and ran greenly in the stretch, yet still romped by a distance to become the latest '**TDN Rising Star**' Thursday at Churchill.

Showing an upbeat worktab for trainer Brian Lynch highlighted by a half-mile breeze over the local main track in :47 1/5 (5/84) May 23, the \$45,000 OBS March buy was supported at the windows throughout and ended up as a close 17-5 third choice behind firsters from the Mark Casse and Wesley Ward barns. Off at the tail of the nine-horse group, the dark bay quickly made up ground and had moved up into fifth with barely a furlong run.

Continuing to advance powerfully around the turn, she almost ran up on the heels of pacesetting favorite Road to Romance (Quality Road) a few strides before turning for home, but managed to avoid getting stopped and took charge in the two path at the top of the lane. Quickly moving clear under confident handling from Adam Beschizza, she slammed the door before the furlong grounds and cruised home 6 3/4 lengths to the good jumping back to her left lead. Longshot Ever Clever Lady (Vancouver {Aus}) won a photo with Little Jewel (Liam's Map) for the place, while Road to Romance faded to be fourth.

Tobys Heart is the first 'Rising Star' for Crestwood Farm's second-crop stallion Jack Milton, a graded stakes winner at three, four and five years old for Todd Pletcher who reached his career zenith with a score in the GI Maker's 46 Mile S. in 2015. She is the fourth foal to race out of stakes winner Pick of the

Pack (Lil's Lad), a half-sister to GSW turf sprinter Great Attack (Greatness) out of GSW juvenile Cat Attack (Storm Cat). She produced a Commissioner colt last season and a filly by the same sire Apr. 15.

Roden May Have Found Another Star for Hamilton

Bloodstock agent Alistair Roden has already found Canadian owner Terry Hamilton a pair of future graded stakes winners at bargain prices and he may have hit the trifecta following the smashing debut victory by **Tobys Heart** (Jack Milton) Thursday at Churchill Downs. Roden signed the ticket on future Grade I winner Heart to Heart (English Channel) for \$25,348 at the 2012 Canadian Yearling Sale and Spooky Channel (English Channel), winner of the GIII W.L. McKnight S. in January, was a \$10,000 purchase at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton October sale. The agent purchased Tobys Heart for \$45,000 at this year's OBS March sale.

"Terry is not a big spender, but I've been very lucky with him with the horses I've bought," Roden said.

Roden purchased a colt by Jack Milton on behalf of Hamilton for \$30,000 at last year's OBS June sale. Now named Jacks Outlaw, the colt is two-for-two over the grass at Turf Paradise. That colt's success led him back to the sire in March.

"We bought a Jack Milton last June that has done really well," Roden said. *Cont. p2* "Then I came across this filly, but I didn't think we'd get her for \$45,000. I thought she was going to bring more. The sire is a little under the radar, I think, but I kind of like buying those kind of horses."

"I'm not a sire snob," he added with a chuckle.

Of the filly's appeal in Ocala, Roden said, "I really liked the filly. The breeze was nice. She did switch her leads in the breeze going the eighth of a mile, but she had a good stride to her. She was a big, good-looking filly. She wasn't a stunning-looking filly, but there was nothing wrong with her. She was a good walker and correct. A nice filly."

Roden had heard plenty of positive news about the filly prior to Thursday's debut at Churchill, but the smashing victory still surprised him.

"I think she worked twice at Churchill," Roden said. "I didn't actually get to see her work, but the reports from Terry were very good on her. We thought she would run well, but my heavens, that gave me goose bumps."

He continued, "When she got left at the gate, I'm thinking well, she is going to be green here and she's got to go through horses, if she finishes third, that will be nice. At the threeeighths pole that's kind of what I was thinking. We'd be happy if she finished third. She was obviously very good. She gave me goose bumps, which they don't often do."

Heart to Heart won the 2018 GI Gulfstream Park Turf S. and GI Maker's Mark Mile S., Spooky Channel's graded win also came over the turf and now Tobys Heart opened her career with a win on the lawn.

"It's not one of the criteria that we have to have grass horses," Roden said. "But Terry doesn't mind running on the grass. He's not going to give \$300,000 or \$400,000 for a horse--I bought him Heart to Heart for \$25,000. We've done awful well and he quite enjoys running on the grass." Hamilton has about eight horses in training. Asked if he'd be shopping for the Alberta native next week in Ocala, Roden said with a laugh, "I haven't run across any Jack Miltons down there yet. But maybe."

SECOND CHANCES: NAUTILUS

In this continuing series, TDN's Senior Editor Steve Sherack catches up with the connections of promising maidens to keep on your radar.

Nautilus (c, 2, by Cairo Prince--Pantanal, by Congrats) has every right to move forward with a race under his belt following a better-than-it-looked fourth on debut behind a blowout '**TDN Rising Star**' performance from Cazadero (Street Sense) at Churchill Downs May 29.

Drawn on the fence in that five-furlong affair, the \$130,000 OBS March breezer (:10) was quickly out-sprinted while under a ride and raced in tight quarters heading into the far turn. With his work cut out for him as they turned for home, he ran on nicely with late interest once steered into the clear on the outside by John Velazquez to finish a length behind the thirdplace finisher.

Cazadero, a dominating 8 3/4-length winner, earned a very strong 81 Beyer Speed Figure. Nautilus received a 50.

Trained by Brad Cox, Nautilus is campaigned in partnership by Kent Spellman and Sol Kumin's Madaket Stables, LLC.

"We knew he wanted longer, but thought he would get a lot of out of the race," Kumin said. "It was a tough post for a 2-yearold with not a lot of speed and I thought he got a good education. We'll run him back June 27 at Churchill Downs going longer and he should be tough. Brad Cox likes him." The gray is named after The Nautilus, a restaurant located in Nantucket, Massachusetts. Kumin is also an investor in the eatery.

"The owners of the restaurant all watched the race and are excited about the horse," Kumin added.

Nautilus, bred in Kentucky by Haymarket Farm LLC, RNA'd for \$50,000 as a KEENOV weanling. He brought \$75,000 from King's Equine as a KEESEP yearling and \$130,000 from BSW Bloodstock at OBSMAR.

Nautilus is a half-brother to last year's GI Woody Stephens S. third-place finisher Borracho (Uncle Mo) and the promising \$425,000 OBSMAR graduate and unlucky 3-year-old maiden of two starts Union Maiden (Union Rags), who was featured in this same column Feb. 27.

Previous standouts featured in 'Second Chances' include: MGISW and 'TDN Rising Star' Paradise Woods (Union Rags), GSW Backyard Heaven (Tizway), MSW and 'TDN Rising Star' Gidu (Ire) (Frankel {GB}), the highly regarded GII San Felipe S. runner-up Honor A. P. (Honor Code) and GII Fasig-Tipton Fountain of Youth S. runner-up Candy Tycoon (Twirling Candy).

Paret, a former sprinter in his native Australia, produced a career high when stretched to 12 furlongs in his seasonal finale here last October, and proved once and for all that marathons are his best game with a huge upset of the 1 3/8-mile Tiller S. Thursday at Belmont.

A four-time winner in 16 Oz starts, the gelding was eighth making his North American bow in the GII Dixie S. last May at Pimlico before finishing third in the Glasgow S. July 13 at Delaware, second in the Neshaminy S. Sept. 2 at Parx and third in the 5 1/2-furlong Rainbow Heir S. Sept. 28 at Monmouth. Moving all the way to 1 1/2 miles in the Point of Entry S. here 15 days later, he set a strong pace for the distance before just wilting late to be second.

Dismissed in the wagering at nearly twice his 20-1 morningline quote in this spot, the dark bay won an early tussle to show the way through fractions of :23.90, :49.67 and 1:14.68. Still confidently handled as Dot Matrix started to bear down three furlongs out, he cut the corner into the lane and dug in resolutely through the final sixteenth to just repel that challenger. Narrow favorite Sadler's Joy ran on late to win a photo for third.

"We've been working with this horse, trying to just get him to chill out and turn off and it obviously worked. What a nice horse; he gets all the credit," said winning trainer Chuck Lawrence. "This horse gets turned out at five every morning in his own paddock. Then we train him a few days a week out back on the hills. He trains primarily on Michael Dickinson's Tapeta [track] and he just thrives on it. We turn him out rain or shine every day and he just loves it. He was really nervous the first time I ran him in the Dixie. I didn't have him very long; we kind of ran him off the plane. He has a lot of class and a lot of talent." On getting a stakes win after the difficulties of the past few months, Lawrence added, "We just wanted to get back racing. It has been a tough go for everyone in the country, just trying to make payroll and keep your help on. [Owner] Matt [Schera] was loyal enough to leave horses with me. I had a few leave and it really hurts trying to keep your help on. This is a big relief." **Click for the Equibase.com chart or VIDEO, sponsored by Fasig-Tipton.**

The joint Goffs UK and Arqana Breeze-Up Sale will be held at Doncaster, with the breeze set for June 28 at Doncaster Racecourse and the sale at the Doncaster Sales Complex on July 1. Tattersalls's joint Craven and Ascot Breeze-Up Sale has been moved to June 25.

Provisional plans had been made to hold the Goffs UK and Arqana Breeze-Up Sales in Ireland if COVID-19 restrictions necessitated. Restrictions will be placed on the number of people attending the sale, with all buyers required to register their wish to attend with Goffs UK. Social distancing protocols in line with UK government directives will be in place at the sale, and protocols in line with British Horseracing Authority directives will apply at the breeze. **Cont. p2**

JUVENILES PUT ON A SHOW AT HQ

Newmarket staged its belated season-opening card on the Rowley Mile on Thursday, and with six of the 10 races on offer being for 2-year-olds, it is likely some strong Royal Ascot clues were laid out.

Cheveley Park Stud's homebred filly Sacred (GB) (Exceed and Excel {Aus}) got the day off to a flyer with a dominant 1 3/4length score for James Doyle and William Haggas that vaulted her into favouritism for the G2 Queen Mary S. Just 35 minutes later, Sheikh Hamdan bin Mohammed Al Maktoum's Eye Of Heaven (GB) made it a double for Exceed and Excel when charging home in a five furlong juvenile course-record time for Frankie Dettori and Mark Johnston. Then it was the turn of Hillwood Racing's Bright Devil (Ire) (Dark Angel {Ire}) to prevail over six for the in-form Andrew Balding yard and Oisin Murphy. Expensive Goffs Orby €400,000 yearling Creative Force (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}) was a notable winner under William Buick for Godolphin. In the final maiden of the day at HQ, Roger Varian's Setarhe (Ire) (Footstepsinthesand {GB}) was similarly eyecatching with pilot Andrea Atzeni aboard, landing a six-furlong contest by 3/4 of a length for Amo Racing.

Goffs UK, Arqana Breeze Ups Back To Doncaster, Craven On June 25 Cont. from p1

To acknowledge one of the key differences between Goffs UK and Arqana's payment and billing conditions, a 5% agents levy will be deducted from the sales proceeds of each lot sold from the Goffs UK and Arqana Breeze-Up catalogues, and paid to the purchasing agent. Full details will be available in the modified Conditions of Sale, which will be available closer to the sale.

Those conditions will apply to both catalogues to ensure all 2YOs are sold on the same basis and include the standard Goffs commission rates for both sales.

Goffs UK Managing Director Tim Kent said, "The teams at Arqana and Goffs UK are doing everything we can to stage successful breeze-up sales so holding them in Doncaster will make logistics far simpler. We are taking every precaution to make the sale as safe as possible and so we ask that all prospective buyers contact Goffs UK and/or Arqana to register their interest in attending.

"The extra time between breeze and sale acknowledges the additional challenges for buyers this year and we have worked with GBRI and ITM to provide conformation footage of all the 2year-olds to aid pre-sale decision making. In addition we will be offering a new online sale facility for those who cannot attend for which registrations will be taken in the week prior to sale. We will also have the full Goffs UK and Arqana teams on site to take phone bids, meaning bids can be taken in one of three ways--in person as usual, over the phone or via the internet.

"In advance we would like to thank BHA and all at Doncaster Racecourse for their help and positivity whilst acknowledging the offer of Naas Racecourse and HRI who were prepared to assist in hosting the breeze had that been necessary. We have also been pleased to work with Tattersalls to make the process as easy as possible for our many mutual vendors and purchasers."

Arqana Executive Director Freddy Powell added, "The current context requires agility and cooperation, and this is what we are trying to deliver along with Goffs UK and Tattersalls. By holding all European breeze-ups in the same country, utilizing an online platform and providing a choice of bidding options, we are hoping to make buyers and vendors' lives easier and give the sale every chance to succeed."

The move of the Tattersalls breeze ups was necessitated by the allocation of race dates to Newmarket Racecourse on June 18 to 20, which led to a logistical problem for scheduling a breeze prior to the original June 23 date. The breeze will now

take place on the Rowley Mile on June 22, and the sale three days later.

"It is unfortunate that we have had to make yet another change to the dates for the combined Tattersalls Craven and Ascot Breeze Up, but we are all constantly having to respond to events outside our control," said Tattersalls Chairman Edmond Mahony. "These dates now look set in stone and have been agreed in full consultation with Goffs UK and Arqana whose Breeze Up Sale date had been similarly affected [by racing at Doncaster on June 26].

On a practical level, in line with prevailing Government guidelines, the sale will be restricted to those attending in a professional capacity. Full health protocols will need to be adhered to by all those attending the sale and we will be circulating full details to vendors and purchasers alike in the coming days. We are looking forward to staging the first live sale of the 2020 European breeze-up season and to providing as vibrant a market for these high-class 2-year-olds as we possibly can."

ROYAL ASCOT SLASHES PRIZEMONEY

Royal Ascot has confirmed prizemoney for its behind-closeddoors 2020 meeting, with a total pot of £3,680,000 to be handed out. All eight Group 1 races will be run for £250,000, and no race will be worth less than £35,000. All races will close at the six-day stage.

It was announced in December that this year's Royal meeting was to be worth £8,095,000–the richest ever–with no race to be worth less than £95,000 and the G1 Diamond Jubilee S. and G1 Prince of Wales's S. set to be the meeting's first-ever £1-million races, but the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic put a halt to those plans.

Guy Henderson, chief executive of Ascot Racecourse, said, "2020 was set to be a landmark year for Royal Ascot prize money. However, these unprecedented times have intervened. We have sought to respond by producing an enhanced programme of racing this year to maximise opportunities to participate and which in its own way will deliver an exciting and memorable Royal Meeting. Some 70% of our annual income comes from public admissions, including hospitality, and producing in excess of 3 1/2-million pounds in prize money in the current circumstances would not have been possible without the support and commitment of our wonderful Official Partners QIPCO and Longines, for which we are all deeply grateful and express our sincere thanks on behalf of everyone involved."

2017. John Gosden is looking at the outing as a vital warm-up for his bid for a third consecutive victory in Royal Ascot's feature in 13 days' time.

"As I've said to everybody, Stradivarius is in good form and we are looking forward to getting him going," he said. "It is the shortest trip he has run over for some time, but we need to have a prep race before the Gold Cup."

Anthony Van Dyck and **Broome (Ire)** (Australia {GB}) are Aidan O'Brien's first runners in Britain this year and both will most likely be using this as a starting point. At his best operating on a sound surface, the G1 Epsom Derby hero Anthony Van Dyck is the pick of Ryan Moore over the long-absent Broome. No blue riband winner to have run in this race as a 4-year-old has succeeded since Roberto in 1973 and Sir Percy (GB) (Mark of Esteem {Ire}) was the last to try in 2007.

"I don't know much about the mile and a half at Newmarket, but I would imagine you'd need to get a mile and a half very well to get the trip," the master if Ballydoyle commented. "We haven't had a lot of runners over that trip in Newmarket. We just thought soft ground at Ascot [in the King George last year] wasn't the right thing to do with Anthony Van Dyck and he paid for it. But he's in good form now, we're happy with his work and the plan would be to keep him on good ground. He's doing everything right at the moment." **Cont. p5**

"Defoe is a horse who tells you when he's right and is giving us the right messages," trainer Roger Varian said. "He's on his racing weight, he's come good in his skin and he seems to have a bounce with him. He's tuned-in for the race, but it might take a career-best to win it because the race looks a touch stronger this year. He seemed to really love Epsom last year, when he put it to bed in a few strides and won going away. But, saying that, he's run well at Newmarket the couple of times he's performed there and I don't think the track holds too many fears for him." FRIDAY • 5 JUNE 2020

Like Defoe, Ghaiyyath was denied a run in the abandoned G1 Dubai Sheema Classic but trainer Charlie Appleby is happy with where last year's impressive G1 Grosser Preis von Baden winner is at present. "He came back probably about six weeks ago now and looks fantastic," he commented. "He's a horse that we're very excited to see race this year. He's got proven form up the Rowley Mile as a winner of the Autumn S. as a 2-year-old. When he won the G3 Dubai Millennium at Meydan in February, he took it much better than his previous races. His post-race condition was much better than before. He is now the finished article. He can be a flagship for Godolphin in the top middle-distance races this year."

In the G3 Betway Abernant S., the 2017 and 2018 winner **Brando (GB)** (Pivotal {GB}) is back again bidding for vengeance after finishing third in the latest renewal behind the re-opposing **Keystroke (GB)** (Pivotal {GB}). **Cont. p6**

Stradivarius on Show Cont.

That race precedes the Listed Betway Paradise S. for G1 Queen Anne S. aspirants including Khalid Abdullah's 'TDN Rising Star' **Sangarius (GB)** (Kingman (GB), who is making his comeback having been absent since winning the G3 Hampton Court S. at the Royal meeting almost a year ago.

At Lingfield, the Listed Oaks Trial and Listed Derby Trial will offer the first Epsom pointers a year on from providing the winners of both mile-and-a-half Classics and in the former contest John Gosden saddles a trio headed by the G3 Zetland S. runner-up Miss Yoda (Ger) (Sea the Stars {Ire}). Robert Havlin said of her, "She is a filly that I know well having won on her the first two times. She is the highest-rated in the race so she goes there with a good chance, but we will find out a little bit more about her after Friday as to whether she is an Oaks filly. She has been pleasing us at home and whatever she does on Friday she will improve on. She can be a free-going filly in the morning, but she seems to be different in the afternoons and I think she will get the trip. The heavy ground would have worked against her in the Zetland last year, so her record is flawless really. She is probably the pick of three in the race from the yard, but these fillies improve over the winter."

Mark Johnston puts forward the G3 Sweet Solera S. winner West End Girl (GB) (Golden Horn {GB}), who was last seen finishing at the tail of the field in the G1 Fillies' Mile. "Her two runs at the back-end were very disappointing and I don't know why, as nothing really came to light," the trainer's son and assistant Charlie Johnston said. "This was an obvious starting point and on pedigree the step up in trip should suit."

Without the usual Ballydoyle contingent, the Derby Trial lacks an element of weight and Charlie Fellowes has warned that of the race's key protagonists **King Carney (GB)** (Australia {GB}) is not a certain runner. Signing off his 2-year-old season with success in the Listed Silver Tankard S. at Pontefract in October, Susan Roy's representative has to give away three pounds as a result and does not need the going too quick according to his trainer. "I'm a bit concerned about the ground and I'm going to go and walk it beforehand," Fellowes said. "If we are going to go for nice targets, he has got to go on the ground so we will find out a lot. It is the right race to go for and he is the one to beat. He has a penalty, but he has got a lovely way of going and he will suit the track. He is quite an exuberant horse on the racecourse and he is the same at home, so all the time I'm trying to do as little as possible with him."

Bjorn Nielsen's silks are sported by the Ed Walker-trained **English King (GB)** (Camelot {GB}), who had this week's winner Galsworthy (GB) (Dansili {GB}) soundly beaten in third when winning a 10-furlong maiden on Newcastle's Tapeta in November.

HURWORTH STEPS UP FOR THE CUP

It may be running on its original date but the Coronation Cup has a different location as well as a new sponsor for this year.

Traditionally run at Epsom, the Group 1 contest returns to Newmarket for the first time since World War II and in this disrupted season the race sponsorship had become available, allowing young bloodstock agent Sam Haggas to step in to support the race under his Hurworth Bloodstock banner.

The son of William and Maureen Haggas and grandson of Lester Piggott, Haggas clearly has a good grounding in the business and he set up his own agency just over a year ago, having worked with John Ferguson and Mark McStay at Godolphin and then Avenue Bloodstock.

A one-man band at present, Haggas, a keen form student, is focusing predominantly on the horses-in-training market.

He says, "I've always been interested in the form side of things ever since I've been interested in racing, and that led me to a job with Paddy Power on the racing team in Dublin. So that is the main focus but I'm still very much planning to cover all aspects of Flat racing on the bloodstock side."

Like many people, he has had a quieter spell during lockdown, though he did manage to pick up a bit of business following the opening turf meeting of the season in Ireland on March.

"I was lucky to be able buy a filly who ran at Naas. Camichita (Ire) was with Johnny Murtagh and has gone on to race in America, so that was a great boost for the business and it at least kept me a little bit busy during what has otherwise been a pretty quiet time," he says.

His first purchase in the name of Hurworth Bloodstock last year was **Miss O Connor (Ire)** (Roderic O'Connor {Ire}), who was bought after winning a maiden for John Feane at Gowran Park. She remains unbeaten in three starts for William Haggas, including the Listed Dick Hern S. and the G3 Prix Perth.

"She does prefer a bit of cut in the ground and if we get some rain this month she could perhaps go for the Duke of Cambridge at Royal Ascot," says Haggas, who bought the 5-year-old for Roy and Gretchen Jackson of Lael Stable. "That could be her first target this season but it's ground dependent. The other flagship horse has been **Urban Fox (GB)** (Foxwedge {Aus}), who was a 425,000gns purchase by Barnane Stud from the 2017 December Sale. She had plenty of black-type but no stakes-winning form to her name but she went on to win the G1 Pretty Polly S."

He adds, "I'm lucky to have bought some horses for Roy and Gretchen Jackson, who have been very supportive and I'm hoping to make it an international business. I'm also been buying horses with George Boughey, who just started training last year and was really going well this year before racing stopped. We bought a few horses together at the horses-in-training sale and yearling sales so hopefully they can do well for George this season."

Haggas, who has been based in Hungerford, near Lambourn, for the last couple of years, is looking forward to his association with the Coronation Cup—a race won by his grandfather on 10 occasions—even if he cannot be in his former home town to attend the races.

He says, "It's fantastic to see racing return and, this being the first Group 1, it's an honour to have a small part in it and to have been given the opportunity to sponsor the Coronation Cup. It looks like it's going to be a fantastic race, with five Group 1 winners out of the seven runners, and Stradivarius (Ire) (Sea The Stars {Ire}) has been an absolute superstar in the last few years. The prospect of Ghaiyyath (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}) serving it up to Stradivarius: it will be so interesting to see race how the race unfolds."

FIFTEEN POISED FOR 1000 GUINEAS

Khalid Abdullah's unbeaten 'TDN Rising Star' Quadrilateral (GB) (Frankel {GB}) will face 14 rivals as she heads to post for Sunday's G1 QIPCO 1000 Guineas at Newmarket. Drawn in six, the G1 Fillies' Mile winner who will be steered by Jason Watson is housed away from the other main protagonists who are positioned towards the stand's side. They are Stonethorn Stud Farms' G1 Cheveley Park S. scorer Millisle (Ire) (Starspangledbanner {Aus}), the sole representative of the Jessie Harrington stable who is drawn 11, and Coolmore's G1 Moyglare Stud S. heroine Love (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}), who was handed the 14 stall. The latter is the only runner for Aidan O'Brien after he withdrew Peaceful (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) and So Wonderful (War Front), while Frankie Dettori has been retained by John Gosden to ride Lord Lloyd-Webber's Lingfield novice winner Shimmering (Ire) (Lope de Vega {Ire}). That leaves Mickael Barzalona to take over the mount on Sheikh Hamdan bin Mohammed Al Maktoum's G2 Queen Mary S. and G2 Duchess of Cambridge S. scorer Raffle Prize (Ire) (Slade Power {Ire}), who Dettori was pencilled in for and that potential pace-setter is in 13.

Quadrilateral has already upstaged Love over this course and distance in the Fillies' Mile, having scored by nine lengths in a seven-furlong conditions event that has thrown up smart fillies in the past at Newbury in September. If successful, the homebred relative of Three Valleys (Diesis {GB}) will be providing Roger Charlton with a first win in this Classic. He is typically understated as the race nears.

"We've had the driest May on record, which has not made life easy," Charlton said. "Ideally, it would have been nice to have a prep race but otherwise she looks really well and is in good heart. She's a big strong filly, much like a colt really, and needs plenty of work." **Cont. p8**

G1 QIPCO 1000 Guineas Cont.

He added, "I'd expect her to improve for the race and I'd expect her to stay beyond a mile. This weekend will be the first time she would have run on quick ground, so that will be interesting."

Charlie Appleby may have the hot favourite for the previous day's G1 QIPCO 2000 Guineas, but in the fillies' Classic he has to rely on an outsider in Summer Romance (Ire) (Kingman {GB}). Labelled a 'TDN Rising Star' on her winning debut at Yarmouth in mid-June, the grey justified that with a six-length success in the Listed Empress Fillies' S. on the July Course here later that month. Subsequently disappointing when sixth in Ascot's G3 Princess Margaret S. in July and when third in the G3 Dick Poole Fillies' S. at Salisbury in September, she steps beyond six furlongs for the first time and trainer Charlie Appleby is hoping she can regain her spark. "She's one filly who I'd have liked to seen in a trial, although she's done very well through the winter and her homework has been pleasing us," he said. "She was disappointing at Ascot, but we put a line through that as she got upset in the preliminaries and it was soft ground. When William got off her at Salisbury he said she'd gone weak and so we put her away."

DUBAI STATION IN PAVILION UPSET

Newcastle's G3 Betway Pavilion S. provided a surprise on Thursday as Ahmad Alshaikh's **Dubai Station (GB)** (Brazen Beau {Aus}) bounced back to the best of his juvenile form to upstage **Malotru (Ire)** (Casamento {Ire}). Sent off at 10-1 after two disappointing efforts brought his juvenile season to a halt, the bay who had previously been third in the G2 Norfolk S. was switched off in rear early by Ben Curtis. Moving smoothly along the rail and to the front approaching the final furlong, he was always holding the expected late effort of the 2-1 favourite Malotru to score by a neck, with 1 1/4 lengths back to **Dream Shot (Ire)** (Dream Ahead) in third.

"He's a very good horse, he shows us that on the gallops at home as he does a lot of his work with Lord of the Lodge and probably has a better turn of foot than him," trainer Karl Burke said. "We knew we had a horse, but he had a few niggles last year and we had to iron them out in the winter, just cleaning up a couple of joints, but he's given us no problems since. It's great for the owner, because he nearly sold him but we persuaded him to keep him."

Sent to Royal Ascot a fortnight after winning over five furlongs at Haydock, Dubai Station was doing his best work at the death when third behind A'Ali (Ire) (Society Rock {Ire}) in the Norfolk and was at this trip next time as he finished 4 1/2 lengths off the subsequent G1 Prix Morny and G1 Middle Park S. hero Earthlight (Ire) when third in the G3 Prix de Cabourg at Deauville in July. Only 11th in York's G2 Gimcrack S. the following month, he took another downturn when 10th in the Listed Redcar Two Year Old Trophy in October. Refreshed and revitalised on this return, he was leaving those deflating experiences well behind and Burke has his eye on a return to the Royal meeting now.

"He showed plenty early last year and wouldn't want the ground too soft, it was slow enough today so we'll go to Ascot and hope for fast ground in the [June 19 G1] Commonwealth Cup and he'll go with a chance," he added. "He might get seven furlongs, but he's got too much speed for a mile. Ben said he was just hanging on at the end, but he had to commit him early when the gap came."

TAILOR A SALE FOR MIDDLE-DISTANCE

YEARLINGS By Jeremy Brummitt

The extended hiatus in the Thoroughbred business is forcing changes to the accepted calendar and offers the opportunity to make others. The extent of the issues to be resolved will be uncertain for some time, but there are two inevitable challenges to be faced: depression of the economy will reduce demand at the sales and there will be a loss of income for racing owing to reduced betting activity.

There is one change to the sales schedule which would be constructive in the long term and pragmatic in the short: hold a one-day sale limited to yearlings bred to race over middle distances as 3-years-olds and up. The ideal spot would be between Books 1 and 2 of the Tattersalls October Sale in Newmarket. Increasingly yearlings answering this description are marginalised in Book 3. Goffs UK has established a sale that almost exclusively caters for the other end of the spectrum, but no sales house is prepared to attempt to market the profile of horses that may require time and distance.

Book 1 is the major source of this type of horse for owners with substantial budgets, but producers of purportedly less fashionable yearlings answering this remit are shuffled back to Book 3. This comes at the end of a busy fortnight for the diehard, and week for the many who assume that they cannot compete in Book 1 and whose attention begins with Book 2. Very many feel, understandably, that they cannot justify absence from the day job as trainer or owner for the full two weeks. Compiling a single day that comes after a weekend without live sales action should enable all interested to attend and the response may well surprise those who believe it is a sector of the market without commercial appeal. My lasting memory from last year's sales season came with the very last yearling through the ring at Tattersalls. Normally this would be a manifest example of disillusion with saturation and most years the attendance in the ring would barely scrape into double figures. Last year a virtually full house came back to see a spirited battle for a son of Sixties Icon, out of a mare by Sir Percy, with no black-type under the first two dams, make 70,000gns.

Yearlings like this deserve the opportunity to be viewed by a wider audience. No doubt the riposte will be that the charms of the more backward yearlings are less apparent when inspected.

Fair enough--lump them together with likely types and let the buyers looking for them decide. They can do their shopping and let the deluge of limited models conceived for market appeal rather than lasting performance occupy the stage for as long as is necessary.

It is little wonder that precocious and limited horses are so popular within the business. They require replacing every 12

months, which means business for breeders, agents and trainers all of which must be underwritten by an owner--if the owner is there.

The more backward model is welcomed at the horses-in-training sales when it has reached an immediate and obvious appeal. There is no freely available data for the sales averages of stallions' stock as mature horses with form (partly as so many are sold privately), whilst it is easy for prospective purchasers to divine the disparity between foal and yearling sales prices and racecourse performance. I think

yearling purchasers may well draw up different short lists if they were aware that the relation between yearling price and 3-year-old realisation tended towards the inverse.

The likelihood that an economic recovery will be gradual rather than immediate would motivate owners towards horses that can run for multiple seasons, as indeed many of the most committed, though smaller scale, already are. It is wildly optimistic to expect annual restocking on recent levels. Many within the business believe that we had reached overproduction before the current disruption, but that will surely be more apparent this autumn. There is a declining demand from the domestic buying bench for yearlings, but in contrast an increase from new export interests. They have a unanimous desire for a horse with scope to progress beyond its 2-year-old season and the vast majority of their purchases are for horses that will go well beyond a mile.

Which brings us back to the spectre of reduced levy funding. Unless we are able to divorce ourselves from this mechanism, we must embrace the most propitious programme to deliver the best yield. We have been prepared to suffer a bloated fixture list to appease the bookmakers, but largely ignored the strongest evidence: the highest turnover flat races are Group 1s and big-field handicaps. It seems obvious that this is because punters are most likely to bet on the familiar. In the 1930s, the then-Aga Khan was complaining about the slant of prize-money towards big handicaps and complaining about the earnings of better horses. Whatever the motivation, or merits of changes to the racing programme since then, it has not maintained the sport's popularity with the general public.

The domination of racing superpowers has enabled us to keep

the world's best bloodstock at home and cemented our position at the pinnacle of international racing, but it has come at the cost of domestic interest in the top events, both from owners and bettors.

The only contestant who is a certain loser is one that quits and too many breeders and owners have quit the Classic quest because they feel it is unattainable. As an industry we need to ensure that near misses are so well rewarded that they make the pursuit of those goals appealing and worthwhile. The reward will be a far healthier choice of stallions and depth of

market. The recent initiatives in boosting the stayers' programme are a welcome start, but need expansion.

Australia and the United States have marched in the opposite direction over recent decades and where has that led them? Only Japan has sought to frame a balanced racing programme (Deep Impact was asked to race over two miles on two occasions and it failed to prevent him producing a Guineas winner out of a Galileo mare) and only Japan is a serious factor in international middle-distance competition.

Until racing's funding is properly addressed, international export must weigh increasingly heavily within our business. Sales inspections are now underway, it is time to showcase horses that meet that demand.

OBSERVATIONS on the European racing scene

DELTA'S ROYALTY TAKES TO NEWMARKET

"Whilst this going description is acceptable for flat racing, it generally suits a relatively small pool of horses. At a time when the focus is on maximising the opportunities for horsemen, and despite an unsettled forecast for this weekend, we have taken the decision to move the fixture to Lingfield Park's polytrack surface."

AQUIS POISED TO MAKE GROUP 1 SPLASH

With a connection to a third of the field in the JJ Atkins S. as well as holding part ownership in two key runners in the G1 Stradbroke H., Aquis is well poised to make a splash on what is the only Group 1 raceday of the 2019/20 racing season for its home state of Queensland.

While Aquis is a national and international racing and breeding operation now, it is very much connected to the state it set up its business in five years ago, with the farm at Canungra in south-east Queensland at the heart of its success.

Managing Director Shane McGrath said a Group 1 win in either of the feature races at Eagle Farm on Saturday would be tremendous fillip for the Fung family and the entire Aquis team.

"The Magic Millions Carnival and Queensland Winter Racing Carnival are significant parts of the Australian calendar. For us, Queensland is the heartbeat of the company and it'd be a massive thrill if we could get a Group 1 success. It's exciting to be part of it," he said.

Given Aquis's amazing success with 2-year-olds this year, highlighted by G1 Golden Slipper S. winner **Farnan** (Not A Single Doubt) as well as Magic Millions 2YO Classic winner **Away Game** (Snitzel), who is part-owned by Loretta Fung, it comes as no surprise that it holds such a strong hand in Queensland's only juvenile Group 1 race, the JJ Atkins.

Five of 18 runners in the race have Aquis or the Fung family in

their ownership, three of which were bred at the farm, while Aquis also bred one of the other runners.

It has recently bought into leading Queensland 2-year-old **Wisdom Of Water** (Headwater) as part of a deal with existing owners Golden East Horse which secured future breeding rights for the last-start G3 Ken Russell Classic winner.

"We acquired an interest in the stallion rights of Wisdom Of Water. He's an extremely exciting colt. He's run fast times and he has rated really highly racing against what look a really quality bunch of 2-year-olds in Queensland. He's right at the top of that pecking order," McGrath said. "He's drawn 10 on Saturday and with the speed outside of him, Trent and Toby (Edmonds) have done a great job with him so far. Robbie (Fradd) knows him really well. We are going in there with a fair degree of optimism."

Saffiano (More Than Ready {USA}) will be the flagbearer and carry the aqua and black colours in Saturday's Group 1 test. Bred by Aquis Farm, he was then purchased by an Aquis connected syndicate through Newhaven Park's draft for \$600,000 at the 2019 Magic Millions Gold Coast Yearling Sale and has won one of his three starts.

"He's a well-bred horse and will really appreciate the step up to the 1400 metres. Chris Waller has always got a sense of timing this time of year with the Queensland carnival," McGrath said. "You can imagine he will be running on strong later in the piece and if they run along hard in front, he will be the one to watch to get over the top of them."

Aquis-bred and part-owned **Macroura** (Snitzel) is considered the leading chance of the fillies in the race having won her three starts to date for Ciaron Maher and David Eustace.

"She's a gun and we've had great success with Ciaron and David throughout the year. We've had a phenomenal year with the 2-year-olds," he said. "She's still on the way up having won a stakes race last start. She's got really solid Sydney form, has got a good gate and a good rider on board. You can see her stalking the speed and she makes her own luck. She's tough, she's three from three and she's definitely one of the favourites."

Beans Making it Count

There are also two runners by former Aquis stallion Spill The Beans, who died last October and whose first crop has made quite the impression with 10 2-year-old winners, the most of any first-season sire in Australia.

Way Beyond was bred by Aquis, which retained a share when he was sold to Stuart Kendrick for \$50,000 at last year's Magic Millions March Yearling Sale.

"Way Beyond is a really good Queensland story. We put the horse with Stuart Kendrick and raced him with a few of the stable stalwarts. He's a homebred and he's got the blinkers on and Spill The Beans himself really appreciated the blinkers," he said.

Kendrick also trains the other 2-year-old by Spill The Beans in the race, **Cosmic Gossip**, who is part-owned by Loretta Fung.

"Stuart does a good job with his 2-year-olds. Mrs Fung is delighted to have one by her favourite stallion," McGrath said.

Aquis also bred the Richard and Michael Freedman-trained **Not An Option** (Not A Single Doubt), who has been a Group 2 winner in New Zealand for her owners which include Cambridge Stud's Brendan and Jo Lindsay.

"He's a colt that we bred and sold through Curraghmore Farm as a yearling. We still have the mare Chintz, and we sent her to America. She's residing at Woods Edge Farm and she is in foal to US champion sire Curlin," McGrath said. "If she could get a Group 1-winning 2-year-old that would be phenomenal. There are several significant New Zealand breeders involved with him and from the mare's profile, it would be enormous."

The Many Parts of Aquis on Display

The six runners with the Aquis connection in the JJ Atkins S. all reflect different parts of the Aquis business, something which is not lost on McGrath.

"From the breeding side, you have the progeny of Chintz, from a stallion perspective, we've got two by Spill The Beans and from our stallion-building side of things, we've got Saffiano and Wisdom Of Water. It's a great illustration of the many parts of Aquis within the race," he said.

Aquis' influence also extends to the Stradbroke H. where it holds part ownership in two runners, **Dawn Passage** (Dawn Approach {Ire}) and **Graff** (Star Witness).

"Dawn Passage is a leading chance and while he's drawn wide, speaking to the trainers, we are not too concerned with that as he is a free rolling horse. We were happy enough to be drawn outside as he is a horse that needs galloping room," he said. He's got a winner's profile, 3-year-olds have a great record and with the weight, he's the one they have to beat."

Along with Australian Bloodstock, Aquis bought into Graff, a close relative of Dawn Passage, earlier this year and McGrath thinks the 4-year-old can prove a knockout chance from an inside barrier with a light weight.

Success in the final Group 1 races of the Australian racing season would prove an excellent way to cap a brilliant year for Aquis.

"It's been a year like no other. It's what you set out to do, but not in your wildest dreams we would have thought we would have had the success we have had. It's testament to that system we have in place," McGrath said.
