Before he became a Hall of Fame trainer, Todd Pletcher was once a sports journalist. Kind of. He had a nickname, too. Find out what horse race is his most satisfying victory and who were his favorite horses to train. And, if you want to find out what NFL team is near and dear to his heart, dive right in. Find out all you never knew about one of the most successful trainers in the history of the sport.

TDN: On your resume--and I am not going to go through the whole thing because we would be here for hours--no one has more Eclipse Awards for leading trainer than you. No one has more Saratoga training titles than you. Two Kentucky Derbys. Four Belmonts. Is there one thing you have done that sticks out for you?

Todd Pletcher: I don't know if there is one individual achievement that stands out. I would like to think it's been the consistency that we have been able to maintain at a pretty high level over an extended period of time.

WITH A HEART "THE SIZE OF TEXAS," SPECIAL ME'S FAIRYTALE KEEPS GETTING

Special Me has been the gift that keeps on giving for breeders Carrie and Craig Brogden and Dr. Sandra Fubini of Machmer Hall. Now that the outstanding broodmare is 18 years old, you'd think that her best days are behind her. But with a Grade I winner competing at the top level of the filly and mare turf division this year and an impressive fleet of well-bred, unraced progeny in the pipeline, the mare's fairytale story just keeps getting better.

Carrie Brogden famously purchased Special Me, a Maryland-bred daughter of Unbridled's Song, for just \$6,000 at the 2009 Keeneland January Sale. Born six weeks premature, the 14.2-hand filly who never placed better than sixth in three career starts was about as unassuming of a broodmare prospect as one could possibly find. Flash forward 15 years and the petite gray mare has built up a produce record worthy of the blue hen appellation.

"It's kind of amazing that she was actually named Special Me and she became so special," reflected Brogden. "It's hard to put into words something that you just can't believe you actually have. I mean, you see her now at 18 and she's got old arthritic knees, but she has heart. Gosh, she has a heart the size of Texas."

Special Me was already the dam of Grade I winner Gift Box (Twirling Candy), who now stands at Lane's End Farm, and Grade II winners Stonetastic (Mizzen Mast) and Special Forces (Candy Ride {Arg}) when Gina Romantica (Into Mischief) came onto the scene. *Cont. p8*



TDN: So, there is not one thing you are going to hang your hat on and say, 'that was pretty cool.'

TP: I tell you, it's a difficult business to sort of sit back while you are still active and reflect on everything that has happened. I have found, maybe at times, when you have some milestone achievements...3,000 wins, 5,000 wins...you kind of briefly reflect like 'wow, I never anticipated it would accumulate to that level.' You can get inducted into the Hall of Fame and then later that afternoon go over and lose four races.

TDN: You are 57. There is still a long way to go.

TP: I would hope so.

TDN: When you were a student at Arizona, didn't you dabble in journalism a little bit?

TP: I did. But I wouldn't call it journalism. That might be stretching it a little bit. My roommate, who was an English major, was the beat writer for the Arizona football team. He came back one day and said there was a job I needed to take. I said, 'what are you talking about?' He said the guy that covers intramural sports for the Arizona Daily Wildcat quit today. He said it was a piece of cake. I ended up doing it. One of the things I did was the intramural rankings for flag football, for

volleyball...whatever sport was going on. I would make the rankings and our fraternity would be ranked No. 1 a lot of times. I was also refereeing intramural basketball and volleyball. I could ref a game and get 20 bucks and write an article and get another 20 bucks. I was killing it. Double dipping. I also wrote an article previewing the 1989 Kentucky Derby and I picked Sunday Silence to beat Easy Goer.

TDN: So, everyone in the fraternity got rich?

TP: (laughs) I don't know. We were already gone by the time they ran. It was right around graduation.

TDN: I know horse racing was with you from the start, but did you ever think you would be a journalist?

TP: No, no, no. I wasn't a good enough writer. I just stumbled onto that.

TDN: People who don't know Todd Pletcher might say he is dry, no sense of humor. I know that is not true. You can be a funny guy, can't you?

TP: Occasionally, I think I crack some people up. Probably not very many.

TDN: It's not like you are a piece of sandpaper.

TP: No. I think it gets mislabeled a little bit. I don't necessarily look at that as a bad thing either.



TDN: When you walk through the crowd at Saratoga, how often does someone ask you for a horse?

TP: Pretty much every day. You would expect when you walk through, you'd get 'do you like this one?'

TDN: Do you answer them?

TP: Yeah. Usually it's "we're trying ... hopefully." I don't tell them, 'go to the window on this one.'

TDN: With all your success, some people might look at you like they look at the New York Yankees. They root against you because of all the past success.

TP: I think there is some element to that. I think maybe you go through phases. When (Bill) Mott was the leading trainer here every year, maybe he was that guy. Then me, and now Chad (Brown). It's human nature to root for the underdogs. The dukes of the world aren't always that popular but, hopefully respected.

TDN: Did you have a nickname growing up?

TP: When I was in college, everyone called me Fletch. A lot of guys called me that.

TDN: If there's a movie made about your life and you can pick the guy to play you, who are you picking?

TP: Oooh. That's a good one. Paul Newman. Seems like a cool guy. I think our generation thought that.

TDN: You must have loved "The Sting."

TP: Classic.

TDN: If you could have dinner with three people, living or dead, who would they be?

TP: John Wooden, Richard Pryor and, for my daughter (Hannah), Ruth Bader Ginsburg. I was a huge Richard Pryor fan when I was a teenager. All his movies, standup...everything. I don't know how this would go. Maybe Richard and I will hang around for after dinner drinks.

TDN: I know you're a Dallas Cowboys fan. Big?

TP: Yup. I was born in Dallas, grew up in Texas and, probably as a 6- or 7-year-old, I thought because I was born in Dallas, that meant I was obligated to support them. Growing up in Texas, Dallas was on TV every Sunday, unless they played on Monday night or Thanksgiving Day. I remember as a little kid my mom would make me go to church and I would miss the first 10 or 15 minutes of the game. That was not a good thing. From first grade to when I graduated high school, I seriously doubt I missed more than a game or two.



TDN: Do you still try to catch all their games now?

TP: It's easier now. Back then, you had four channels.

TDN: But there is thing called horse racing that happens on Sunday afternoons.

TP: Yes. Growing up in the 70s, it was awesome. I got the Roger Staubach days and the Drew Pearson days. In the 90s, when they were good, I was had just starting training, so I did not get to watch nearly as many of those games. When my kids (Hannah, Kyle and Payton) were born, they missed all those teams. They are Cowboy fans, but they missed the 70s, the 90s. They have seen like three playoff games in 25 years. Every once in in a while they get a little upset with me because I made them into Cowboy fans.

TDN: I talked to you before and you said that Scooby-Doo is your favorite cartoon when growing up.

TP: Yup. It's still good.

TDN: OK. Who is Shaggy and who is Scooby-Do between you and your owner, Mike Repole?


TP: (laughs) Oh, man. I have to make Repole Shaggy.

TDN: Describe Mike Repole in fewer words that he would describe you.

TP: He is a very complex guy. I think a lot of what you see is the real Mike Repole. He is a very thoughtful guy, a very charitable guy, a very philanthropic person. I consider myself to be a fairly busy person in terms of the amount of responsibility I have, the job I have, the amount of time it takes. I could not imagine being Mike Repole for a week. He has got so many things going on and he'll know everything going on with every single one of his horses. And he is doing 30 other things and taking care of 10 other people who maybe have a medical issue or things like that. He does so much for so many people that a lot of people don't know about.

TDN: Most satisfying win and most heartbreaking loss.

TP: I have always said, and I don't think it will change, Rags to Riches' Belmont win (2007). It was my most satisfying for a number of reasons. It was my first Classic, a filly beating the colts, the excitement of the race and the way it unfolded. Everything about it was literally experiencing everything in horse racing in less than two and a half minutes. The disappointment of the stumble, then thinking you are going to win, and then thinking Curlin is going to come back and you're going to lose by a nose, and you ultimately win by a head. It encompassed everything that is great about the thrill of the sport. There have been a lot of tough beats. I think we have been second in the Belmont nine times



TDN: You think Rags to Riches should be in the Hall of Fame.

TP: I think I might be disappointed about that more than anything. I don't understand it because, to me, getting inducted into the Hall of Fame means you have accomplished something that very few others have. She is the only filly to win the Belmont in, what are we at now, 110 years? [119. Tanya was the last to do it in 1905]. That puts her in an elite category. The detractors say she didn't make enough starts (seven, five wins, one second). Justify (who is being inducted this year) had a tremendous career (six starts, six wins) but it only lasted four of five months. It seems a bit unfair. I always thought she deserved to be in there. Hopefully, the voters will see it that way one day.

TDN: You have five empty stalls, and you can put five horses from history in there, but none of your own. Who are they?

TP: When I was in California with my dad's good friend Henry Moreno, who I spent a couple summers working for, told me Swaps was the best horse he had ever seen. I would probably say him. My dad was training at Santa Anita the winter of Spectacular Bid's 4-year-old season and he always said he was one of the best horses he had ever seen. Flightline was as talented as any horse we have seen in a while. Rachel Alexandra. I think her Kentucky Oaks was arguably as good as a horse has ever run. I'll go with Seattle Slew because Angel (Hall


of Fame rider Cordero) said he was the best horse he had ever ridden.

TDN: No Secretariat.

TP: You can't put him on the AE (laughs). From a historical perspective, it's too hard to narrow it down to five. I'm good with those five.

TDN: You did a TDN Podcast--the Writers' Room with Randy Moss and Zoe Cadman--last week and now this. You are going to be Mr. TDN. Might have to get you on the staff.

TP: It's a good thing. I love the TDN. I've read it every day for a lot of years. It's good for the industry.

TDN: If you could have a superpower, what would it be?

TP: X-ray vision. It would come in handy in today's training world (laughs).

TDN: Do you cook?

TP: No. I occasionally tend to the grill but I'm not very good at it.

TDN: (Wife) Tracy does the cooking?

TP: Tracy does the cooking.

TDN: With all the owners in town, how much sleep do you get a night?

TP: With the extension of the meet, it has changed the dynamics of it a little bit. I have kind of scaled back on the number of events we go to. The schedule is so demanding that you have to pick and choose your spots and pace yourself. We eat at home a lot and try to have early dinners when we do. Depending on the post times you have, sometimes it's possible, sometimes it's not.

TDN: What time are you at the barn in the morning?

TP: Four. The other day we were in early races, so I was here from 4 to 5:30 (p.m.). On the weekends, it's later than that. I like being here early. I like a little bit of quiet time before we get going so I can look over some condition books.

TDN: What time do you get up?

TP: 3:30 (a.m.).

TDN: What time do you go to bed?

TP: Eight (p.m.). There are certain times of the year where it's less busy. But we still start early. During the winter I might get to the barn at 4:30 (a.m.).

TDN: It would be unfair to ask you who is your favorite horse you have trained, right?

TP: There are certainly horses you have had that you enjoy training more than others. I have always said the two horses that helped my career get going the most were Jersey Girl and More Than Ready. Because of that, they will always be two of my favorites. Jersey Girl was my first Grade I winner.

TDN: Watch much TV?

TP: I find myself watching more Netflix and those kinds of things. It's a different world now. Kids now don't watch TV the way we did when we were kids.





If you lived in El Paso, Texas, you were at home on Tuesday nights watching "Happy Days" at 7 (p.m.) and you were done for the week. Now, with the exception of watching a live sporting event, you can watch things whenever you want. Binge watch twenty episodes if you want.

TDN: Were you a "Happy Days" guy?

TP: I think everyone was at my age. You watched "Happy Days" and "Laverne & Shirley" back-to-back.

TDN: Wayne Lukas, who you worked for before going out on your own, is a Hall of Fame trainer, one of the giants of the game. What do you think of when you hear his name?

TP: He's a legend. I have always said that he is probably the most resilient person I have ever met. The longevity is such a small part of the story. If you look back at the 1980s, to me, he is the only trainer I can think of who has really revolutionized training. He totally changed the trainer game. Guys like Steve (Asmussen) have taken it to a different level. It was Wayne's blueprint that laid it out for a bunch of us.

TDN: Baseball players have walk-up songs when they come to bat. What would be your walk-up song bringing a horse onto the track?

TP: There is a guy who works out at McMahon [of Saratoga Thoroughbreds LLC] Farm. His rapper name is Lip Shank. His rap song is N One. His real name is Benji [Perez], has worked for McMahon for 25 years. That would be my song.

Special Me's Fairytale Keeps Getting Better (cont. from p1)

Gina Romantica was Special Me's first seven-figure yearling when she brought \$1.025 million in 2020 and two years later, she became her dam's second Grade I winner when she scored in the GI Queen Elizabeth II Challenge Cup Stakes. The Chad Brown-trained, Peter Brant-campaigned filly returned to Keeneland the next season with a win in the GI First Lady Stakes, posting an 11-1 upset.

Brogden was on hand for both of those wins at her home track and she remembers them as two of her favorite days in the sport.

"Sheer joy," the horsewoman described. "Just irreplaceable joy. It's the greatest thing about horse racing, which we do not get across enough. Everyone that has owned a racehorse and has won a race understands what I'm talking about. I wish I could bottle that feeling and give it to somebody because it's euphoric. And she's done it twice now."

Gina Romantica ran a big number in last year's GI Breeders' Cup Mile, finishing in fourth less than two lengths behind winner Master of The Seas (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}). She was having a relatively quiet 5-year-old season this year with two unplaced starts at the Grade I level, but she recently put in a big performance in the GI Diana Stakes, closing late to just miss second by a nose. Chad Brown has said he is considering the GI Fourstardave Handicap on Aug. 10 for her next start.

Meanwhile Special Me had a few quiet years herself after producing Gina Romantica. In 2020, she aborted a Quality Road colt at six months. It was the only year she hasn't produced a foal in her 15 breeding seasons. The next year she had a Curlin filly who tragically died in a paddock accident.

The mare returned to making headlines with her next foal, a colt by Into Mischief who made history for his breeder when he sold to Coolmore for \$1.2 million at the Keeneland September Sale last year.

"We have owned parts of several 2-year-olds who sold for more and we've consigned some higher-priced yearlings, but I think for our farm, \$1.2 million is the highest-priced yearling [we have bred]," Brogden said.

Now named Jousting, the 2-year-old colt has been exported to Ireland and has yet to make his debut.

Special Me has another yearling pointing to the Keeneland September Sale and Brogden has hopes that the filly could perhaps out-do her older brother. The full-sister to Gift Box is by a sire that Brogden has supported enthusiastically over the years.

"We've had really, really good luck with Twirling Candy," she said. "We've had a lot of graded stakes horses that we've sold like Sweetontheladies, obviously we had Gift Box, Trophy Chaser. This filly definitely has some traits of Twirling Candy and she definitely has some traits of Unbridled's Song. She's easy peasy to be around. Straightforward and a great mind. She's a big, strong filly and she's correct. The mare always throws correct, never had a crooked horse no matter who we breed her to."

Brogden always gets a little anxious when it comes time for Special Me to foal each spring and this year was no exception. She told her husband Craig, who heads up the mare and foal division, not to tell her when Special Me was showing signs of foaling. Around 2:30am on April 7, she got the text she was hoping for: It's a filly.

From the first-crop of Horse of the Year Flightline, Special Me's latest foal is everything Brogden was hoping for and more.

"If I had imagined the best case scenario of what we could have possibly gotten from this mare, it would be what this filly is times two," Brogden reported. "I cannot believe it. In my mind, she's kind of irreplaceable. Stonetastic was also a 10 physical, which is why she sold for \$77,000 as a daughter of Mizzen Mast all those years ago before the mare was a producer. That's how good of a physical she was and this filly rivals her."

"She's really saucy," Brogden continued. "I don't know if it's because the guys are afraid of her because she's worth so much money, but both her and [the yearling] are going to be hard to sell because mama is 18 now and at some point we know it'll be retirement for her. But the good thing is, no matter what Special Me looks like physically, her uterus is in great shape."

Special Me was bred back to Into Mischief this spring and has checked in foal. Aside from arthritic knees that Brogden says are manageable and are a result of her underdevelopment as a premature foal all those years ago, the broodmare continues to thrive and does especially well when there is a foal at her side.

"She just loves her foals so much," Brogden reflected. "I think she must give something to her foals like some tenaciousness or toughness. There is a reason that they've been so sound and successful. I can't predict the genetics, but obviously there's something special going on."

The Brogdens do have a granddaughter of their superstar mare at Machmer Hall. They purchased Stonetonic, an unraced daughter of Stonetastic by Candy Ride, for \$400,000 at the 2022 Keeneland November Sale. She now has a yearling filly by Yaupon and a colt at her side by Flightline.

Other than Stonetonic, the Brogdens do not have any other members of Special Me's family, so the idea of keeping one of her latest fillies is tempting.

"The biggest question I've had asked on a regular basis with the Twirling Candy is if I'm selling her," said Brogden.

Brogden continued, "We're not going to go up there and give her away, but at some point with being commercial breeders it gets to a point where yes, we are sellers. It's hard for us to keep filles because they are so valuable. We are getting back into having a bigger racing program, but our racing program is basically for horses that, for whatever reason, we couldn't sell."

Fortunately--or perhaps unfortunately depending on how Brogden is looking at it--the Twirling Candy filly had x-rays this spring that were "squeaky clean with a grade one scope."

While the results of Special Me's offspring in the sales ring have been and continue to be imperative to Machmer Hall's success, Brogden is even more proud of the ability and soundness the mare's progeny have shown on the track rather than their growing reputation for producing big-figure sales.

She fondly remembers how, when Gina Romantica was preparing to sell as a yearling, a veterinarian was looking at her X-rays and complimented what he found.

"I remember he came up to me and said that she had the cleanest, strongest bone he'd seen in a long time from a yearling," she recalled. "Clearly it meant something with her because she went on to become a Grade I winner. I don't know what the genetics are with this mare, but I know we're super lucky to have her."

FLORIDA HORSEMAN MILTON HENDRY **PASSES AWAY**

Longtime Florida horseman Milton S. Hendry passed away in Crystal River, Florida June 27. He was 82. The native of Bay Springs, Mississippi first became professionally involved with show horses, reining horses and barrel racing. He later started race riding at unsanctioned meets in the south and midwest before receiving his jockey license to ride Quarter Horses in Louisiana in 1972. Before retiring from riding in 1986, he was a leading Quarter Horse jockey at Commonwealth Race Course in Louisville and Pompano Park Race Course.

Hendry, who trained for Alec and Louise Courtelis's Town & County Farm, began working for Fred Hooper in November of 1988. During his 12 years of service for Hooper, he broke and trained the likes of Diplomatic Jet and Roman Envoy.

After a brief stint working for John Franks at his Franks Farm in Ocala, Hendry started working at Arthur Appleton's Bridlewood Farm where he broke and trained the 2004 GI Kentucky Derby and GI Preakness Stakes winner Smarty Jones.

Hendry and his wife of 37 years, Beth, owned Westfield Farm in Ocala from 2000 through 2008 and bred their mares and sold the foals as yearlings and 2-year-olds in training. The couple bred and sold Don't Get Mad, who finished fourth in the 2005 Kentucky Derby and GI Travers Stakes and won the GII Indiana Derby.

Hendry retired from Bridlewood Farm in 2012 to help his son, Lane, start Hendry Training.

Hendry is survived by his wife Beth and children Katrina (Craig) Patterson, Lynn Hendry, Lane (Shantel) Hendry, Casey (Ashley) Hendry, Byron (Jennifer) Saucer; and grandchildren Ben Myers, Madi Garcia, Cassidy Stone, Tucker Hendry, Grant Saucer, Easton Hendry, Harper Saucer, Atleigh Hendry, Guy Hendry and Magnolia Hendry.

A celebration of life service will be held at Gulf to Lake Church in Crystal River at 11 a.m. Friday. Contributions in his memory can be made to Gulf to Lake Church, 1454 N. Gulf Ave, Crystal River, FL 34429.

QUARTER HORSE JOCKEY TAPIA FINED \$500 FOR PUNCHING FILLY by T.D. Thornton

Emilio Tapia, a Quarter Horse jockey at Ruidoso Downs, has been fined \$500 by that track's stewards for punching his mount after the 2-year-old filly finished fifth in a maiden race.

A stewards' ruling dated July 21 stated that Tapia was "acting in an unprofessional manner when returning to the unsaddling area with his mount Famous Long Eagle following the second race on July 14," and that his breach of conduct further included "striking horse in the belly with his fist in front of grandstand."

The chart caller's notes for the 400-yard sprint stated "no mishap" for Famous Long Eagle, who went off at 3.8-1 odds. Tapia had ridden the filly in two previous races.

Tapia has been licensed since 2012, according to Equibase. He rides primarily in New Mexico and Arizona, and has compiled lifetime win-place-show Quarter Horse stats of 295-263-273 with \$4.9 million in earnings. He has a lifetime record of 4-for-26 in Thoroughbred races, but has not ridden that breed since 2020.

In the past year, Tapia has twice been suspended seven days for "careless riding" infractions at Ruidoso and the Downs at Albuquerque.

It was unclear at deadline for this story if Tapia planned to appeal his fine. The ruling stated he has 10 days to do so.

THE FACTOR COLT NAMED MHBA GRAND CHAMPION

David and JoAnn Hayden's Dark Hollow Farm came away victorious in three of the four classes at the 90th annual Maryland Horse Breeders' Association's Yearling Show held Sunday at the Maryland State Fairgrounds in Timonium.

Dark Hollow Farm's colt by The Factor, co-bred and owned with Ellen Charles of Hillwood Stable was awarded the grand champion trophy by this year's judge, longtime bloodstock agent Rick Abbot.

The Haydens have now won 19 classes (solely or in partnership) at the annual show since 1989, with grand champions in 2009 and 2014.

A total of 59 yearlings were judged Sunday and are now eligible for the \$40,000 premium award which is split annually, with \$20,000 going to the exhibitors of the four show contestants who earn the most money as 2-year-olds during 2025, and another \$20,000 divided among the exhibitors of the four highest-earning 3-year-old runners the next year.

The MHBA Yearling Show is open to all yearlings eligible for Maryland-bred registration with four classes: one for Maryland-sired colts and geldings, one for Maryland-sired fillies, out-of-state-sired colts and geldings, and out-of-state-sired fillies

Blofeld, who stands at Murmur Farm in Darlington, was the recipient of the Northview Get-of-Sire trophy as the top Maryland sire of the show.

TIZ MOLLY PARTNERS WIN TOC PARTNERSHIP **AWARD**

Tiz Molly Partners, which campaigns The Chosen Vron, has been selected by Thoroughbred Owners of California (TOC) as the recipient of the inaugural Horseracing Partnership Award, according to a press release from the TOC Monday morning.

Nominated by one of the four partners, Richard Thornburgh, the partnership was chosen by TOC's Owner Relations Committee from a field of 14 nominees. Its other partners are Robert Fetkin, John Sondereker, and Eric Kruljac, who also trains for the partnership.

The new annual award recognizes and celebrates the growing population of co-ownerships and partnership entities within the horse racing community. VALHALLA GOLF CLUB HOSTS GRADED RUNNERS

Valhalla Golf Club, recent site of the 2024 PGA Championships, will host a pair of retired graded stakes horses through the conclusion of this year's golf season. Hawaakom (Jazil), winner of the 2018 GIII Razorback Handicap, and General A Rod (Roman Ruler), third in the 2014 GI Florida Derby, will reside in a Valhalla-donated eight-acre area which features a traditional wood plank fenced paddock and lighted Lexington-style run-in shed. The two horses are sponsored by their prior connections, Skychai Racing, Hot Pink Stables and MagnaWave, to be ambassadors for the Second Stride equine adoption program.

The partnership between Valhalla and Second Stride began when Randy Hoffacker, owner of Destination Design, wanted to incorporate Kentucky's signature industry into his redesign of the Louisville golf club in 2022.

"My vision was for the property to epitomize Kentucky," Hoffacker said. "To represent what makes our state the special place it is geographically and culturally. The two horses will return to their Chorleywood Farm home in the fall.

Off the board only twice in his career (once on debut and once when fourth in the GI Frank E. Kilroe Mile Stakes), First Peace stretched out to the mile for the first time since that May 3 Grade I after dropping back to 6 1/2 furlongs in his three starts since. The 7-2 third choice let three speedier rivals go ahead of him past the wire the first time and raced a solo fourth to lead

the second flight into the backstretch. As the leading trio opened up a sizeable gap through fractions of :22.16 and :45.04, First Peace was content to sit just off the rail and was the first to jump as the speed began to trail off around the far turn. Up to lead past the quarter pole, he finished with a strong kick to keep 22-1 longshot Astronomer relegated to second.

"He got a perfect set up today," said winning trainer Mark Glatt. "No doubt about it. It helps when three horses blast-off away from you. They got away from him enough to where it probably helped Mike (Smith) settle him back a little. That was extremely impressive. I'm looking forward to what the future holds for him going a little farther".

SEVEN DAYS: AUGUSTE IN JULY?

Seventy years ago, Queen Elizabeth II won the fourth running of the race named in honour of her parents, the King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes, at her own racecourse, Ascot. Aureole was a hugely appropriate winner, having been bred by King George VI in 1950, two years prior to the monarch's death. The horse's victory was widely welcomed, not least because he had been beaten a year earlier by his conqueror in the Derby, Pinza.

The 'King George' provides ones of the key pivot points in the season, when the three-year-olds start to take on their elders. What we want to see is the Derby winner go toe to toe with the previous year's Arc winner, as was the case in 1953, when Pinza went from glory at Epsom to a three-length win in the King George, with Aureole second each time. The Aga Khan's 1952 Arc winner Nuccio (Ity) was behind them both at Ascot.

A subsequent tendon injury ahead of the St Leger curtailed Pinza's career but the often hot-headed Aureole raced on, with his wonderful four-year-old campaign including victories in the Coronation Cup, Hardwicke Stakes and then the King George. The late Queen was said to be so delighted after the latter that she sent a case of champagne to the press room--a gesture which really should have become a tradition among winning owners. Cont., p3

AUGUSTE RODIN STARS AS 11 REMAIN FOR KING GEORGE

Aidan O'Brien is responsible for five of the 11 possible runners in Saturday's G1 King George VI And Queen Elizabeth Qipco Stakes following Monday's confirmation stage, with **Auguste Rodin (Ire)** set to lead the Ballydoyle team into battle at Ascot as he tries to atone for his disappointing effort in the corresponding race 12 months ago.

A four-time winner at the top level as a three-year-old when landing the Derby, Irish Derby, Irish Champion Stakes and Breeders' Cup Turf, Auguste Rodin ran one of his lesser races that season when sent off the 9-4 favourite for the King George, ultimately finishing last of the 10 runners behind Hukum (Ire) (Sea The Stars {Ire}) on rain-softened ground.

And by golly, the roll call for the race - both human and equine - is a proper who's who of the turf over the last seven decades. I feel pretty convinced in my opinion that I'll never see a better winner than the horse who powered to glory in the 50th anniversary year: Montjeu (Ire). But if any horse can match or surpass him I will be happy for that opinion to be swayed.

What can we look forward to this Saturday? The potential delight of last year's Derby winner Auguste Rodin (Ire) returning triumphant at Ascot following his victory in the G1 Prince of Wales's Stakes to avenge for last year's mystifyingly bad performance in the King George? Yep, we'd definitely settle for that. But second-favourite is Charlie Appleby's world traveller Rebel's Romance (Ire), a fellow winner of the Breeders' Cup Turf. The only time this pair has met ended in triumph for the

Godolphin six-year-old and disaster for the Coolmore colt. Ding, ding: round two.

And let's not overlook Bluestocking (GB), a granddaughter of Montjeu who is two-for-two this year and from the red-hot Irish Oaks-winning stable of Ralph Beckett. There have been some terrific female winners of the race, starting with Aunt Edith in 1966 and continuing with Park Top, Dahlia (twice), Pawneese, Time Charter, Danedream, Taghrooda and Enable (thrice).

More than anything, though, the King George is perhaps most renowned for its epic tussles: Grundy and Bustino in 1975, Galileo and Fantastic Light in 2001. We're surely due another, but whatever happens let's just hope we're served up a field and a spectacle worthy of one of the-most valuable races in Britain.

We don't do tips in TDN but if I was asked to offer up a long-shot, I'd side with Goliath (Ger), who comes into the race as more of a David but has just the kind of steadily rising profile to deliver a Franco-German shock come Saturday afternoon - and we've seen those before on several occasions.

Vintage Nathaniel

Goliath was second in the Hardwicke Stakes to Isle Of Jura (Ire), who has sadly been ruled out of his attempt to join that elite band of horses who has won at Royal Ascot and gone on to glory in the King George. Cont.

One who did just that after his King Edward VII Stakes victory of 2011 was Nathaniel (Ire), who then returned to the King George the following year to be denied by a nose by Danedream. The Newsells Park Stud stallion is creeping now into the territory of being a national treasure. He is also perhaps unique in having a sparkling wine named after him by owner Graham Smith-Bernal, who combines a love of thoroughbred breeding and viticulture at his Hertfordshire farm.

Having started off his stud career at $\mathfrak{L}20,000$ back in 2013 - perfectly decent value for a horse of his achievements and breeding - Nathaniel has never dropped to what one might call bargain level, but he has remained sensibly priced throughout his career, with his lowest advertised fee having been $\mathfrak{L}15,000$, while this year he split the difference at $\mathfrak{L}17,500$. For owner-breeders of Classic pretensions (and, let's face it, that should be every breeder, even those with lemonade pockets) Nathaniel really is a bit of a vintage tipple. The outstanding Enable and Derby winner Desert Crown (GB) have now been joined on this list of Group 1 winners by Saturday's Irish Oaks winner You Got To Me (GB).

The filly's victory meant that this was the third of four Irish Classics trophies to have left the country in a horsebox bound for Britain this year. Only Los Angeles (Ire) prevented a shut-out for the home team, but he was chased home by the British-trained duo of Sunway (Fr) and Ambiente Friendly (Ire). Ireland did claw two back though, with the Epsom victories of City Of Troy and the now-retired Ezeliya (Fr).

You Got To Me also provided her rider Hector Crouch with a deserved first Classic success, while her co-breeder Mark Tompkins joins that elite band of people who can boast of having trained and bred a Classic winner. Tompkins, the former owner of Dullingham Park Stud who retired from the training ranks five years ago, won the 1993 St Leger with Bob's Return (Ire)

The team at Newsells Park Stud, who co-own You Got To Me with Valmont, can also draw increasing encouragement from the start made by resident young stallion Without Parole (GB), who was bred at the stud by John and Tanya Gunther and is a son of Nathaniel's old nemesis Frankel (GB).

To his five winners in Britain and Ireland can be added another in America. Without Caution, who won on debut at Saratoga last week for John Gunther, is not only an exciting first winner in North America for Without Parole, one of the stars of the Gunthers' breeding programme, but he emanates from the family of another. Without Caution's third dam is Voodoo Lily (Baldski), who appears in the same place in the pedigree of Justify, the Triple Crown winner bred at the Gunthers' Glennwood Farm and now head of the roster at Coolmore's Ashford Stud.

It's a Yah for Mo

However much you may never again want to hear the 1980s pop song of the same name, it was good to see Yah Mo Be There (GB) become the first stakes winner for his sire Mohaather (GB) at Newbury on Friday.

The colt, trained by Richard Spencer for Phil Cunningham, continued an excellent year for Stuart McPhee, who co-bred Yah Mo Be There with Nigel Kelly, and is also the sole breeder of the Poule d'Essai des Poulains winner Metropolitan (Fr) (Zarak {Fr}). Yah Mo Be There was offered last year by the Rawding family's Manor House Farm Stud, where he was born and raised, at the Goffs UK Premier Yearling Sale, fetching £95,000.

The same consignor's sole entry at the same sale this year, lot 137, was also bred by McPhee and is another Mohaather colt, out of the Listed-placed Tamadhor (Ire) (Arcano {Ire}) and a half-brother to eight-time winner Tawaazon (Ire) (Invincible Spirit {Ire}).

A Winning Formula for Highclere

The combination of Highclere Thoroughbred Racing, George Boughey and the Tattersalls Craven Breeze-up Sale has been a potent one in recent seasons. First came Cachet (Ire) (Aclaim {Ire}), the 60,000-guinea breezer who became a first Classic winner for her trainer in the 1,000 Guineas of 2022. Into her place has stepped Believing (Ire) (Mehmas {Ire}), who has been ambitiously campaigned but stepped up another level again at the weekend with victory in the G2 Sapphire Stakes. This was her sixth win in 20 starts, and her fifth stakes success.

Believing was a little more expensive than Cachet, but not ridiculously so, as Jake Warren paid 115,000gns for her from the draft of Michael Fitzpatrick's Kilminfoyle House Stud.

It was a good weekend for Fitzpatrick's pinhooks, whether foal to yearling, or yearling to breezer. He had bought Believing for 70,000gns from Book 2 of the Tattersalls October Sale, and at that same sale a year later he sold, for 325,000gns, a colt by Havana Grey (GB) whom he had bought for 56,000gns as a foal. Admittedly that was the year in which Havana Grey really started motoring as a commercial prospect, but Fitzpatrick has proved time and again how adept he is at judging young stock - and turning a decent profit when trading them.

That Havana Grey colt now goes by the name of Elite Status (GB), who brought up a natty Kilminfoyle pinhooking double on Saturday when winning the G3 Hackwood Stakes for Karl Burke. The three-year-old has now won twice at Group 3 level along with two Listed victories.

Alice Procter

We send our very best wishes to Alice Procter, who remains in intensive care in hospital in Lancashire as she begins her recovery from a race fall at Cartmel on Saturday.

The 21-year-old amateur jockey is the daughter of Doug and Lucy Procter of The Glanvilles Stud in Dorset, the birthplace of the Grade 1-winning hurdlers Honeysuckle (GB) and Sam Spinner (GB). Procter's elder brother Freddie also rides as an amateur and has won 37 races over jumps in America.

A statement released by the Injured Jockeys Fund (IJF) on Monday read, "[Alice] is conscious and able to talk for short periods of time. The surgery to stabilise her thoracic spinal fracture was successful, although there are indications of some damage to the spinal cord.

"Alice will remain in hospital as plans are made for her longer-term rehabilitation.

"The Procter family are very grateful for all the messages of support from across the industry. However, they recognise that this is likely to be a long journey and they kindly ask that enquires are handled by the IJF."

This year began in similar fashion for the son of Deep Impact (Jpn) as he again failed to beat a rival in the G1 Dubai Sheema Classic at Meydan in March, but he's got back on track on his last two starts to cement his position as the red-hot favourite for Saturday's feature contest. Runner-up to White Birch (GB) (Ulysses {Ire}) in the G1 Tattersalls Gold Cup at the Curragh in May, he then underlined that the Ascot track holds no fears for him when gaining the sixth Group 1 success of his career in the Prince Of Wales's Stakes.

Auguste Rodin could be joined at Ascot by the stable's four-time Group 1 winner Luxembourg (Ire) (Camelot {GB}), last seen winning the Coronation Cup at Epsom, and last year's G1 St Leger hero Continuous (Jpn) (Heart's Cry {Jpn}), who shaped as if needing the run after nearly nine months off when finishing fifth in the G2 Hardwicke Stakes at Royal Ascot. Point Lonsdale (Ire) (Australia {GB}, third in last month's G1 Grand Prix de Saint-Cloud, and Hans Andersen (GB) (Frankel {GB}) complete the Ballydoyle contingent.

Grand Prix de Saint-Cloud scorer **Dubai Honour (Ire)** (Pride Of Dubai {Aus}) is one of four other Group 1 winners in the potential line-up, along with Charlie Appleby's **Rebel's Romance (Ire)** (Dubawi {Ire})--already successful at the top level five times in four different countries--last month's Pretty Polly Stakes heroine **Bluestocking (GB)** (Camelot {GB}) and the three-year-old **Sunway (Fr)** (Galiway {GB}), who won the Criterium International as a juvenile and was last seen filling the runner-up spot in the Irish Derby. **Cont.**

Sunway is the only member of the Classic generation among the 11 contenders, leaving the four-year-olds **Goliath (Ger)** (Adlerflug {Ger}) and **Middle Earth (GB)** (Roaring Lion) to complete the list, having finished second and third, respectively, when they met in the Hardwicke last time.

REGENT'S STROLL BREAKS NH HIT WORLD RECORD AT GOFFS SUMMER SALE



Regent's Stroll sells to Tom Malone and Paul Nicholls for £660,000, a world record for a NH horse-in-training | Goffs

Unbeaten **Regent's Stroll (Ire)** (Walk In The Park {Ire}) set a new world record for a NH horse-in-training when the 5-year-old gelding dropped the hammer at £660,000 to Tom Malone and Paul Nicholls at the Goffs Summer Sale on Monday.

Regent's Stroll (Ire) (lot 67) is set to remain in the care of Nicholls in Ditcheat after selling to the 14-time British champion trainer and bloodstock agent Malone after a spirited bidding war. Bred by Rita Kent, Regent's Stroll is one of five winners out of the unraced Pretty Puttens (Ire) (Snurge {Ire}), who is in turn a half-sister to the G1 Cheltenham Gold Cup winner Denman (Ire) (Presenting {GB}).

The gelding won both his starts in bumpers during the latest season for Nicholls and in the familiar colours of Chris Giles, who offered 11 lots through Mill House Stud at Doncaster following his departure from the sport. That dispersal sold for a total of $\mathfrak{L}1.9$ -million with Nicholls and Malone securing eight of the lots for new owners.

That pair also notably struck for lot 65, Graded-winner **Rubaud (Fr)** (Air Chief Marshal {Ire}) for £200,000, and partnered with Dave Staddon to secure Grade 1-winning **Stay Away Fay (Ire)** (Shantou) (lot 72) for £325,000. French Grade 1-winner **July Flower (Fr)** (Pastorius {Ger}) (lot 96) changed hands to Henry De Bromhead for £350,000.

Of the 188 offered lots, 134 sold for a 71 per cent clearance rate, which is down 9 per cent from 2023 where 125 were offered and 100 sold. The turnover surged to £3,643,000 in 2024 from £1,135,000 in 2023. The average and median prices also rose with the former tallying £27,187 and the latter £9,000; up from £11,356 and £5,000, respectively, from last year.

"What an incredible day in Doncaster and we must start by thanking Chris Giles for entrusting Goffs to handle such a prestigious dispersal of quality horses," said Goffs UK managing director Tim Kent.

"It has been a pleasure to work for Chris and we hope to see his colours back in the winners' enclosure in the not-too-distant future. It has also been a pleasure to work with Juliet Minton and the Mill House Stud team, who did such a fantastic job of presenting the horses for sale."
