TRAINING GIANT JEAN-CLAUDE ROUGET TO JOIN FORCES WITH JEROME REYNIER

Jean-Claude Rouget, one of the most successful trainers in French racing history, is set to join forces with Jerome Reynier with the pair set to operate from a joint licence from January 1, 2025.

Rouget, 71, has training bases in Pau and Deauville and has managed the careers of some of the game's biggest stars, including Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe winners Sottsass (Fr) and Ace Impact (Ire).

The four-time champion trainer in France announced back in May that he had been suffering from exhaustion and was set to follow doctor's advice by taking a three-week break from training. He was later diagnosed with lymphoma.

The statement read, "Jean-Claude Rouget will be absent from the racecourse for the next three weeks. His two assistants, Jean-Rene Dubosc [in Pau] and Jean-Bernard Roth [in Deauville] will pick up the baton in the meantime.

"Preoccupied with his state of exhaustion, his doctors have recommended he undergo medical examinations as well as complete rest.

"Jean-Claude Rouget aspires to strictly adhere to this advice, which requires him to step back from his professional life, while he thanks everyone for their messages of sympathy." Cont. p3

SHERGAR CUP CONTENDER JORDAN ELECTRICS CHASING EIGHTH WIN OF 2024

It's usually the jockeys who dominate the headlines at Ascot's Dubai Duty Free Shergar Cup fixture, but the Jim Goldie-trained Jordan Electrics (GB) will be well worth a few column inches of his own should the eight-year-old continue his remarkable winning sequence when he teams up with the British-born, Australian-based Rachel King in Saturday's 'Dash' run over five furlongs.

When Jordan Electrics made his first appearance of 2024 at Musselburgh in April, he did so as an admirable sprinter--the sort of horse anybody would love to own as the winner of nine races--but one whose ceiling appeared to be fairly well established, never having won from a BHA rating above 74.

However, nearly four months on from that ninth-place finish at Musselburgh, it's fair to say that the remains of that ceiling now lie shattered on the Hamilton turf, the scene of five of the seven wins he's accumulated so far this season. **Cont. p3**

It has not been confirmed whether joining forces with Marseille-based Reynier, one of the most progressive trainers in Europe, is linked to Rouget's health.

In an exclusive interview with Jour de Galop on Thursday, Rouget said, "I have known Jerome for some years and when I looked at the way he works, everything about it pleased me. We haven't been close but we understand one another very well. The idea came to me at the start of the year."

Reynier added, "The joining together of our two stables will become official on January 1, 2025 and from then on our names will appear together on racecards.

"I am convinced that by joining forces we will maximise our opportunities and that everyone will gain from it. Together we will be stronger and it will be exciting to share that together, as we strive to obtain the best possible results."

For good measure, when he gained his fourth straight success at the South Lanarkshire track last Saturday, he clocked a rapid time of :56.96s, lowering the five-furlong course record to go with the six-furlong record he'd broken a couple of weeks earlier.

Now up to a rating of 102, having started the calendar year off 72, Jordan Electrics is no doubt in the conversation when it comes to the most-improved horse of the season. What the son of Dandy Man (Ire) has achieved is quite simply extraordinary, so too the where--he's now the winningmost horse at Hamilton with nine career victories--but the only way to start the conversation with Goldie when it comes to the arc of this horse's improvement is the simple question of 'How?'.

"I wish I knew!" laughs the trainer based at Libohill Farm in Uplawmoor, located roughly 45 minutes away from the course Jordan Electrics has made his own. Not too far to go then, although a small change to the travel routine of "the wee horse" is identified as one of the reasons why he's seemingly an improved model this year.

"He used to get angry if you travelled him with other horses," Goldie explains. "He would be kicking the partition and carrying on. We just don't travel him with other horses now. We've put him in a stable on his own and in his own wee world he's quite happy and saves all of his energy for the racecourse.

"I've studied sprinters for years and I used to be fascinated with Dandy Nicholls. He was a master with them and David Chapman was before him. It's just about finding what works for certain horses and to keep doing it."

He adds, "It's quite a remarkable achievement for the wee horse. He's not a big horse but very well balanced, well put together and very sound, touch wood. That's the main thing and he comes out of his races very well."

Jordan Electrics's robust constitution should stand him in good stead at Ascot on Saturday when he faces his toughest test yet, stepping up further in grade after only seven days off. Is it possible that he could still have more to offer? Goldie is as eager to find out as the rest of us. Cont. p4

"I'll be curious to see how far the graph goes because if you're carrying top weight and still breaking course records, it's not as if you're scraping home, is it?" he points out. "He's in sparkling form and hopefully we can keep the ball rolling.

"Paul Mulrennan has won a good few races on him and it will be interesting going to a Shergar Cup. He's a straightforward horse and hopefully the jockey [King] gets a good tune out of him.

"If there's a tailwind, we're laughing. He's very fast and he breaks well, so he'll be on the pace I would imagine. If there's a headwind, it makes it difficult for front-runners. He doesn't need to make the running but he's sharp.

"Whatever he does, it seems to work perfectly at Hamilton. Ascot is a different ball game, but I've done quite well at the meeting over the years and we're looking forward to it."

Jordan Electrics takes his name after his owner's family business in Lanarkshire and is quickly developing a cult following according to Goldie, who explains, "Brian Jordan, it's his family who own him. Brian has been retired for a few years now, but the business is still going. You can imagine all the workers back him, so he's most popular horse in Scotland at the moment! He's got a huge fan base."


Similar comments apply to stable-mate Euchen Glen (GB) (Authorized {Ire}), who was just a four-year-old when Dutch rider Adrie De Vries partnered him to victory at the Shergar Cup back in 2017.

The winner of the John Smith's Cup, Old Borough Cup, Cumberland Lodge Stakes, St Simon Stakes, Brigadier Gerard Stakes and Gala Stakes in the interim, Euchen Glen is still going strong at the age of 11 and no conversation with Goldie would be complete without mention of the much-loved veteran.

"He's in great order," Goldie says of the 13-time winner. "I wouldn't say he was unlucky at Goodwood [when finishing fourth last time], but Joe Fanning is a master at getting to the front and stacking them up and we were sitting out the back. But that's the risk you take when you drop in. You just hope the race is run to suit you.

"We're probably heading to York. That's where he had one of his most famous victories when he beat the St Leger winner Logician in the Cumberland Lodge [the rescheduled race after the original Ascot fixture was abandoned]. There's a mile-and-a-half race on the Friday of the Ebor Festival he might go for."

The Goldie team can embark on the long journey to Ascot on Saturday and to York in under a fortnight safe in the knowledge that the stable seems to be in rude health. **Cont. p5**

From 20 runners so far in August, only four have finished outside of the first four places.

"Midsummer is usually our time of the year," says the trainer, before revealing one of the possible reasons why. "Probably one of our secrets is that we grow our own organic haylage for the horses. We don't have enough to do them all year, so we purposely put them on the organic haylage at this time of year.

"It's made the news this morning that the scientists can tell how good a racehorse is going to be when they're a month old from the bacteria in their gut. Maybe that's a big factor. If you're feeding them organic haylage, you're not going to have the same chemicals and what not.

"We do that with them all and one or two of them are having a good season--but they're not all improving 30lb anyway!"

BLACK-TYPE REVIEW

Leopardstown staged a pair of Group 3 contests on Thursday evening and it was the older horses who held sway with the Bahrain Turf Club Desmond Stakes heading the way of Eleanora Kennedy's hardened veteran Mutasarref (GB) (Dark Angel {Ire}) and the Ballyroan Stakes falling to the progressive Crystal Black (Ire) (Teofilo (Ire)). In the former mile contest, Ballydoyle's Ylang Ylang (GB) (Frankel (GB)) beat only one rival but that could mean very little after the coming weeks as Aidan O'Brien had warned that last year's G1 Fillies' Mile winner would badly need the comeback run. Beaten under four lengths in total, she probably shaped better than fellow 3-year-old and TDN Rising Star Galen (GB) (Gleneagles {Ire}) who was only fourth as the disappointing 5-4 favourite.

Ger Lyons was delighted with the fifth black-type success of Leopardstown specialist Mutasarref, who with his extra threepound burden was giving 10 pounds away to the 3-year-olds. "He's some horse and you don't expect him to be winning with the penalties," he said. Eleanora is having some summer, it's just fantastic. His plan is to come back here for the Group 2 on Champions Weekend, which is beyond him as we know, but it's another day out."

Moyglare-bred Crystal Black has been a revelation of late and was winning his sixth race in his last seven starts in the mile-anda-half Ballyroan, maybe even upgrading his portfolio after his latest Duke Of Edinburgh Stakes romp at Royal Ascot. After his five-length defeat of Ballydoyle's 3-year-old colt The Euphrates (GB) (Frankel {GB}), trainer Ger Keane revealed that there has been an inevitable Australian interception given a horse of his profile. "There is a bit of interest from Australia in him and there are negotiations going on that he might go for the Melbourne



Cup," he revealed.

"The lads want to hold onto half of him, but we'll know more in the next few days. If he was in the first three today, that deal was on the table. It's a kind of a fairytale really. He just keeps improving and improving. He had issues when we got him first with allergies and this year has just been amazing. You are always afraid that you are one run away from going over the top."

QUALITY ROAD'S HILL ROAD SNAGS TDN RISING STAR ROSETTE AT LEOPARDSTOWN

Last year's renewal of Leopardstown's Irish Stallion Farms EBF Maiden was garnered by subsequent G3 Gallinule Stakes victor Chief Little Rock (Ire) (Galileo {Ire}) and Thursday's latest edition witnessed the 'TDN Rising Star' performance of Adrian Murray trainee and G1 Vincent O'Brien National Stakes entry Hill Road (Quality Road--Exotic Notion, by Lemon Drop Kid).

Hill Road, a \$350,000 Keeneland September yearling who registered a May 27 Naas barrier-trial 'win' between missed engagements at the Curragh in May and June, broke well and raced in a handy third after the initial exchanges of this debut proper. Nudged along rounding the home turn, the 11-2 chance was ridden to the front passing the quarter-mile marker and

lengthened clear in style inside the final furlong to easily defeat **Shackleton (Ire)** (Camelot {GB}) by an impressive five lengths.

He becomes the first European Rising Star for his Lane's Endbased sire (by Elusive Quality), whose Stateside tally of 19 is headed by GI Santa Anita Derby hero Roadster, GI Del Mar Futurity winner Klimt and GI American Pharoah Stakes and GI Breeders' Cup Juvenile victor Corniche.

"We've always held this lad in good regard," revealed Murray. "We had him ready early in the year and he won a barrier trial in Naas. We backed off him as we wanted to give him time to strengthen up and mature. He's all there now and we'll probably come back here for the Group 2 [Golden Fleece Stakes] over a mile on Champions Weekend. He's a very laid-back horse and takes a bit of revving up. It's a good sign in a horse." Cont. p7

Hill Road is the third of five foals and first scorer produced by the stakes-placed Exotic Notion (Lemon Drop Kid), herself a fullsister to the dam of GII Pilgrim Stakes third Liam's Journey (Liam's Map).

Exotic Notion, who was bred to Practical Joke this year, is also kin to G1 Pegasus World Cup Invitational hero and multiple Grade I-winning sire City Of Light (Quality Road) and the stakesplaced Pointsman (Mt. Livermore). Her GI Santa Susana-winning second dam Fabulous Notion (Somethingfabulous) is a half-sister to GI Turf Classic-winning sire Cacoethes (Alydar). The Aprilfoaled bay is half to a yearling colt and a weanling colt by Uncle Mo.

MOORE TO REPLACE SHOEMARK ABOARD INSPIRAL IN THE JACQUES LE MAROIS

John and Thady Gosden have opted to replace Kieran Shoemark with Ryan Moore for the ride aboard **Inspiral (GB)** (Frankel {GB}) in Sunday's Prix Jacques le Marois at Deauville.

The prospect of Shoemark being replaced aboard Inspiral, who was well-held by Auguste Rodin (Ire) (Deep Impact {Jpn}) when last seen in the Prince Of Wales's Stakes at Royal Ascot, was raised earlier this week by the owners Cheveley Park Stud.

Confirming the switch, Cheveley Park's Chris Richardson said, "Ryan Moore rides Inspiral in the Prix Jacques le Marois on Sunday."

He added, "Ryan has ridden many of our best horses over the

years and we are always keen to use him when he is available." Despite the switch, Gosden snr came out in defence of his stable jockey after a string of high-profile defeats.

He told the *Racing Post*, "As stated this morning by Chris Richardson of Cheveley Park Stud, Ryan Moore will ride Inspiral in Deauville on Sunday. Ryan, along with Frankie Dettori, is the greatest international jockey in the world and regularly rides for Cheveley Park when available.

"Inspiral is attempting to win the Jacques le Marois for a third year running. She has always had a pattern of taking time to find her form in the season and is now pleasing us at home."

He added, "In her first race this year she had not run for six months and the cold spring held her back and she very much needed the race."

He said, "She then ran at Royal Ascot where the ferocious pace in the Prince of Wales's over the stiff mile and a quarter proved too much for her stamina.

"As previously publicly stated by me, there was no jockey error in either ride. She now returns to the flat mile of Deauville."

ARC STILL THE GOAL FOR AL RIFFA, AS MASAAKI MATSUSHIMA JOINS OWNERSHIP

Group 1 winner Al Riffa (Fr) (Wootton Bassett {GB}) will race for the Al Riffa Syndicate and Masaaki Matsushima beginning in Sunday's G1 Grosser Preis von Berlin. The Joseph O'Brien trainee's long-term goal remains the G1 Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe.

Matsushima has already enjoyed some success in Europe as the part-owner of G1 Grand Prix de Saint-Cloud winner Broome (Ire) (Australia {GB}).

The 4-year-old won the G1 National Stakes at two, and added runner-up finishes in both the G3 International S. and G2 Prix Guillaume d'Ornano. Fourth in the G1 Prix Ganay this April, he was sixth in the GI Manhattan Stakes in America in June. In his latest appearance, he was an encouraging second in the G1 Coral-Eclipse Stakes at Sandown behind City Of Troy (Justify) in early July.

"Obviously, it was a fantastic run at Sandown," O'Brien told the *Nick Luck Daily*. "The Arc is obviously a big target for him in the autumn. It would be great if we could have a good run in Germany at the weekend on the way there.

"I think we always had it in our minds that he would stay a mile-and-a-half. His dam is a sister to a horse that was placed in the Ascot Gold Cup, so there's plenty of stamina in his family. And she's obviously by Galileo (Ire). He's a Group 1 winner at seven furlongs and it was a big run in the Eclipse last time at 10 [furlongs] last time in the Eclipse. We have always expected that the best of him would be seen when he gets to go 12 furlongs.

"He's a very big horse. He was a big yearling and was a high class 2-year-old. That was why we decided not to run him again after the National Stakes. He had a good 3-year-old year. He had a little setback on the eve of the Champion Stakes, and he's come back on the back of a career best at Sandown. This looks like an open Group 1 and it's a logical spot for him."

DUBAI MILE AMONG TATTERSALLS ONLINE AUGUST LOTS

A total of 172 horses, including Group 1 winner **Dubai Mile** (Ire) (Roaring Lion) (lot 172) have been catalogued for the Tattersalls Online August Sale. The sale begins at noon on Wednesday, Aug. 14 and ends beginning at noon on Thursday,

Aug. 15. There are 139 horses in/out of training, 16 broodmares, nine stores, four yearlings, three foals, and the aforementioned Dubai Mile, who will be offered by Martyn Meade's Manton Park Stud, where he stood his first season in 2024.

Baroda Stud will consign **Useful (Ire)** (Galileo {Ire}) (lot 119), who is out of Group 1 winner Nickname (Scat Daddy). Another lot of note is James Ferguson Racing's lot 59, **Gulf Legend (Fr)** (Dubawi {Ire}), who is currently rated 88. He is a half-brother to Group 1 winner Feed The Flame (GB) (Kingman {GB}) and Group 3 winner and Group 1-placed Sacred Life (Fr) (Siyouni {Fr}). The Gigginstown Annual Dispersal is also part of the sale and features eight lots.

Goliath (Ger) (Adlerflug {Ger}), who won the G1 King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes, has received a mark of 125, good for second in the Longines World's Best Racehorse Rankings.

Leading the list is G1 Dubai World Cup hero Laurel River (Into Mischief) at 128, while G1 Derby and G1 Eclipse Stakes victor City Of Troy (Justify) and UAE and Hong Kong Group 1 winner Rebel's Romance (Ire) (Dubawi {Ire}) are both tied for third on a mark of 123. In a five-way tie for fifth, Group 1 winner Audience (GB) (Iffraaj {GB}) improved to 122 after winning the G2 Lennox Stakes, while G1 2000 Guineas winner and recent G1 Sussex Stakes hero Notable Speech (GB) (Dubawi {Ire}) also rose to 122. PROWESS MAKES NZ\$1.452 MILLION ON **GAVELHOUSE PLUS**

After a bidding battle, the star mare Prowess (NZ) (Proisir {Aus}) was snapped up for NZ\$1,452,500 (€796,747) by an entity under the name Downtown from the Gavelhouse Plus standalone auction. The bidding was active between several parties, including underbidders Cambridge Stud, but Downtown responded to the increments and added the dual Group 1 winner to their broodmare band.

Prowess retired with eight victories from 12 starts, ranging in distances from 1200 to 2050 metres. She was crowned the Champion Middle Distance Horse in New Zealand and claimed two Group 1 victories, along with a placing in the New Zealand 2000 Guineas.

Her dam, Donna Marie (NZ) (Don Eduardo {NZ}), was served by Proisir last season and is set to return to the champion sire this spring. Prowess's full-sister was knocked down for NZ\$1.6 million at this year's New Zealand Bloodstock National Yearling Sale. The filly was purchased by the Pakenham-based trainers Peter Moody and Katherine Coleman under the Moody Racing banner. She has been named Seychelles (NZ).

DESPITE LOSING MANY STARS, MOTT'S STABLE REMAINS A FORCE AT SARATOGA

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. - Ten days before the start of the Saratoga season, Hall of Fame trainer Bill Mott was typically optimistic and realistic about how his stable might follow yet another solid summer at the Spa.

Long a force at Saratoga, where he has won or shared nine titles, Mott was without most of the heavy hitters from the lineup that carried him to an Eclipse Award:

- Horse of the Year and champion Cody's Wish (Curlin), third in the GI Whitney in the experiment at 1 1/8 miles, was retired.
- Champion Elite Power (Curlin), winner of the GI Alfred G. Vanderbilt, was retired.
- Champion **Just FYI** (**Justify**), who broke her maiden at Saratoga, was getting some time off at the farm.
- GII Wood Memorial winner **Resilience** (Into Mischief), sixth in his 2023 debut at Saratoga, who was sixth in the GI Kentucky Derby and 10th in the GI Belmont Stakes, was also out of training at a farm.
- Veteran **Channel Maker** (English Channel), winner of the GII Bowling Green, was retired.



A week later, Mott lost another veteran star, **Casa Creed** (Jimmy Creed), who was sent off to retirement. Casa Creed won the GII Kelso and the GI Fourstardave in 2023.

"We're rebuilding this year," Mott said on that morning in early July. "We're looking for some new guys. We need some new faces and hopefully some of the 2-year-olds turn out and maybe some of the 3-year-olds from last year are going to show up."

As rebuilds go, this one has been sprinter-quality quick. Through the midpoint of the season Wednesday, Mott had 12 wins from 50 starts and earnings of \$1,587,654. He picked up another third with his lone starter on Thursday. He is tied for third in victories with Todd Pletcher and is second to Chad Brown in purse money earned. His 56 percent in-the-money rate is second only to Brad Cox's 60.7 among the top 10 on the earnings table. Last year, he won 17 of 119 starts and earned \$2,805,937.

Mott said that he understood that he faced the task of restocking a deep and talented roster.

"I knew that was coming," he said. "I saw it coming last year. It's not like it snuck up on me. I was well aware of it. It's hard to replace some of those horses we had. They were older horses that had won Breeders' Cups, and we got them back for another year. And they won another Breeders' Cup. It's hard to come up with those horses for one year, much less to be lucky enough to have them two years."

In August, the Mott barn has been white hot with a record of 6-5-3 in 14 starts at four tracks across the country.

The biggest victory of this Saratoga season was by **Arthur's Ride** (Tapit) in the GI Whitney Stakes on Aug. 3 in his first try in a stakes. With a dozen different winners--**Scotland** (Good Magic)

is the only one who won for Mott in 2023--and three stakes victories, Mott gave his stable a solid grade at Saratoga.

"I'd say, excellent so far," he said. "Up to this point, we're very fortunate. They've been running good. We've been in some spots that the horses have run well. They've fit. I was lucky enough to have Arthur's Ride ready to go. That was huge having him winning that race. For everybody. Huge for Arthur's ride and the connections."

Mott picked up a pair of decisive firsts Wednesday, which pushed his win total at Saratoga to 497, second to Pletcher's 714 and just ahead of Brown's 493.

Equibase stats show that Mott made his first foray to Saratoga in 1984 with three seconds in seven starts. He was winless again as a shipper in 1985, but was second in all four starts. In 1992, Mott tied for the meet title with D. Wayne Lukas with 14 wins. It was first of the 30 years that he has won at least 10 races at Saratoga. He also won the training title in 1993, 1995, 1996, 1997, 1999, 2000, 2001 and once more in 2007 with a personal-best 27 victories.

While Mott is a major player at all of the high-level meets he competes in, he no longer carries the number of horses needed to vie with Brown and Pletcher for championships. He is planning to go after a some more Grade I Saratoga scores--his first Whitney success was his 28th overall--with 10-time graded stakes winner **War Like Goddess** (English Channel) in the Flower Bowl and GIII Ohio Derby winner **Batten Down** (Tapit) in the Travers.

Veteran jockey Junior Alvarado is Mott's go-to rider and has been up for eight of his wins this summer. Alvarado said there was some question about how the stable would fare this year with the departure of so many standouts.

"We were worried because there were a lot of horses--Elite

Power, Cody's Wish--that were going away," he said. "We knew we had to replace them and now it is mid-year and there are a couple horses showing up and we hope it puts us into a good spot at the end of the year. And we are hoping for some of the babies to start waking up."

Through Thursday Mott has saddled 16 2-year-olds at the meet and has a record of 2-2-2.

"He has a lot of good babies here," Alvarado said. "They're just a little behind mentally and late-developing horses. I think that's what Bill's best for. He gives them time, and they eventually come around as good as they can be."

Mott, 71, a member of the Hall of Fame since 1998, uses a patient approach to improve and grow the many types of horses that come into his barn.

"He lets them find themselves," Alvarado said. "That's what he's known for and that's why his horses really develop into nice horses and they are very good later on."

Mott said he is dealing with what he said was "a little virus" in his stable that may have an impact on some 2-year-olds starting in the coming weeks.

Looking toward the second half of the meet for his stable, Mott is typically optimistic and realistic.

"It's day to day," he said. "We're lucky to have some more horses to run, and hopefully we can make them fit in."

SARATOGA NOTEBOOK: MCPEEK CALLS AN AUDIBLE, WORKS THORPEDO ANNA TO BEAT THE WEATHER by Tim Wilkin

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. - At 4 a.m. Thursday morning, trainer Kenny McPeek changed the game. With the prospect of stormy weather on the horizon courtesy of the remnants of Tropical Storm Debby, McPeek decided to move up the work of his star filly, **Thorpedo Anna** (Fast Anna).

So, instead of a Saturday breeze for Thorpedo Anna, she went five furlongs in :59.59 (1/4) on the Oklahoma Training Track with exercise rider Danny Ramsey at 5:30 a.m. Thursday morning. Thorpedo Anna is being pointed to the \$1.25-million GI Travers Stakes at Saratoga Aug. 24.

"I was looking at the weather report and it looked like we were going to get rain (Thursday) and tomorrow and the next day," McPeek said as he stood outside of the Oklahoma with his trusty dog Sonny. "Originally, we were going to go Saturday, but I could not see that happening with all the weather coming."

A filly has not won the Travers since Lady Rotha did so via a disqualification in 1915. The most recent filly to run in the Midsummer Derby was Wonder Gadot, who was last in 2018.

Thorpedo Anna has won six of her seven career starts by a combined 36 1/4 lengths. Her last two wins have come at Saratoga, the most recent being the GI Coaching Club American Oaks by 4 1/2 lengths July 20.

McPeek said Thorpedo Anna will have her final Travers work next Friday at her usual time of 5:30 a.m. She worked by herself on Thursday; next week she will have a workmate, McPeek said.

"I didn't want to work her over a sloppy track," McPeek said.

"She loves galloping on a sloppy track but when it's sealed, they don't get a whole lot out of it."

McPeek said that Thorpedo Anna--owned by Nader Alaali, Mark Edwards, Judy B. Hicks and Magdalena Racing (Sherri McPeek)--hasn't missed a step in her preparations for her date with the boys in the Midsummer Derby.

"She is pretty easy-peasy," he said. "It's not rocket science. She makes our job easy. She is eating good, she's happy. We could run her tomorrow if we wanted to."

Brian Hernandez, Jr. will ride Thorpedo Anna in the Travers.

Dornoch Pleases Gargan in His First Work Since Haskell Victory

Just after 7 a.m. Thursday morning, trainer Danny Gargan sent who he believes is the best 3-year-old in the country to the main track at Saratoga. **Dornoch** (Good Magic), winner of the GI Belmont Stakes and the GI Haskell Stakes, had his first work

since his victory on the Jersey Shore.

Dornoch, with exercise rider Priscilla Schaefer on board, worked four furlongs in :47.20 (2/172), exactly what Gargan wanted to see. He worked in company with Rookie Card (Adios Charlie), an unraced 2-year-old.

"He looked good doing it ... galloped out really well and he came back good," Gargan said back at his barn on the backstretch. He is right on schedule."

Gargan did not have to alter the plans for Dornoch's work because of the predicted impending nasty weather. After the Haskell, which he won by 1 1/4 lengths as the third choice, Gargan said Dornoch would have two works before running in the Travers.

He penciled in either Thursday or Friday for the first one. Dornoch has won three of five starts this year and is the current leader of the division off the two Grade I victories. Gargan isn't going to argue that.

And, if he wins the Travers, the colt--owned by West Paces Racing LLC, R.A. Hill Stable, Belmar Racing and Breeding LLC, Two Eight Racing LLC and Pine Racing Stables--will have a stranglehold on the division.

"And he might be third choice (in the Travers)," Gargan said.
"He was third choice in the Haskell. He is going to run well. If we get an outside post, he will be so tough to beat. If he can sit on the outside of horses like he did in the Belmont, they are in big trouble. We are just hoping we don't draw the rail."

Dornoch had post position one in the GI Kentucky Derby and was never a factor, finishing 10th.

Gargan said that Dornoch's final Travers work will be either next Friday or Saturday, depending on the weather. His regular rider is jockey Luis Saez.

The Queens M G May Attempt Rare Triple for Joseph at Saratoga

The last time it happened, in 1987, Saffie Joseph, Jr., was just shy of eight months old.

At the end of the Saratoga meet, Joseph is hoping to make a little Spa history with his 2-year-old filly **The Queens M G** (Thousand Words).

The Queens M G could attempt to become the first 2-year-old filly since the D. Wayne Lukas-trained Over All in 1987 to win all three Saratoga stakes races for juvenile fillies. The Queens M G, who has already won the Schuylerville Stakes and GIII Adirondack Stakes, goes for the triple in the \$300,000, GI Spinaway at seven furlongs Aug. 31.

"We are going to try it," Joseph said outside his barn on the Saratoga backstretch Thursday morning. "She will ultimately tell us, but, right now, it's the target."

The Queens M G, owned by C Two Racing Stable and Mathis Stable LLC, went back to the track for the first time since her nine-length score in the Adirondack on Thursday morning. She jogged once around the track counter-clockwise with exercise rider Omar Tapia Droguett aboard.

"She is a very relaxed filly, a smart filly," Joseph said.

The Queens M G turned some heads when she won the Schuylerville with jockey Dylan Davis by 2 3/4 lengths at odds of

44-1. She romped to win the Adirondack by nine lengths at 5-2 odds.

"She was a little worked up in the paddock the other day before I put the saddle on her," Joseph said about the Adirondack. "She got hot--it was hot and the other horses were not getting as hot as her. It concerned me. Once I got the saddle on her, she was quiet and that gave me confidence."

Joseph said that he was unaware that it has been 37 years

since a filly has swept the juvenile stakes races at the Spa. When Over All did it, the meet was only 24 days long.

But he is also a fan of the history of the sport and it would mean a great deal to him if The Queens M G could pull it off.

"It would be huge," he said. "She bounced out of (the Adirondack) better than she did (in the Schuylerville). Once we are sure she is doing well, we will give her that chance. That is something that racing needs. It would be special."

FIERCENESS GETS BACK TO WORK AT THE **SPA**

Repole Stable's homebred 'TDN Rising Star' Fierceness (City of Light) returned to the worktab Thursday for the first time since his determined one-length victory in the GII Jim Dandy July 27, posting a half-mile in company with graded stakes winner Surprisingly (Mastery) in :49.59 (89/172) over the Saratoga Race Course main track.

"Perfect," Hall of Fame trainer Todd Pletcher said of the work. "We originally scheduled it for tomorrow, but that [the weather] looked dicey, so we went today. He did really good and seems very happy. He went with Surprisingly for a nice, steady half and was moving well. It's what we were looking for and he did it very willingly."

Fierceness, the reigning champion 2-year-old colt, is now likely pointing for the GI Travers Aug. 24 after the defection of stablemate Mindframe (Constitution), who has been sidelined due to bone bruising.

He knew that the Not This Time colt out of Kayce Ace-named for his daughter-was going to be a hot property. Not only had it been evident since the colt was foaled, but all the right people were looking at him, and bloodstock advisor Doug Cauthen and consignor Kim Nardelli had been telling him the colt 'was going to ring the bell.'

And yet, he said, "That was an amazing thing the other night to sell that horse, no doubt a once-in-a-lifetime event, but I wouldn't have traded this trip to be there to see that horse sell. For me, this has been so much more rewarding."

Casner's daughter founded For the Good 10 years ago, and its

initial goal was to allow girls in Kenya reaching puberty to continue to go to school by providing them with sanitary products. "Because they don't have even the most basic means of hygiene, they would stay out of school five days a month at that time," he explained. "Pretty quickly, they would fall behind and drop out, and be cast into a life of childbearing and hard labor."

"I came over here because I wanted to see where Kayce has been doing her work for the last 10 years," he said. "Helping young girls stay in school evolved into building secondary schools that are public. Most secondary schools in Kenya are private and so many families just don't have the means to be able to send their children to school, especially the girls. If they have several children, the boys might go but the girls don't get


that benefit. But with free secondary education, they are able to go."

For the Good has been named a top-ranked charity by GlobalGiving, and they have entered over 1,000 children into schools since the end of the Covid pandemic.

Casner was in the Masai region with Kayce at a dedication at one such new school this week. In the last presidential election, Casner explained, For the Good approached a candidate about supporting free secondary education in Kenya, explaining that the stance could help get him elected. He agreed, and won in a landslide. Now, the government puts up a third of the money necessary to build the schools, the community raises one third, and For the Good donates a third.

At the recent dedication, "the community had raised 250 million shillings," he said, "which translates to about \$18-\$19,000. They are expected to take part in the construction, and For The Good will match what they raise. They raise those funds by all of the individual families donating a goat. It really becomes a community effort. It's easy to give somebody something, but when they have to be a partner and they understand they have to do their part, it becomes much more meaningful."

"As a father, the dedication yesterday, to see what she has accomplished, meant the world," he said. "She won't speak of it,



but she's a rock star over here. When she goes to a community, they all turn out. There were at least 250 people at the dedication. It was wonderful. She's doing some extremely important work and helping to change the world, one child at a time, one woman at a time."

What a contrast from our lives back in America, he said.

"It puts everything into perspective," he said. "The privilege that we have to live where we do in the times that we live it in. The opportunities that we have for our own children, for education, for health care, we take it for granted, and for these people it's something that is a rarity for them. They live very hard lives. Schools are very sparse. They may be five or 10 kilometers away which makes it impractical for kids to go to school. So when these schools are built, it gives those children a chance to get an education."

When Anderson started the charity, she decided not to barge into these communities telling people what they needed. Instead, she brought them something.

"It's very hard to go into someone else's community saying, `we're from America and we know what to do.' That just doesn't work. So she made up these kits that had eight reusable pads that could be washed, and hung outside where the ultraviolet rays could sterilize them. It allowed the girls to stay in school and it was something that was well received by the teachers and

community leaders. It was something they saw as helpful. It has evolved into so much more. One of the things they have done is stipulate that half of the teachers have to be women, which gives those young girls role models. They don't have to have a life of hard labor. If they aspire and dream, they have the opportunity to accomplish so much."

Casner took some time to enjoy some of Kenya's natural wonders as well, experiencing the Great Wildebeest Migration,



where over 1.2 million wildebeests and another 300,000 zebras and gazelles make an annual trek through the Masai Mara. In a conservatory, he saw lions, elephants, and rhinos. Kenya banned hunting in 1977, and the country is now home to 25,000 animal species, making it one of the 10 most biodiverse countries on earth.

But the contrast between the two worlds he experienced Monday wasn't lost on him.

"I thought about that Monday night," he said. "I knew most people considered him the best horse at the sale. He's checked all the boxes. We've known it for a long time. I was staying at a very primitive eco camp in the Masai territory where Kayce does her work. No electricity. No wifi. I set my alarm for 3:30 in the morning and crawled out of bed. There was no signal, but there was one little place on a hill 200 yards from the camp where you could get a call through, and I went out there with a flashlight at 3:30 in the morning and waited for a call. It was black out there, and I was looking for the snakes. It's the bush. They've had lions wander through, elephants on their migration. Kim called me and I could hear the bidding. I was hoping this horse would be 1.5 maybe two million, but the stars were aligned and he kept going."

But Casner said it was hard not to compare what was happening half a world away to what was happening right in front of him.

"The juxtaposition of it has not escaped me," he said."I think about how little these people have and how little they live on annually and then I think about how many people that horse could feed. How much good it could do."

When she told her father about her idea for the charity, he warned her that she was going to have to stand on her own two feet.

"In the beginning, I said `I'm not going to fund this thing. If it's to be, you've got to make it happen.' She said, `I don't want you to fund it. If it's to be, I will make it happen.' I'm certainly a supporter but she has gone out and found people who believe in it and she has made it work."

So while the money from the Kayce Ace yearling will "help the bottom line of the horse budget," says Casner, he adds that a 'significant portion' of it will go to For The Good.

"I'm incredibly proud of my daughter," said Casner. "As parents, we want our kids to grow up and be good, self-sustaining human beings and leave a positive footprint on this planet. And she has gone so far beyond that."

ALAN FOREMAN Q&A PART 2: LEGAL REPRESENTATION "A VERY HEAVY LIFT FOR MOST HORSEMEN" By Dan Ross

Though officials within the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Act (HISA) Authority have already made huge strides forward in terms of across-the-board equine safety standards, one ongoing concern among stakeholders is that when it comes to the enforcement arm of the national program, an inflexibility in the way some cases are handled and sanctions meted out means the penalties don't always fit the crime.

To discuss these concerns, the *TDN* recently spoke with Alan Foreman, chief executive officer of the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association and national ombudsman on behalf of HISA and the Horseracing Integrity and Welfare Unit (HIWU). In this role, Foreman serves as an impartial resource and advocate for the nation's horsemen and women.

In Part One of this Q&A, Foreman discussed advocating for HISA to take a "fresh look" at the banned substances list to re-categorize them "based on the severity or potential to affect the horse," and to adjust the penalties accordingly "depending upon the category."

Foreman also called for the industry as a whole to "step forward" and advocate for a fairer system of enforcement where it sees problems in the current approach. "If it feels that these cases are not being handled fairly," he added, "they need to step to the plate and say so."

The following is the second part of a long, discursive conversation. It has been edited for clarity and brevity.

TDN: Let's talk about some of the other aspects of the adjudication system. The burden now is essentially on the trainer to prove the source of a positive finding where questions have been raised, whereas before, state commissions were more involved in this process.

Just this past week in the TDN, Bill Mott's attorney raised concerns about just this.

Do you also believe this a part of the adjudication process that needs correction?

AF: The burden of proof prior to HISA was absolute. Horsemen were held strictly liable for the violation, to explain the circumstances. The appropriate penalty was then issued. The standard under HISA is essentially identical. Strict liability. Now under HISA, it's to establish how the drug got into the horse. And then the standard is: Can you establish no fault, no significant fault or negligence?

Prior to HISA, an investigation would ensue. The commissions would cooperate in an investigation. The trainer would investigate. Ultimately, based on the facts and circumstances of that investigation, a final action would be taken, a penalty, or whatever.

The same thing happens with HISA or HIWU, except that HIWU is the enforcement agency. They're separate. In part, they're independent. They're not a racing commission. They are the independent third-party arm that is responsible for enforcement.

And so, my understanding is they conduct a complete investigation. They ask the trainer to investigate and provide whatever information is possible. A determination is made whether to prosecute the case or not. Not every case is prosecuted. There are cases that are thrown out that you don't read about.

Putting that aside, if you're dealing with controlled substances,

it's a very quick process and a relatively easy and smooth process. In the banned substance area, it is very tough, partly because with respect to banned substances, you have to establish to the best of your ability how the drug that was reported got into the horse's system.

How did it get there? And then, based upon how it got there, are you at fault? Are you not at fault? Were you negligent? That's the standard that arbitrators and HIWU lawyers will look at in determining whether to prosecute a case and its outcome.

But the burden that has always been on the trainer, and it's always been a tall burden in horse racing.

TDN: Just look, however, at the sheer costs involved with defending yourself. They're enough...

AF: ...That's a separate issue. First, let's separate out the controlled substances from the banned substances. If somebody wants to hire an attorney and go through the process [for controlled substance violations], they can do so. It's an inexpensive and relatively quick process.

With respect to banned substances, it's a totally different ballgame. And I think we all acknowledge that it is a very expensive process. It's an onerous process that quite frankly is a very heavy lift for most horsemen. And that's always been of great concern.

HISA instituted the pro bono program, which has helped a number of trainers. But a lot of trainers don't qualify. And therefore, they don't get the benefit of free legal counsel and that part of the system.

TDN: As you point out, it appears rare that a trainer would intentionally administer a banned substance. The penalties are large and potentially career-ending. It's extremely expensive to defend yourself. And yet the fact remains, the onus is on the trainer to prove that they're not responsible for a banned substance positive. And that's a big burden to prove.

And so again, my question is this: Should the system be modified so that HISA or HIWU or some kind of regulatory body is more involved, more cooperative in the investigation to determine the source of a banned substance positive finding?

AF: Well look, let me say that I totally agree with your premise. Totally, okay? And I believe that it's incumbent on the industry working with HISA to take a fresh look at the banned substance rules and penalties.

I don't think anybody would quarrel that provisional suspensions, significant penalties, are appropriate for the use or administration of substances that could affect the integrity of the sport or the safety, health and welfare of the horse. Bu there are substances getting into horses that would not be carried by a veterinarian, or prescribed in very unusual situations, for which trainers have had their careers upended.

Prior to HISA, a 60-day suspension was a significant suspension to a trainer. A 30-day suspension was a significant penalty. We're dealing with far more significant penalties now that not only have the potential to affect a trainer's livelihood, but they anger owners. And are they truly a deterrent? I mean, isn't there a better way to do it?

When HISA was created, the concern in the industry was the lack of uniformity, the lack of speed in many jurisdictions over adjudicating cases, and the overall fairness of the system. That's what HISA was created to address.

I think that many people feel that there has been overreach with respect to the penalties as they relate to many of the substances on the banned substances list and the ability of trainers to defend themselves.

TDN: I've heard from individuals involved that some case arbitrators appear to have little practical knowledge of the specifics of horseracing, and have shown significant deference to the prosecution as a result. Is this something you've seen? If so, is this an issue that needs addressing?

AF: In the controlled substances cases, you don't have an arbitrator. The so-called arbitrator is in the banned substances cases-they all are required to go to arbitration. And the arbitration system is the system that is used in international equine sport. It's used in Olympic sport. It's used in those bodies that abide by the world anti-doping agency code.

JAMS is the entity that is the judicial arbitration and mediation service. They specialize in arbitrations. The arbitrators who hear the HISA/HIWU cases are familiar with HISA rules because they're the same rules that apply across sports.

They may not be familiar with the nuances of horse racing, but the analysis is the same, whether it's horse racing or horse showing, or Olympic swimmers. And that is: How did the drug get into the horse? What is the drug? What effect can the drug have on the horse? And is there a fault? Is there no fault? Or is there limited fault or is there negligence?

The standard is the same. And it's incumbent upon both the prosecution and defense counsel, to the extent that there are nuances in horse racing, to establish and lay out those nuances.

TDN: But there are important differences between horse racing and some of these other equine sports, right?

AF: In some states pre-HISA, you had hearing officers who

worked for the state. You had racing commissioners who may not have been familiar with horse racing but who were adjudicating cases. So, this is the system that was set up. These are the rules. And if they wanted to include those who are familiar with horse racing, they certainly could have put that in the rules. But that's not the way the rules were established.

TDN: If you had established the rules, would you have somebody else arbitrating these cases?

AF: I personally would prefer to have arbitrators who are familiar with our sport. But that's not the way the system is set up. And I think you needed to have a system that was totally unbiased.

TDN: What do you think of the HBPA's efforts to impose no-effect thresholds?

AF: The issue of no-effect thresholds is not new. It's been looked at by the industry and by the RMTC for over 20 years.

I mean, we went from a point of what people thought was zero tolerance to a system where, with respect to 30 controlled therapeutics, we established threshold levels. And those threshold levels for those particular drugs were well studied. They informed the RMTC and ARCI of where it could comfortably set a threshold for substances that are routinely used in the treatment of the health and welfare of the horse, and not compromise either pain management or the integrity of the race.

But there are thousands of drugs and those drugs have not been studied. And to make a determination of each individual case, whether or not the concentration that was reported could have affected or did not affect the performance of a horse is relatively impossible. And so, it's very difficult to establish no-effect thresholds.

You don't know dose of administration. You don't know route of administration. You don't know time of administration. How do you measure the effect of a particular substance on the horse? We'd all like to see it. Who wouldn't want to see it? But I think it's a really, really difficult task to require.

TDN: Difficult. But as you say, the RMTC had been doing that for years.

AF: There are drugs that have been used for years, well studied in horses. There is scientific literature in support of it. You can't do that for every drug. And that's why the standard in horse racing pre-HISA has always been: Is this a drug that does or

could have the potential to either affect the performance of a horse or affect the body systems of the horse? The standard has never been based on the concentration of the drug in the system.

Look, this is all about contamination at the end of the day. It's all about contamination. And contamination is a confounding and perplexing problem for the industry. And it's one of the reasons why we have and have had the absolute insurer rule, because it's just so difficult to referee cases to determine the severity of what's happened or to put blame on someone else.

TDN: Finally, I have heard dozens of times over the past year or so from stakeholders that HISA could have avoided these teething problems by using the ARCI's model rules and building off of that. From where we are right now, do you think that that should have been done?

AF: Well, I'm going to make this point that may make me somewhat unpopular. As I look at the statistics over the past year regarding fatalities and breakdowns it makes a case, and that is: Backing off the administration of medications under the new system together with the heightened safety program, I believe, has contributed towards the substantial reduction of fatalities.

Anyone who doesn't think we were facing an existential threat because of those fatalities has their head in the sand.

The controlled substances adjudications have been very similar to pre-HISA. The difference is the system is transparent and horsemen are seeing the actual violations. They really didn't know what was happening in the industry pre-HISA. And I would argue that it's very similar.

More to your point, yes, I would've preferred to see the ARCI rules. The problem with the ARCI rules was that not every jurisdiction adopted them. They were not being uniformly applied. Look, the ARCI adopted the Mid-Atlantic safety program together with the NTRA safety program. The work that was being done in California and Kentucky-that is the HISA program. So, to me, those of us who were using this Mid-Atlantic system, there wasn't a big adjustment with HISA.

We're playing between the bookends right now in trying to resolve the best way to address and adjudicate banned substances. And I know that's been the focus of this interview. But I would tell you the safety program has been a home run. It's been good for the industry. It's something that was desperately needed. And by applying safety standards uniformly across the board, we've put the industry in a far better place than it was two years ago.

FEDERAL JUDGE WON'T ISSUE RESTRAINING ORDER TO BLOCK HISA IN OKLAHOMA

A federal judge in Oklahoma on Thursday denied a request for a temporary restraining order (TRO) that eight licensed Remington Park horsepeople wanted put in place to keep the Horseracing and Safety Integrity Act (HISA) from being enforced in that state.

Chief Judge Timothy DeGiusti of United States District Court of Oklahoma (Western District) wrote in an Aug. 8 order that, "the Court finds that Plaintiffs have failed to make a sufficient showing of irreparable harm to warrant the extraordinary remedy of injunctive relief, [and that] the imminent threat of irreparable harm that might warrant relief–particularly the issuance of a TRO on an expedited basis—is simply not present here "

The TRO request by the eight plaintiffs–Joe Offolter, Danny Caldwell, Elizabeth Butler, Randy Blair, Bryan Hawk, Scott Young, Boyd Caster and Michael Major–is only one component of their broader constitutional lawsuit that targets the HISA Authority and the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) as defendants.

The litigation seeks to invalidate HISA rules and prohibit the HISA Authority, the FTC, and the Horseracing Integrity and Welfare Unit (HIWU) from enforcing the regulations that govern the sport.

At some future point as the case unfolds, the judge wrote, it is possible that he might consider enforcing a preliminary injunction against the HISA rules.

"[T]he Court expresses no opinion about the merits of Plaintiffs' claims or whether injunctive relief might be appropriate on a more developed record," DeGiusti wrote.

Thus, other aspects of the lawsuit "should proceed in the usual course in which all parties have the opportunity to make, and the Court has the ability to consider, an orderly presentation of the relevant facts and the legal authorities bearing on Plaintiffs' claims," the order stated.

But by denying the TRO, DeGiusti was essentially agreeing with a legal response that had been filed by the HISA Authority on Monday that stated "there is no emergency."

Seven previous federal lawsuits initiated around the country since 2021 have similarly tried to invalidate HISA, and the judge in this latest Oklahoma case acknowledged in his order that he was aware of the ramifications of the other litigation, including the conflicting opinions about HISA's constitutionality that have been handed down by the Fifth and Sixth Circuits of the federal appeals courts.

"Various challenges to HISA's regulatory scheme have been moving through the federal court system while legislative and regulatory amendments have been made," the order stated. "The Authority has been enforcing the current regulations in Oklahoma for more than a year. With the exception of Plaintiff Butler, these same plaintiffs brought and voluntarily dismissed a similar lawsuit involving almost identical claims over a year ago.

"The impetus for the present action is a decision by the Fifth Circuit on July 5, 2024, declaring unconstitutional HISA's delegation of enforcement power to the Authority, which vests executive functions in a private entity," the order continued. "Until the mandate in [that case] issues, however, the plaintiffs in that case (including an Oklahoma horsemen's association) cannot seek injunctive relief from the trial court barring HISA enforcement activities by the Authority and HIWU."

Judge DeGiusti's eight-page order was issued only 24 hours after he presided over a Wednesday hearing regarding the TRO.

"During the Aug. 7 hearing, counsel for the parties presented oral argument that addressed the requirement to show irreparable harm," the judge wrote. "Plaintiffs made clear they are making a facial challenge to HISA's enforcement scheme, and they contend the mere existence of unconstitutional regulatory oversight by the Authority and HIWU–that is, the possibility of being subjected to an unconstitutional exercise of the Authority's enforcement power-constitutes irreparable harm that cannot be cured or remedied later by a favorable ruling or judicial declaration."

But at this very early stage in the litigation, DeGiusti wrote, "Plaintiffs have not satisfied their burden to make a clear showing that they are likely to suffer irreparable harm if a TRO does not issue to prevent the Authority from enforcing HISA regulations against them."

LETTER TO THE EDITOR: HEAD OF TIC CALLS FOR GREATER GLOBAL COLLABORATION

Working together. Two simple words. But such a powerful concept.

And, I believe, the power behind those words represents the future prosperity of our industry. If we don't work together to solve our issues (which are remarkably the same globally), there are strong reasons to believe that we won't have an industry to delight, stimulate and inspire for future generations.

For those who don't know me, I founded Thoroughbred Industry Careers (TIC) in 2019--with enormous help from Godolphin and many others in the racing and breeding world--as I saw a real need in Australia to proactively and strategically turn the tide on a declining workforce.

Too many in Australia have little or no connection with the Thoroughbred and do not realise that fulfilling careers are available and the next generation coming through have little or zero awareness of horseracing. And that is despite the fact we have extraordinary levels of horse ownership and more than 80,000 people working alongside our Thoroughbreds.

Here's how big the problem is: I did a focus group with a secondary school's equestrian team of 15 students, and only one person could name anything to do with horseracing. A girl put her hand up and said: "I've heard of Winx". Others all stared at me blankly.

No wonder everyone's saying they can't get staff, as even young people who ride horses don't know the thoroughbred industry exists as a career or as a sport.

So, in 2019 Thoroughbred Industry Careers launched a 12-month course that aimed to educate young people on both the breeding and racing sides to the industry and out of that it created track riders, jockey's, stable and stud staff and even media out of school-leavers, a lot of whom had little or no previous experience with horses.

So far, so good. We were delighted to have gone some way to creating our own 'British Racing School'. Then disaster: in mid-2022, for economic and political reasons, we lost our "training centre" when the New South Wales state government closed the Richmond equine courses, which hosted the core 'work safe' training our students. Suddenly we were in limbo and there is no alternative to what Richmond offered two years on--to be clear, that is face to face training with thoroughbreds, like the training that is offered at the British Racing School or RACE in Ireland.

I came very close to giving up everything. Only the intervention of key figures and unwavering support from John Messara, Vin Cox and Chris Waller's Charlie Duckworth kept me

on track.

One small point of comfort was that we had been planning pony racing as a bridge from childhood to the school-leaver years. So we just went hard at that. And we've enjoyed success with Season One now finished and Season Two around the corner. Long term secure funding remains an issue, always. Doing anything nationally in Australia, puts you in no man's land politically, so every year, cap in hand, we have to raise the funds to implement our initiatives.

Thanks to the newly launched 'Women in Racing Awards' initiated by Katie Page of Magic Millions and TAB, winning the inaugural award, has afforded me to recently conduct an inspiring mini tour of England, Ireland and France, with the aim of ensuring best practice in our pony racing. But beyond that, my time in Europe has reminded me how broadly, we all face the same challenges.

And that is why it was such a breath of fresh air to meet Diana Cooper, of Godolphin, when I was planning the launch of TIC. I have been able to draw upon the wisdom and experience of so many like-minded souls, but as soon as I met Diana, it was clear we saw things in the same light. This was her "space" and both then and now we find it difficult to stop talking about all the possibilities the industry presents.

Back then, Godolphin sponsored me to visit the UK and Ireland to review all the education initiatives that were already in place. These countries are well ahead of what is on offer in Australia.

Next, Godolphin arranged for so many industry players to meet and from that emerged Together for Racing International (TfRI). This was clearly what we needed, being able to exchange views with people from all over the world. And what a delight to discover we were all on the same page. We all have the same issues, so we could share ideas and learn from initiatives we

were working on.

Fast forward a few years and we all met in Deauville as a much more cohesive and vibrant TfRI!

So truly joined-up care for thoroughbreds and the people who work with them really is coming together, and that is made all the easier thanks to technology.

This meeting of minds from different racing precincts and how we can learn from one another is truly humbling. What has been created is a global think tank. And I have to say that so much of this is emerging thanks to Godolphin.

Without Godolphin, the danger is that each country would be working in a silo. Diana is so brilliant at bringing people together and ensuring that ideas are shared and, crucially, that things happen.

But while technology fuels our collaboration, it is the welfare of horses and the people who tend to them lies at the heart of what we do.

It is vital to have good people looking after our horses' because the horses well-being is everything. That's the very essence of our social licence. The industry has to realise we're as much in the horse business as we're in the people business.

People define our industry--robots or Al are never going to take care of our racehorses. And because it's always going to be a people-heavy industry, we have to invest in people, their education and welfare.

And while at TIC we have been working exclusively with children and young adults, those educational needs never end, no matter how old you are. Which is why any support, such as Godolphin's Flying Start programme, the excellent Thoroughbred Industry Employee Awards and other ongoing initiatives that celebrate our people, should be applauded.

For the next generation though, making those connections to horseracing is everything. First, we have to ensure in Australia that children and their parents have heard about us. So, we've run taster days and we've hosted around 350 kids from 77 pony clubs right across the country in the last 12 months.

We give them an illustrated booklet outlining the history of horseracing, how we look after our horses, what happens to them after racing, plus all the different careers available--all the time making a connection with the thoroughbred world. Any sort of engagement with our world and we're winning.

What we are trying to do is transfer the love and passion we all experienced the first time we connected with racing. It's showing them, it's lifting up the curtain and saying, here it is. This is horse heaven. This is where it all happens.

ADAPTABLE AND ONE MORE TIME SCORES AT MUSHY SARATOGA by Mike Kane

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y.--Though the mission was to run her on grass, **And One More Time** (Omaha Beach) clearly relished the muddy sealed track she won over Thursday afternoon at Saratoga Race Course.

The eight 2-year-old fillies were on their way to the paddock with light rain falling when New York Racing Association officials moved the 5 1/2 furlong maiden special weight contest to the main track. The switch did not bother the Live Oak Plantation filly, who stalked the early pace and scooted away to a 4 3/4 lengths victory in the sixth race over **Mean Eileen** (Twirling Candy) under Jose Ortiz. They reached the wire in 1:05.11 and paid \$5.20 as the favorite.

And One More Time broke her maiden one year and one day after Live Oak owner Charlotte Weber and Hall of Fame trainer Mark Casse purchased her for \$750,000 at the Fasig-Tipton Saratoga Sale. Casse said the daughter of Complicated (Blame) was the prize he and Weber were after last summer.

"She has a tremendous pedigree," Casse said. "She's a half to, like, three stakes winners. She's beautiful and she was our pick of the sale. We were bidding on her and (Weber) goes, 'is that it? What do you think?' I said, 'Ah, and one more time. Let's do it one more time.' And that's how she got her name."

And One More Time was bred in Kentucky by Bill Harrigan, who grew up in nearby Schenectady, and Mike Pietrangelo. Casse said that in addition to her pedigree, her appearance was impressive and made her a strong package.

"As an individual, she's probably a nine and three quarters out of 10," he said.

With that impression, the Live Oak team stayed in the bidding to the end.

"We're always looking to help Mrs. Weber's broodmare band," he said. We go out every year, usually here at Saratoga, and buy two or three well-bred fillies that we hope to have as broodmares down the road."

And One More Time debuted on dirt at Churchill Downs on June 26. Casse had her pointed to the turf at Saratoga but said he wasn't concerned when he heard that the race was being moved.

"It was a little disappointing, because we wanted to try her on the grass," he said. "I said to Jose before the race, 'disappointing, but I don't think it's going to matter.' And he said, the same thing."

Casse said the 4 1/2 furlong race at Churchill Downs, where And One More Time was never in contention and ended up seventh, gave her an education that helped her graduate on Thursday. He said that is a typical scenario for this young horses.

"I always tell my riders I'd rather be a closing fourth than a dying third," he said. "I like them to learn to rate and run by horses. Sometimes some horses don't react as well to others, and that's probably what you saw with her first time. She took all this kickback, but she learned a lot and we're doing this for a long career. We're not doing it for one race. I never put emphasis on first-time starters."

The emphatic victory has added versatility to her resume.

"I'm anxious now," he said. "She won on the dirt, which she can handle the dirt as well, I do want to see her on the grass someday."

Two-time black-type winner Looms Boldly added another trophy to his case when he took home the John Morrissey Stakes at Saratoga on Thursday afternoon.
